The Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo shares touching tribute to audiences near and far

On 7th August 2020, The Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo is paying homage to its incredible audiences, performers and staff on what would have been the show's opening weekend with a specially created tribute, to be released at 7pm on the Tattoo's social channels.

After 70 years, the Tattoo has grown from having a largely local audience of 100,000, to seating 220,000 — including international guests from over 100 countries — on the esplanade throughout August. This year is a joint celebration as it also marks the 70th birthday of HRH The Princess Royal, Patron of the Tattoo.

From humble beginnings — inspired by a simple show called 'Something About a Soldier' performed in 1949 at the Ross Bandstand, Lieutenant Colonel George Malcolm was the first Producer of The Edinburgh Tattoo with the ambition of bringing the Army's contribution to the Edinburgh International Festival to life.

From a modest event in a park to today's globally recognised spectacular on the Castle Esplanade, the mixed military and cultural cast is now drawn from far and wide and audience following continues to grow year on year.

Buster Howes, CEO of The Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo,

said: "I'm immensely proud to have recently taken the reigns of this iconic show. The audiences we welcome year on year are hugely important to us and we want to acknowledge the continued support on what should have been the opening night of our 70th anniversary show.
