David Wilkie

Olympic swimmer David Wilkie, MBE, died on Wednesday, aged 70. He was a role model for young people in Edinburgh in the 1970s — first of all winning the bronze Commonwealth medal in 1970 in Edinburgh at the Royal Commonwealth Pool, followed by the silver Olympic media in Munich and the Olympic gold medal in Montreal in 1976 both for the 200 metre breaststroke, and

holding British, Commonwealth, World and Olympic swimming titles simultaneously.

As a boarder at Daniel Stewart's College he trained at Warrender Baths Club, and, in the council owned swimming pool, he trained to become Scotland's greatest swimmer. There is a lovely video here showing him reflecting on his career sitting in the Royal Commonwealth Pool
