

Five things you need to know today

The new UK Parliament will begin work today as members of both Houses return to Westminster following the general election last Thursday.

Business begins at 2.30pm when members of both Houses will attend the Lords Chamber to hear a Royal Commission from the King to hold the new Parliament.

The House of Commons will then proceed to elect a Speaker, while members of the Lords begin to take an oath of allegiance or make a solemn affirmation to the Crown.

Business continues on Wednesday when the '[Royal Approbation](#)' ceremony for the Commons Speaker-elect is expected to take place followed by oath taking by members of both Houses.

The State Opening of Parliament will take place on Wednesday 17 July. The King's Speech, written by the government, will be read from the Throne in the House of Lords chamber. Members of both Houses then get straight down to work debating the contents of the speech over several days.

Our five Edinburgh MPs going to Westminster include Christine Jardine (Liberal Democrat), and four Labour politicians – Scott Arthur, Tracy Gilbert, Chris Murray and Ian Murray who is also the Secretary of State for Scotland.

Scott and Chris travelled with Lumo, Tracy with LNER, Ian by plane with other members of the Cabinet and, mainly since she

hasn't tweeted about it, we are not sure how Christine travelled to London.

The Eric Liddell Community

City marks the centenary of The Flying Scotsman

IT WILL BE 100 YEARS this month since athlete and missionary, Eric Liddell, won an Olympic gold medal in Paris. The story of his victory was the real-life inspiration for the film, Chariots of Fire, and he was not only a sprinter, but also a rugby player, winning seven caps for Scotland and working as a Christian missionary in China.

While he studied at the University of Edinburgh he also played sport for his country - although he had been born in Qing China where his Scottish parents were missionaries.

At the 1924 Olympics he would not run in the heats for the 100 metres race as these were held on a Sunday when he did not play sport. He then competed in the 400 metres heat held on a weekday, and - even though this was not "his" distance - he won.

His name has been given to The Eric Liddell Community (ELC) at Holy Corner which will celebrate the life of their namesake with a series of events this month. ELC is a registered care charity based at Holy Corner where they provide specialist dementia care and help people to overcome loneliness and isolation. The charity, which has HRH The Princess Royal as patron, has begun a fundraising campaign during this year to help them continue with their important work.
