"Whilst I didn't mean finish stone last, the way the fans have stood by us, understood what we're doing, its actually been a pretty good first season's business, and the crowds have stuck with us and turned up every week. We put decent foundations in this year to really build on over the future."

Havelock said: "Got to thank Razor (Ian Rae) and Heppy (George Hepburn) who worked at the track from about six in the morning or some godforsaken hour right through the day after the track was flooded unexpectedly.

"If the forecasters had got their act together and given us accurate information we'd have had the track covered on Friday but as they didn't get it right at all, we nearly lost the meeting with the flooding, but Razor and Heppy worked a miracle and we had a great track to race on. Thanks guys."

No Goals But Gritty Hearts Are On Their Way Back

There was a surreal feeling about Hearts first league game of the season on Saturday. The Maroon Army weren't heading to Gorgie but to the BT Murrayfield Stadium, a Don Cowie corner kick over the Western Approach road away. With Tynecastle's new main stand not yet ready for use, Hearts have arranged to play their first three 'home' games in the Ladbrokes Premiership at the home of Scottish rugby.

The fact we're in the second week of September and Hearts have been away from home in the first four league fixtures added to the unreal feeling as did the fact that Hearts manager from a decade and a half ago was back in charge of first team matters. Craig Levein looked dapper in his suit, collar and tie, a throw-back to an era when sartorial elegance was still an element of football management.

And then there was the size of the crowd. More than 24,000 were inside the game as the game kicked off slightly late — Hearts biggest home attendance in nearly 13 years.

Levein made four changes from the team that lost 2-1 at Motherwell two weeks ago. Hearts new goalkeeper Jon McLaughlin and fellow new signing Ross Callachan made their debuts while Connor Randall and Isma Goncalves returned to the starting line-up.

Hearts began the game like a rabbit caught in the headlights. There has been much hype about Aberdeen's admittedly impressive start to the league campaign with the Dons sitting top of the Ladbrokes Premiership with a 100% record after four games. It seemed some of the Hearts players were believing the hype as the Maroons were penned in their own half for much of the opening half hour.

Just two minutes had gone when Aberdeen nearly got the perfect start when May's fine lob soared over debutant keeper Jon McLaughlin but, thankfully for the home support, Hearts captain Christophe Berra thwarted Rooney to prevent the opener.

Backed by a large travelling support of around 7,000, the Dons continued to swarm forward but it was Hearts who had a real opportunity when Jamie Walker was felled inside the penalty box — but referee Craig Thomson refused to listen to strong home appeals for a penalty kick.

At the other end, Christie fired in a free-kick which was deflected to Ball but his effort on goal was wide.

As the first half wore on Hearts at last began to appear as an attacking threat. On the half-hour mark, Jamie Walker's free-kick from just outside the penalty box was well saved by Dons keeper Lewis before he thwarted Isma Goncalves as Hearts finally began to show some belief.

Aberdeen, though, continued to create the better chances and Christie's low shot went inches wide. Then, the game's best chance fell to Jamie Walker. The attacking midfielder — the subject of transfer speculation linking him with a move to Rangers before the transfer window closed at the end of August — had time and space just inside the Aberdeen penalty box to chip the ball over keeper Lewis, only for the Dons custodian to produce a stunning leap to push the ball over the bar.

It was then the turn of Hearts keeper McLaughlin to produce heroics as he denied Logan with a fine save with his legs.

It isn't clear what Craig Levein said to his troops during the interval but Hearts came out looking like a different team in the second half. Ross Callachan got on the end of a pass from Goncalves and the former Raith Rovers player and life-long Jambo thought he had scored on his Hearts debut only for keeper Lewis to produce another stunning save to push his effort wide.

Jamie Walker was next to test the Dons keeper as Hearts began to dominate the game.

In the 63rd minute, Hearts came agonisingly close to making the breakthrough. Fine play from Jamie Walker set up Goncalves who took a step inside before firing a fierce shot off the crossbar. The Hearts players and supporters collectively held their heads in their hands.

As much as the first half had been all Aberdeen the second was a tidal wave of maroon attacks. Kyle Lafferty and new boy Manuel Milinkovic came on and it was the Northern Irishman who had a great chance to score but he dithered allowing Logan to clear.

Both sides then chased the game in the final minutes but it was something of a travesty that the game ended without a goal. It certainly deserved not just one but several. It was the proverbial game of two halves — Aberdeen dominating the first with Hearts very much in control of the second.

Afterwards, Craig Levein said he was disappointed his team did not get the three points their second half dominance deserved. He told the official Hearts website:

"Once I get over the disappointment of not winning the match, I'll be able to focus on the positives that we can build on. I honestly feel a bit robbed, but enormous credit to Aberdeen and to Joe Lewis today.

"I can't even blame our strikers for not hitting the target enough, because they did. Sometimes, it's Aberdeen's forward players who get all the attention, but at times it felt like the keeper kept us singlehandedly at bay.

"Three points would have really pushed us on, but I'm sure when I look at the match in the cold light of tomorrow, I'll feel really good about the positives. Right now, though, I'm just disappointed.

"We've got a wee bit to go until our next game here, so we won't have all the nice facilities like we've had this week and we need to prepare for that, but everyone in training has worked really well, and taken it onto the pitch, so I can have no complaints."

It was like a Hearts team of old on Saturday. Yes, there were long balls played on several occasions although when they did get the ball down on the Murrayfield playing surface they passed it with aplomb. However, there was fight, determination and a physical presence which was notably absent during Ian Cathro's time in charge.

Had Cathro been in charge of Hearts on Saturday I have a feeling the Maroons would have lost the game. Had Billy Davies — one of several out-of-work managers who had expressed an interest in the Hearts Head Coach position — been in charge I have no doubt Hearts would have lost the game. His comments in the press today mark him as a bitter man who has little respect for Scottish football.

But it's Craig Levein who is back in charge of Hearts. And if the boys in maroon can play like this for the rest of the season they will soon be moving up the league.

Newport-Gwent Dragons were the visitors to, the reworked, Myreside on Friday night as the new-look Guinness competition started its second week as the PRO14 league thanks to the inclusion of two South African teams who had found themselves cut from the, Southern Hemisphere, Super Rugby League.

As the end of the first quarter approached, Edinburgh were beginning to come back into the match and exert some pressure of their own.

As the match was pushed back into the Dragons' 22, the ball was recycled swiftly through the pack, releasing new signing, Robbie Fruean down the left wing. Reward for the pressure came via a 23rd minute penalty for Edinburgh's Duncan Weir for 6-3.

A long break from his own 22 by full back, Blair Kinghorn, brought the play straight back into Dragons' territory, and, although the ball was lost, the home side eventually saw another Weir penalty over the posts for 6-6 with around 13 minutes left in the half.

With the half hour mark on the clock, Dragons lost the ball from their own scrum as Edinburgh's scrum half, Sam Hidalgo-Clyne, turned over his opposite number at the rear of the pile up. The ball was then quickly sent across the pitch where Chris dean broke through to set up a flying Kinghorn for the first try of the match. Weir then converted to take Edinburgh clear at 13-6.

From the restart, Edinburgh were back, putting pressure on the dragons' line, and getting close to scoring their second try from a five metre ruck. However, as the crowd all thought the referee went upstairs to check the grounding, he was actually checking for foul play at the ruck. And, foul play thus confirmed, Weir was yellow carded for using his feet on a player on the ground.

Down to 14, Edinburgh held their own until the stroke of half time, when Henson knocked over another penalty for a half time score of 13-9.

Edinburgh managed to muck about and delay proceedings at the start of the second half, running the clock down and getting Weir back on with no further damage to the score board. They then returned to the fray with a series of running attacks, culminating with their second try. Once again, a searing break from Kinghorn carried the ball deep into the opposition 22, Kinghorn then offloading to allow Hidalgo-Clyne to dive in under the posts. Weir then knocked the conversion over and, with 48 minutes played, Edinburgh were 20-9 ahead.

Straight from the off, Dragons almost gave Edinburgh a taste of their own medicine and almost scored a fine try in the left corner, but a fine covering tackle just short of the line, prevented the score.

This didn't, however, prevent the scoring as the next 15 minutes saw Edinburgh going to sleep, giving away the ball and three penalties within kicking range to allow Henson to bring the visitors up to within two points at 20-18.

So, with 15 minutes left to play, things were looking a bit close, but the home side upped their game and continued pressure put sub, Junior Raseolea over in the corner for Edinburgh's third try minutes after Weir had opened the gap with a 75th minute penalty, Raseolea's try — unconverted — too it out to 10 points at 28-18.

Fruean then got just reward for his part in setting up the previous try, by scoring one of his own under the posts with just four minutes left on the clock. Weir converted to close the match at 35-18 to Edinburgh.

A fine win, but, as coach, Richard Cockerill commented after the match, not a, consistently enough, fine performance.

"You do the work in the beginning and hopefully it pays off in the end. It is definitely more professional."

D'Orazio admitted that language can be a barrier but Capitals are fortunate that several player can speak English and Russian and, of course, the new coach speaks both languages after his lengthy spell in North American hockey.

The player added: "Of course, there is also sign language and it's not been too bad.

"Guys have been playing hockey for some time and once you are on the ice the guys feed off each other whether we speak the same language or not."

On Clan, he said: "I was at the game they played against the University of Manitoba but it will be a learning curve for us and all teams as there are a lot of new guys in the Elite League this year."

The other semi-final on Saturday features Dundee Stars and Fife Flyers (face-off 2pm) and the Tayside team's coach, Omar Pacha, could have Canadian forwards Patrick Lee and Marc-Olivier Mimar making their debuts. Their arrival has been delayed because of red-tape.

Spend a short time with Dundee Stars' coach Omar Pacha and you will understand the word commitment.

The talkative and approachable Canadian desperately wants success for his low-budget Tayside team.

To achieve his targets he will demand 100 per cent effort from his hand-picked squad.

That is in every game and on every shift.

It was obvious after chatting midweek post-challenge that he was not 100 per cent happy with the performance of his men.

One simple phrase summed up his mood. He said: "We were not the hardest working team."

Stars, incidentally, won 3-2 despite that situation prevailing and they are still as the coach says: "Work in progress."

But Pacha will demand extra when Dundee square-up to arch rivals Fife Flyers in the inaugural Scottish Elite Cup semifinal at Murrayfield today (2pm face-off).

The match-up continues an intense rivalry between the clubs who are only a short distance apart geographically.

Pacha wants a huge distance between the work rate of his side and that of Flyers coach Todd Dutiaume's side.

The Tayside team's coach could be boosted by the inclusion of talented imported forwards Patrick Lee and Marc-Olivier Mimar.

Calgary-born Lee is a raw talent. He's 22 and has just spent the last three seasons in college hockey in North America.

Right-wing Mimar from Rosemere is 25 years old. He's spent the last five seasons with the University of Quebec-Trois-Rivieres posting good numbers.

Their arrival has been delayed by red-tape but Pacha has been in touch and they have been in training, on and off the ice. They know what is expected of them.

Not icing is experienced former Nottingham Panthers right-wing or centre, Toronto-born Chris Lawrence.

The 30-year-old former National Hockey League draft pick by Tampa Bay Lightning has enjoyed two spells in the Lace City and has also iced for British clubs Coventry Blaze and Sheffield Steelers.

The 6ft 4in forward arrived in Britain after an extensive career in the rough-tough North American leagues. He is expected to be a leader.

Today's tie is bound to increase the pulse rates of the club's passionate fans and Pacha wants to see that energy mirrored on the ice by his squad.

The former Manchester Storm playcaller, who also doubles as Dundee's general manager, is excited by what lies ahead. He wants to give fans something to cheer and keep them coming to watch his young and energetic team.

Police Scotland throws support behind Suicide Prevention Week

Police Scotland has thrown its support behind Suicide Prevention Week 2017.

If you can read between the lines, you can save lives. That's the message Choose Life continues to send out to people in Scotland to mark this year's Suicide Prevention Week (4-10 September 2017).

Last year, 728 people in Scotland took their own lives. The emotional impact on families, friends and communities bereaved by suicide is devastating and can have long lasting negative effects on those left behind.

The continuing Choose Life 'read between the lines' campaign,

asks everyone to be alert to the warning signs of suicide in people close to them. The message is:

"....if you're worried about someone, such as a friend, family member or workmate, asking them directly about their feelings can help to save their life."

Chief Superintendent John McKenzie said, "We are working with partners across many communities in Scotland, handing out leaflets, talking about suicide and suicide prevention, with the aim of providing information and where needed, signposting to places where help can be provided."

The campaign acknowledges that signs of suicide can be difficult to spot, but encourages people to take all signs of distress seriously, even if it seems a person is living a normal life. It also aims to assure people that asking a person about what's troubling them can make a positive difference.

People who have tried to take their life often talk movingly about reaching the point where they could see no alternative. Despite this, they also had a strong desire to live but wanted someone to intervene and stop them from ending their life. This helps us understand that the words and actions of others are important and by taking a minute to show you care and asking directly about suicide, you could change their life.

Police Scotland's largest and most ethnically diverse

intake complete training

Police Scotland's largest ever intake of new officers has today officially joined the ranks.

213 recruits, who began training in June, took to the Parade Square at the Scottish Police College, Tulliallan, this morning in the presence of Deputy Chief Constable Johnny Gwynne QPM, other senior officers, invited guests as well as family and friends.

The record breaking class is also the most ethnically diverse group to pass through SPC Tulliallan in Police Scotland's history. Included in the intake were the first group of black and minority ethnic (BME) recruits to complete the recently launched Introduction to Policing course, led by the Police Scotland Positive Action Team in January and February 2017.

The four-week programme offered potential applicants an insight into day-to-day life as a police officer and an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the application and selection process as well as provide peer support to each other during the process via a closed Facebook group.

The second course has resulted in an increased number of applications to join Police Scotland, with more BME applicants due to start their initial training at Scottish Police College, Tulliallan, later this month. A third course is currently underway in Aberdeen.

Deputy Chief Constable Johnny Gwynne QPM said: "I am extremely encouraged to see so many people willing to serve as police officers, helping to keep Scotland's communities safe. They have all put in a great deal of personal commitment and hard work to reach this milestone in their training, which I know will continue as they embark on their public service across

the country."

He continued: "Policing in Scotland is carried out by consent, and one of the best ways to achieve this is to have a police service which reflects the communities we serve. A diverse workforce benefits the whole country and officers who have something in common with their communities can find it easier to understand cultural differences, enabling them to build trust and confidence.

"Through the Introduction to Policing project we are working hard to ensure any perceived barriers to applying to Police Scotland are dispelled or removed and by highlighting to people from all social, economic, cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds that policing is an employer of choice for BME communities."

All of the newly qualified constables will now move onto local training for a week before hitting the beat in policing divisions across the country for their two year probationary period.

Of the new officers passing out today, 37% are women. This is one of the highest ever percentages of women in a class at the Scottish Police College, Tulliallan.

Police Scotland remains keen to receive applications from people interested in joining the service across Scotland, and in particular women and people from under-represented groups including the BME communities

K9 Conference to tackle illegal importation of dogs

This Scottish Animal Week the Scottish SPCA has announced a new K9 Conference to be held on 9 November with the aim of tackling the multimillion pound puppy trade and illegal importation of dogs to the UK once and for all.

The conference is scheduled to be opened by Cabinet Secretary for the Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform Roseanna Cunningham and hosted by the University of Edinburgh with support from Dr Jo Williams of the Clinical and Health Psychology department.

Scotland's animal welfare charity continues to suffer firsthand the devastating effects of puppy farming and are more determined than ever to raise public awareness and tackle this issue once and for all.

Scottish SPCA Animal Rescue and Rehoming Centre Superintendent Sharon Comrie said, "We have issued a number of warnings to the public about the cruel reality of the puppy trade, particularly following the high profile Brownlie case last year, and more recently prolific puppy trader Gorman. Sadly, there is considerably more work to be done to bring an end to this horrendous trade.

"Lucy, the Chihuahua, was brought to us last month at around four to five weeks old after being bought by a member of public from the back of a car boot for £800.

"Despite paying this large sum of money, the member of public soon found herself out of her depth when the vet bills started piling up. Lucy was signed over to us a few days after being bought.

"Even with extensive vet care and 24hour supervision from me and other trained staff members here at the Society, Lucy was too ill to survive. Shortly after coming to us she was found to have fluid in her abdomen and an under-developed liver.

"Despite only being in my care for a few short weeks, I am devastated at her loss. It is beggars belief that these puppy farmers think so little of an animal's welfare as to remove them from their mum before they are even fit enough to survive."

Chief Superintendent Mike Flynn added, "In Lucy's case, she had the best possible veterinary treatment available. Money and time were not issues and she still did not survive.

"Whoever sold Lucy undoubtedly sold the rest of the litter who may also be suffering from similar medical issues.

"Our Special Investigations Unit spearhead Operation Delphin, a multi-agency task force specifically focused on stopping the illegal puppy trade.

"This new conference is aimed at bringing experts from across the UK together to create a more robust strategy to bring an end to the suffering of dogs like Lucy.

"It is vital that we work together to ensure the health and welfare of animals, and bring an end to this prolific trade."

South of Scotland MSP Emma Harper, who has been campaigning for an end to Puppy Trafficking since her election in 2016, said, "As an owner of three amazing rescue dogs myself, I would like to take the opportunity to encourage everyone to consider rescuing a dog instead of buying a pup, and if this is not an option, ensure the dog is coming from a responsible and registered breeder as this is the only way we can stop puppy trafficking and unscrupulous breeding. I will continue to work closely with the Scottish SPCA, and the Scottish Government to bring an end to the horrors of puppy trafficking."

Film Review: 'A Ghost Story'

A Ghost Story

'A Ghost Story' examines the universal themes of love and loss, its effects on the human desire for connection over time and memory. A classic human story told with utterly original and completely unpredictable imagination. Starring Oscar winner Casey Affleck as 'C' and Oscar nominee Rooney Mara as 'M', this film is shot entirely in a square shaped aspect ratio, representing the apparently ordinary lives of the central characters. We follow their apparently ordinary story from their house day in and day out.

A score of tense violins are the only suggestion that the extraordinary may be approaching, with the noises of the train horns blowing in the distance and birds and insects in the surrounding trees amplifying the claustrophobia of the summer heat in normal suburbia. Suddenly, we discover C has been killed in a car accident, only to awaken as a ghost and return home to his girlfriend whom is left behind. Everything changes from here.

As the score vanishes, so do their hopes and dreams for a future together. All safety and security that once existed is gone while painfully long static takes heighten the intensity of loneliness and isolation with no music or dialogue for extended sequences creating further emphasis.

'A Ghost Story' is similar in style to the bleak tones of the 2015 film 'Macbeth' by Justin Kurzel as well as the 2014 film 'The Grand Budapest Hotel' and other works by Wes Anderson through highlighting symmetrical lines and vanishing points, as well as the 4:3 aspect ratio and dolly camera movements.

As time passes, C's ghost interacts with other residents of the house while the narrative jumps back and forth between life and death, before and after the accident, filling in the painting of the story piece by piece.

From the urban lives of the small town to the big city, to the rural wilderness, we are taken on a journey through time all from the same constant location with twists and surprises in abundance. Our fears of mortality as individuals and humanity as a species are all touched on creating a profound impression long after the film is over. Both spiritual and haunting, sad but not depressing, this piece of work is the epitome of arthouse filmmaking.

It is the absolute antidote to the blockbuster film franchises traditionally released in summer.

Is there something there?

Action Porty now own Bellfield Church

A community group in Edinburgh has become the first organisation in an urban area to benefit from community right to buy powers.



Action Porty has today taken ownership of the former Portobello Old Parish Church with a view to transforming it into a multi-use community hub.

The Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003 gives communities the right to buy land and assets under certain conditions. While the powers have been used widely across rural Scotland, this is the first time permission has been granted to a group within a city to proceed with a purchase.

Dog owners across Scotland could face criminal charges if their dog attacks an assistance dog.

From January 2016 to September 2017, 25 dogs from Guide Dogs Scotland were attacked by other canines. Nine animals had to undergo vet treatment, leaving their owners without their lifeline support during the recovery period.

22 of the aggressor dogs were not on a lead or tied up in when the incidents happened, with all but one of the attacks happening in a public place. Four people were also hurt in the attacks while 19 owners were left emotionally affected by the incidents.

Police Scotland is publishing a film highlighting the impact of a dog attacking a registered assistance dog, and reminding the public, and its officers, of the seriousness with which such an incident will be treated.

Chief Superintendent John McKenzie, Police Scotland Safer Communities, said: "As a nation of dog lovers, no-one wants to hear of an animal being injured, let alone a highly trained assistance dog which offers a lifeline to its owner.

"It is the responsibility of the dog owner to ensure an animal in your care is under control at all times, whether that's in a public space, such as a park, or in a private are, like a garden.

"Police Scotland is committed to raising awareness of the issue of attacks on assistance dogs and the traumatic effects of these incidents, some of which can be felt years down the line."

As a result of changes to Section 3 of the Dangerous Dogs (Scotland) Act 1991, any person in charge of a dog, whether they are its owner or not, can be charged if the dog in their care attacks an assistance dog.

Guide dog owner Elaine McKenzie is featured in the video talking about the effect on her life and on her dog Una after she was attacked while the pair were out shopping: "I can only liken the noise she made to that of a screaming child, she was in so much distress. Shop staff tried to pull the attacking dog away but it was relentless. Una bled a lot and had several

puncture wounds in her chest.

"For two weeks after the attack, I couldn't get out and about with Una. My independence was taken away. It then took two months of gentle, patient work, with the support of Guide Dogs staff, to get Una back to working confidently.

"Fortunately, she recovered, but it took quite a long time for us both to get enough confidence to get out and about like usual.

"If that attack had been any worse Una may not have been able to work again and my mobility would be gone. Una was still suffering after-effects from the attack for some time and was hesitant about going into the store again."

Niall Foley is Guide Dogs Scotland's Engagement Manager and said some animals are so badly injured or traumatized that they have to be withdrawn from service: "An Attack on a guide dog can be devastating for the owner and their dog. It can leave someone with sight loss traumatized, isolated at home and robbed of their independence and freedom.

"We urge all dog owners to be responsible when they meet guide dogs and other assistance dogs. We welcome Police Scotland ensuring their officers are aware of the serious effects of an attack on an assistance dog, and their commitment to keeping our guide dog owners safe."
