life. According to the serial number the Bechstein was built
in 1922 and it has been in the club for 65 years.

The new piano is made by Feurich and has been used by a recording studio so the club is assured of its accuracy and reliability.

The ivories will start tinkling during August when the club is

awaiting guest performers such as Ron Davis and his jazz group from Canada, the young concert pianist Elena Fischer-Dieskau as part of the Club's Fringe programme — ClubFest.
