# Scotland's universities offer scholarships to students from India

Students from India studying in Scotland have access to more than £6million in international scholarships with over £1million ringfenced to specifically attract outstanding Indian students, Universities Scotland has revealed.

As a delegation of Scotland's higher education leaders accompany Scotland's Deputy First Minister John Swinney on an official visit to India, Universities

Scotland can announce that there are scholarship opportunities available to

students from India for all of Scotland's 19 higher education institutions.

Below is a selection of the wide range of opportunities available:

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The Scottish Funding Council has announced a new £200,000 scholarship fund to mark the mission in India which will give 20 students from India scholarships of up to £10,000 for 2018/19 which will be jointly funded by the Scottish Funding Council and Scottish universities. The offer is limited to the three of the themes of the mission: big data, medical technologies and food/water.

Strathclyde Business School (part of the University of Strathclyde) has launched a new scholarship of up to £7,000 to give 2018/19 Indian applicants the opportunity to undertake a Strathclyde MBA (one year, full time study) in Glasgow commencing September 2018.

The University of Stirling has introduced a new postgraduate taught scholarship for 2018/19 Indian applicants to receive a £2,000 tuition fee waiver.

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For 2018/19, Edinburgh Napier University is again offering its South Asia Scholarships of between £1,000 and £3,000. More than £100,000 was awarded to Indian students last year through the merit-based scheme, in addition to four Education is GREAT India Scholarships, each worth £7,000.

There are approximately 150 scholarships available to Indian students across Heriot-Watt University campuses in Scotland, Dubai and Malaysia. Last year (2016/17) the university awarded £375,000 in scholarships to students from India.

To celebrate its 120 years since its original foundation in Paisley in 1897, 25 years as a university and 10 years as the University of the West of Scotland (UWS), the UWS is

offering 120 '120 Anniversary Scholarships' to non-EU international students who have achieved academic excellence. This includes outstanding students from India.

The University of Edinburgh has over £80,000 of scholarships to offer Indian

students. The largest is from the Inlaks Shivdasani Foundation which supports exceptionally talented young Indian students.

From 2-5 December 2017, the delegation of higher education leads joined the Scottish Government, Scottish Development International and the British Council as they meet with key Indian government officials, education policymakers and business leaders.

To deepen existing relationships and build new partnerships with the higher

education sector and key industries in India, a joint-programme of events was hosted by 11 of Scotland's universities and the Scottish Government in Mumbai and Delhi. They all share the message that 'Scotland's universities welcome India' and demonstrate Scotland's reputation for excellence in research, innovation and learning. There are currently over 1,300 Indian students studying in Scotland and the delegation will celebrate the excellent quality of Indian students at under-graduate and post-graduate levels in Scottish universities.

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Deputy First Minister John Swinney said: "I am delighted to announce these 20 scholarships and to extend a warm welcome to students from India to come to Scotland to benefit from a high quality educational experience, our world-class research and Scotland's distinctive culture.

"I fully expect our friends from India will made good use of the opportunities to develop the skills they need to support their long term employment prospects."

Councillor Susan Rae was instrumental in arranging for the reception hosted and she told us: "The links to Edinburgh Council go right back to the beginning.

"I worked 40 years ago helping to set up Women's Aid and I was involved in Zero Tolerance. To see young women working in these two areas is inspiring, although still a bit depressing that they are needed more than ever. We have other things to deal with such as FGM, forced marriages and trafficking so it is no longer just domestic violence.

"It is however useful to have the work recognised by the council in this way."

Fleshmarket Close was cordoned off following the attack which took place around 3am on Wednesday morning.

Police say that a man has been detained in connection with the attack and officers have appealed for anyone with information to come forward.

A Police Scotland spokesman said: "Police in Edinburgh are investigating following a report of serious sexual assault on a 44-year-old woman.

"The incident happened sometime around 3am on Wednesday, December 6, in the High Street area.

"A man is currently detained in connection with this inquiry, however, anyone who believes they may have information relevant to the ongoing investigation is asked to contact police immediately."

### Growing concern for missing schoolboy



Concerns are growing for the safety of 15-year-old schoolboy

Ryan Kerr who has been missing for two days.

He was last seen shortly before 10pm on Monday, leaving an address in Ravenscroft Gardens, and he has not returned home or attended school since.

Ryan is white, of medium build, 5ft 10ins tall, with green eyes and short light-brown hair which is shaved at the sides, longer on top and combed to the right.

When last seen he was wearing a light grey Nike tracksuit, a hooded top and grey Huarache trainers.

He also had two black rucksacks which contained extra clothing, including a school uniform.

Enquiries continue to trace the teenager who has links to the Inch, Fernieside, Portobello, Drylaw and Bingham areas of the city.

Officers urged anyone who may have seen him since this time, or who has information on where he may be, to contact them.

Police Scotland also asked the boy to get in contact with either them or his family to let them know that he is safe and well, if he sees the appeal.

Anyone with information is urged to contact Howdenhall Police Station via 101.

### Two men plead guilty to involvement in Ferry Road collision



Two men who were involved in a serious road traffic collision on Ferry Road on Saturday 19th August which left a 10-year-old boy seriously injured have today pled guilty.

Connor Whalen, aged 20, pled guilty to injuring the 10-yearold while riding a motorcycle whilst Marc Miller, aged 22, pled guilty to driving in a dangerous manner and to having an involvement in the incident.

Whalen and Miller left the scene in the wake of the collision, leaving others to tend to the 10-year-old.

The boy sustained serious injuries and was taken to the Royal Hospital for Sick Children for treatment. He has since returned home where he continues to recover from his injuries.

Officers from Edinburgh's Criminal Investigations Department conducted extensive inquiries into the circumstances of this incident and later arrested Miller and Whalen.

Whalen and Miller pled guilty at Edinburgh Sheriff Court on Tuesday, December 5. They will both be sentenced at a later date.

Detective Inspector Graham Grant of Corstorphine CID said: "Connor Whalen and Marc Miller's actions resulted in a 10-year-old boy sustaining serious injuries which will take a significant period of time to overcome.

"This was a major investigation which has thankfully resulted in Whalen and Miller both submitting early pleas and sparing a child the trauma of a trial.

"I also want to pay tribute to the 10-year-old's bravery throughout this process and wish him well as he continues his recovery.

"I hope this plea will bring a degree of closure to him and his family and allow them to move forward with their lives."

Chief Inspector Stevie Sutherland, Local Area Commander for North West Edinburgh, said: "This incident had a profound impact on those within the North Edinburgh community who have been incredibly supportive not only to police, but to the young boy and his family.

"The criminality undertaken by Whalen and Miller and their associates is completely unacceptable and will not be tolerated.

"Tackling the theft of motorcycles, and associated criminality, is a priority for us and we continue to address the matter through Operation Soteria and the Stronger North partnership.

"However if we are to fully tackle this issue we need the

support of the local community. Anyone who is aware of motorcycle criminality in their area is asked to contact Police Scotland on 101, or anonymously through Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

#### Review: Cinderella \*\*\*\*



When the editor of The Edinburgh Reporter told me I was going to review Cinderella, the much-loved pantomime at Edinburgh's Kings Theatre, I responded in traditional panto fashion. 'Oh, no I'm not!' I replied. 'I have never been to a pantomime in my life and I'm not going to start now'. Her reply was brief and to the point. 'Oh, yes you are' she said, 'or else your career with Edinburgh's best news and media website will be behind you!' (that's enough panto gags — Ed)

However, I was mighty glad I did go to the fairy godmother of all pantomimes on Wednesday evening. The Holy Trinity of Panto – Allan Stewart, Andy Gray and local hero Grant Stott – have returned to the King's for the 13th time as a trio. And they provided a hugely entertaining evening to a packed and appreciative audience.

Veteran Allan Stewart has appeared so many times at the old theatre over the years I wouldn't be surprised if the King's aren't charging him rent. He plays Auntie May, Cinderella's Fairy Godmother and despite being a star of stage for half a century, Stewart clearly still loves the pantomime season and his infectious enthusiasm certainly has its effect on his costars. Stewart has worked with Andy Gray on numerous occasions and their great friendship is there for all to see, particularly when one of them makes a wee error which is

immediately pounced on by the other with great hilarity.

Gray plays the part of Buttons, the lovable servant who has Cinderella's best interests at heart. Keeping it in the Gray family is his daughter Clare who plays one of the ugly sisters — Ruth. Maureen Carr — one of the stars of BBC Scotland's hit comedy Still Game — plays the other ugly sister — Nicola. Perhaps a wee nod there to the political landscape in Scotland? Who knows?!

Grant Stott plays the part of Baroness Hibernia Hardup, the wicked stepmother and he plays the part with great panache. Stott is, of course, a well-known fan of Hibernian FC and his reference to hating the Jambos brought a laugh even from Hearts fans present (including the former Lord Provost Eric Milligan)

The part of Cinderella is played by Gillian Parkhouse, star of Singin' in the Rain in London's West End while Prince Charming is played by James Darch, another London West End performer (Wicked) and who has also appeared in the BBC Television drama New Tricks.

The young dance troupe were highly impressive and the special effects just before the interval were breath-taking.

But the stars of the show are undoubtedly the 'terrible trio' of Stewart, Gray and Stott. The classic folk tale was given the 'Embra' treatment from the off and the audience lapped it up. Stott's assertion that Cinderella's father 'gies me the boak' is a line you won't hear in any other performance of Cinderella anywhere else in the world! At the ball, Baroness Hardup says she feels 'about as welcome as a Jambo at Easter Road!' I'm pretty sure the Brothers Grimm didn't include that in their original transcript!

It was great entertainment, nearly two hours of good old-fashioned laugh-out-loud pleasure. You don't need to be a child to enjoy this panto. It's great fun for adults too. And

the great news is that the show runs for the next six and a half weeks!

If you want to treat a loved one this Christmas — or as a New Year gift — get them a ticket to see this show. They'll thank you for it.

### Social enterprise set to expand



A social enterprise set up to help artists and designers sell their work without paying commission is set to expand its Edinburgh store and open a second outlet in Glasgow.

The Scottish Design Exchange (SDX) is a unique concept store and not-for-profit creative community, bringing artists and designers together to share retail space that benefits both the producers and customers.

Around 150 independent fashion designers, artists, textile and jewellery designers, publishers and photographers now display their creations in the SDX store in Ocean Terminal in Edinburgh.

As well as retail space, SDX provides support and training to help them develop a profitable product and promote themselves to other retailers.

The Edinburgh store is now at full capacity and director Lynzi Leroy said: "The commission-free model allows the artists and designers to sell unique and handmade items at High Street prices.

"The idea has also proved popular with customers who can buy locally made items knowing that the manufacturers will benefit directly from their support."

### Optician says: 'Don't ignore warning signs'

A nine-year-old from Edinburgh has received life-saving treatment after a quick-thinking optician spotted warning signs during an eye test.

Joanne Dovesi said her daughter Ava had experienced months of blurry vision, headaches, fatigue, motor skills issues and, more recently, a limp.

She asked her optician's advice during Ava's routine appointment at Specsavers in Morningside resulting in the youngster being referred to hospital.

Optometrist Daniel Herbert had spotted severe swelling of Ava's optic discs (known as bilateral papilodaema) caused by pressure inside the skull.

He says: "I recommended that Ava visit the hospital immediately as vision loss can result if the underlying condition causing swelling of the optic nerves is not treated.

"She was referred to the Royal Hospital for Sick Children where a diagnosis meant doctors could give her the treatment and medication she urgently required."

Joanne said: "The surgeon told us that fluid had been building up for a long time. Ava's head was so swollen it was almost the size of an adult male."

Six months on from the operation, Ava's optic nerves have returned to normal.

Grateful mum Joanne thanked all concerned and said: "I have seen a huge change in Ava since the operation.

"She is no longer tired after school, her balance is perfect and she is a bright, cheery child full of life.

Optometrist Daniel said Ava's story was a reminder of just how important it is to seek expert advice.

He added: "Ava's diagnosis is a reminder that it is essential to seek a professional opinion if you experience anything unusual — don't ignore warning signs."

Three Edinburgh University players and one from Watsonians have been named in Scotland's 27-strong squad as the clock ticks towards selection for the Commonwealth Games in the Gold Coast next year.

Coach Gordon Shepherd hosts a warm-weather camp in Gran Canaria on from January 13 to February 3 and Laura Swanson, Rebecca Merchant and Amy Brodie from Edinburgh University and goalkeeper Lucy Camlin of Watsonians will be there.

Former Edinburgh University players Nicola Cochrane, Mairi Drummond and Sarah Robertson are also selected along with former Cala Edinburgh and Inverleith player Amy Costello.

Dundee-born but Glasgow-based Shepherd said he will use this camp to name the squad for the Commonwealth Games on Feburary 14.

The Scots will play Wales five times during the camp and in the Games Scotland have been drawn in Pool B against Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and Ghana in Australia. Shepherd said there is real competition for places in the squad and he added: "The camp in Gran Canaria will allow the players to express themselves.

"As well as training we have five games versus Wales and I feel this is an excellent balance of training and games to maximise each player's opportunity to be selected."

And he added: "Every player that is going on this selection camp has the same opportunity to be selected to represent Scotland at the Commonwealth Games."

These competitors, despite their different disabilities which included visual impairments, amputations and health conditions, had different stories to tell and a common love of climbing. # Construction underway on £35 million Council regeneration project in North Sighthill



Construction is underway on a £35 million Council-led regeneration project at North Sighthill.

The City of Edinburgh Council's partner, Keepmoat Regeneration, will deliver a mixed tenure affordable housing development on land previously occupied by outdated poor quality high rise housing.

The development, funded through the Council's housebuilding programme supported by £2.88m Scottish Government funding, will comprise 316 much-needed new energy-efficient homes, including 96 affordable homes for social rent, 88 affordable homes for mid-market rent and 132 flats and family homes for market sale.

The contract brings many additional benefits. As part of the four year programme, Keepmoat Regeneration has committed to offering substantial employment and training opportunities for local people via an ambitious Community Engagement Plan, centred on Employability & Training, Education & Outreach, Enterprise & Business, Funding & Development and Community Cohesion. A £25k investment fund has also been established dedicated to help local community groups.

Kevin Stewart MSP (Minister for Local Government & Housing) and Councillor Gavin Barrie (Convenor Housing and Economy committee) joined representatives from the local community, City of Edinburgh Council and Keepmoat Regeneration to celebrate the start of the build where Keepmoat presented the £25,000 community group contribution.

Eamonn McGarvey, Regional Managing Director for Keepmoat Regeneration, said: "Our launch ceremony was a hugely important milestone, as it not only marks the start of imperative housing delivery, but the start of our commitment to improve North Sighthill's social and economic prosperity.

"Our Community Investment Fund is just the start of this pledge, as we will be working with our partners at the council throughout the duration of this major programme, to ensure we are investing in the area as whole and offering opportunities for local people."

Housing and Economy Convener for the City of Edinburgh Council, Councillor Gavin Barrie said: "This is another major step forward in the regeneration of North Sighthill, which will bring much-needed affordable housing to the area. This development is a key part in the Council's coalition pledge to deliver 20,000 affordable and low-cost homes over the next ten years.

"Each of the new homes have been designed to ensure residents' heating costs will be kept low and the development includes a variety of gardens and open space for residents. "We are very pleased to be working with Keepmoat on this project which is now part of a larger programme already delivering new affordable homes in Leith, Newhaven, Craigmillar, Pennywell, Gracemount and Chesser in one of the most ambitious Council-led housebuilding programmes in the UK."

# A trio of British Empire Medals for Edinburgh volunteers

June McIntosh, a child cancer nurse and fundraiser. Alexander Douglas Ruthven, Trustee of Therapet and Fiona Russell, volunteer for Capability Scotland all received their British Empire Medals from the Lord Lieutenant Frank Ross this evening.

A reception was held in the Lady Provost's room with friends and family invited to join the three recipients.



June McIntosh, a registered nurse with the Western General Hospital for 30 years and a fundraiser for Fighting Against Cancer Edinburgh (FACE) for 25 years, will receive the honour for services to young people with cancer and to charity.

Described as part nurse, part play therapist, part counsellor and part friend by her peers, June is recognised for improving the lives of countless children undergoing cancer treatment and their families in Edinburgh, and for making a real and measurable difference to patient care as deputy charge nurse for the Edinburgh Cancer Centre.

Alexander Douglas Ruthven, a volunteer dog walker and Trustee of Therapet, will be recognised for voluntary service to the community in Edinburgh and the Lothians.

Douglas and his beloved Border Collies have been regular visitors to long stay patients and residents in hospitals, care and nursing homes since 1998. He is recognised for negotiating a key initiative with NHS Lothian to provide pet therapy support to children confined to hospital, people suffering from stress and anxiety and the lonely.

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Fiona Russell, a volunteer at her local Capability Scotland shop, will also be honoured with the British Empire Medal for services to charity. Volunteering three days a week, every week, Fiona has rarely missed a shift in 22 years. She is commended for supporting and training staff across Capability Scotland's shops, for her commitment and passion. The financial benefit of her service to the charity has been described as incalculable.

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The British Empire Medal is awarded for meritorious civil or military service worthy of recognition by the Crown.

#### Edinburgh MP leads WASPI consultation

Christine Jardine, MP for Edinburgh West, is at the centre of efforts to reverse the injustice to women born in the 1950s caused by pension reforms.

Ms Jardine and a cross party group of MPs launched a consultation, which will help formulate proposals for transitional arrangements for women disproportionately affected by pension reforms.

An estimated six thousand women in Edinburgh West have been affected by the changes which left women with inadequate time to prepare for their retirement, leading to financial difficulty and hardship.

Christine Jardine said: "These women have suffered a gross injustice as a result of government mismanagement and poor communication.

"It's time this government recognised that tens of thousands of women, whose only mistake is to have been born in the 1950s, have had their retirement plans ruined and in many cases are facing hardship, because the state pension age was changed without adequate warning.

"This consultation will show us exactly what is involved and what is needed to ensure these women get the deal they deserve."

#### Davidson and Sturgeon speak out over Brexit talks

MSP for Edinburgh Central and Leader of the Scottish Conservatives, Ruth Davidson MSP has spoken out against the proposed deal on Brexit which hinged on a special deal for Northern Ireland. Talks between the UK government and the EU Commission ended with no agreement in evidence yesterday afternoon.



It appears that the DUP which supports the government at Westminster would not allow the government to agree to something which would leave Northern Ireland in a situation which is separate and different from the rest of the UK.

In a statement earlier Ms Davidson said: "The question on the Brexit ballot paper asked voters whether the UK should stay or leave the European Union — it did not ask if the country should be divided by different deals for different home nations.

"While I recognise the complexity of the current negotiations, no government of the Conservative and Unionist Party should countenance any deal that compromises the political, economic or constitutional integrity of the United Kingdom.

"All sides agree there should be no return to the borders of the past between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

"Similarly, jeopardising the UK's own internal market is in no-one's interest.

"If regulatory alignment in a number of specific areas is the requirement for a frictionless border, then the Prime Minister should conclude this must be on a UK-wide basis."

First Minister Nicola Sturgeon issued a statement yesterday afternoon in which she also rejected any idea of a deal which allowed Northern Ireland to be treated differently from Scotland.

She said: "Despite the fact that no deal on the Irish border issue has been reached today, and while full details of any such deal are still to become clear, I welcome the fact that

there now appears to be the outline of an agreement which would ensure that there is no return to a hard border on the island of Ireland.

"The potential for a hard border has been one of the most concerning aspects of Brexit, and the UK Government's position to date on protecting the terms of the Good Friday Agreement has left much to be desired.

"While I welcome the proposed commitment for Ireland and Northern Ireland — and while the particular circumstances in Scotland are distinct and separate from those in Ireland — today's developments show very clearly that if one part of UK can retain regulatory alignment with the EU and effectively stay in the single market, there is no good practical reason why others cannot do the same.

"Indeed, any special status for Northern Ireland would make a similar solution for Scotland even more vital. For Scotland to find itself outside the single market, while Northern Ireland effectively stays in would place us at a double disadvantage when it comes to jobs and investment.

"While the simplest answer to the Brexit problem is for the whole UK to stay in the single market, the Scottish Government has already put forward very detailed compromise proposals for how Scotland's place in the single market could be maintained if the rest of the UK insists on leaving — proposals which were previously rejected by the UK Government as unworkable. Indeed, if Northern Ireland is effectively kept in the single market it makes it all the more vital for Scotland's national and economic interests that we are too.

"Today's developments also demonstrate in the clearest possible way, through the role played by the Irish Government at the top table in Europe, the importance of being independent when it comes to defending your vital national interests.

"Scotland voted overwhelmingly to remain in the EU, and the Scottish Government will continue to make the case, as strongly as ever, for that democratic choice by the people of Scotland to be respected and for our place in Europe to be protected."

### The Last Ship will sail at the Festival Theatre next summer

The Last Ship will sail at Edinburgh's Festival Theatre on 12 June 2018, but there was a decidedly low key launch in Edinburgh at Leith Dockers' Club yesterday afternoon.

Although the queue of invited guests outside the front door was a bit of a giveaway, life in Leith went on as normal and few would have guessed that a megastar was lunching nearby and about to take to the very small stage. When the audience assembled in the room, there were intermittent periods of expectant hush, and when Sting walked in through the back door

and down the central aisle, saying "Hi, everybody!" it took a moment or two for them to realise it was really him.

A burst of applause broke out as Sting sat on the chair on stage (which had been changed three times since his short sound check to find one of optimum height).

He opened by saying: "It's been a lot of years since I've been in a social club. I did serve my apprenticeship at working mens' clubs in the north east so I'm not totally unfamiliar. What time's the bingo?!"

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There was a bit of casual banter with the audience, and Sting proved to be as much at ease in this setting as he might have been on a massive stage.

He was accompanied to Edinburgh by Producer Karl Sydow, who explained we might know him for his Dirty Dancing stage show which is one of his most successful productions. He said he is no stranger to Edinburgh, and his American accent belies the strong links he has to the UK, as a former Oxford man. The Last Ship is produced by Northern Stage in association with Karl Sydow and Kathryn Schenker.

There followed half an hour of some unrealness. I was standing as close as I dared to the megastar who only once looked directly at me, so I can only think I didn't annoy him too much!



The music we heard from the show is truly Sting. It is melodic, lyrical and interspersed with some scraps of Newcastle accent which he appears not to have lost.

One audience member who asked if he would sign his guitar got a 'Why-Aye man!' in reply.

He took a little time to explain that the inspiration for the play is in his own past, although the story is not wholly biographical.

With a grandfather as a shipwright and a father who built turbines it appeared that his own future was already mapped out. Sting explained: "That was the last place I wanted to go. The shipyard was noisy, it was dirty, it was dangerous and had one of the worst health and safety records in Western Europe. I had other dreams. I dreamt I would become a musician and would become famous.

"I never forgot where I came from, or the people I was brought up with, and about seven years ago I started to write a series of songs inspired by those early days in the shipyard, writing about people I knew. I cobbled together a story and I was influenced by two real events. One was reading about some shipyard workers in Gdansk in Poland where Lech Walesa worked, the start of the Solidarity trade union which brought down the Soviet Union actually. But like the shipyard in Wallsend there was a downturn, the yard closed and the men were all made redundant and all of the problems attendant with redundancy happened. Things like alcoholism, domestic violence, social problems. So a priest raised some money and got the men to build their own ship, a boat, in the car park of a men's home that he was running. and it got these men back to work and got them back on a level playing field.

"The other inspiration was what happened in Govan on Clydeside in the seventies with Jimmy Reid, the union leader who decided when the government stopped subsidising the shipbuilding industry that they would not go on strike, they would occupy the shippard and carry on building and hopefully get new orders. That as you well know was successful for about a year, but an amazing inspirational story. Largely the engine for that was Jimmy Reid's eloquence. He was an honourable man and he was a hero of mine in the seventies. So I have used some of these elements in this play. It's a musical, it's not all doom

and gloom. There are some happy moments and joyful moments and funny moments. There's a love story. There is also a father and son relationship.

"This story is not biographical, it's not about my life, but there are elements of my own life which have seeped into it just by accident. My relationship with my dad was pretty tense. He wanted me to have a technical education. He wanted me to learn technical drawing, something that he understood. Instead I passed the 11+ to go to a grammar school and he couldn't figure out why I wanted to learn Latin. He wasn't wrong! I went off to grammar school and learned Latin and Greek and all that stuff and he never really understood what I ended up doing either. This song is how sometimes sons' ambitions can seem pie in the sky fantasy and the father's love can be misconstrue as being controlling or oppressive. The song is called Dead Man's Boots, and it is in the show...."

Here you can share with us his explanation of the inspiration for the show:

With some of the great musicals in his childhood memories like Oklahoma and Carousel, perhaps this was something that Sting was always waiting to turn his attention to. He explained too that staging a show is a bit like building a ship, as there are all sorts of different 'trades' who contribute to the making of the show and they have to be steered in the right direction. He concluded: "It has been a seven year voyage and it is ongoing. I am so happy to bring it to Scotland both Edinburgh and Glasgow. I think there will be a resonance here, an understanding of what that industry was. It makes me very emotional to see any ship in a dock. There are universal themes here with manufacturing and the dignity that work gives you, which is an important element of the play."

And then almost as unobtrusively as he had arrived he walked off with a final "Bye everybody!" and the surreal afternoon

ended.



Written by Sting the musical will star Jimmy Nail, and this will form part of a UK & Ireland tour. It premiered in 2014 in Chicago and had a four month run at the Neil Simon Theatre on Broadway where its closure was met with some critics suggesting that a run in the UK would be a more natural fit for the show.

Whether Sting will join the cast is not yet known, but we rather hope he does!

This play is the culmination of several years' work and was initially inspired by Sting's 1991 album The Soul Cages and his own childhood experiences, tells the story of a community amid the demise of the shipbuilding industry in Wallsend, Tyne and Wear, with the closure of the town's Swan Hunter shipyard.

When Gideon Fletcher returns home after seventeen years at sea, tensions between past and future flare in both his family and his town. The local shipyard, around which Wallsend has always revolved, is closing and no-one knows what will come next, only that a half-built ship towers over the terraces.

The show is directed by Lorne Campbell, the artistic director of Northern Stage, with set design by the Tony Award-winning 59 Productions.

One of the country's most exciting and acclaimed theatre directors, Edinburgh-born Lorne Campbell had his first professional job as an assistant director at Northern Stage, before returning as artistic director in 2013. A graduate of Channel 4's Young Theatre Director scheme, he has previously worked with the Liverpool Everyman Playhouse, Bath Theatre Royal, Traverse Theatre and Greyscale theatre company, which he co-founded. Productions for Northern Stage include Get Carter, Dr Frankenstein and A Song For Ella Grey.

This personal, political and passionate new musical from multiple Grammy Award winner Sting, is an epic account of a family, a community and a great act of defiance. With original music and lyrics by Sting, The Last Ship also features a few of his best-loved songs *Island of Souls*, *All This Time* and *When We Dance*.

### CodeClan marks its second anniversary

Numbers stack up as skills academy hits graduate landmark

Deputy First Minister, John Swinney, hailed the impact of digital skills academy CodeClan in supplying new talent to support the country's burgeoning tech sector. Mr Swinney paid the compliment as the organisation marked its second anniversary, highlighting its success to date and outlining plans for growth in 2018.

A total of 200 CodeClan graduates have now secured technology related jobs on completion of their courses and, to meet demand, the academy has unveiled plans to double its course numbers in Glasgow in the year ahead.

Mr Swinney said: "Digital skills are playing an increasingly important role in almost all business sectors. Being able to provide a technologically savvy workforce will be crucial for Scotland in the years ahead and CodeClan is playing an influential role in helping us to achieve this.

"The number of organisations returning to recruit skilled employees highlights the success of CodeClan and I welcome its plans for expansion. There is a well-publicised skills gap

in the global tech sector and initiatives such as this are key to helping Scotland build the skills capacity to meet that demand."



CodeClan is a key element in the Government's 'Digital Strategy for Scotland', which aims to create the conditions in which our digital technologies industries can thrive. It is working with industry to meet a shared objective of employing 150,000 in digital technology roles over the next five years.

70% of all CodeClan graduates secure technology related jobs within three months of completing their course, and this rises to 90% within four months.

CodeClan plans to double its intake in Glasgow in 2018 from three cohorts to six, with a further nine starting in Edinburgh; this will produce 200 job ready individuals in Edinburgh and 120 in Glasgow during 2018.

Students have the opportunity to work towards a Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) Level 8 pass in Software Development as part of the course. More than 100 have successfully completed this to date.

Chair of Skills Development Scotland, John F McClelland CBE, said: "CodeClan's success shows how SDS and partners can work with industry to react quickly to meet the skills needs of employers.

Its success has been in equipping people with the digital skills they need and that businesses want in a crucial area of Scotland's economy.

"A digital skills academy was one of the key actions identified by our Digital Technologies Skills Investment Plan, developed with industry backing in 2014, with CodeClan opening

the following year."

Polly Purvis, chair of CodeClan, said: "CodeClan has come a long way in two years and continues to change to meet the needs of the industry. We work closely with employers to make sure we are producing people with skills relevant to their needs. With an increase in courses planned for 2018, we will be providing more opportunities than ever before for people considering a career in tech to get involved and develop the skills the industry badly needs."

Former GP David Hale, from Edinburgh, retrained to be a developer after deciding to leave his career in medicine. After finishing the course he secured a role as a junior software developer with Zonal, a firm creating software and hardware for the hospitality sector.

He said: "CodeClan ticked a lot of boxes because it was local, focussed on practical skills and wasn't too long at only four months. I can now safely say that going to CodeClan was one of the best decisions of my life. My ultimate goal from going on the course was to get a job as a software developer, and that happened, but better than that it taught me the skills to keep learning and keep progressing as a developer."

Registers of Scotland has recruited 10 of CodeClan's graduates. The organisation responsible for compiling and maintaining 18 public registers relating to property and other legal documents in Scotland has placed eight students into roles within their software development team, as well as appointing one business analyst and one user experience specialist.

Keeper of the Registers of Scotland, Sheenagh Adams said: "I'd like to congratulate CodeClan on its second anniversary. It's great to see this programme is being expanded and that its graduates are playing a key role in Scotland's digital transformation. Registers of Scotland (RoS) aims to become a

fully digital business by 2020, and has benefitted from the expertise and skill of eight CodeClan graduates to-date, with two more due to join us in the next month. I'm delighted that our work with CodeClan has been so successful, and I look forward to seeing what their next steps will bring."
