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Community council election will take place in the new year

A new community council in the Drylaw/Telford area was not set up after the recent community council elections, but since then twenty people raised a petition to establish a community council in the area.

The matter was discussed and the procedure approved at the Neighbourhood and Communities Meeting yesterday. Convener, Councillor Maureen Child mentioned the fact that if nominees have to publish their home address some of them are put off, and wondered if that could be changed. The council officer confirmed that it would be a matter for the whole council to decide, and a report would be required.

The election will be delayed until the new year. This will allow time for the nomination process to name new community councillors, and for any polling should too many nominations

be received.

Online and polling place voting will be used in this process as it was in Leith Links in the autumn.

The nomination period will run between 9-30 January 2017. The poll will be notified on 6 February and then any subsequent voting if needed will take place on 23 February 2017.

The community council gets an annual grant of £620.16 to cover administrative costs, This is already budgeted for.

If a poll is required that may cost around £7,500 and again is budgeted for.

Councillor Hinds will act as returning officer.

Paul Young chats to the Edinburgh Reporter about 80s Invasion Tour



Due to overwhelming public demand after this year's hugely successful run, the '80's Invasion' tour is back in 2017 with four iconic artists from the decade performing on the same bill.

The new line-up features Paul Young — one of the most popular solo artists from the era, legendary pop punk princess Toyah, Liverpool's finest guitar duo China Crisis and for the first

time performing in the UK in over 25 years, flying in especially from the USA the gorgeous Martika!

The tour takes in 15 dates and starts on 2nd March at Leicester's De Montfort Hall, culminating on 19th March at Liverpool's Philharmonic, with a performance at the Edinburgh Playhouse on 5th March.

With his stylish charm and unique vocal talent Paul Young quickly cemented a place in the nations hearts. Coming into his own with his first solo album 'No Parlez' in 1983, the release went triple platinum in the UK alone, and spawned the No 1 single 'Wherever I Lay My Hat (That's My Home)', which maintained the top spot for most of that summer. The album also included the top 10 hit 'Love Of The Common People' and the No. 4 hit 'Come Back And Stay'. With the release of his second album 'The Secret Of Association', which also reached No. 1, his status as a world star was confirmed with singles that included the No. 2 hit 'Every Time You Go Away', 'I Wanna Tear Your Playhouse Down' (No 9) and 'Everything Must Change' (No 9). One of the highlights of the 1989 'Nelson Mandela Tribute Concert" was Paul's performance of the Crowded House song 'Don't Dream It's All Over'. In 1991 Paul recorded a duet with his friend Zuchero 'Sensa Una Donna' which reached No. 4 and which along with the afore mentioned 'Don't Dream It's All Over' featured on his best of album 'From Time To Time'. Paul also featured on the massive No 1 original Band Aid record 'Do They Know Its Christmas'.

Earlier today, Paul took time out of his busy schedule to chat to the Edinburgh Reporter about his love of Scotland, 80s music and culture and his plans for the future.

He said: "I'm really looking forward to coming to Scotland. I was actually in Edinburgh a couple of weeks ago receiving the Forth Icon award which was a very nice surprise.

"I have performed in Scotland so many times with the Q Tips, Streetband and solo and I often think that I don't get up there often enough.

"The 80s Invasion tour will mainly include my hits from that decade although I may include at least one new song.

"I enjoy the fact that the audiences for these shows are diverse and there is a fair mix of adults who were around at the time and younger fans who have easy access to the internet these days and can get very inquisitive.

"Also appearing on stage will be Toyah whom I know well and have performed with many times, China Crisis and Markita.

"80s music has remained popular over the years. Love her or loathe her, the Thatcher era saw a positivity about the future and for some it was an affluent time that people like to look back on. There were significant developments in music such as CDs and drum machines and there was a real diversity. Duran Duran were nothing like Culture Club who were nothing like Simply Red and of course the fashion was wild as well.

"Growing up, I lived on a pure diet of soul as well as African music and my R&B vocal style went with that.My favourite used to be "Everytime you go away" but now it changes all the time. "Senza una donna" is probably my favourite at the moment.

"Earlier this year I released by first album in almost 20 years, 'Good Things' which has been critically well received and after the tour I have a number of projects on the go.

"One in particular involves me as an interviewer rather than an interviewee and is called 'Rock Tales.' It's great fun and involves guests mixing a cocktail and talking about life on the road. I want to put a little bit of the dirt back. So far we have had a mixture of rich and varied people such as the Charlitans, Sean Ryder and Bez, The Sex Pistols and Andy Bell.

"It's all very light hearted. I'm not sure where it will be broadcast yet but be sure to look out for it."

Appearing with Paul will be Toyah who has had a highly successful and incredibly diverse career with major hit records and many prestigious stage and screen roles to her credit that have made her one of Britain's biggest household names. She has had 15 top 40 singles, 4 gold and platinum albums, made over 10 feature films and appeared in over 30 stage plays. Her hits include 'It's A Mystery' (No. 4), 'I Want To Be Free' (No. 8) and 'Thunder In The Mountains' (No. 4). In 1982 she won the Best Female Singer in the then Rock & Pop Awards (now the Brits). She also appeared in the cult classic 'Quadrophenia' alongside Phil Daniels and Ray Winstone, based loosely on the life of The Who. In 2003 she survived 12 long days and nights in the Australian jungle for "I'm A Celebrity ... Get Me Out Of Here" and is still a prolific performer.

Liverpool based new wave synth pop duo China Crisis features Gary Daly and Eddie Lundon who started to work together at the age of 18. The release of "African and White" became China Crisis' first hit in the UK, reaching No. 45, The follow-up single, "Christian", made No.12 in early 1983 and brought them to national prominence. Their debut album peaked at No.21 in the Album Charts. During this period the band toured supporting Simple Minds. The second album, "Working With Fire and Steel" — Possible Pop Songs Volume Two, was released in November 1983. The album was a Top 20 success in the UK and China Crisis spent 1984 and 1985 marking their biggest chart run, The album included the single, "Wishful Thinking", which peaked at No.9. Their third album, Flaunt The Imperfection, reached No.9 in the Album Charts in May 1985. The album included the hits "Black Man Ray" and "King in a Catholic Style (Wake Up)". All three of these albums went gold in The UK

Finally Martika, the US pop singer-songwriter and actress who

made an immediate impact on our shores with the No 5 hit 'Toy Soldiers' released in 1989 will also be appearing. Other hits followed that included 'I Feel The Earth Move', 'More Than You Know', Love Thy Will Be Done' (written by Prince) and 'Martika's Kitchen'. She had two internationally successful albums in the late 1980s/early 1990's the first, 'Martika' went platinum in the UK and the latter 'Martika's Kitchen' was co-produced by Prince. She has sold a total of four million albums worldwide. She began her career as a child actress, appearing in the hit movie 'Annie'. She went on to be cast as 'Gloria' on the Disney children series 'Kids Incorporated' alongside Stacy Ferguson (Fergie, The Black Eyed Peas) and Mario Lopez.

Edinburgh craft brewers Innis & Gunn have raised over double the amount they set out to in their crowdfunding which closed last night. The campaign was run with the assistance of AdventureCapital™and aimed to raise £1million in equity.

The company was set to sell 2% of its shares.

Following the first day which was exclusively open to its BeerBond® holders, strong demand led to the company raising £500,000 in just 48 hours and reaching its stated

target in just three days.

The additional funds will allow the company to extend to England a year ahead of schedule with the opening of another bar and restaurant The Beer Kitchen there. There are already three Beer Kitchens in Edinburgh, Dundee and St Andrews.

The company hopes to double its turnover to £25 million in the next three years, with expanding beer productions at Inveralment Brewery in Perth.

Police Scotland receive

reports on non-recent child sexual abuse within football

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Following ongoing, widespread publicity surrounding reports of non-recent child sexual abuse within football, Police Scotland along with many police forces across the UK has received a number of calls, both reporting further allegations and offering information. This is in addition to the calls being received by the dedicated NSPCC helpline.

Detective Chief Superintendent Lesley Boal, Police Scotland Public Protection, said: "We will continue to work with partners, including the National Police Chief's Council through Operation Hydrant, the Scottish Football Association and the NSPCC to ensure a co-ordinated police response is in place and that we maintain an accurate picture of child abuse investigations.

"Speaking out about any form of child abuse is incredibly difficult, and disclosures are often made many years after an incident took place. Police Scotland will listen to any such disclosure, regardless of the passage of time, and will investigate as well as work with partner organisations who have access to advocacy and support during the process of disclosure and investigation.

"We appreciate that sometimes finding a safe place to first talk about experiences helps eventual disclosure and would encourage anybody who feels this would assist to contact a support organisation. Details of such organisations can be accessed via Survivor Scotland http://www.survivorscotland.org.uk/

"Keeping children and young people safe is a top priority for Police Scotland and everyone has a role to play in protecting the country's children. Where reports are made, we will assess any current risks and ensure appropriate action is taken.

"If you suspect someone is being abused, please contact Police Scotland on 101."

Foreign Office may have the wrong bridge

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office may have got it wrong when they tweeted about the new Queensferry Crossing — and used a photo of the Forth Bridge which is over 150 years old. This of course led to some ribbing from the Twitterati....but not least as the bridge is being paid for by the Scottish Government and the FCO appear to be trying to 'own' it for themselves.

The Queensferry Crossing is due to open in May 2017. The stunning, globally unique bridge forms the centerpiece of a major upgrade to the important cross-Forth transport corridor in the east of Scotland, representing a total Scottish

Government investment of £1.325 to £1.35bn (at 2016 prices). The 1.7 miles (2.7km) structure will be the longest three-tower, cable-stayed bridge in the world and also by far the largest to feature cables which cross mid-span. This innovative design provides extra strength and stiffness, allowing the towers and the deck to be more slender and elegant.

She said that the shared history between Scotland and Ireland had created inextricable links and a bond of mutual cooperation that a consequence of Brexit in Scotland was an even sharper focus on social justice.

Ms Sturgeon said: "Although we share more than a thousand

years of history, I hope and believe that relations between Scotland and Ireland are now stronger, warmer and more harmonious than they have ever been."

Ten new galleries open on 8 July 2016 at a cost of £14.1 million

A programme tonight at 21:00 on BBC Two includes discussions among writers Muriel Gray and Alexander McCall Smith, and model Funice Olumide.

They investigate some of the most outstanding treasures from one of the finest and most diverse collections in the world at the National Museum of Scotland.

Now 150 years old the museum has had a makeover in recent years and ten new galleries opened this year.



Record breaking year for the Saltire Society



The Saltire Society awarded over £75,000 of funding in its Inspiring Scotland programme this year to support Scottish talent and culture. The funds have been used for a packed year of lectures and events to celebrate the charity's 80th anniversary.

Some young people travelled to New York with the Steven Campbell New York Scholarship, and Berlin with the Saltire Society International Travel Bursary. This is supported by British Council Scotland.

Other events have included talks by former First MinisterAlex Salmond, Scottish video game entrepreneur Chris van der Kuyl and composer and conductor Sir James MacMillan. There was also

a series of debates featuring lawyer Amal Azzudin, Pat Kane of Hue and Cry and Scottish journalist Ruth Wishart.

There was lively discussion at their Housing Design Awards between architects Malcolm Fraser and Toby Paterson about Scottish housing design. Other awards have recognised artist John Byrne and writer Graeme Macrae Burnet, the 2015 repairs to the Forth Road Bridge and new public artworks in the Hebrides, Helensburgh and John O'Groats.

Jim Tough, Executive Director of the Saltire Society said:

"Central to the philosophy of the Saltire Society is to invest in ideas, innovation and risk. We were determined to honour that philosophy on this, our 80^{th} anniversary year, by pulling together a bumper programme of support to help nurture and develop the next generation of Scottish creative talent."

Saltire Celebrates takes place tonight (30th November) at Oran Mor, Glasgow with music from Karine Polwart, Blue Rose Code, Cherry Grove and poetry from Christine De Luca. Tickets via <u>Saltire's website</u>.

Greens to lead two Holyrood debates today

Two Green MSPs are leading debates at Holyrood later today first about cuts to additional support needs and secondly on the need to strengthen local democracy.

Next year Scotland will vote for new councillors across the country and the Green Party see these issues as key campaigning points in those elections.

Ross Greer MSP said: "The First Minister has said education is her number one priority, so today's debate on Additional Support Needs is a real test for her Government. Funding cuts to this area are harming the opportunities for children and young people who need support, such as those with autism, hearing or visual impairment, or dyslexia. It's simply shocking that the number of ASN teachers has fallen 13 per cent in five years.

"Councils, who are responsible for school budgets, have been unfairly squeezed by the Scottish Government, and ASN has taken the hit. As we approach local government elections in five months' time we need a clear sign from the Scottish Government that it will improve funding for local authorities to enable them to repair the damage that has been done. We cannot have, as experts warned this week, a lost generation of children who didn't get the support they need."

The motion reads:

That the Parliament believes that professionals who provide additional support for learning play a vital role in Scotland's classrooms; welcomes international comparisons that demonstrate that Scottish schools are inclusive, but is concerned that public sector cuts threaten the opportunities that are available to children with additional support needs; notes that real terms revenue cuts to the Scottish budget have been disproportionately focused on local authorities, where education is the biggest spend, and that the number of additional support for learning teachers and support staff has fallen by 13% and 8% between 2010 and 2015, and calls on the Scottish Government to bring forward a budget that raises more revenue to support local educational priorities.

Andy Wightman Lothians MSP who will lead a later debate seeking endorsement of the final report of the Commission on Strengthening Local Democracy.

He said: "Creeping centralisation by successive governments has impoverished and weakened local democracy and left local authorities with little flexibility and choice in responding to local needs. The Scottish Parliament needs to properly debate the future of local democracy and agree that the situation as it stands is unacceptable.

"There is broad consensus across the parties that local democracy needs revived in Scotland. Today's debate is an opportunity for government and opposition parties to prove that they are serious about devolving real power from Holyrood to local level.

"All parties took part in the Commission on Strengthening Local Democracy, which found that fifty years of centralisation has not tackled the inequality in our society. By endorsing the Commission's findings, Parliament can send a signal that it intends to give power to the people and strengthen and deepen local democracy."

Police advice ahead of Hearts

v Rangers game

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Police in Edinburgh are requesting fans attending this week's Hearts FC Vs Rangers FC match do so in a responsible manner.

The teams kick off their Premiership tie at 7:45pm on Wednesday, November 30th, with the match at Tynecastle expected to be a sell-out.

To ensure the safety of all those in attendance, police will have a high visibility presence in and around the ground and will assist stewarding staff to conduct searches of those entering the stadium.

Fans travelling from outside Edinburgh are reminded that officers will be enforcing the city's drinking by-laws and so antisocial street drinking or consumption of alcohol in the street will not be permitted.

Chief Inspector Mark Rennie, Local Area Commander for Edinburgh City Centre, said: "This will be the first time that Rangers have visited Tynecastle since their promotion to the Scottish Premiership last season and we anticipate a significant support for both teams.

"Those travelling from outside Edinburgh are advised to leave in plenty of time to avoid traffic congestion in the west of the city.

"Ensuring the safety of all those who will attend the match is our priority and it's essential that supporters act in a responsible manner that does not put themselves or others at risk.

"As such flares, alcohol and items which could cause harm if thrown are strictly forbidden from being brought inside the ground and if you are found in possession of any of these items you will not get to see the match and are likely to face arrest and prosecution.

"This is one of the most exciting fixtures of the Scottish football calander and we want both sets of fans to enjoy the game in the proper spirit."

Overall crime down but incidents reported to police up



Management information relating to policing activity, including recorded crime, the number of incidents reported to the police and user satisfaction, between April and September 2016 has been published today.

The provisional management data gives an indicative picture of crimes and incidents across the country at a point in time over a six month period. The information helps to inform operational decision making on a daily basis throughout the organisation. It helps maintain our focus on keeping people safe by managing resources in the most effective way to police communities.

Management information is also published at a divisional level and for each local authority area across Scotland.

Deputy Chief Constable Iain Livingstone said: "This latest snapshot indicates that compared to the previous six month period, overall crime between Groups 1 and 5 reduced and the number of incidents reported to the police increased.

"Recorded crime tells an important part of the story about policing; however, the significant level of calls for service for non-crime related incidents creates a more complete picture about the demand on the organisation.

"We continue to see significant rises in incidents which relates to missing people, domestic abuse, traffic and motoring issues and anti-social behaviour.

"It is of course welcome that overall crime has fallen during the six months between April and September. The information also shows that crimes of violence and sexual crime have increased, with crimes of dishonesty reducing.

"We maintain a rigorous approach to preventing and detecting all crime. Crimes of violence and sexual crime, including rape, a priority for policing. Detection rates are constantly monitored and reviewed to ensure we take every appropriate and proportionate step to ensure offenders are traced and put before the courts.

The information published today is classified as Management Information. Official statistics are published by the Scottish

Government
