
Full council meeting

A brand new bike bus began this week with a 6km route to George Heriot's School. A bike bus is a way of many pupils biking to school with adult support to effect rolling closures at junctions and protect the young cyclists on their way to begin a school day.

Volunteer Jarlath Flynn who helps to set the bike buses up in the city <u>reported the successful trip on Twitter</u>. This bike bus used the quiet route through Whitehouse Loan which is also used by the James Gillespie's bike buses – but the future of this route is under discussion.

THE EDINBURGH Riding of the Marches will take place on 10 September in a canter back to the Royal Mile after a three year gap, and this year the Lord Provest, the Provest Consort and the Council Leader will all be on horseback.
