For families, there is Disney's <u>Winnie the Pooh</u> and Northern Ballet's <u>Ugly Duckling</u>. Or get your pantomine tickets sorted early with <u>The Pantomine Adventures of Peter Pan</u> at the Festival Theatre, followed by Scottish Ballet's <u>Cinders!</u> in the new year.

Plenty music shows too, including boogie-woogie, swing, jazz, R&B from <u>Jools Holland & His Rhythm and Blues Orchestra</u> during the <u>Edinburgh Jazz and Blues Festival</u> in July, or recreate some 70s disco with <u>Lost in Music</u>, party with <u>the Magic of Motown</u>, or dig out the white jumpsuits and singalong with <u>Mania</u>: The Abba Tribute.
