"FSB was founded to enable grassroots activists to fight for change. As we look back over the last year, we can celebrate a number of significant wins for our members.

"We saw the scrapping of planned NICs increases for the selfemployed. In Scotland, 104,000 small businesses saved a total of £226m in the last year through the landmark Small Business Bonus scheme. This was all sparked by our members being vocal at the local level.

"Looking forward, we need to increase our focus on effectively mobilising FSB's grassroots activists."
