Shirley-Anne Somerville said : "This is one of three high schools all opening on the same day in Scotland.

"But it is what happens within the building which is important. I have had a tour of your amazing facilities, and have seen your amazing rooftop football pitch and some of the other facilities here.

"I have no doubt that this will provide all of you with such great learning opportunities regardless of where your passions lie within school."

Earlier the Minister spoke to us about the new school building. She said : "It is fantastic to see the facilities here, and having spoken to the staff and pupils today there is a real sense of excitement for their new school. There is a real pride for what they have here.

"This is of course part of the Schools for the Future programme that the Scottish Government has had since coming into administration with £1.8 billion invested in the schools estate. It is great to see the facilities that they have here at Boroughmuir now."
