Corstorphine Connections

Today at the council the still new Traffic Regulation Orders Sub-Committee will meet to decide whether the temporary orders in Corstorphine should become permanent.

This would mean changes to the bus gate camera — it would operate from 8am to 9.30am and 2pm — 4pm each day Monday to Friday. (This would not cover the early closing of Corstorphine Primary School on a Friday for some reason.)

The purpose of Corstorphine Connections is to:


Improve the safety of routes to schools in the area; Understand and address issues with speed and volume of traffic in

residential streets;

Improve walking and cycling routes and access in the area; Improve local air quality; and

Create a more attractive environment with new public realm spaces.

The criminal damage caused to the bus gate camera has cost the council more than £300,000 in repairs.

They now need funding to continue with research.


