A bioblitz collects loads of information about the wildlife living in one area over a set period of time, usually one day; it works best if there are lots of people involved, as the more eyes and ears there are, the more wildlife can be uncovered. Participants don't need any specialist knowledge about wildlife; all you have to do is find things, and a team of naturalists will identify them for you. Anyone can take part — all you need is enthusiasm! Events and activities you can get involved in today include an early bird walk at 6am, a butterfly survey, a spider walk in Dr Neil's Garden, a wildlife cycle ride, a reptile ramble around Duddingston Loch and a mammal tracking workshop.
