#GE2017 Fireside chat with Tommy Sheppard MP for Edinburgh East

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It was just a short time ago that we interviewed Tommy Sheppard MP about his chances of becoming an MP to represent Edinburgh East. He then went on to make a barnstormer of a maiden speech without notes, and has been active in many Westminster debates since.

Following last week's announcement that there is to be a snap General Election we met up with him to have what turned out to be a long chat about the reasons behind an election called by Theresa May on 8 June 2017.

All SNP MPs have now been selected to stand in the seats they currently hold, so three years ahead of when the next election would have taken place, Mr Sheppard is faced with about seven weeks of campaigning to keep his seat. He won Edinburgh East with a majority of 9,106 votes in 2015.

TER: We probably didn't think we would be back here quite so soon!

TS: Well it's crazy times. I went down to Westminster on the train after the bank holiday weekend. I looked at my diary and thought this looks like quite an uneventful week. It's going to be quite dull.

Then within an hour and a half of getting on the train suddenly we are in general election mode! Never a dull moment!

TER: Why do you think Theresa May has called this election?

TS: Oh I think there are three reasons fly she has called the

election. The first is that she thinks she can crucify the Labour Party in England because of the poll ratings that she has.

The second is that Brexit is going to get pretty messy in the years ahead, and that's going to come back on the government, so she wants to cut and run to the electorate now before that starts.

The third reason is that if she leaves it for another couple of months several dozen of her members of parliament might well be facing legal charges for election fraud from the last election, so she does not want to take that risk either.

So this election is being done entirely for the convenience and benefit of the Conservative party. In that sense I think it is a monstrous abuse of the democratic process, and they're putting party political advantage above the public interest.

But it is what it is. It's on now and we will fight it, and fight it to win."

TER: Here in Edinburgh East do you know yet who your political opponents are going to be?

I don't know. The runner-up last time was the Labour Party candidate and former MP, Sheila Gilmore. I don't know whether Sheila is going to stand again. I don't know if anybody even regards Labour as the challenger to the incumbent this time round.

I suppose the SNP is in the fortunate position of having most of the MPs already there and wanting to stand again. We have all been confirmed as candidates while other parties are, fairly desperately I should imagine, trying to get candidates in place. They've only got two weeks to do it, it's not a long time.

TER: Do you think there is enough time between now and 8 June to have a reasonable campaign?

TS: No I don't. I think this is a cut and run election which is being done by the government with undue haste. I think they are trying to play the advantage they sense they've got in the polls down south.

I worry there is quite an authoritarian streak creeping in to the Conservative party to be honest.

It seems that a majority of 30 is not enough, they have to have 130. They don't want any opposition at all it seems.

Anybody who does oppose anything they say is branded as a

saboteur or disloyal to the country.

These are not good times that we are in to be honest.

Theresa May's refusal to take part in TV debates is all part and parcel of this. I think that is going to come back to haunt her.

Of course it is worth noting that this is the second year in a row where are Westminster ballot has interfered with the timetable of a Scottish election.

Last year they put the Brexit vote in June, despite us trying very hard and voting to have it in September to keep some distance from the main Scottish Parliamentary election.

But they went ahead and had it a month after, and now we've got just five weeks between the council elections which are already underway and this general election. It's not enough time, of course it's not enough time.

This is what the Fixed Term Parliament Act was meant to prevent. People were meant to know that the elections were on a five year schedule, so you didn't get the advantage of being the government and being able to fiddle the dates and the press and policy announcements.

That was supposed to be behind us we were supposed to be cleaning up politics by doing that, and now Theresa May has driven a cart and horses through that for her own advantage.

TER: Has anything changed with regard to what the SNP will be campaigning on this time round?

TS: It's going to be pretty much the same things to be honest. We haven't, sad to say, achieved what was in our 2015 manifesto. In fact we may be facing a government, after this general election, which feels itself stronger and even further to the right in the United Kingdom, and trying to do the things that we are seeking to oppose with even more vigour.

The road ahead is going to be a rocky one, but we remain committed to fighting this government's austerity programme, to making the case for investment in public services. We will be proposing again that we go for steady and sane growth in public spending, in order to be the engine of economic recovery.

The two years in between has not changed that. The whole thing is a lot more murky and uncertain, because no one knows exactly what the Brexit deal is going to be.

I think pretty much 90% of the manifesto we had last time we

can dust down and represent to the electorate.

The other added dimension to this is of course the debate about Scotland's future.

We are adamant that when the Brexit deal is known, probably in a couple of years time, and before it's too late to do something about it, then the people of Scotland ought to be able to choose whether or not that is indeed the type of United Kingdom they want to remain part of, and the one they voted to stay in in 2014.

I think it's reasonable to say that should happen at a time when all 27 other European countries will be deciding if that Brexit deal is satisfactory.

If the unelected House of Lords can have a vote on that agreement, I think the people of Scotland ought to be able to express a view on it as well.

But that is for the future, and we are not seeking a mandate for that at this General Election because we already have a mandate for that in the Scottish election from last year. The Scottish parliament has already decided that that is what it wants to do.

What this will be a judgement on though, is Theresa May's refusal to respond to these requests from the Scottish Government; her refusal first of all to seek any compromise solution, any differentiated solution that would allow us to protect Scottish interests in the Scottish economy and respect Scottish public opinion.

She has refused that.

TER: What do you think the mood is at Westminster? On Tuesday morning there must have been quite a lot of confusion. What's the mood amongst your fellow MPs?

TS: When I got into the Houses of Parliament on Tuesday lunchtime shock and surprise was the first thing.

You sensed the Tories were fairly chipper. They really think they have pulled a fast one here. They think they're holding all the cards. They think they are going to crush in their own words the Labour opposition in England. They're very cock-ahoop about it.

I think they may get their comeuppance to be honest. Seven weeks is a long time in politics. The Labour MPs looked pretty depressed about it. Some of them are sitting on very thin majorities, and are feeling very unnerved and uncertain.

I think generally the biggest feeling was one of annoyance. We are only two years into the parliamentary term, the government has a majority, no one is trying to prevent it implementing its programme. This is an unnecessary election it's not one that many people wanted, and it's being done entirely for the benefit of the Conservative Party."

Get Hooked on Fishing (ghof) is an angling charity which creates opportunities for young people, building a brighter future for them, their families and local community.

Council Elections 2017 - Manifestos for local

government



The main political parties have now published all their manifestos with pledges on a variety of local government issues.

Conservatives

The Conservatives in their local election manifesto and on other local leaflets we have seen are very much using this as an opportunity to resist any second independence referendum, although this is not the remit of local authorities. Otherwise they say that they will put life back into the local economy, with more money staying in everyone's pay packets.

They would like to introduce a more flexible local government structure with better accountability through directly elected provosts. But they also admit that this cannot be a one size fits all approach.

The Conservatives say that economic growth should not however be driven at the expense of the environment, and they would like to establish a 75% recycling rate by 2035.

Green Party

The Greens want to place the power in the hands of the electorate, by having participatory budgeting so that citizens can decide how council money is spent. Pupils parents and teachers will have a real say in how schools are run, and care workers will receive the Living Wage Plus.

Under the Green Manifesto council rents will be cheaper, as will buses, and there will be a broadband action plan for every council within a year of the election.

Community groups will have a say in running parks and energy

schemes, and green spaces will be protected.

Liberal Democrats

The Scottish LibDems claim that they are on the rise again and will play a major part in Scottish councils after the 2017 elections. They aim to raise the quality of local government and fight poverty and oppression.

Their aims at national level are to decentralise power to local authorities, and to get improved resources for councils from The Scottish Government.

With an emphasis on excellence in education and on mental health, they say they have a can do will do attitude to local government and would deliver excellent services.

Scottish Libertarian Party

The party has a number of candidates in some of the wards across the city. They say that they "stand with the people of Scotland in favour of individual liberty, a free and sound economy, foreign neutrality and political independence".

SNP

The SNP want more money for classrooms giving more power direct to schools, more affordable housing promising to build 50,000 new affordable houses across the country and they plan to devolve 1% of council budgets to local projects.

As well as backing local business and boosting jobs, they ask you to vote SNP to protect local services.

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Walking Football sessions in and around the capital



Walking Football has seen a surge in popularity in recent years with teams and projects developing in settings from football clubs, local authorities, community groups, sports clubs and in healthcare settings.

The sport is aimed at keeping people aged over 50 involved with football if, due to a lack of mobility or for other reason, they are not able to play the traditional game.

Though based on association football, the key difference in the rules, from standard football, is that if a player runs then they concede a free kick to the other side. This restriction, together with a ban on slide tackles, is aimed both at avoiding injuries and facilitating the playing of the sport by those who are physically disadvantaged

Walking Football has the potential to improve people's lives. Benefits include increased physical activity, improved mental health and wellbeing, access to additional sources of support

and the opportunity to form new friendships for those living in isolation.

The sport is now so popular that a national tournament is scheduled to take place at Glasgow Green in June and a national league is due to start later this year with games taking place at Ravenscraig.

Regular player and member of the Scottish Walking Football Network Colin Mackay told the Edinburgh Reporter: "I was first introduced to walking football through the Hibs Still Game and Fit Fans in Training programmes almost four years ago. Through these excellent initiatives, I was fortunate to lose almost four stone in weight and improve my fitness levels, encouraging me to eventually go back to playing running

football at both 5/6/7 and even the odd 11 a side game.

"Although I thoroughly enjoyed this, playing against lads up to twenty-five years younger took its toll and injuries began to mount up so walking football seemed the perfect alternative.

"Hearts began walking football sessions in August 2015 and I have been a regular ever since and now play up to four times a week with Edinburgh City, Heriot Watt and Hearts including a trip to the Algarve to play in an international walking football festival in October last year.

"It is absolutely brilliant to be still playing the game as I approach my 66th birthday and, apart from the fitness and wellbeing benefits, I have met dozens of really great lads, many of whom have suffered life threatening illnesses and injuries yet are now enjoying both the physical and social opportunities that walking football provides.

"Everyone can play this variation of the game regardless of ability, fitness or age and at Edinburgh City Walking Football, where I am one of the organisers, we have a few lads who have played at professional level, ex amateurs and players who had previously little football experience. The ages range from 40 to an incredible 87 years young with an average age of around 63.2"

Police operation to highlight the space cyclists need to use roads safely

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Plain clothed police are taking to Edinburgh's streets to highlight the space cyclists need for everyone to use our roads safely.

Operation Close Pass will see drivers who pass an unmarked police cyclist too closely pulled over and given advice using a specially designed mat which shows how much space a person on a bicycle needs when overtaking them.

PC Dominic Doyle from the Divisional Road Policing Unit is leading the initiative locally and said that the close passing of cyclists is a concern, with the sense of close passing vehicles often cited as a significant disincentive to cycle.

"A lot of drivers see a person on a bicycle riding on the road on in a cycle lane and don't consider that passing them closely puts all road users in danger. It could constitute careless or even dangerous driving and you would fail your driving test for that.

"Those drivers that we stop during this operation will be shown how closely they passed the unmarked officer by standing on our specially designed mat. You should allow at least as much room as you would when overtaking a car when passing a person on a bicycle, giving consideration to the maximum speed limit and time and distance available to you."

The initiative is being piloted in Edinburgh, having been originally developed by West Midlands Police, with the intention of rolling it out across Scotland. Three-hundred-

and-ninety-eight cyclists have been injured in collisions in the capital over the past two years, 62 seriously, and one has died.

The operation is running alongside Cycling Scotland's Give Everyone Cycle Space campaign. Keith Irving, Cycling Scotland chief executive, said:

"Operation Close Pass is a welcome new initiative by Police Scotland to improve road safety. Education and enforcement are essential to making safer roads for everyone, whether we are cycling, driving or walking. This initiative is one of the many we need to take to tackle the increase in serious injuries amongst people cycling. We aim to see the scheme rolled out nationwide so everyone will benefit, complementing the Give Everyone Cycle Space road safety awareness campaign which reminds people to drive and overtake safely around people riding bikes."

Chief Superintendent Andy Edmonston, head of road policing for Police Scotland, has welcomed Operation Close Pass.

"We are constantly working to make Scotland's roads safer for everyone, and I am very pleased to see this innovative approach being piloted in Edinburgh where a large number of people cycle to commute and for pleasure.

"I would encourage all road users to take responsibility for their own safety whilst respecting that of others, and any road traffic offences that are seen by officers during the operation will be dealt with appropriately. I would urge cyclists to make themselves as visible as possible to other road users through positioning and clear signals, reflectors and lights after dark and light-coloured clothing, and to ride safely according to the law."

Dylan McGeouch praises character of team mates as Hibs exit Scottish Cup

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Hibs' midfielder Dylan McGeouch praised the character of his team mates for coming back from a two goal deficit to draw level against high-flying Aberdeen at Hampden Park yesterday.

The Dons, who are likely to finish the season in second place behind champions Celtic took the lead in the 12th second after a mix up in the Hibs defence then added a second from a freekick midway through the first half.

Derek McInnes's men looked to be cruising and Hibs' fans feared a hammering but a change of formation paid immediate dividends and substitute Grant Holt pulled one back before half time before McGeouch equalised on the hour mark.

The influential former Celtic player was then forced to leave the field with an injury and was replaced by Andrew Shinnie.

From them Hibs looked the more likely to win the game until a cruel slice of luck gave Aberdeen a late winner when Jonny Hayes' speculative effort struck Darren McGregor which wrong footed Ofir Marciano and rolled into the corner of the net.

After the final whistle, the Hibs players received a standing ovation from the 20,000 supporters.

After the game McGeouch told Hibernian TV: "It was an awful start and we gave them two goals and it could have gone three or four but we showed great character to get back into the game.

"The manager made a few decisions and changed the formation a

bit which worked in our favour then when we got back into the game it looked like we were the team who were going to get the winner but football's like that.

"Holty (Grant Holt) coming on gave us an outlet and we could put it long and pay off him and play in their half and get space. "I thought that Holty was great. He scored his goal and set up the other goal and all afternoon he was a nuisance.

"They got a goal and it's hard to take. The shot was probably going wide and the deflection could have gone anywhere, but overall we did well and we can take a lot from the character we showed to get back into the game.

"Overall it was an entertaining game and the fans appreciated the effort we put in this season, especially the cup run and we have a lot to look forward to. Its a good place to be.

"Promotion was the number one priority and we achieved that last week, now we have to get ourselves ready for next season."

And he said: "We can get better."

Neil Lennon criticises players after semi-final defeat

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Neil Lennon criticised his players after Hibs' narrow defeat to Aberdeen at Hampden this afternoon and although he admitted that some may get accolades from the fans, he said that they would not get any from him and insisted that 'gallant losers were losers.'

Individual errors saw Hibs two goals down after 24 minutes before an inspired substitution helped level the game.

Hibs looked the more likely to score a winner however a speculative strike from Jonny Hayes deflected off Darren McGregor and wrong footed Ofir Marciano with minutes remaining.

After the game Lennon said: "Don't commiserate, it wasn't good enough. It was pathetic. Utterly pathetic. It was a semifinal, the pitch was good. We have been playing on quagmires all season. I wanted the players to go out and express themselves.

"You get set-backs, losing the early goal, but it didn't worry me because I have character in there but they just didn't show it. The first two goals were schoolboy stuff.

"I thought I was getting there but some old, bad habits started creeping back in there, players hiding, miscontrolling the ball and not being physical enough.

"We didn't turn up for 30 minutes then for the next 60 we were the better team by a long way. "We scored two wonderful goals but you can't give any team a two goal start in a semi-final.

"People talk about tactics but it's about decision making. We got it back, the game could have gone either way but to be fair to Aberdeen they got a huge slice of luck for their winning goal, it happens.

"But for the first 30 minutes, I don't know, they need to have a good look at themselves. I don't mind conceding a goal after one minute because you have 89 to get back in, but we didn't show any responsibility. Two players did, Bartley and McGeouch.

"The rest looked like the boy band they've been over the last three or four years. It takes a 36 year-old (Grant Holt) to come on and change the game for us. I thought he was brilliant.

"We get back to 2-2 but it's not our day because we lose Dylan and that's been the story of his career. It was a blow at the time because we were on top and comfortable.

"We had a problem at centre half all day. Efe had an allergic reaction to something before the game. He took some sort of medication at half-time.

"They got a huge slice of luck for the goal but I still think Darren could have done better for the third goal too."

"We make the change and suddenly we come alive. We looked poor at the back at times, too poor for my liking. We didn't look comfortable enough.

"We could have won the game, if we hadn't have gifted two goals we probably would have.

"Okay, it was a massive stroke of luck for Aberdeen's winner, maybe Darren could have adjusted his feet better.

"But for the first two goals Aberdeen didn't have to do anything. We just gave them the goals."

"Coulda, woulda shoulda. Gallant losers are losers. Forget it. You all know me, I am not interested.

"Boyle's in and should go down and it's a penalty but he stays on his feet. Cummings is in and lets the ball run away from him. We have had opportunities to make it 3-3. McGregor kept winning headers in their box and we didn't react to the second balls.

"They are the most important bits that make a difference. You might get a touch or a penalty, we were too static.

"They get no accolades from me, they might do from the punters, but no accolades from me. Not today.

"They should have won, the opportunity was there, and they will have loads of regrets about the game. I'm not here to pamper them or say well done after that it's no good."

Aberdeen end Hibs' hopes of retaining Scottish Cup with 3-2 victory



Hibs' hopes of retaining the William Hill Scottish Cup were dashed following a narrow defeat to high-flying Aberdeen at Hampden Park this afternoon.

After a dreadful start to the game, Hibs fought back from two

goals down to equalise only for a cruel deflection to end their dreams.

Neil Lennon made one change to the starting XI that defeated Queen of the South to clinch the Championship title last weekend with Marvin Bartley replacing Andrew Shinnie.

Hibs took almost 20,000 supporters through to the national stadium and they were in fine voice in the pre-match build up outnumbering the Aberdeen fans by almost two to one.

Hibs kicked off but found themselves a goal down after only 12 seconds. John McGinn was dispossessed in the centre circle then Marvin Bartley won the ball and passed to Darren McGregor who tried to find Efe Ambrose but Adam Rooney intercepted the pass and fired the ball low into the bottom corner of the net.

The Dons then dominated possession and added a second in the 24th minute. Fraser Fyvie was booked for a challenge on Kenny McLean then from the resultant free kick Ryan Christie curled the ball into the net at the near post with everyone anticipating a cross ball.

Neil Lennon then made a tactical switch with a visibly disappointed Fraser Fyvie replaced 36-year-old Grant Holt.

The substitution paid immediate dividends when Martin Boyle beat three defenders and sent a cross to the back post which Holt nodded past Joseph Lewis with his first touch of the game.

Hibs then dominated the remainder of the first half but were unable to grab an equaliser.

Hibs deservedly drew level on the hour mark when Bartley won the ball in midfield and passed to Dylan McGeouch on the half way line. The midfielder surged forward and at the edge of the box played a One-two with Holt, who flicked the ball back into his path and he kept his composure to fire the ball into the net, sparking wild scenes from the large Hibs support.

Both teams had chances but the game was decided by a stroke of luck with four minutes remaining.

Jonny Hayes tried a speculative long range shot which appeared to pose no real threat to Ofir Marciano's goal until it took a deflection off the unfortunate McGregor and rolled into the corner of the net.

Boyle had a great chance but was denied by some excellent defending then in time added on Marciano came up for a corner which he headed towards goal, but Lewis produced an acrobatic save to ensure Aberdeen progressed to the final.

After the game Lennon told BBC Scotland: "We needed a 36-year-old (Grant Holt) to come on and get us playing.

"He was brilliant, Holt. We scored two fabulous goals and then we're in the ascendancy. They got a huge slice of luck with the third goal.

"The first 30 minutes was pathetic and totally unacceptable. It's nothing to do with tactics or formations, it's to do with decision making and individual errors.

"We didn't deserve to lose the game but you can't give a team like Aberdeen a two-goal head-start.

"Anything can happen once it gets back to 2-2. It just wasn't our day, but I'm not happy with the way we approached the game.

"All the old habits coming back in, people hiding, not taking responsibility. Gallant losers are losers."

"Darren (McGregor) has a lapse in concentration. You can't concede a goal [Christie's free-kick] from that angle. Aberdeen haven't worked to score three goals. The first two

goals are unforgiveable.

"They've got loads of character but they shouldn't have to fight back in the first place.

"They'll go away with loads of regret. They were as good as Aberdeen if not better.

"I felt we were good enough and had the players to go to the final and beat Aberdeen and it was certainly in evidence today for long parts of the game."

SNP confirm all MPs to stand at #GE2017

The party's NEC confirmed this morning that the SNP's 54 MPs — who they say are the hardest working politicians at Westminster — will be reselected as candidates for the upcoming General Election.

The party will select candidates in five further constituencies currently not represented by SNP MPs by the end of the week following consultation with local members.

At the same meeting the fate of Edinburgh West MP Michelle Thomson was made clear. She will not be reselected and will stand down in June.

Ms Thomson issued the following statement: "'At 1026 thIs mornIng (Saturday 22nd April) I was called from the ongoIng SNP NEC meetIng to be told a selection process for Edinburgh West would happen and that I would not be eligible to stand for selection.

I am very disappointed with the decisions of the SNP. I am grateful to both elected officials and local branch members who contacted me In recent days to say they had lobbied the NEC on my behalf.

'Since I was elected 2 years ago I have been subjected to sustained personal attacks, starting with the malicious addition of an old email address to the dating website 'Ashley Madison'. At the time I escalated it to Police Scotland and I thank them for their investigation. It's a pity that those in the press who knew this failed to report it nor note any of the (male) public figures who were genuine additions to the database.

'Since September 2015 there have been reports concerning a solicitor I used some 7 years ago. I have always made it clear that I have done nothing wrong and it is a matter of public record that it was the solicitor who was under investigation and not myself, that no charges have ever been brought and that I assisted PS on a purely voluntary basis.

No criticism of the time taken by my fellow public servants within Police Scotland and the Procurator Fiscal can be made and I anticipate they are subject to similar restraints as other public services.

I have been impressed by their professional and courteous manner and I have taken the view that the matter must be allowed to run its course. As such I shall not comment further at this time.

'I must note that, even in political parties the concept of natural justice must apply, as must the need for defined processes that are applied fairly, rigorously and transparently. I would advise the SNP to employ the services of an external body to help them develop a process as soon as possible.

'I have been proud of what I have achieved in the past 2 years despite the above events. Highlights from my work on the Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy Select Committee include a key role in encouraging Sir Philip Green to do the right thing for BHS pensioners, the continued focus on Sports Direct working practices and the recommendation for women to be represented equally in all FTSE 350 companies by 2020.

The work to make banking fairer for SME's will continue and I summoned the courage to speak out about being raped at the age of 14. Most importantly my office has supported many, many constituents and I thank my team for their efforts.

'I have been privileged to be the MP for Edinburgh West. After careful consideration I have decided not to stand again at this time and I would encourage all the political parties to avoid personal smears and instead focus on what people really want to hear about.

'I thank all those who have supported me, those who elected me, my family and my colleagues in Westminster who so vociferously and consistently spoke out on my behalf but to no avail."

Meanwhile, the Elite League enjoyed a 12 per cent growth in fans last season.
