Funk/Fusion Double Bill: WorldService Project (London) + Thunkfish (Edinburgh). Sax player Tom Pickles formed his left-field funk/jazz outfit Thunkfish last year, and they have grown into a formidable force, with an all—original programme of full-on, spiky, rocky music. London-based WSP are on Eurotour to launch their new album For King & Country. With a

set of edgy avant-funk-jazz, the powerhouse 5-piece cuts across stylistic boundaries with a decidedly different attitude. Leader **Dave Morecroft** says: 'Punk-jazz for me is more a reflection of rebellion. Maybe it's jazz but it's played with an 'f-you' to the establishments that dictate what jazz is supposed to mean or be.'
