## Five things you need to know today Edinburgh!

Council meeting today — Edinburgh City Singers — Edinburgh Zoo Nights — Chinese Warrior lanterns — Digital Sentinel

The full council meets this morning beginning at 10 am. The Edinburgh Reporter will be providing live coverage <a href="here">here</a>. All of the council papers are <a href="here">here</a>.

The council will consider a report about the progress of building a new £41.5m school at Portobello. They will have spent almost £3.2m by the time they get to the stage where the Private Bill is passed. This is now being considered by Holyrood, and given that it attracted unanimous cross-party support when it was debated early last month, it is likely to be passed later this year.

While the council was involved with legal action in connection with the site at Portobello Park it had considered two 'fall back' options which are now said to be no longer possible as there are insufficient funds. One of these was to purchase the former Scottish Power site at Baileyfield, but Scottish Power has now agreed to explore the option of selling the property to another party. The council made an offer for the property last year but despite requests for information on the sale during 2013 the sellers did not advise their intentions till fairly recently.

The second fall back option is to build on the existing site in a phased manner which it is estimated would cost £47m and thus exceeds the budget.

The council already undertook in October 2012 to designate the existing school site as open space following the construction

of the new school on parkland. This will now be earmarked as a Field in Trust. This option offers a firm legal commitment from the council to retain the space as open ground in the future, which it must hope will allay some of the fears of those who opposed the building of the school on this site. In addition, during the planning renewal process the council undertook to allow access to the two all weather pitches to the public when not required by the school.

Jo Paulson, Events Executive for Edinburgh Zoo, said: "Edinburgh Zoo Nights could not have had a better launch, winning Best In-House Event at the 2013 Scottish Event Awards, and it is really exciting to be bringing it back for a second year.

"Many aspects from last year's events will be returning this year, including the silent disco, animal talks and adult face painting, but we will be bumping up the entertainment on offer, with a different combination of live music, street performers and comedy acts at each event. Edinburgh Zoo Nights promises to be a wild start to the weekend!"

Running from 6pm to 10pm, advanced online booking is required for Edinburgh Zoo Nights; tickets cost £20 each or £17 each for members, plus booking fee. Attendance is strictly for over 18s. Tickets can be purchased via www.edinburghzoo.org.uk/zoonights.
