One of the Scottish Law Lords who sits at the Supreme Court in London, Lord Hope, gave the keynote address at the Scottish

Young Lawyers Association dinner on Friday evening. He was one of the judges who ruled on the case of Peter Cadder, which resulted in emergency legislation being brought in by The Scottish Government. The case is an important one meaning that all suspects must be given access to a lawyer before being questioned by police. Lord Hope expresses the view in the article in <u>The Scotsman</u> that the new Supreme Court in England does not threaten the independence of Scots Law.
