HRH The Princess Royal has addressed the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, where she is serving as Lord High Commissioner representing Her Majesty The Queen.

After praising the General Assembly as a place for "reasoned and civilised debate" she said the numbers worshipping in church may be falling, but "there is still a need for 'spiritual leadership, and in fact, "that need is greater than ever." She continued "The importance of the General Assembly has been reasoned debate and that reasoned debate is in quite short supply at the moment."



From a position just next to the newly installed Lord Provost of the City of Edinburgh the Rt Hon Frank Ross, she addressed the gathered clergy.

HRH The Princess Royal also noted that churches in Scotland have "a major role to play in welcoming strangers," a tradition she believes is "stronger in Scotland than in many other parts of the world". The speech came after the election of the new Moderator Rt Rev Dr Derek Browning, who was installed in the role by the retiring Moderator Very Rev Dr Russell Barr.

Her Royal Highness is the first member of the Royal family to take on the role for a second time, having first served in the role in 1996. On Friday she took part in the Ceremony of the Keys at Holyrood Palace and she resumed her duties this morning with the ceremonial procession which opened the General Assembly. First Minister Nicola Sturgeon also took part in the opening ceremony.

The opening session included an address from retiring Moderator, Very Rev Dr Russell Barr, who has drawn attention to the situation of homeless people across Scotland throughout his year of office. Four charged after cocaine, ecstasy and cannabis worth £47k seized in North Berwick

"Police Scotland is wholly committed to tackling any drug related incidents and we will continue to investigate any offences reported using every resource at our disposal.

Tackling the supply of drugs, and the often devastating consequences it has on our communities, is a top priority and we will continue to take action to identify those involved in drug related crime.

"We will also work closely with our partners at the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service to stop drug dealers from benefiting from the proceeds of their criminal activity.

Woman's five year ban on keeping horses after causing unnecessary suffering

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A Midlothian woman who caused unnecessary suffering to her horse (William) has been given a £180 fine and a five year ban from owning or keeping horses following a Scottish SPCA investigation.

Louise Paton, 20, formerly of Glen View Road, Gorebridge was sentenced at Lothian and Borders Sheriff Court on Wednesday (17 April).

Paton pled guilty to causing unnecessary suffering to William by failing to provide appropriate veterinary treatment.

Commenting on the investigation and court case, Scottish SPCA Inspector Tracy Dow said, "William has been caused unnecessary suffering for approximately six months due to Miss Paton failing to provide adequate veterinary care.

"Miss Paton initially failed to seek veterinary assistance and subsequently failed to follow veterinary advice that she received.

"Had she sought veterinary assistance from the outset the level of suffering would have been significantly reduced and the long term prognosis may have improved.

"Unfortunately on veterinary advice William has had to be put to sleep due to the extent of his injuries and the pain and discomfort he suffered.

"We hope Miss Paton will give serious consideration to her ability to care for horses again once her ban is over."

Letter from Scotland



Councils in coalitions and chaos

Two weeks on from our local council elections, we are still in some confusion about who is in charge in our 32 districts. We're hoping that the town clerks, or "chief executives" as we must now call them, are just getting on with the day to day chores of making sure the schools are opening each morning and the care services are up and running and the dustbins are being emptied.

While the politicians haggle over coalition agreements, Scotland's 240,000 council workers are valiantly providing the services we all depend on. Which goes to show two things: we don't really need politics....at least in the short run.....and local councillors don't have much power anyway.

For what it's worth, the political map that is haphazardly being formed in front of us looks like this. The SNP have more councillors than any other party (431). They are the largest party in half of the 32 districts. They have taken over the administration of Glasgow City Council, ending nearly 40 years of Labour control. Along with a few independents, they rule Dundee. They have formed the administration in Falkirk. And just about everywhere else they are the party the rest are ganging up against.

Except in Fife, where Labour has agreed to work with the SNP. At the time of writing, it looks as though the same may happen in Edinburgh. In Aberdeen, nine Labour councillors have gone into coalition with the Conservatives (yes, the afore-hated Tories!) to keep the SNP out. For their high-mindedness, they have all been suspended from the Labour Party and will sit as Independent Labour councillors.

The Highlands, of course, is in a world of its own. Its 28 Independents have joined with the Liberal Democrats and Labour to form the administration, under the redoubtable Margaret Davidson who once again will lead the council. The Borders too are an exception, with the Conservatives in charge, along with a handful of Independents.

I can't myself see why all this coalition-forming is necessary. Why can't the largest party form the administration in each district and have to come to the full council for approval of each of its actions in turn? This would allow a proper, open debate about each policy separately, rather than having a package bundled together in haste in what we used to call "smoked filled back rooms" and now we must grandly call the "cabinet."

The process of forming these unfortunate coalitions has proved particularly messy this year because the general election campaign is taking place at the same time. Who wants to be seen in bed with the enemy as we approach 8 June ?

But actually, I doubt if these little local difficulties will matter to the electorate at large. The battle lines are already drawn; for or against independence. Even Brexit doesn't seem to matter in Scotland. It will be interesting to see over the next couple of weeks whether other issues can break though, now that the campaign in England has moved onto issues such as taxation and spending, living standards, pensions and immigration. The Scottish parties have yet to publish their manifestos.

While all this politicking has been going on, the economy has been chugging along nicely. Unemployment has fallen to 4.4 per cent, it's now lower than in the UK as a whole and the best rate for over 40 years. The number of Scots in work also grew in the last quarter by 41,000 to 74 per cent of the working age population. And many thousands of jobs are expected to come in the renewables industry with a court ruling that four huge off-shore wind power projects can go ahead off the east coast. It's not such good news for kittiwakes, gannets and puffins however and the RSPB says it is considering an appeal.

This weekend the British Pipe Band Championship comes to Paisley and the 140th annual university boat race takes place between Edinburgh and Glasgow on the Clyde. It's also the

beginning of the Church of Scotland's General Assembly.

The assembly has already been in the news because one of its guest speakers, Rev Rola Sleiman from Syria, was refused a visa by the Home Office. Some pettifogging civil servant told her he wasn't convinced she would go back to Syria after her visit or that she would be supported while here by the Church of Scotland. Lo and behold, within hours of the story appearing in the newspapers, the Home Office changed its mind.

Finally, the next time I go into my local outdoor equipment shop, Tiso's, I'll be on the look-out for one member of its glamorous staff in particular. Mollie Hughes (26) has just become the youngest British mountaineer to climb Mt Everest from both the north and south side. She and her climbing partner Jon Gupta succeeded in scaling the north face on Tuesday after spending a month on the mountain. Five years ago, she climbed the traditional south col route.

"I'm elated," she messaged from the summit, " and I'm exhausted. And I know I still have the hardest part to do, the long and difficult descent to base camp." She hopes to raise over £8,000 in sponsorship for Cancer Research UK.

When the Edinburgh councillors finally get their act together, I hope they award her a medal.

New magazine aims to spark architecture debate

It was perhaps appropriate that the launch of an architecture magazine should take place in Edinburgh's Lothian Street.

On one side sit traditional Edinburgh sandstone buildings housing pubs and flats.

Opposite is the stunning McEwan Hall in Bristo Sqaure, it's circular dome and external stone highlighted by the evening sun.

And to our left is an example of modern architecture in Potterrow.

We're at Paradise Palms, once a traditional pub but now packed with 'palm trees' and totally lacking any shred of sympathy with the surroundings.

And the bi-annual magazine. Well, Crumble hopes to encourage

constructive conversation about architecture in the public realm.

The editors claim a meaningful debate has been lacking recently.

Our environment could have sparked a lengthy discussion on its own, but to business.

Crumble is born. The name does not, the six-strong production team stress, signal a view that Scotland's Capital is falling to bits.

Far from it. However, they hope the publication can provide answers to current political and social issues.

The theme of the first publication is "What is Urgent?" Issues discussed by the team who are students and professionals include the on-going St James' Centre development which they claim is "hauntingly similar to the Caltongate scheme of 2007".

The author said: "As with many huge new urban projects, its reason for being built seems almost entirely in-substantial. The new centre promises four floors of shopping, dining, leisure and entertainment even though Princes Street, George Street and Multrees Walk already offer more than enough — along with the additional gift of frresh air."

Another piece claims that Edinburgh has a city centre manager but the author alleged: "His role seems to be primarily concerned with getting the best deal for city from the promoters of Edinburgh's Hogmanay or making life difficult for buskers".

International issues encountered within its 40 pages include

the refugee crisis, whether architecture can be a vehicle for social good and an enlightening piece, the first, incidentally after the editor's page, about the Badjao, a nomadic tribe of sea dwellers travelling with the currents of South East Asia.

Editor-in-chief, Theo Shack, who is originally from Dumfries, said: "The magazine is critical-propositional, so it raises questions about the status quo but also contains answers and ideas for solutions."

Edinburgh's "most spectacular outdoor dining space" launched

It is no surprise that visitor numbers at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh (RBGE) are within touching distance of one million a year.

The garden is an green oasis away from the bustle of central

Edinburgh, yet it is within a 20 minute walk — downhill — from Princes Street.

Strolling through the space, which was founded in 1670 as a physic garden, is a pleasure, particularly on a still night, and it is easy to see why so many people come regularly.

One man was sitting on a bench with his eyes closed, contemplating, a woman was reading a book, excited children were playing, I nodded to several groups sitting in the late evening sunshine chatting. This is a wonderful place to be.

On previous visits I've noted artists capturing the plants on canvas and photographers delighting in the colour and the diversity of plantlife on their doorstep.

The RBGE is a world-renowned centre for plant science, horticulture and education and extends over four gardens (Edinburgh, Benmore, Dawyck and Logan) boasting a rich living collection of plants.

The vision, explained Simon Milne, Regius Keeper, is to explore, conserve and explain the world of plants for a better future

Put simply, without plants, there would be no life on earth.

But there is another side to RBGE which has been growing and studying plants for more than 330 years.

Aside from their world class Living Collection, Herbarium and Library, there is a business to run.

Mr Milne explained that they are continuing to explore ideas to increase visitor numbers.

Their portfolio of events includes an annual winter light show, which is stunning, and the board is also looking to extend its corporate business. Along with caterers Sodexo they have invested heavily in the John Hope Gateway, the largest event space on-site with a capacity for up to 250 for a seated dinner or 400 for a standing reception and BBQ.

It is available for evening events with access to a large, decked area (with non-slip panels) overlooking the biodiversity garden.

It was there that Sodexo hosted a reception to spread the word that the re-furbishment was over and that the John Hope — with a new outdoor kitchen serving a movable feast which includes pizza and burgers — was now fully open.

Fraser Sharp, general manager of Sodexo, Prestige Venues and Events, believes that the decking area outside the restaurant in the John Hope Gateway at the main entrance to the garden is the most spectacular outdoor dining space in Scotland's Capital.

Edinburgh Napier student has a cracking idea!

It's the food stuff that is traditionally enjoyed scrambled, poached, boiled or fried.

But eggs could soon be appearing on tables in a way never seen before thanks to the work of one Edinburgh Napier student.



Martina Zupan, a fourth year product design student at the University, has struck upon the cracking idea of using eggshells to make a range of disposable tableware.

The 26 year-old has designed and produced a product called 'Colleggtion' — a disposable circular plate with tearaway cutlery that is made from waste eggshells.

One of hundreds of exhibits at Edinburgh Napier's More Than A Degree Show, the designer has developed a process that allows for waste eggshells to be formed into products.

This process is currently patent pending, but Martina believes her tableware could help highlight the opportunities that upcycling waste eggshells can bring.

She said: "The idea literally came to me one day as I was making scrambled eggs in the house and after some extensive research I found that despite eggshells carrying a range of beneficial components, very little was actually being done to upcycle waste product.

"I tested eggshell powder in a range of formats — including adding it to muffins, into plaster for egg cups and even

cement and other resins but it was the tableware idea that really caught my imagination.

"I worked closely with research teams at Edinburgh Napier who had some leftover raw materials from various experiments that they were happy for me to use. I started testing it with the eggshells and things fell into place from there.

"I think I've managed to produce a sophisticated product that has the potential to highlight a new method of producing sustainable tableware and cutlery — it's been really exciting to work on."

Martina's idea was sparked by becoming dismayed at the lack of recycling options for by-products within the food industry, meaning that potentially beneficial components such as calcium carbonate were simply being lost in landfill.

According to egginfo.co.uk, the UK consumes more than 12.5 billion eggs each year, which equates to more than 75,000 tonnes of eggshell waste. As a result of current laws and regulations, egg processors are obliged to send their eggshell waste to landfill, with more than 17,000 tonnes being disposed of in this way last year.

Despite some eggshell waste being used domestically, in restaurants and recycled generically though food bins, Martina still believes there is room for improvement when it comes to finding an alternative use for leftover waste.

She added: "Sustainability was a key consideration throughout the entire project and I've been careful to ensure that nothing goes to waste throughout the entire process. In my testing, I've even tried using waste food material to dye my tableware in certain colours — there is so much scope to be creative with food waste!

"Very few know of the benefits that eggshells can bring to the environment. With this project, eggshell waste could not only

be prevented and reduced, but eggshells would be recycled into a valuable product. Being fully compostable means the tableware can be disposed of together with food waste, which will then be, with the help of anaerobic digestion, turned into biogases which act as a source of green energy as well as nutrient-rich bio-fertiliser. It has massive potential.

"I'd love to continue the development of the tableware after my time at University comes to an end. Ideally I'd like to work with like-minded investors who could help commercialise the patent pending process further — it would be great to get some help and support to fully get the product up and running and onto kitchen tables."

Richard Firth, Programme Leader, BDes (Hons) Product Design, said: "One of the many achievements that singles out Martina's project is the incredible amount and range of her research and ideation process. Martina's commitment, determination and drive to 'try and try again has been rewarded in a design project that is truly unique with the potential to achieve real change with regard to how we think about materials, design our products and how we engage with producing our products within the 21st century."

Edinburgh Napier's More Than A Degree Show is an annual showcase of the creative talent of new and emerging designers, photographers, film makers, journalists, creative writers and actors from its School of Arts and Creative Industries and School of Computing.

The exhibition runs within Merchiston campus and is open to the public from 19-28 May.

Greenpeace say Bass Rock polluted with ocean plastic



An expedition by the Greenpeace ship *Beluga II* has revealed high levels of plastic pollution around the famous Bass Rock in the Firth of Forth.

Shocking images reveal plastic around eggs in nests and strewn across the island, and even in the birds' beaks. Unfortunately, the groups says this phenomenon is not rare, as it is estimated that up to 90% of seabirds have ingested plastic.

The findings come at the beginning of research conducted during the *Beluga II*'s scientific voyage around Scotland, which runs until the end of June. They will document the impact of plastic pollution on some of the UK's most precious wildlife like puffins, gannets and basking sharks.

"Being surrounded by tens of thousands of gannets on the Bass Rock is a stunning spectacle — but it's seabirds like these which are acutely threatened by ocean plastic pollution," said Willie Mackenzie, oceans expert at Greenpeace UK. "We found plastic bags, packaging, bits of old fishing gear and even crisp packets strewn across the island."

"It's no wonder that that studies have shown that 90% of seabirds have eaten plastic."

Beluga II will continue her two-month expedition around the Scottish coast until the end of June. The trip is conducted by students and crew from Exeter University.

Five One Five Years On

William Hill Scottish Cup Final — Saturday 19 May 2012 — Hampden Park

The first time I cried at a football match was 1st January 1973. I was ten years old and was spending New Year with my father, my parents having divorced three years earlier. In 1968 my father had taken me to my first football match, the less than exotic delight that was Brockville Park, Falkirk. Living in Cumbernauld at that time, my Dad didn't want me being associated with the baggage that came with Celtic and Rangers and his intention was to bring me up as a Falkirk Bairn. But on that cold, October day, Hearts were the visitors. The Maroon Army had taken over the old ground creating an atmosphere that was spellbinding for an innocent six-year-old. The boys in maroon won 3-1 — and that was that. I was bitten by the Jambo bug and it's been part of my DNA ever since.

On the first day of 1973, I stood on the Tynecastle terracing with my father who was less than thrilled at succumbing to my badgering to take me to the Hearts-Hibs game. I was badgering him again at half-time but for entirely different reasons. Hearts had been the victims of five blatantly offside Hibs goals. I begged my father to take me back to his house in Cumbernauld. His reply was less than sympathetic.

'Listen, son, you wanted to be a Hearts fan so you'll bloody well stay to the end'

Thanks, Dad.

For decades, those of the Hibernian persuasion had thrown that game in the faces of those in maroon. Damn it, to this day there's even a shop at the foot of Leith Walk still selling tee-shirts with the Hibs team line up emblazoned on the front. It was an Edinburgh derby that would remain in the spotlight until it was over-shadowed by the Scottish Cup semi-final in 2006 — and then totally eclipsed by the Scottish Cup final in 2012.

There was a tense build up to the 2006 semi-final. With Second Division Gretna waiting in the final the victors knew they would be red-hot favourites to lift the Scottish Cup. It had been eight years since Hearts had last lifted the famous old trophy. It had been 104 since Hibs had done so.

A Paul Hartley hat-trick inspired Hearts to a 4-0 triumph over their city rivals. I wrote at the time it was the mother of all Edinburgh derbies. I was wrong. Hearts duly lifted the cup by defeating Gretna in the final (albeit after a penalty shoot-out) but the chance for Hibernian to gain revenge came six years later when the capital pair faced each other in the Scottish Cup final of 2012.

As was the case before the all Edinburgh semi-final in 2006, the build-up to the first Scottish Cup Final between Hearts and Hibs since 1896 was full of tension. Hearts were installed

by the bookmakers as odds on favourites but several players, including Ian Black and talisman Rudi Skacel, were looking unlikely to be continuing their careers at Tynecastle, as there were no offers of any new contracts on the table. Semifinal hero Craig Beattie had been nursing a hamstring injury and wasn't included in the starting eleven. Hibernian, who had only just managed to avoid relegation, had several players who were on loan, including striker Leigh Griffiths who had scored their winner in the semi-final win over Aberdeen.

A crowd of over 51,000 packed into Hampden and the tension was palpable as the teams walked on to the field. It was Hearts, however, who made the brighter start and good work from Andrew Driver saw a cross for Rudi Skacel but the Czech Republic player could not direct his header on target. If Hearts were nervous they certainly didn't show it during that opening period as they pinned their city rivals inside their own half. With 15 minutes gone, the breakthrough arrived. A corner from Danny Grainger seemed to bemuse the Hibs defence. Ryan McGowan showed commitment to get to the ball first and his attempt at goal fell at the feet of Darren Barr who stabbed the ball past Hibs goalkeeper Brown and into the net to give Hearts a deserved lead.

Already in the ascendancy, Hearts confidence grew further. Shortly after the goal, Hibs defender Kujabi was booked for a foul on Santana — a foul that would have major implications later. Ian Black was dominant for Hearts and it seemed astonishing that Hibs were allowing the former Inverness Caledonian Thistle player so much space to orchestrate the Hearts midfield. It was from Black's pass that Rudi Skacel doubled the Maroon's lead after 27 minutes. Collecting the ball on the edge of the Hibs penalty box, Skacel produced a trademark turn past McPake before firing in a shot that took a deflection off the Hibs player before flying past Brown. 2-0 to Hearts and the Maroon Army erupted in anticipation of another Hearts cup triumph.

Hibs had barely been in the game and when striker O'Connor had a chance on the edge of the Hearts penalty box, his effort on goal soared over the bar and in among the goading Hearts fans in the West Stand. Hearts nearly made it game over when Suso Santana's effort on goal was scrambled off the line by McPake. And, typical of Hearts, what should have been 3-0 turned into 2-1 as Hibs grabbed an unexpected lifeline a minute before half time when McPake poked home Soare's cross. At half time, there was slight irritation among the Hearts camp that the game was now on a knife-edge after dominating the game.

The second half had a spectacular start. In the 47th minute, Suso Santana set off on a run down the right wing skipping easily past a couple of Hibs challenges. He had his shirt pulled by the pursuing Kujabi who also clipped the Spaniard's heels as the winger danced into the penalty box. Penalty said referee Craig Thomson who also booked the Hibs player for a second time meaning the Easter Road team were down to ten men. They also went 3-1 down when Danny Grainger stroked home the resultant penalty kick and looked to the skies in tribute to his late grandfather.

Any lingering doubts that the Scottish Cup was heading back to Gorgie disappeared two minutes later when Hibs keeper Brown could only parry Stephen Elliott's header and Ryan McGowan leapt to head the ball home. 4-1 to Hearts — and it was game over, a fact the mass exodus of Hibs fans at this point clearly indicated.

Hearts seemed content to toy with their great rivals and sprayed passes all over the Hampden turf, much to the delight of the baying Jambo Army. With 15 minutes to go, Rudi Skacel collected the ball on the edge of the penalty box and fired in an effort and that trundled past Brown to make it an astonishing 5-1 to Hearts. Ecstatic Hearts supporters taunted those few Hibs fans who were still in the National Stadium with chants of 'ole' and 'we want six' and 'there's only one

Pat Fenlon'. This was too much for the Hibernian manager who made an ill-judged salute with his arm to the Hearts support — and was duly sent to the stand by referee Craig Thomson for his troubles.

The game ended at Heart of Midlothian 5 Hibernian 1. I had waited 30 years to see Hearts win a trophy before they won the Scottish Cup in 1998; this was Hearts third Scottish Cup triumph in 14 years and was the sweetest of them all. Hearts had dominated the Edinburgh derby for nearly 30 years but this magnificent victory over an admittedly poor Hibernian team took derby domination and humiliation of their city rivals to new levels.

#GE2017 Alex Salmond out campaigning with Joanna Cherry in Edinburgh South West



Earlier today in Broomhouse The Rt Hon Alex Salmond had lunch at the Broomhouse Centre with Joanna Cherry QC who is standing for re-election in the Edinburgh South West constituency.

The main reason for having lunch there (other than the fact that they serve delicious food) was to celebrate the fact that the Centre has won backing for its ambitious plans to demolish and rebuild. It has run a fundraising campaign meaning it now has enough funds The Edinburgh Reporter asked Ms Cherry why she chose to bring her fellow Westminster candidate there.

She explained :"Broomhouse Centre is an amazing place which does an incredible amount of fantastic developmental work with people in the community. And that is not just in Broomhouse but in fact across South West Edinburgh and indeed in other parts of Edinburgh. There are many different and diverse projects which are run from here from working with elderly people with dementia in the Beacon Club to working with young carers and young people who are vulnerable.

"The projects which are started here don't just stay here they fan out across the community. There are some really energetic people working here such as in the café with its fantastic home cooking. The kitchen here is used as a place for people to come and learn new skills making it easier for them to make the transition from being at school to being employed."

Some of the groups represented at today's campaign stop included Bridie Ashrowan the CEO of The Broomhouse Centre. The BIG Project which offers young people from 5-15 opportunities for personal growth. EVOC was represented by CEO Ella Simpson. EVOC helps to support develop and promote the interests and work of voluntary organisations in Edinburgh.

A representative from The Broomhouse Food Bank explained to us that demand is increasing all the time. And we also met up with the Rev Michael Mair who is the local minister at Broomhouse Parish Church.

And when asked about her main campaigning points Ms Cherry explained: "The Tories of course have tried to make this election about the independence question in a desperate

attempt to trick people away from looking at their record in government. But what this election is really about is the Tories failed austerity project and their disastrous plans for Brexit. This will have a huge impact on jobs and the economy right across the United Kingdom. The austerity plans have failed despite making people, like the people in this community, suffer. They have failed to reach any of their targets on debt, deficit or borrowing. They are still hammering hardworking people in this community, people on low incomes by taking away their tax credits, forcing them to rely on the food bank just up the road."

As to the need for food banks, Ms Cherry was scathing of the Tory benefit cuts. She said: "The food bank here helps people with all sorts of problems not just about having enough to eat. We should not need to have projects like this in modern Britain. The Tories have tried to balance the books on the backs of the poor and haven't even succeeded in doing that.

"Their manifesto issued today is more of the same. So it is the responsibility of politicians like me to remind voters what this election is really about — and that is whether you want another five years of Tory austerity or a positive vision for Scotland such as the one the Scottish Government has."

Alex Salmond who is standing as SNP candidate in Gordon was there to see first hand the work that the Broomhouse Centre does. He was as expected very critical of the Tory government and warned agains the consequences of an increased Conservative majority at Westminster. He said: "If the Tory government get a big majority the sort of thing that will go through parliament will be things like tax credits.

"These measures would take more money off people who need it, hard-working people who need these tax credits. They would get less. People who are vulnerable like the disabled will continue to get treated shabbily and the bigger the majority the shabbier the treatment will get. The SNP provided the real

opposition and so they must get sent back to Westminster because this Tory government needs real opposition."

He then explained that the SNP leader Nicola Sturgeon has laid out a three point plan for this election. Firstly to provide the real opposition which Labour can't provide just now, and everybody knows they can't. Secondly to strengthen Scotland's hand. Theresa May keeps talking about strengthening her hand. We have to strengthen Scotland's hand to make sure that we don't get the hard Tory Brexit that she is aiming for because that will cost jobs and prosperity in Scotland.

"Thirdly we must have the future of Scotland decided in Scotland by The Scottish Parliament and by the Scottish people. Scotland's future must be in Scotland's hands not in the hands of the government in Westminster.

"So these are the three points that Nicola Sturgeon has outlined and I think they are a powerful platform and a powerful mandate to seek in this campaign."

As to whether he has had any input into the SNP manifesto which will be launched next week, Mr Salmond admitted he had put forward a few ideas, but said it is a personal document for the leader of the party. He concluded: "I am sure you will see a visionary and uplifting manifesto which does not talk about hard choices for other people, but rather talks about how we can work together to provide real hope for Scotland."
