Weatherseal has already gifted thousands of pounds including projects for the elderly, vulnerable, and young people. Other

good causes have included supported mental health charities, children's hospitals, specific children's health support groups, and carers.

Weatherseal managing director Tony Reilly commented:-"We were bowled over by the response in Edinburgh and had some fantastic applications. Pilton Equalities Project was chosen as a worthy beneficiary due to the many services they offer to such a large, potentially vulnerable group. Unfortunately resources are very limited and we feel it's important that additional funding is made available to such a good cause."
