Hibs made it 3-0 in the 52nd minute when skipper David Gray flicked McGinn's low corner kick into the net then Graham then almost added his second of the day but his powerful strike rebounded off Robinson's ankle and was cleared.

Moments later Boyle managed to get his name on the score sheet with a spectacular strike after beating three defenders.

From then Hibs continued to dominate and created several other chances but Queen's held on to keep the score at 4-0.

Spain take 5 point lead to Madrid

Scotland and Spain lined up at a chilly Scotstoun in Glasgow on Friday evening to play the first leg of a twoparter to decide which would go to Ireland for the 2017 Women's Rugby World Cup.

With the pitch-side track beginning to freeze, and with several Edinburgh based players in the starting line-up, Scotland kicked off to get proceedings underway and then spent most of the first 10 minutes inside the Spanish 22. Good attacking play through both running and rucking had the defence scrambling at times, but both sides were guilty of giving away too many penalties.

Just before the 10 minutes, Spain made ground into the Scots' 22 and dragged the game from one side of the pitch to the other, eventually winning a penalty in front of the posts which No. 10, Patricia Garcia, knocked over for a 3-0 lead.

After that, it was back to the opposition half for the home side. A penalty awarded just inside the 10 metre line gave the home fans a bit of hope, but Helen Nelson's kick just slid past.

Still, things were on the up and, as the half hour mark approached, Scotland scored the first try of the match.

Again, play was concentrated deep inside the visitors' 22 and a scrum on the five metre line set up the platform required. On the subject of the scrums, Spain were on top almost the whole time, pushing the Scottish pack all over the place. They didn't win any balls against the head, but it did look ominous for the future. Anyway, with the ball won, the play first went right, then came back to the left where lock, Debra McCormack took full advantage of space on the wing to crash over in the corner for the five points. Hooker, Lana Skeldon, stepped up for the kick, but she couldn't quite make the distance so 5-3 it remained.

It was now Spain's turn to get into the attacking mode and they progressed upfield through a succession of penalties and fine passing moves. Playing under advantage, the ball came back to the back line near the 22, and was quickly moved through the hands to the left side of the posts, ending up with centre, Vanesa Rial. She still had a player on her outside, but she stepped right and barrelled over for the try. Garcia scored the conversion and the score was 10-5 to Spain as the sides went into the break.

Spain, more or less, started the second half where they had left off, with pressure on the Scots' line. A well organised defence, kept them out but many saw the writing on the wall.

Within this time, Spain managed to get the ball across the line twice, but on both occasions the ball was deemed to have been 'held up'.

Scotland did manage a couple of forays, and got close to scoring through full back, Chloe Rollie, but as the clock neared the 70 minutes, Spain were once more stretching the home defence.

A well worked move across the front of the defence eventually drew in two defenders to the second last player in the line, leaving the winger free. However, the lobbed pass over was well forward and it was widely recognised that Scotland's Getout-of-Jail card had now been played!

As the match entered the final stretch, Scotland were beginning to get back into things and came close to scoring in

the left corner, but Lisa Thomson was bundled into touch with a suspiciously high tackle.

The final couple of minutes of the match were all in the Spanish 22, but as full time ticked over, Spain won the ball and cleared over the stand to take the match 10-5.

Speculation about his future has been ongoing since Scotland's defeat to England at Wembley eight days ago.

After this defeat, the Board of the Scottish FA considered the performance of the Scotland Men's A squad so far in the FIFA World Cup Russia 2018 qualifying campaign and as part of this review, Strachan, provided his feedback on the campaign and his views on the team's prospects in 2017.

Following the review, the decision was taken to continue to support Strachan and his staff.

Stewart Regan, Scottish FA Chief Executive: "The Board have considered the team's performance since the start of the campaign and subsequently discussed the disappointing points total after four matches.

"Gordon shared the disappointment of the Board and, of course, the fans. He is adamant, however, that we can recover the position and believes a play-off place still to be attainable.

"The Board are convinced that he still has the hunger for this challenge and we have four home qualifiers in 2017 to rejuvenate our campaign.

"We support Gordon unanimously in improving our qualification prospects."

Gordon Strachan said: "We were all extremely disappointed with the result on Friday night but having reflected on our performance, I still believe we can get ourselves back into contention in the group.

"There are still 18 points to play for and the players, the staff and I, as in previous games, will give everything we have to turn things around.

"I have said consistently that our fans deserve success and a return to a major tournament finals.

"Although we have had a difficult start to the campaign, I firmly believe that this group of players, together with our supporters, can maximise our chances of a play-off place, starting with the home match against Slovenia in March."

#### Hearts Announce Profit as Main Stand Redevelopment Work Begins

×

Hearts have announced they are now debt-free, having cleared their debt of £1.6m — and have posted a profit of more than £600,000 for the year ending in June 2016.

The reclassification of £4m of loans as reserves rather than liabilities from the fans group the Foundation of Hearts has helped transform the financial outlook of a club who plunged into administration three years ago. Although operating costs have increased, turnover has increased threefold following the club's promotion back to the Ladbrokes Premiership. The sale of Osman Sow in January – just months before the end of his contract – has ensured Hearts are able to record a profit.

This surplus of cash will be reinvested in the redevelopment of the main stand at Tynecastle. Work has already begun on demolishing some of the old administrative buildings in the shadow of the old stand ahead of construction of a new stand which will seat 7,300 fans.

Hearts will travel to Hamilton Academical on Monday evening for their Ladbrokes Premiership clash.

Sir John Leighton, NGS Director-General, said: "This offers a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for this major work to be acquired for the nation.

"The Monarch of the Glen is an iconic image which is famous across the world.

"The ideal home for such an important and resonant picture is the Scottish National Gallery where it can be enjoyed and admired by millions of visitors."

Fiona Hyslop, Cabinet Secretary for Culture, Tourism and External Affairs, said: "Recent reaction to news of the auction underlined the importance of this painting."

#### Pianist who got Dylan in the groove returns to the Jazz Bar

Louis Durra had a ready-made response when Bob Dylan was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature last month.

×

The Berlin-based Californian pianist, whose trio plays the Jazz Bar in Chambers Street on Wednesday, November 23, has a cool, groovy take on Tangled Up in Blue, one of the stand-out songs from Dylan's Blood on the Tracks album. So he was able to slot it into his live set instantly as a dedication to the new Nobel laureate.

The opening track on Durra's 2012 release, The Best of All Possible Worlds, Tangled Up in Blue contributed to the pianist's unlikely elevation to American college radio sensation. In a way reminiscent of Ramsey Lewis in the 1960s, Durra's jazz piano trio versions of Dylan, Bob Marley, Alanis Morisette and Radiohead songs took a trick with deejays and became part of the soundtrack to student life across the U.S

A follow-up, Rocket Science, released later the same year, made similar waves with its explorations of the Beatles, White Stripes, KT Tunstall and traditional Mexican and French Canadian material.

Durra is by no means the first jazz musician to explore Radiohead's repertoire, for example, or the first to cover pop hits of the day. That's an idea as old as jazz itself. Durra, however, takes it further than most, even finding jazz piano trio repertoire and inspiration in Scottish electronica band Boards of Canada.

"I'm not on a 'say no to the mainstream jazz repertoire' soapbox," says Durra. "I'm just as likely to play music by Cedar Walton, Hank Jones, Joe Henderson, Annie Ross or Brad Mehldau as, say, Snoop Dog. Jazz was once described as the sound of surprise and it's my aim to make each piece have something unexpected about it, in the nicest possible way." Durra's investigation of the wider popular music canon – his most recent album, Chromakey, has a typically understated exploration of country-noir singer Gillian Welch's Orphan Girl — stemmed from his accepting a three-nights-a-week residency in a Los Angeles restaurant.

After years of playing an accompanying role, mostly in theatre, and having made a couple of jazz albums that sold disappointingly, Durra was in danger of losing interest. His residency, which presently expanded to four nights a week, allowed him to rediscover the hunger that had led to him turning onto jazz in his teens.

With four to five hours a night to fill he determined that he, his rhythm section and the bar staff and clientele alike wouldn't get bored with the same tunes being played on rotation. So he worked up a repertoire of some two hundred items, ranging from jazz standards to songs by the Ting Tings, Radiohead and songwriter-rapper Ke\$ha.

The restaurant's customers liked what Durra calls his oddball pop covers. So he recorded a selection of them, gave the album to a publicist and found himself with a hit on his hands. When he then decided to investigate another market, he booked himself onto the Edinburgh Fringe and promptly won an award, a Herald Angel, one of the much coveted statuettes that Glasgowbased newspaper The Herald awards for performing excellence during Edinburgh's festival season.

On his way back to California after his second Edinburgh Fringe run Durra stopped off in Berlin, loved the feel of the city and decided to move there. Wanderlust and the lure of the Parisian jazz scene will see him relocate to the French capital in the not too distant future but his raison d'etre as a musician remains as it was during his restaurant residency.

"I want to connect with the public," he says. "And the best way to do that, the best way to draw them into my way of playing is to give them something they recognise every now and then. Just because you're playing pop tunes doesn't mean that you can't make them artistic and expressive. Besides, there's poetry in Bob Dylan's music – it's official."

### Eyeball Brewing — lagers but not like the others!

EDINBURGH-based brewer James Dempsey believes it is great to be a beer drinker in Britain just now but argues that lager continues to look like a poor relation.

That is why he has set up Eyeball Brewing near Edinburgh with the aim of redressing the balance.

Currently, he has two brands, Yellowball, a pale, intensely malty lager, and Blackball which is smooth and complex and inspired by the Munich Dunkel style.

He said: "They are lagers, but not as you know it."

The duo — which are suitable for vegans — are on sale at selected outlets in Bridge of Allan, Kelso, Haddington, Musselburgh (The Brunton) and in outlets in Edinburgh.

The former Stirling and St Andrews University PhD student aims to extend his outlets in the next few months.

And he is using his expertise as a former business and management consultant to progress the business which is housed in a former school in Cockenzie, East Lothian.

James has defined his target market and said: "Yellowball is an easy drinking, crisp beer whereas Blackball showcases the flavours of coffee, chocolate and dark roast from the dark malts from which it is made.

"Blackball goes with food, particularly spicy food, and I am trying to appeal to the craft beer market.

"By that I mean the type of people who might be into their IPA, who may be tempted to try something different and who may not normally pick up a lager.

"Hopefully people will drink the products in bars and pubs but I'm trying to make the products taste well with different types of food.

"It's going well so far. I'm into a mixture of bottle shops and pubs but a lot of cafes, bars and restaurants and I'm hoping to tap into the recent trends in the market of people having a beer with a meal or with something in a coffee shop.

"I'm really aiming to get out there in the next six months, talking to people and letting them taste the product."

#### Lord Advocate to have his say in the Supreme Court on Section 50



The Supreme Court has today confirmed that applications to intervene in the above case have been granted to The Lord Advocate in Scotland as well as The Counsel General for Wales and two other bodies, The 'Expat Interveners', George Birnie and Others and The Independent Workers Union of Great Britain.

Additionally, the Attorney General for Northern Ireland has made a reference to the Court regarding devolution issues relating to that jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has decided that permission to intervene is therefore not necessary.

Counsel for the Scottish Government and for the Independent Workers Union of Great Britain have been invited to address in their skeleton arguments the relevance of points of Scots Law, so far as they do not also form part of the law of England and Wales, to the determination of the present proceedings. A further update on other applications to intervene, and a timetable for oral submissions during the hearing, will be issued by the court in due course.

Minister for UK Negotiations on Scotland's Place in Europe Michael Russell said: "We welcome the decision of the Supreme Court to allow the Scottish Government to intervene in the case, however we continue to call on the UK Government to drop the appeal and to accept that Parliament has the right to determine the triggering of article 50.

"We recognise the decision of people in England and Wales to support Brexit, but the views of people in Scotland cannot simply be brushed aside. The Lord Advocate will be making the case on behalf of the Scottish Government and he will set out his arguments to the court."

#### Hibs Community Foundation helps fight alcohol misuse

×

Seven local initiatives fighting alcohol misuse in Scotland have been awarded support from the Scotch Whisky Action Fund. This is the third round of awards from the £500,000 fund set up in December 2013 by the Scotch Whisky Association (SWA).

The Scotch Whisky Action Fund, which extends the SWA's commitment to addressing alcohol misuse and promoting responsible drinking, gives a total of up to £100,000 each year to 2018 to projects working to reduce harm in Scotland. It is managed by Foundation Scotland, an independent charity.

The fund supports and develops a range of initiatives that deliver targeted interventions to tackle alcohol-related harms across three areas: young people (aged under 18); families and communities.

Hibernian Community Foundation is among the initiatives to receive funding this year. It has been awarded £9,500 towards the delivery of a preventative alcohol education project to P5, P6 and P7 pupils across 20 schools in Leith and the north of Edinburgh. The project will educate children on the effects of alcohol and promote positive lifestyle messages around physical activity and healthy eating.

All the initiatives to receive backing in this year's round of funding are selected by an independent awards panel, chaired by Dame Joan Stringer. They are spread across Scotland from Moray in the north east to Lanarkshire and Orkney.

The other initiatives receiving awards this year to help their work with young people are: Liber 8 Lanarkshire; CrossReach (Edinburgh); Reeltime Music (North Lanarkshire); Outfit Moray and Mentor Foundation UK (Edinburgh).

Orkney Alcohol Counselling and Advisory Service (OACAS) has been awarded funding to assist its work in communities.

Dame Joan Stringer said: "I was extremely impressed with the range and quality of projects applying for awards from the Scotch Whisky Action Fund. It was a very tough decision to choose seven projects to receive funding. All the projects being awarded have a great deal to contribute to tackling alcohol misuse across Scotland."

Douglas Meikle, Scotch Whisky Association head of alcohol policy, said: "We're delighted to support these initiatives delivering in their communities to prevent and reduce misuse." Giles Ruck, Foundation Scotland chief executive, said: "It is great to see so many innovative projects receiving funding from the Scotch Whisky Action Fund. This is a significant step to help individuals and communities tackle misuse across Scotland."

Charlie Bennett, Hibernian Community Foundation chief executive, said: "Hibernian Community Foundation are delighted to receive this funding from the Scotch Whisky Action Fund and look forward to working with school children across Edinburgh to raise alcohol awareness."

## Witness appeal following handbag snatches in capital

He is described as white, in his 30's and very slim. He wore a black rain jacket with the hood up, trainers and had spots on his face.

Detective Constable Peter Grady of Gayfield CID said: "At this stage of inquiry we are keeping an open mind to the possibility that these crimes are linked and I urge anyone with information to come forward.

"Fortunately, neither victim required hospital treatment but these were extremely frightening incidents for them.

"I'd again urge anyone who recognises the descriptions of the suspects to please contact police as quickly as possible."

### Miles secures debate on station traffic

×

Lothians MSP Miles Briggs has made it one of the principal

aims of his new position to get accessible taxis back into Waverley Station.

Despite Scotrail having said when they banned all vehicles except delivery trucks that this would bring the station in line with all the others they own and run, Briggs has not been dissuaded.

He is adamant that many groups of travellers need the convenience of getting a taxi down in the station, and set up a <u>petition</u> to gather support in August.

He has also secured a Members' debate at Holyrood next Thursday 24 November 2016 to ensure proper discussion of the matter at the highest levels.

Miles made representations to Scotrail Alliance's Chief Executive and the Transport Minister Humza Yousaf.

He hopes that his <u>petition</u> will demonstrate the significant level of public support for bringing back accessible taxis to the station.

Speaking earlier Miles said : "Since being elected as a Lothian MSP in May many constituents, especially elderly and disabled people, have contacted me to express their deep unhappiness with the current taxi arrangements at Edinburgh's Waverley Station.

" In 2014 taxis were banned from previous taxi ranks within the station, meaning passengers have to leave the station to get a taxi, or be dropped off, on neighbouring streets. Older people regularly tell me about the inconvenience and difficulties they face as a result. Disabled and infirm travellers say they find it very hard to navigate their way to the lifts to leave the station to get a cab while the escalators also pose a particular challenge to those visually impaired people with guide dogs. Tourists, for whom Waverley is often their first experience of Scotland having travelled north, struggle with heavy luggage to stand outside in all weathers waiting for a taxi on crowded streets with no overhead shelter.

" It is well over a year since the Scottish Parliament's Infrastructure Committee investigated this issue and concluded it was "essential that suitably located, accessible taxi facilities are available at Waverley." Constituents and visitors are frustrated that no action has yet been taken to address this matter.

" I am pleased that my Parliamentary motion on better access at Waverley Station has gained the support of 34 fellow MSPs from across the political spectrum and that I have now been able to secure time in Parliament for a Member's debate on this subject.

" I am very clear that the current access arrangements at Waverley Station aren't good enough, especially for blind, disabled and elderly residents who sadly feel they are second class citizens when it comes to using the station and who wish to see a better drop off and pick up system. It is the Scottish Government's responsibility to ensure disabled travellers have equal access to transport services in Scotland and I feel Ministers should have been doing far more to work with Network Rail to resolve matters.

" I look forward to the debate on the 24<sup>th</sup> and hope MSPs from across Lothian and further afield will join me in putting pressure on the Scottish Government and Network Rail to make sure one of Scotland's key transport hubs is truly accessible for all travellers including those with visual impairment and mobility issues.

" In the meantime I am keen for my online petition to demonstrate the level of public support that exists for the return of taxis to the station and therefore I am urging constituents and others to sign my petition. It can be accessed

### Kitten dumped inside

## Marchmont Street residential bin

The Scottish SPCA is appealing for information after a 5 month old kitten was cruelly dumped in a tightly knotted pillowcase inside a residential bin on Marchmont Street, Edinburgh.

Scotland's animal welfare charity was alerted Wednesday (16 November) when a pair of students heard the kitten's cry for help. They found the young cat unhurt inside the bin.

The feline is now being cared for at the charity's animal rescue and rehoming centre in Dumbarton where she has been nicknamed Echo.

Animal Rescue Officer Fiona Thorburn said, "Echo is extremely vocal, which looks to have saved her life. Thankfully, it doesn't appear that the she was in the bin for very long as the pillowcase wasn't soiled but it must have been very traumatic. If she hadn't been discovered then she would have died a slow and painful death.

"Echo is doing great despite her ordeal and is very active so doesn't seem too affected.

"This is not only an unusually cruel incident but it is also an offence. We are now looking to trace whoever is responsible and ask that anyone with information to get in touch."

Abandoning an animal is an offence under the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006. Anyone found guilty of doing so can expect to be banned from keeping animals for a fixed period or life.
