Residential property expert, MNM Developments Scot Ltd, has announced the construction of a new build property scheme in Edinburgh's Meadowbank, with support from a £7.7m funding package from Bank of Scotland.

The £11m project will meet the increased demand identified by MNM for larger, more modern investment properties in Edinburgh's city centre, and from second time buyers looking for more space.

The venture, scheduled for completion in early 2017, will create 50 new job opportunities for the area, with the company opting to use local subcontractors exclusively and bring its engineering function in house.



To support with the build, the business has also invested in a suite of new equipment, including a crane, funded by an £120,000 asset finance facility from Bank of Scotland.

The 51 modern apartments on Marionville Road will be ideally situated near local amenities and public transport links. Each property will have a steel frame, solid concrete floor and triple glazed windows.

In addition to the main complex, MNM will also install a basement car park directly underneath the building to provide residents with secure parking in the city centre.

The announcement comes on the back of a recent win at the Scottish Home Awards, where the family business took home Apartment Development of the Year 2016 for its latest project at Harbour Green, Portobello.

Marc Teague, director at MNM Developments said: "It been an exciting year for us so far and we're looking forward to providing a great selection of modern, high quality homes so close to the city centre. Meadowbank is a fantastic place for families and those looking to invest in property and we hope that the project will help support the area's bright economic outlook."

Graham Dunlop, relationship director at Bank of Scotland added: "This is the fourth project we have supported Marc and his team with and we're confident it will be another major success.

"Residential property is an important sector for Bank of Scotland and we're committed to providing tailored support to meet the individual growth strategies of our customers in the industry."



EDINBURGH pub Southside Social is celebrating after being shortlisted for a prestigious award at The Scottish Bar and Pub Awards.

The venue is in the final four for a Diageo Social Responsibility and Community Award at Scotland's longest running bar and pub awards which take place on August 16 at Glasgow's Hilton Hotel.

The social enterprise business on Buccleuch street aims to help Scotland's young people into sustainable work — and provide a drinking venue for customers.

The bar also donates its profits to charity.

The pub's director Chris Thewlis who has a background in the security business, said: "I'm very excited we've reached the shortlist. We are a social enterprise and we turn our profits into training young people from harder to reach backgrounds and find them job opportunities. They come to us and gain the skills, qualifications and work experience they need and we try to get them a job. We have an extremely high employability rate so it works."

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The bar is celebrating its first birthday in August and Chris and his partners have bought another venue in Edinburgh too. He said: "We keep prices keen and if you want to use the venue for a community group we never charge. We try to be a place for people to use and our supply chain is ethical and, wherever possible, through other social enterprise companies. We use Changeworks waste management and Breadshare bakery with helps people with mental health issues. We also stock Heroes vodka which gives back to Help For Heroes charity."

Judges from DRAM Magazine, who host the awards, and Diageo are looking for a responsible pub or bar that has developed good relationships with local police, community safety partnerships, community groups, and licensing forums to help minimise alcohol-related crime, as well as those who go the

"Our aim is to bring families some source of comfort in what must be the most difficult of time. After receiving thank you cards and verbal feedback from families, it's overwhelming to see the positive impact they are having".

"We're so thankful that the Sick Kids Friends Foundation continues fund these memory boxes for families at what has to be one of the most difficult and traumatic of times."

The boxes have recently been redesigned to ensure they are of the best quality for each and every family and the keepsakes items in them provide comfort to families. Roslyn Neely, CEO of the Sick Kids Friends Foundation, said: "This is a really touching initiative and we're very pleased to provide this valuable support to families. We can't even begin to imagine what these families are going through and want to ensure that we can continue to help them in any way possible.

"We exist to ensure children and young people's lives are less interrupted by illness and that they have a more positive hospital experience. We provide enhanced facilities and cutting edge equipment and it is the generosity of those who get involved with initiatives like this one which allows us to continue to do this."

"Spoken word is everywhere at the moment, and this summer we are joined by some of the biggest names in spoken word performance right now. Luke Wright brings his award-winning show What I Learned from Johnny Bevan to Charlotte Square Gardens for one night only. He tackles British politics head on, challenging the rise of New Labour and David Cameron, in this humorous hurricane of a performance. Meanwhile, producer of BBC R4's Short Cuts, Eleanor McDowall chairs a discussion about spoken word in the digital world with some leading names in the field including podcaster Ross Sutherland and actor Mike Livesley."
