Livingston man cycles to Paris for charity



LIVINGSTON LOCAL PEDALS FROM LONDON TO PARIS WITH SKY

Keen cyclist, Mike Muldoon took on the challenge of a lifetime when he signed up for Team Sky Challenge and committed to a gruelling London to Paris bike ride.

The Edinburgh father, who works as a Developer at Sky Livingston, was one of a few brave Sky employees who decided to take on the 300 mile long cycle.

Mike said: "France is the spiritual home of cycling and somewhere I had always wanted to ride. I will never forget the amazing countryside in France and the final few kilometres into Paris, first seeing the Eiffel Tower come into view and then riding along the Seine, before finally catching a glimpse of the Arc De Triomphe in the last few hundred metres of the race.

"Although I have ridden in some big events, the London to Paris cycle was a completely different experience. The camaraderie in our team was great and seeing the cyclists I had mentored over the course of the year achieve their goals was inspiring."

After successfully completing the once in a lifetime challenge, Mike had the opportunity to see Team Sky cyclist, Chris Froome cross the Tour de France finish line in first position.

Mike said: "The atmosphere in Paris was electric. Being able to watch the pro-riders on the final stage of the Tour de France and see fellow Sky cyclist Chris Froome win the iconic event was a truly unforgettable experience: one for which I cannot thank the Sky Team Challenge enough."
