Vital sewer works about to begin

SEE UPDATED DIVERSION ROUTES AT END

Scottish Water will start upgrading the Victorian sewers in the city next month to keep the capital's waste water flowing, and you would be well advised to avoid the Haymarket area while they are doing so.



This is all a part of Scottish Water's programme of investment between 2015-2021 and £29.5m of water and wastewater infrastructure projects across the capital have been scheduled by agreement with The City of Edinburgh Council, residents and businesses.

The £2.5 m project at Haymarket is part of Scottish Water's on-going investment across the city which will significantly strengthen the infrastructure which serves Edinburgh and plays a critical role in ensuring the city functions effectively.

The modern sewer will be installed along Haymarket Terrace which will increase capacity and reduce the risk of flooding for properties and businesses in the area.

Scottish Water's alliance partner Amey Black and Veatch (aBV) will commence the work on 4 September to upgrade the original egg-shaped brick Victorian sewer which is at capacity and now requires upgrading.

The project comprises of four main phases to install a new 1.2m diameter storm storage sewer pipe, starting on Haymarket Terrace at the junction with Magdala Crescent and moving east towards Haymarket Station.

Traffic management will be implemented to ensure vehicles and public transport can flow during the period of the work, with other measures planned to allow residents and business to operate as normal.

James Weir, aBV project manager, said: "The works have been planned and discussed in detail with the City of Edinburgh Council. This is essential work which will build capacity into Edinburgh's sewer network and ensure the city's waste water cycle is fit for the demands and future development of a 21st century capital."

Scott Fraser, Scottish Water's corporate affairs regional manager, said: "Scottish Water is absolutely focused on providing our customers with excellent waste water services which meet their needs and which have the capacity to deal with demand on the network.

"The Victorian-era sewer network needs to be upgraded to meet the needs of a modern capital city which is constantly growing and developing.

"We have been liaising closely with aBV, and the City of Edinburgh Council to minimise the disruption to residents, businesses and commuters as far as possible.

"We are halting the works during the Christmas roads embargo period from 11 Dec 2017 — 12 Jan 2018 to support businesses during this vital trading period. We will ensure that all businesses in the area can operate as usual and will regularly visit all affected businesses to discuss concerns and ensure we are capturing their needs. We would also encourage the public to check Scottish Water's social media channels — Facebook, Twitter and Instagram for regular updates."

The work will be carried out in phases until the Christmas embargo in December, recommencing in January 2018 with completion expected by early summer.

During the work three lanes along Haymarket Terrace will be closed. One lane will remain open for traffic heading west out of the city. For inbound traffic a diversion route through Magdala Crescent, along Eglington Crescent and down Palmerston Place has been agreed with the City of Edinburgh Council. Local access will remain open, though there will be some parking restrictions in certain sections and footpaths will remain open. Scottish Water will closely engage with the transport network in Edinburgh to ensure tram routes will be unaffected, bus route diversions are in place and taxis are accommodated at temporary ranks.

In advance of the road closure signs will be put in place in various locations, including on Traffic Scotland motorway gantry signs on the M8 and M9 into the city and within Haymarket train station to advise commuters of the works.

Man jailed after heroin worth £500k recovered following car chase



A man pled guilty at Edinburgh High Court yesterday to the supply of controlled drugs and dangerous driving.

Paul Macaulay, aged 30 from the Newcraighall area, was sentenced to seven years and four months in prison for the offences and disqualified from driving for six years.

Road Policing officers signalled Macaulay to stop as he

travelled in his Vauxhall Insignia on Calder Road on Wednesday 7 June 2017.

As they approached him he drove off over a footpath onto Calder Road, then the wrong way around a roundabout.

He narrowly missed other road users, before he stopped and was detained.

His vehicle was searched and officers found a quantity of high purity heroin with an estimated street value of over £500,000 and £15,000 in cash.

His home address was also searched and associated paraphernalia was recovered.

Detective Inspector Bruce Coutts of Corstorphine CID said: "The large quantity of heroin, cash, mobile phones and other paraphernalia seized at Macaulay's address demonstrated his involvement in organised crime offences, including drug supply. He also went to great lengths, as shown in court, to evade arrest.

"His arrest and conviction came about through concerted efforts by road policing officers and detectives and shows that we continue to utilise all resources at our disposal to tackle serious and organised crime, bringing offenders to justice and making our communities safer.

"Information from members of the public is absolutely vital to our efforts to address drug crime and to keep people around Scotland safe and we encourage anyone who has information to contact Police Scotland on 101 or Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111."

Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2017 — The Giant Jam Sandwich

The picture book that generations of parents and children still refer to as their all-time favourite, THE GIANT JAM SANDWICH, is coming to the Edinburgh Festival as a first ever British stage adaptation.

After a hugely successful national tour earlier this year, this madcap production with an original score by composer James Atherton, the show will run for a month at the Pleasance Courtyard.

It must have been a cathartic process for Derbyshire born author John Vernon Lord, a man who is allergic to wasps, to write his bestseller, The Giant Jam Sandwich. Now in its 45th year, readers of all ages have been enthralled by this timeless tale of a village

community's inventive plan to trap a swarm of wasps in an enormous sandwich.

Having been endlessly translated and adapted for radio, television and large scale orchestra, it had not been adapted for the stage until earlier this year. This new stage adaptation by New Perspectives' Artistic Director — Jack McNamara — toured venues in England following its premier at the Derby Guildhall back in February.

Bursting with humour for adults and children alike, New Perspectives' production evokes the vivid brilliance of the original

illustrations whilst expanding the story with original songs by James Atherton and a host of new characters. John Vernon Lord is among the production's fans, commenting: "I enjoyed it from beginning to end…a very clever way of extending the story."

The play's adapter and director, Jack McNamara, said: "When we saw the excited reactions of children and parents to this production on tour we knew we had to bring it to Edinburgh. It has a real festival energy about it and seems to really mean something to people of very different ages".

While aimed at audiences 3+, the production doesn't shy away from some challenging themes, including the moral dilemma of trapping wasps, the marital problems of one of its characters and even a short scene that hints at the current Brexit situation.

Jack continues: "It feels wrong in the 21st century to tell a story about an invasion of outsiders without exploring the complexity of what that means. So in our production we decided to give our wasps a voice, to hear their side of the story, and children have completely appreciated that. The style of the original book is beautifully messy and human and we wanted to capture that in our production, rather than sanitise it."

The show is at the Pleasance Above at the Pleasance Courtyard, from 2-28 August at 10.20am daily.

Ross Pavilion — and the winner of the design competition is...

The winner of the design process to replace the Ross Bandstand was announced this morning in the Royal Overseas League, overlooking Princes Street Gardens.

And the winner is.... an international consortium of companies headed up by US design practice wHY, with local input from GRAS, Groves-Raines Architects and others.

wHY (USA) is an international consortium made up of GRAS, Groves-Raines Architects, Arup, O Street, Creative Concern, Noel Kingsbury, Yann Kersalé Studio, Lawrence Barth, Stuco, Alan Cumming, Aaron Hicklin, Alison Watson, Peter Ross, Adrian Turpin and Beatrice Colin

Mark Thomann is landscape design director with GRAS which is a

part of the consortium to redevelop one of the most iconic sights in Edinburgh. We asked how that felt and he replied: "It's exciting, It's an exciting challenge. I visited Edinburgh many years ago and I was completely captivated by the rock and the castle, in the way that I think many people are. Since that time I have seen many other world wonders. You always dream as a landscape architect of working on a project of that quality and character.

The pavilion designed by wHY is called The Butterfly Pavilion and Mark explained to us where the name and the concept came from: "As we were looking at the connections and how the connections and the transformations could happen in this project, biodiversity was something that was really important in working with Noel Kingsbury our horticulture consultant.

"We asked how we could bring a new image of horticulture and biodiversity to the project. The idea of butterfly and the papillon meaning pavilion and the etymology of the words started to come together. We realised even some of the forms were... It was almost like it was starting to transform and starting to emerge for us so it became this nice tidy concept."

Mark confirmed that not only have they taken account of the public's views throughout the design process, and they have members of their team including writers and actors as well as architects who are all based in Edinburgh.

"We have a blueprint and we can talk about that, and if certain things need to change that's okay. That is what the design process is. What we have now is a good base and it will emerge into something really special and fitting."

<u>The Ross Development Trust have picked a design winner from Phyllis Stephen</u> on <u>Vimeo</u>.

CULTURE AND COMMUNITIES CONVENER

Councillor Donald Wilson the Culture and Communities Convener explained there were 160 notes of interest in the design competition and he thought they were all good. As part of the judging panel he recognised that the seven shortlisted entries were very fully developed concepts. But this design stood out for him and he told us why: "This design shows a very real and knowledgable approach to the culture and history of the site and how it could be developed. But it makes the most of the assets that are already there. You have the New Town on the one side and the Old Town on the other and of course the iconic backdrop of the castle. You have make the most of these things but at the same time these are pleasure gardens. They were originally set up as that so they have to be there for people to enjoy as gardens.

Local businessman and entrepreneur Norman Springford has invested £5 million in the project and the council signed a development brief just over a year ago. The Convener confirmed that the council is 'fully committed' to the development of the site. Councillor Wilson continued: "It is something that the council has wanted to do for a long time, but if it was not for Norman Springford then this would not be happening. The council's support is non-financial and so that is why it would not otherwise be happening. There is also a requirement to raise some private funding as well."

CHAIR OF THE ROSS DEVELOPMENT TRUST

Norman Springford said it was a privilege to be part of the whole process and as chair of the jury panel it was a fascinating day to look at all the finalists' submissions and we had several days of debate.

We reminded him that he started all of this and made it possible, and asked why he did that. He explained that as somebody who has been here all his life he considered the gardens were looking just a little bit tired. "Was it due for a refurb? I think the answer is it probably was."

And why did he like this design? "I think the reason why we all selected this design unanimously was that not only had they come up with a great design for the Butterfly Pavilion but they respected the setting, the castle the link between the Old and the New Towns and the landscaped areas which they are introducing back into the gardens."

There is now a funding requirement and this is the start of the process. There will be ongoing consultation with heritage bodies, the council and members of the public.

Mr Springford concluded: "Everyone is vital to this project from funding from high net worth individuals and corporate funders and we also expect and hope to get the city behind the whole thing."

Edinburgh-based architect Gunnar Groves-Raines is also involved in the project and we found out what his involvement had been: "We have had the privilege of being at the centre of this collaborative design team led by wHY in America. We've been providing a lot of local context and understanding of the place and the people. We have been very involved in the design development, but also critically in the heritage aspects and really understanding the significance of Edinburgh's built and natural heritage."

wHY is an interdisciplinary design practice dedicated to serving the arts, communities, culture and the environment since 2004. Led by founder and creative director Kulapat Yantrasast and landscape design director Mark Thomann, wHY is a collective of architects, landscape designers, makers and strategic thinkers, who work as four independent yet interconnected workshops; ideas, buildings, grounds and objects. With offices in Los Angeles and New York, wHY's 30 team members and network of experts share a commitment to collaboration. wHY has assembled a team of thought leaders and creative influencers, including engineers, designers,

plant-lovers, graphic designers, writers, journalists, actors, artists, and activists who are passionate about Scotland and participating in the conversation for the future of the Ross Pavilion. Recent projects include the widely published Speed Art Museum in Louisville, KY and Skylanding with Yoko Ono, in the historic Olmsted designed Jackson Park in Chicago, IL.

Seven architects were shortlisted to lead the major redevelopment of the Ross Bandstand in Edinburgh. All submitted comprehensive designs in line with the brief prepared by The Ross Development Trust. Each was invited to create concept designs for the £25m project brief, which includes a new landmark venue to replace the bandstand, a visitor centre and subtle updates to West Princes Street Gardens.

The seven teams of architects and designers were selected earlier this year from a pool of 125 entries. Entries from the shortlisted teams have been on display at the City Art Centre, Edinburgh since $21^{\rm st}$ June and today the winner was chosen. This is only an outline concept and the public can still influence the final design.

Who is Tom Stade — are we any closer to the real Tom now that we have met him? Will the real Tom Stade stand up?

Tom Stade is appearing at the Fringe this August and will bring his national stand up tour home to the capital in November too.

As a Canadian who now lives in Edinburgh, he is well known on our streets and now he will make us laugh once more with his I Swear show. We are promised that the show will be mischievous, carefree and enlightened with no subject off the menu.

He is one of a kind with a genuine flair for observation and improv, and yes there might be a few swear words in there too!

The Canadian now lives in Edinburgh and during his show nothing will be taboo. He promises you the truth (but as we found he gives little away!)











We met him recently to see if we could find the real Tom, but honestly he is a real comic even in person. So we don't think that we learned anything revolutionary about what makes him tick.

We asked if it would be funny and he said it would be funnier than the last eight shows he has done. He feels more prepared for I Swear and he confessed that he does swear though he calls it punctuation rather than swearing!

What are you talking about in the new show?

I am going out there to just try and be a little bit honest with myself and some of my family members may be subjected to some home truths that they may not want to hear.

The funny part is that I think when I say this that it is a relatable thing. Instead of trying to pander to them I want to try and get right into their gut. So my words will trigger a memory of theirs.

"When I am telling the joke they're not going to be thinking of the joke they're going to be thinking about something that they did. That's when I think the real belly laugh comes.

Apart from his family the other material comes from experience, travel and his skill to tell a joke.

"Sometimes I can make something very untruthful seem very truthful!"

Other material comes from whatever is going on in the world around him but Tom tries to steer clear of what he calls 'easy politics'.

"I would try and talk more about child soldiers than Donald Trump because I find it more interesting.

"I took a year off and went back on the circuit to hone all these jokes so they are now comedy club ready which means they are stronger than Edinburgh ready!"

A strong set in a comedy club is different from an Edinburgh set due to the length of it. In a comedy club a comedian like Tom would only do about 20 minutes and here he will talk to you all for an hour.

He is confident that his memory will hold up!

Tom starts a 67 date UK tour a couple of weeks after the Festival.

The pall of silence which fell over Tynecastle following the club's embarrassing elimination from the Betfred Cup at the weekend finally lifted this morning when Hearts Director of Football Craig Levein announced that Head Coach Ian Cathro had left the club with immediate effect.

In a brief statement, Hearts said "The Board wishes it to be known that this was a very difficult decision, reluctantly made, as every member of the Board recognises that Ian is an extremely talented young coach with a very bright future ahead of him. We thank Ian for all of his efforts and wish him well in the future".

Hearts said that a further statement will be made on Wednesday in relation to management plans for this weekend's Ladbrokes Premiership match against Celtic and the longer-term coaching of the club.

It is expected, however, that Assistant Head Coach Austin MacPhee will take charge of the team ahead of Saturday's opening league game in the east end of Glasgow.

Speculation is already rife about who will succeed Cathro with former Hearts player Steven Pressley, who was club captain when Craig Levein managed the side a decade and a half ago, being touted as favourite. Pressley is presently without a club but if he were appointed this may divide the Hearts support, some of whom still regard the former centre half as a Hearts icon while others never forgave him for his chest-thumping celebrations at Tynecastle when he returned as a Celtic player.

Whatever happens and whoever is appointed as the new Head

Coach, an interesting few days lie ahead in Gorgie. For not even the club's previous owner — Vladimir Romanov who went through managers at a whim — sacked a manager four days before the start of a league campaign!

Inspector Andrew Harborow of Tranent Police Station said: "This was a high value theft and we are eager to trace those responsible as soon as possible.



Detectives are keen to trace the men on the CCTV footage, who are seen to be within the area at the time of the assault.
















Anyone who recognises these images is asked to contact police immediately.

Lothians MSP says 'Care homes must do better'

The Scottish Conservatives obtained figures relating to the ratings given by the Care Inspectorate and their verdict is that hundreds of them must improve.

They say that one in four facilities were rated unsatisfactory, weak or adequate by the Care Inspectorate as of March this year.

According to the analysis, it means 275 care homes have work to do to bring themselves up to standard.

Shadow health secretary and Lothians MSP Miles Briggs urged the Scottish Government to work more closely with the care home sector and local authorities to ensure improvements were made.

He said, with an ageing population and a shortage of care home spaces leading to bed-blocking in Scotland's hospitals, it was essential more was done to raise standards.

Care homes in Scotland can receive five possible grades which take in a range of themes and the Tories say the figures show 75.5 per cent received good or excellent results.

The others were deemed unsatisfactory, weak, or adequate -

where bosses say the service "should address areas of weakness".

The 24.5 per cent receiving below-par ratings compares to 26.2 per cent in 2016, and 28.8 per cent the year before.

Scottish Conservative shadow health secretary Miles Briggs said: "While it's welcome to see so many care homes being given good ratings, there are still hundreds which are falling below expectation.

"That's not good enough, and the residents and staff of these under-pressure facilities deserve better.

"Scotland has a well-documented ageing population and, as time goes on, these care homes are only going to become busier and more important.

"The SNP should make moves to sort this out now.

"For one in four Scottish care homes to either be failing, or have improvements to make, is simply not good enough."

Welsh, working-class firebrands The Death Hilarious bring their debut hour to the Edinburgh Fringe. The Scum Always Rises houses a parade of otherworldly souls as daft as they are dark, portrayed by a duo whose references range from Cormac McCarthy to menus at seafood restaurants to that rambling alkie you sometimes see hanging around the bus stop.

Terrifying and joyous, satirical and utterly puerile, The Death Hilarious embody numerous distorted fiends: Creole exorcists, hapless businessmen desperately trying to monetize laughter, a homemade sex robot, the unlikely adventures of John Merrick, and probably most horrifying of all — themselves. This is character comedy that threatens to break out into a vicious fight.

Ambient music and film projections immerse the audience in their idiosyncratic world — imagine Little Britain directed by Ken Russell — as The Death Hilarious roam the aisles, holding people hostage or freeing them of the devil's influence.

They never sleep, these boys. They are dancing, dancing. They say that they will

never die.

The Death Hilarious are Darren J. Coles and Glenn Wade. They began working together on a podcast series set in the South Wales valleys before forming The Death Hilarious and creating their peculiar brand of humour both in film and through their live work. They were finalists of the Welsh Unsigned Stand-up Award 2015 and winners of the 2016 Sketch Screen Award at London SketchFest. Regulars on the Welsh comedy circuit, their previous appearances

also include BBC Radio 4, Machynlleth Comedy Festival and Knock2bag.

A&E on target in June

■ June performance at 95.5%.

The Scottish Government tell us that performance across Scotland's accident and emergency departments was just above the 95% target during June.

ISD Scotland have published monthly figures today for all A&E sites across the country which show that 95.5% of patients were seen and subsequently admitted, discharged or transferred within the four hour target time. This compares with 94% in May.

Weekly figures for core A&E sites also show performance above 95%. Statistics for week ending 23 July was 95.3% — the same as the previous week.

Health Secretary Shona Robison said: "It is very encouraging that performance across Scotland was above the 95% target for June, and that Scotland's A&Es have outperformed those in the rest of the UK for more than two years. The weekly statistics for core sites are also above that level for the second week in a row.

"These positive results are thanks to the hard work of staff on the ground, both in emergency departments and elsewhere in the health and social care system.

"While we can expect some fluctuation week-to-week depending on seasonal pressures there has been continued focus on improvements in patient flow. For example, we are ensuring more people are discharged before noon and at weekends, helping to reduce delayed discharge, and meaning patients can be admitted to hospital more quickly if required.

"An additional £9 million has been given to boards this year to help them continue these sustainable improvements in

Around George Street

The new Hyde & Co, a bar and café at aparthotel Eden Locke is very convenient for the Book Festival and venues on George Street; grab a coffee and one of their amazing cheese and bacon scones at Wellington, also on George Street; or at Cairngorm, either on Melville Place or Frederick Street.

Street Food Stalls

Food at the Fringe has improved over the last decade. No longer is the choice just an unhealthy burger in a bun.

Fortunately now there's no end of **street food stalls** offering everything from vegan to vegetarian, to Swiss dumplings from **Alpings** to Mexican and Indian from **Umami Spice Girl**.

Check out those around **George Square Gardens**; **The Pleasance Courtyard**; **Summerhall Courtyard**; or **the Underbelly's Pasture**.

And if it's raining, seek refuge in one of the many inside bars and cafes at the Gilded Balloon. They do great nachos!

New service to help people in North Edinburgh and Leith into work

Port of Leith Housing Association (PoLHA) has set up a new employability service, Community Works, which will support people over the age of 16 living in Leith and North Edinburgh who are looking for work or seeking to develop their careers.

From today the new service will provide a range of training opportunities, including confidence building, CV creation, and health and safety, administration and computer skills. Community Works will also offer mock interviews, on site visits and work experience placements through its established network of employers.

Unlike other employability services in Edinburgh, Community Works is open to anyone, regardless of their current employment status, length of unemployment or support needs.

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Community Works will build on the success of its predecessor TOiL (Training Opportunities in Lothian) which supported almost 450 young unemployed people aged 16-24 into work, training or further education between 2005 and 2017 before winding up in June 2017.

Community Works Manager, John Murray, said: "I'm extremely excited to be part of this new service which will fill the gap in local support for people with employment needs who don't meet the eligibility criteria set by other services.

"We enjoyed tremendous success with our Training Opportunities in Lothian programme working with young people and now we can build on that good work with Community Works which gives our tenants and the wider community the chance to receive help and guidance from our team. "With the imminent introduction of Universal Credit there has never been more pressure on people receiving benefits to gain employment, so we're thrilled to be able to help our tenants and other people in Leith and North Edinburgh with this service."

Ricky Weir, Contract Manager, T.B. Mackay Energy Services said: "We are really excited about the potential for Community Works to help people whatever their age to get into work. The personalised one to one support that the service will provide and the training and qualifications that people will be able to access combined with relevant experience of the workplace will make a real difference to how they come across in a job interview.

"We have been working with PoLHA for more than 10 years, providing placement opportunities working in our head office or on site. You can see a real difference in people as the placement continues."

MERRILY WE ROLL ALONG

Following an acclaimed 5-star reviewed production of Sondheim's Assassins at The Chelsea Theatre and The Edinburgh Fringe in 2016, BB Theatre Productions is excited to present another Sondheim classic, Merrily We Roll Along, during the first week of the 2017 Edinburgh Fringe. BBTP's mission is to bring local talent to the national stage, producing shows with professional production values, a stellar cast and professional band, and this show is no exception. A poignant and uplifting musical, this heart-rending show explores friendship, ambition and the pressures of show business.



Starting at a hedonistic Hollywood showbiz party in 1976 and working its way back to the New York rooftop in 1957, Merrily We Roll Along portrays the story of three friends who we join at the end of their friendship, tussling with disappointment, heartbreak and disillusionment with fame. The story moves back through time, each musical number perfectly scored to reflect the genre of its era and the emotional roller-coaster of its characters. The musical score is punchy, lyrical and contains some of Sondheim's most sparkling narrative writing including Our Time and Old Friends. As two of the friends try to make it into show business, we hear some of Sondheim's own early frustrations with agents not daring to make the break from traditional musicals.

The reverse chronology time structure heightens audience emotion, wistfully pointing out the artistic and personal compromises faced by the characters along the way. A must see, both for Sondheim aficionados, but also for anyone with a passion for musical theatre.

Tiernan Douieb transports his carefully-cultivated echo chamber to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe, bringing with it a new hour of satirical gags and nonsense musings — if ignorance is bliss should we even know that? Can we learn to understand people we don't agree with?



Should we even try if they are genuinely very annoying? National identity, civilisation, Maslow's hierarchy of needs, and the persuasive properties of raw tomatoes — comedian, writer, podcaster and prolific tweeter Tiernan continues his mission to complain about worldly political happenings in the friendliest and funniest manner possible.

Sound of Silence From Tynecastle is Deafening

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I was listening to an old classic from Simon & Garfunkel this afternoon when my thoughts were drawn to the west end of Edinburgh. As the strains of 'The Sound of Silence ' faded

away, I couldn't help but wonder what — if anything — was going on at Tynecastle.

It's a sad when, after a busy morning, the first thing I did when I switched my phone on at lunchtime was to see if Hearts Head Coach Ian Cathro had left the club. He hadn't. Despite another weekend of anguish for the followers of Heart of Midlothian there was no news of any sort emanating from Tynecastle. The sound of silence from the club is deafening...

Former Hearts captain Gary Mackay wasn't slow to voice his opinion. The man with the record number of appearances in a maroon shirt told BBC Scotland that Hearts have made a mistake appointing Cathro and the club should admit it. However, Mackay's former team-mate Craig Levein, now Director of Football at Tynecastle, has — so far — not complied.

The feel-good factor that Hearts have enjoyed for much of the last three years begun to evaporate at the beginning of 2017 and is in danger of disappearing altogether — something owner Ann Budge must be all too aware of. The fans group the Foundation of Hearts will take over the running of the club from Mrs Budge in due course and the majority of Hearts supporters have placed their faith in her. She rescued the club from extinction three years ago and her leadership has not only resulted in Hearts emerging from the Ladbrokes Championship to a top six place in the Premiership but the creation of a brand new main stand, due to be partially opened in less than six weeks.

However, there seems little doubt Hearts have hit the reverse gear in recent months. Robbie Neilson's departure as Head Coach at the end of November last year appeared to have been triggered by the actions of some disgruntled supporters, some of whom hired a plane to fly over Tynecastle with a banner which displayed 'No Style, No Bottle. Neilson Out'. Neilson's replacement has hardly been top of the popularity stakes with the Hearts support — like Neilson, getting knocked out of the

Scottish Cup by Hibernian meant his status was damaged irrevocably.

Cathro has been a coach at some top clubs, including Newcastle United. But it seems his credibility as Head Coach at Hearts is difficult to accept for some players and certainly much of the support. Last season ended in huge disappointment despite promise shown in victories over Motherwell and, in particular, Rangers who were hammered 4-1 by Cathro's side in February. The cup defeat at Easter Road signalled the start of a malaise and Craig Levein admitted that bringing in so many foreign players on short-terms deal last term was a mistake.

The Director of Football owned up to that one — and now it's time to fess up to another one. Hearts were distinctly average against League Two side Elgin City two weeks ago; not much better against East Fife; absolutely shocking in losing to League Two Peterhead last week and unable to deal with a Dunfermline Athletic team who outfought their hosts at Tynecastle on Saturday. Cathro's decision to drop Jamie Walker for the Dunfermline game — if indeed it was his decision — backfired. Walker may not have been at the top of his game but he is always capable of scoring goals. If a point had to be made why not drop Walker to the substitute's bench and bring him on if the team was in dire straits — as it patently was on Saturday?

Without the width Walker provides with his forward runs, Hearts resorted to long punts up the park to a bewildered Kyle Lafferty and an out-of-sorts Isma Goncalves, a player clearly lacking in confidence. Not that Cathro seemed to notice.

The decision to play John Souttar at the weekend was another decision which backfired. The young defender was at fault for both Dunfermline goals and it seems the former Dundee United man is some way from the fitness required.

Hearts, under Cathro, have become an embarrassment. A Betfred

Cup section containing three part-time teams — two in the fourth tier of Scottish football — and a team from the Championship shouldn't have been too problematic for a side in the Premiership. Not to finish top of the section is bad enough. To fail to finish second is humiliating. Can you imagine if this was Hibernian — how much mickey-taking would Hearts fans be doing right now?

What is adding fuel to a rapidly developing fire is the lack of reaction from the club to the crisis. Even a statement saying the Board were backing Ian Cathro, while not being popular, would at least be keeping the fans — who have parted with hard-earned cash not only for Betfred Cup ties and season tickets but also towards the Foundation of Hearts — informed and updated.

But, for now, the sound of silence from Tynecastle is worrying. With a trip to champions Celtic looming another part of the lyrics from that Simon & Garfunkel song may be more relevant on Saturday evening — hello darkness, my old friend, I've come to talk with you again.

Or not...
