
## Forget-Me-Not Garden opens in the grounds of Lauriston Castle

The speakers were introduced by Jamie Edgar, Chairman of Edinburgh Forget-Me-Not Garden Trust.


The Lord Provost was also tasked with planting a tree in the memory garden.









It provides a balanced mix of relaxation and interest.

The Edinburgh Forget-Me-Not-Garden Trust was formed in 2015 with the objective of turning the dilapidated lodge and unkempt garden into a hub where help could be sought from

volunteer advisors and a tranquil garden could be enjoyed all the year round. The Trust signed a 25-year lease from the City Council in 2019 for the lodge and adjacent garden grounds.

With no additional financial support from the Council, the task began to raise the necessary funds to convert the lodge and garden into the vision imagined.
