Food collection points launched at EICC

The <u>Edinburgh International Conference</u>
Centre (EICC) launched large scale food
collection units inside the centre on St

initiative.

We spotted a bin in the entranceway last week when it was quite empty, but you can see from the photos that donations have already been made.

In partnership with Edinburgh Food Project, part of the Trussell Trust network of food banks providing emergency food parcels to people living in food poverty, the moveable foodbank collection units at the EICC means that the venue will become one of the city's main food donation points.

It was launched on St Andrew's Day, and at the beginning of the Festive season with First Minister of Scotland, Nicola Sturgeon.

Ms Sturgeon said: "This St Andrew's Day we can all use our national day to do something small but significant as part of the #MakeSomeonesDay campaign. If each of us does something kind for another, together we can make a big, positive impact for the benefit of the whole of Scotland
