You are encouraged to come watch and chat with Phill, but also to join in: bring your own iPad or drawing materials and make and share your own sketches.

The Galleries are posting Phill's work each day on Facebook and Twitter and encouraging others to share their efforts there too.

Phill is at a different gallery every week, he visits the Scottish National Gallery on 7-13 August, then the Portrait Gallery 14-20 August, and finally the Gallery of Modern Art on 21-27 August.

visitors are encouraged to draw with Phill. Grown-ups are welcome too!

Every Thursday evening Phill hosts a free in-conversation event — with a different very special guest each time. Expect a passionate and irreverent, if personal look at art as they sit, chat about what Phill has seen in the Galleries that week and maybe even do some sketching themselves!
