Two of Scotland's biggest names complete the already impressive programme of speakers. Former First Minister, Alex Salmond, will be in conversation with Professor Sir Tom Devine on November 25th 2017 at 7.30pm in the City of Edinburgh Methodist Church Halls on Nicolson Square. If any of you managed to get a ticket for Mr Salmond's show at the Fringe then you will know that Tom Devine was one of his guests, and he introduced him as a giant of history. There followed a very interesting discussion about politics in the not too distant past.

Festival director, Susan Morrison, said: "These are two of the 'biggest beasts' roaming Scotland's modern history.

"One stood in the very eye of a political storm and the other has been responsible for shaping a new view of our national story. Think of it as a bit like watching Godzilla face Kong. Only noiser."

* The Medici: Mary Hollingsworth and the reality of the family who built banking; and

* A special Flint & Pitch Production: A dangerous woman's guide to transgressive behaviour: everything you need to know about being a dangerous woman from the great dangerous women of history.

The diverse programme includes comedy, walks, talks, food, seminars and hopefully a good old bit of healthy debate.
