Councillor McInnes is resigning as he was elevated to the House of Lords in David Cameron's Dissolution Honours List and now travels to London as Lord Mcinnes of Kilwinning CBE. He received the CBE last New Year, and in view of his work as head of the Conservatives office in Edinburgh he was further honoured. In May 2016 Ruth Davidson MSP the leader of the Conservative party in Scotland was returned as the MSP for Edinburgh Central along with others who boosted the Conservative numbers at Holyrood. To date he has asked one question in the Lords.

Paul Godzik has been the Education Convener for most of the five years of the administration, but has recently moved out of town and is stepping down in May.

Sandy Howat was leader of the SNP Group for a year, but the SNP Group hold annual votes on who their leader is and who fills all other posts. He lost that position to Councillor Frank Ross last year and with it probably the opportunity to become the council leader in 2017. He can probably fit more words into a three minute speech than most other current councillors.

- Returned to Scotland in 2014 to campaign for No vote in the independence referendum. Now works as a political adviser to Scottish Conservative education spokesperson Liz Smith MSP in The Scottish Parliament.
- Interests include history, cinema, architecture and rugby. Plays for Heriot's Rugby Club and The Scottish Parliament team.

Priorities for Morningside Ward:

Morningside is a great place to live and work and I want to keep it that way. However, I believe that there are still many improvements that can be made to it. I want to give the ward a strong local voice in the City Chambers and not only have its issues tackled but also be a key part of overall planning for a strong and successful Edinburgh. Specifically, I want to address the following issues:

• Make much needed improvements to Morningside's roads and pavements. The Conservatives are pledging to do this by improving the technical specification of repairs and restructuring the tendering and delivery of repairs and maintenance so that people get the best value for money for their Council Tax.

- Improve the infrequent and patchy coverage of our bin collection and recycling services, making them more reliable and cost effective by tendering parts or all of the service and prioritising higher standards and lower costs.
- Ensure our local schools have sufficient capacity and see through the successful building of a new primary school for Morningside.
- Improve Morningside's transport links with the rest of the city and elsewhere by lobbying for the re-opening of the South Suburban Railway and Morningside Station.
- Oppose destructive planning applications, such as those recently proposed for Craighouse, Midmar Paddock, Comiston Farmhouse and the Old Royal High School. We all understand the pressures that a growing Edinburgh will put on the city's infrastructure, however I believe that this can be mitigated and balanced with preserving Edinburgh's fantastic architectural heritage.
- Press the Council to provide funding for a gull denesting service to tackle the urban gull problem in our city's tenement areas such as Bruntsfield and Marchmont.

Melanie is standing for the new ward of Morningside. In 2012 she was elected Green councillor for Meadows/Morningside, and has been working hard ever since, doing just what she said she'd do. Here are just a few examples:

She worked tirelessly as a founding member of Bruntsfield's community owned Green Grocer, Dig-in, the first urban community run green grocer in Scotland. Melanie was chair for the first two years, as the venture was setup and the shop opened.

For 4 years Melanie persistently campaigned with fellow Green Councillor Steve Burgess for rights of way across the beautiful Astley Ainslie Hospital site. Following their success public access is now guaranteed across the site in perpetuity, linking residents to the shops on Morningside Road and maintaining a green space for local families.

Melanie called for and led the largest participatory budget event — South Central Decides — in Edinburgh, transforming the way our council listens to residents. Over £200,000 local funding given over to residents to decide how to spend, with the money being used to fix roads, improve the local environment, and fund local community projects.

Melanie has supported hundreds of residents finding solutions to individual problems and local issues.

Melanie sits on the Education and Audit committees, holding the Council and administration to account. Though not glamorous, her work on governance has been transformational in opening up access to information.
