Will Young and Louise Redknapp Bring Cabaret to Edinburgh

Internationally renowned singer/songwriter, Will Young, and musician and presenter Louise Redknapp will add a touch of glamour to Scotland's capital city this autumn when they will star in Rufus Norri's multi-award winning production of CABARET at the Edinburgh Playhouse in November.

Young reprises his Olivier Award-nominated performance as the enigmatic Emcee alongside **Redknapp**, who makes her stage debut as Sally Bowles.

Ever since winning the inaugural series of Pop Idol in 2001, **Will Young** has been one of the UK's most popular and successful music artists. He holds the record for the fastest selling debut single in British chart history, and has enjoyed a phenomenal career in music with four No1 albums, as well as acting alongside Dame Judi Dench in the film *Mrs Henderson Presents*. Will made his West End debut in Cabaret and will be reprising his award-winning performance.

Louise Redknapp rose to fame as a member of the girl group Eternal. She left the band to carve out a successful solo career achieving an impressive twelve Top 20 singles, including the hits Naked and Stuck in the Middle and selling over 5 million records with 5 albums. Since then she has rarely left our television screens and most recently wowed the nation with her dancing skills finishing 'runner up' in the 2016 series of BBC1's Strictly Come Dancing.

CABARET features show-stopping choreography, dazzling costumes and some of the most iconic songs in musical theatre including 'Money Makes The World Go Round', 'Two Ladies' 'Maybe This Time' and of course 'Cabaret'. The production turns Weimar Berlin of 1931 into a sassy, sizzling haven of decadence, and at its dark heart is the legendary and notorious Emcee, who performs nightly at the infamous Kit Kat Klub.

Since its Broadway premiere in 1966 and the famous movie version with Liza Minnelli and Oscar winner Joel Grey, CABARET has won a staggering number of stage and screen awards including 8 Oscar's, 7 BAFTA's and 13 Tony's. Norris' production has enjoyed two smash hit West End runs and has picked up 2 Olivier Awards.

Rufus Norris is Director of the National Theatre and a multi-award-winning theatre and opera director.

Choreography is by the Olivier Award-winning Javier De Frutos. In 1990, he formed The Javier De Frutos Dance Company. His work includes *The Hypochondriac Bird* and *Affliction of Loneliness*. Recently he joined forces with Sadler's Wells and *The Pet Shop Boys* to create a brand-new dance work based on Hans Christian Andersen's story, *The Most Incredible Thing*.

Edinburgh MP raises question over the EU and protected food

Deidre Brock MP for Edinburgh North and Leith has raised the matter of the protected status for foods such as the Arbroath Smokie and the Stornoway Black Pudding after Brexit.

In response to a written question from Deidre, the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, George Eustice MP said that the EU Protected Food Name Scheme was 'a matter for negotiations' and the government is 'considering options'.

Ms Brock said: "Now we get down to the nitty-gritty of the Brexit negotiations we see that even our food heritage is under threat, and the Tories don't have a plan to protect it.

"Scotland's food and drinks industry has been booming with Scottish Government support, backed up by EU level protections. Exports have more than doubled since the SNP came to power.

"We cannot sit back and allow this floundering Tory Government to damage a healthy Scottish industry. We need the Scottish Government to be at the negotiating table fighting for our food and drinks industry — and fighting to keep us in the single market, as most Scottish businesses and the people of Scotland want us to be."

"Leaders and other volunteers give up their time unselfishly to help young people realise their full potential, and provide them with the skills they need to succeed in life.

"Achieving this award was good fun — I met several Scout groups in my constituency, attended part of a camp, and even tried my hand at archery!"

for Scouts Scotland said: "The exciting thing is that this badge encourages politicians to see and engage with, first-hand, the extraordinary work Scouts Scotland does every single day in Scotland.

"Our Scouts are active citizens and I believe this advocacy award will help to inspire more of our young people to engage with democracy and work towards social change."

The Youth Advocacy Award can be earned by MSPs, in the same way as Scouts earn their badges, by completing a number of actions.

The award is also designed to give politicians a greater insight into the work that Scouts Scotland is undertaking week in week out in Scotland. As the largest volunteer-led mixed youth movement in Scotland, Scouts Scotland support nearly 40,000 young people to enjoy new adventures, experience the outdoors, interact with others and gain confidence.

Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2017 — Quest to Preserve Folktales of the Kurds

"There is one world, but a thousand doorways" — Diane Edgecomb brings the dramatic true account of her travels among the Kurds of Turkey to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.

Her aim was to help preserve a vivid part of a threatened

cultured, the traditional folktales passed through the generations by word of mouth but never written down. The task was urgent as Turkish laws have been silencing their ancient language.

Protected by the Kurds, who kept this innocent project hidden from government eyes, Edgecomb found herself in remote mountain villages forbidden to outsiders.

Here, the true stories of their lives and struggle began to mix with their legends as doorways opened on a very different world, a mythic landscape of shepherds, guard towers, caravans, impossible mountain passes and the mysterious "Eggs of the Ancient Tree".

She says: "During the performance I bring to life the events and people I encountered, playing over 16 characters. I try to let the voices of the Kurds, a people who have been silenced for so long, shine through with all of their wisdom, humour and heart. This is my chance to honour the unforgettable people that I met."

A master storyteller and theatre artist, Edgecomb takes the audience to the heart of a life-changing journey, revealing an unforgettable world. Exotic legends from her book A Fire in My Heart: Kurdish Tales, the first book of Kurdish folktales published in English, are set against the dramatic true story of her encounters with the Kurds. Carpet dealers, chain smoking octogenarians and shy village heroes bring about a series of improbable, synchronistic events in this struggle to honour these last Kurdish storytellers.

A featured storyteller on National Public Radio, at the National Storytelling Festival and the International Storytelling Center, Edgecomb is known for her unique style where she embodies the various characters and scenes in a tale, bringing each moment alive. She has won the first and only National Oracle Award for Storytelling Excellence in the Northeast as well as five Storytelling World Awards.

The charming stories have a timeless quality, passed down from generation to generation and discovered anew by more readers each year.

Producer Jimmy Jewell was made an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music in 2015 for his 'outstanding contribution to the UK music industry'. He comments, I loved Peter and Jemima, my parents and grandparents loved them, and now my children love them too.

The creations of Beatrix Potter consistently withstand the tests of time to remain some of the most recognised and loved characters across the globe.

We all know them, we all watch them, we all read them, and we all adore them. To bring these fascinating and wonderful stories to the stage with Michelle and Children's Classic Concerts is a joy and a pleasure, and I can't wait to spend my summer with them.

New politically charged show from 2015 Fringe First/Stage Award winner

We all want something to believe in. It's 1987 and Frankie Vah gorges on love, radical politics, and skuzzy indie stardom. But can he keep it all down?

Following the multi award-winning success What I Learned From Johnny Bevan, Luke Wright's second verse play deals with love, loss and belief, against a backdrop of grubby indie venues and 80s politics.

Simon Mortimer, the vicar's son from Essex, has lost his religion. Replaced by radical politics, ranting poetry, and his girlfriend Eve, Simon performs his poetry as Frankie Vah. They live on love and in penury, but when Frankie goes on tour with indie darlings The Midnight Shift, his new world is put to the test.

Investigation underway after East Calder sex attack

Police are appealing for information after a 33-year-old woman was sexually assaulted in the East Calder area.

The incident took place around 7.40am on Monday 10 July at a bus stop between Drovers Road and Little Sheil Road.

The suspect is described as white, of slim build, 5ft 9-10ins tall, in his thirties, with short dark receding hair, distinctive side burns and dark stubble.

He was wearing a high-vis short-sleeved t-shirt with a dark panel on the back, high-vis trousers and trainers.

He was last seen heading in the direction of Main Street, possibly into Almondell & Calderwood Country Park.

PC Nichola McConnell of Broxburn Police Station said: "This was a very distressing incident for the woman and we're urging anyone who may have seen the man in the area, or who recognises his description, to contact us as soon as possible.

"There has been an increase in patrols in the area since this incident was reported and this will continue over the coming days."

Anyone with information is asked to contact Police Scotland on 101, quoting incident number 0609 of 10 June, or report this anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Over 150 people report being victims of historical child sexual abuse within Scottish

football.



A major investigation was launched in November after Police Scotland received reports of "non-recent child abuse within football" and to date over 150 people have reported being the victims of historical child sexual abuse within Scottish football.

Eleven arrests have been made so far.

Detective Chief Superintendent Lesley Boal, Head of Public Protection, Police Scotland, said: "Police Scotland's investigation into child sexual abuse in football continues.

"Between 25 November 2016 and 30 June 2017, Police Scotland has been contacted directly or indirectly, via the NSPCC and SFA helpline, by 162 individuals wishing to report or provide information about child sexual abuse in football. In addition, Police Scotland has proactively made contact with a number of victims and witnesses.

"As of 30th June 2017, 11 people have been arrested; more than 150 people have reported being sexually abused as a child within a football club setting and 295 crimes have been recorded.

"Investigations of this nature are highly complex. However, with a dedicated specialist investigation team; major incident administrative system and analytical support, we are confident that our investigations, which are risk focused, are progressing well.

"I would wish to thank each and every person who has engaged with the National Child Abuse Investigation Unit. We understand how difficult this can be, which is why we work

closely with other agencies to ensure that support and advocacy services are available to meet individual needs.

"Many people came forward last year after Andy Woodward bravely waived his right to anonymity. Others have come forward since then and continue to do so. Our assurance to anyone who has not felt able to report so far is you are absolutely not alone — we will listen; we will investigate regardless of where or when the abuse occurred and we will take prompt action to ensure that no-one else is at risk of harm. □

"We would ask anyone who has concerns or information about any person who may pose a risk to children or who may have abused a child to contact Police Scotland on 101 or their local Social Work Department."

Viewers at home can vote and judge too and judgement has become omnipresent in today's society.

Writer Sarah Milton said :"Tumble Tuck arose from dealing with my own mental health issues and re-establishing a sense of self-worth. The pressure on young people, in particular young women, to aspire to look a certain way and achieve certain things in ways that conform to social expectations is enormous. There's so much pressure on young people to obtain top grades and go to top schools. We don't reward young people enough for their personal attributes like being kind and loyal. For the character of Daisy, just getting out of bed in the morning was once a big step for her and Tumble Tuck's aim is to make us think that actually, we all have something to contribute. And we're doing okay."

Tumble Tuck will be offsetting their very minimal carbon emissions by planting trees in the East Midlands. They will be using 100% recycled paper and vegetable ink for their

flyers to ensure the show is as green as possible.

Help the council care for the city's parks

If you go down to the park today the council would like you to take care against causing fires there.

The Parks and Greenspace team have issued a timely reminder that even small sparks can turn into large fires which can damage local greenery and wildlife.

So if you do go then you are asked to leave no trace by clearing away your rubbish and disposing of cigarettes safely.

×

Transport and Environment Convener, Councillor Lesley Macinnes, said: "In Edinburgh we are lucky to have such a wealth of parks and greenspaces, many of which offer areas of particular natural beauty and biodiversity.

"Of course it's fantastic that residents and visitors to the Capital can enjoy these beautiful spaces, but I would encourage the public to treat them with care, ensuring they remain as welcoming to wildlife and people as they have always been."

Natural Heritage Officer, David Kyles, added: "Fires can be devastating in parks and other more rural and upland areas. The breeding season for birds, between March and July and sometimes seasonally later, is a particularly vulnerable time for nesting birds, especially those that nest on or close to the ground.

"Fires that devastate areas can pose knock-on problems whereby small mammal populations can be significantly harmed, posing localised food shortage, loss of shelter and other sources of food and the general loss of habitat. Please act responsibly when out in Edinburgh's countryside sites."

The council is particularly keen to ensure that the areas used for picnics and BBQs are highlighted to the public; these include Corstorphine Hill Nature Reserve, Easter Craiglockhart Hill Local Nature Reserve and Colinton Dell.

There are many ground-nesting birds which would be particularly vulnerable if the low-lying shrubbery in the parks caught fire.

Kenneth Rogers, Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) Local

Senior Officer for Edinburgh, said: "Grass and wildfires are a common risk at this time of year when warmer weather dries out vegetation and grassland — which offers an ample fuel source. Just one heat source like a campfire ember can cause it to ignite and the if the wind changes direction even the smallest fire can spread uncontrollably and devastate entire hillsides. "In the unfortunate instance that a fire is set deliberately, SFRS resources can be diverted from real emergencies. Through robust strategic planning we will always be able to respond to an emergency, however the fact remains that these fires can present a very real danger to our communities."

- Don't put your disposable BBQ on the grass raise it upon bricks or sand
- No campfires are permitted in woodland or shrubby areas.
- If you build a fire then do so away from trees and bushes
- Do not leave a fire unattended
- Build a fire ring with stones around it to contain the fire
- Extinguish the fire before you leave the park

LAB RATS make their Edinburgh debut with the world premiere of a hilariously touching one-man show written by Sascha Moore and performed by David William Bryan. Trashed transforms Belly Dancer into a rancid Yorkshire fly-tipping site for a whirlwind account from Keith 'Goody' Goodman — a mid-thirties bin man struggling to deal with the death of his daughter whilst battling his uncontrollable thirst for booze.

Unapologetically working class, funny and dark, Trashed is a highly physical, powerhouse of a play that will leave you breathless.

Goody is a raucous anti-hero whose life is, quite literally, rubbish. Unable to talk about his feelings and just about ready to explode, he has a dark secret; one of many things he's hiding in this ominous rubbish dump. For one hour only, Trashed lets us see the world through the eyes of a man learning to express himself but realising it's way too late in the game.

He's overconfident, insecure, brash, bitter, playful, downtrodden and very, very drunk. But when does it stop being funny and just become tragic?

Writer Sascha Moore commented: "Trashed is, at its core, a story about loss: of loved ones, opportunity and of oneself. Emotions associated with grief are universal and easily recognisable, but our coping strategies are widely varied, in both method and effectiveness. I wanted to explore what

happens when our ability to self-soothe fails and our pain manifests itself in disastrous ways.

"Is tragedy ever a justifiable excuse for bad behaviour? Is the distinction between villain and victim really as explicit as we assume it to be? Or is it just too abhorrent to consider that we are all on the verge of doing something unthinkable?

David William Bryan and Sascha Moore met at a writer's group at the BushTheatre in 2012.

They formed LAB RATS in 2016, out of a mutual desire to produce affordable, high quality and engaging fringe theatre which is as accessible and entertaining to first time theatre goers as it is to regular audiences and those in the industry.

Anglers can help important salmon research

Hundreds of Atlantic salmon will be tagged and released back into the water as part of a new study aimed at increasing the understanding of the routes they take and the conservation measures needed to protect them.

The Scottish Government research project will run for up to 15 weeks during which 750 salmon will be caught and acoustically tagged off the north coast of Scotland with a network of receivers deployed around the country to detect where those

fish then go.

The scientific study will look to find out how coastal fisheries link to different rivers, as well as increasing our understanding of salmon homing behaviour and breeding spots.

Roseanna Cunningham, Environment Secretary, said: "We know Atlantic salmon can migrate thousands of miles from home rivers to high seas feeding grounds and back to spawn. Exactly how they find their home river again remains a mystery

"While a number of historic tagging studies have shown that fish captured in coastal nets at one location have then been recaptured in nets much further around the coast, our knowledge of how they came to that point is still very limited.

"This new study will look to provide us with further insight into this iconic species' behaviour which will help to determine whether we are striking the right balance between conservation and the interests of those who fish for salmon and what further action might be needed to protect stocks for future generations."

Alan Wells, chief executive of Fisheries Management Scotland, said: "This important research is the largest project of its kind to be undertaken in Scotland.

"The involvement of local fisheries managers has resulted in over 60 acoustic receivers being deployed in around 26 Scottish rivers in addition to helping facilitate more detailed surveys of rivers in the autumn.

"We are encouraging all anglers in Scotland to be on the lookout for tagged Atlantic salmon.

"By removing these externally placed acoustic tags and returning them to Marine Scotland, anglers can play a crucial part in increasing our understanding of the coastal movements of salmon.

"Increasing our knowledge of how salmon come back to Scotland will help us to manage this fragile resource."
