The ceremony will take place outside the Four Points by Sheraton at the end of Magdala Crescent.





### Leith artist carves out new look for Athletic

THE LEGACY OF world famous rtist and Leither Eduardo Paolozzi is helping to support the work of a local football club for which it is believed embers of his family played.

Knighted in 1989, Paologzi later donated a large body of his work and the contents of his studio to The Scottish National Gallery of Modern Art.
