As the one o'clock gun sounded, which is said to be the time at which Bobby left his master's grave each day for a free meal at a nearby café, there was a short outdoor commemorative service which included speeches from Bailie Lezley Marion Cameron, Angela Constance MSP and representatives of the Dog's Trust followed by pupils from George Heriot school laying flowers at Bobby's headstone.
