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### Leith artist carves out new look for Athletic

Paolozzi, widely credited as the father of pop art, was born in Leith in 1924 to Balian immigrants and after graduating from the Edinburgh School of Art, became established as a sought after sculptor, designer. a sought-after sculptor, designer, printmaker and in later life, a teacher and academic.

Knighted in 1989, Paologzi later donated a large body of his work and the contents of his studio to The Scottish National Gallery of Modern Art.
