In Focus: Alexander III of Scotland Rescued from the Fury of a Stag 1786 by Benjamin West. The enormous scale and dramatic subject of this painting reflect the ambitions of its American artist and Scottish patron. Benjamin West, a founder member of the Royal Academy who succeeded Sir Joshua Reynolds as its President, enjoyed an international reputation as a history painter.
