Planning for new Boroughmuir High School — Watch our interview with the Economy Convener -National Trust for Scotland board — Puppet Animation Festival comes to Craigmillar — Professor Higgs at Edinburgh International Science Festival

The council's Development Management Committee appears set to approve further details of the planning application for the new Boroughmuir High School later today, which includes plans to site a multi-use games area on the roof of the new building. Merchiston Community Council have supported the application but have explained to the council that there is no pedestrian access to the site from the north side of the towpath. They would prefer a dedicated footbridge at Horne Terrace to take pupils straight into the school grounds.

There will be limited parking for teachers and staff, as there will only be 7 car parking spaces within the grounds. But there will be 17 cycle racks within the boundary of the school or in the park nearby. The new park will also have an outdoor gym, presumably similar to that in Harrison Park further along the canal.

Planning permission for the replacement school was granted in December last year, but some of the conditions required further clarification, and this is what today's meeting will deal with.

The development of the Exchange District is one of the topics

we discussed with Councillor Frank Ross when we met him recently. In a series of four video interviews Councillor Ross spelled out his vision for the city's economy and how it will grow even more with the development of the site at the canal. This is the first:-

These openings on the Board offer us the opportunity to bring in new faces, skills and talents to continue to take the Trust forward."
