Learning in the great outdoors...

The Outdoor Learning Challenge is the first event of its kind to be staged in Scotland and is taking place in Holyrood Park today. Sadly, as a result of Storm Ali the event planned for yesterday had to be cancelled.

It has proved so popular that organisers from the City of Edinburgh Council's Sports and Outdoor Learning Unit initially put on events today as an extra day, but now it will be the only day that outdoor school is running.

Some 1,900 pupils from 40 different schools signed up to take part.

The event is organised with partners Historic Environment Scotland, Dynamic Earth and Moray House School of Education, and there will be a wide variety of outdoor challenges for the pupils to tackle in three themed zones — Explore, Discover and Create.

Activities include: orienteering, mountain biking, archaeological excavation, ropes/tents/knots challenges, learning about geography, biodiversity, conservation and environmental art.

Cllr Ian Perry, Convener for Education, Children and families at the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "The Outdoor Learning Challenge is a fantastic opportunity to bring together young people from across the city and showcase just how amazing our planet really is alongside discovering many other exciting ways you can learn and play in the outdoors.

"As well as providing an exciting and challenging day for pupils, the event aims to provide school staff with ideas and stimulus to take their regular teaching into the outdoors, and to showcase the many providers who operate across the city to support and provide Outdoor Learning experiences.

"It's going to be a great event and well done to our Sports and Outdoor learning Unit and partners Dynamic Earth and Historic Environment Scotland for pulling it all together."
