The City of Edinburgh Council has awarded the contract for the next three years to a consortium made up of Underbelly and the organisers of Edinburgh's Hogmanay, Pete Irvine's Unique Events. The contract for the next three years will cost the council £3.8m and there will be options to extend the contract for two further 12 month periods.
