Real Money Betting

- **Outright Bet** – This bet involves predicting the overall winner of a particular tournament.
- **Handicap Bet** – Increasingly common in esports, handicap betting adjusts the odds to level the playing field, offering a more substantial return for those with deep game knowledge, making seemingly uneven matches more interesting to bet on.
- **Over/Under** – Given that many esports matches are played in either best of three (B03) or best of five (B05) formats, you can place bets on the total number of maps played in a series.
- **Map X Winner** – This type of bet allows you to wager on which team will win a specific map within the series, where X denotes the map number.

Understanding Match Formats

In esports, matches are often structured in formats like best of three (B03) or best of five (B05) series, while single games are referred to as best of one (B01). In large tournaments, group stages generally use the B01 format, shifting to B03 for the knockout rounds, and culminating in a B05 or even a B07 for the final. Due to the complex nature of most esports, a single game often doesn't accurately represent a team's true capabilities.

The format of a match significantly influences its outcome, making it a critical factor to consider when placing bets. Upsets are far more common in B01 matches, where even a much weaker team has a greater chance of overcoming a top-tier team compared to traditional sports. A favorite might lose due to unexpected strategies, a lapse in focus, or underestimating the opponent.

For example, Na'Vi, a renowned Dota 2 team known for its historical success, has often shown weak early performance in tournaments only to advance impressively through the knockout stages to the finals. Betting sites typically favor such teams due to their overall strength, but keen observers who track their progression can exploit these dynamics to achieve substantial gains.

Understanding the Competitors

Understanding the teams and/or players involved in any esports you bet on is vital for a robust betting strategy, just as it is in traditional sports like football or horse racing.

Take League of Legends as an example: thorough knowledge of the teams you're wagering on can provide several advantages. A team might be struggling with recent game changes due to a new patch, or they could be in a slump.

Consider if Team X's star player is assigned a champion they seldom play, potentially diminishing their usual impact, or if Team X is competing in a minor tournament and opts to include a stand-in, disrupting their usual team dynamics. Such nuances might not be fully captured by the betting odds, presenting savvy bettors with valuable opportunities to capitalize on.

Handling Your Betting Funds

The cardinal rule of betting is never to wager money that you cannot afford to lose. Doing so often leads to dire consequences. It's wise to set a specific betting budget and adhere strictly to it.
