The Edinburgh Mountain Film Festival is offering three films this morning all for £7 according to their website. You can buy tickets on the door as online bookings have now closed. And there are more films later as well as Sunday....

Honnold 3.0 (33 mins)

Alex Honnold's solo ascents of some of the hardest rock faces in the world have taken the climbing world by storm. So what can he dream up for his next big challenge?

The Beinn Ghlas Project (12 mins)

With a blend of archive and stunning contemporary footage, this is a journey to the birthplace of Scottish skiing, going right back to the Scottish Kandahar Ski Race in the 1930s.

Snowfall & the Inner Child

(5 mins)

Sometimes we all need to escape the trials of city life and head to the mountains, as this film beautifully illustrates.

Crossing the Ditch (56 mins)

Shortly after Australian adventurer Andrew MacAuley died while attempting to kayak from Austrailia to New Zealand ('Solo' screened at EMFF 2012), James Castrission and Justin Jones, two young adventurers, made their own attempt. This incredible documentary charts their momentous adventure.

The RSA open a new exhibition at the foot of The Mound today. New Contemporaries will show off work by new artists and architects. The show has its roots in the RSA Annual Student

Exhibition firs held in 1976.

The first Fleming-Wyfold Bursary will be granted in 2014, making this a special year for emerging talent in Scotland. The bursary offers £10,000 with an additional £4,000 towards project production costs. Some of the works from New Contemporaries will be sent to London to the Fleming Collection in Mayfair.

Art from 62 graduates will be on show throughout the gallery's 13 spaces and will include paintings, sculpture and photography.
