The Eyemouth and District Community Trust (EDCT) will now be able to proceed to purchase and redevelop the vacant properties as a Social Eco Innovation Centre providing a learning and training space, a social enterprise training kitchen, IT resource centre, office space for new businesses and space for the local community to use.

Sina Anderson of EDCT said: "We are delighted to receive this

generous award from Scottish Land Fund. This funding will enable us to proceed with the proposed Eyemouth Social Innovation Centre, a project set right in the centre of Eyemouth, supporting the regeneration of the town and bringing a much loved building back into community use. Whilst the community has always been keen to retain the old Burgh Chambers and Town Hall, as a community space, now with the conversion to a multi use space, it will give added benefit to the town.

"Eyemouth until recent times was one of the largest fishing ports in the whole of Scotland but now needs to look to other opportunities to sustain the town. This project will address the need for a variety of training, office space and business support, in an effort to encourage young people to stay in the town, offer retraining, as well as attracting new businesses and start ups, to provide employment."

Research carried out by VisitScotland has decided that the 126 year old Forth Bridge is Scotland's wonder in the Year of Innovation, Architecture and Design 2016.

The bridge which is a UNESCO World Heritage Site beat our other wonders such as Edinburgh Castle, the Glenfinnan Viaduct, Stirling Castle, the Falkirk Wheel, the Caledonian Canal and the Scott Monument.

Almost two thirds of people in Britain have made a journey to see an architectural wonder or famous building. This figure does not just relate to older people, it also includes those in the 16-24 year old age bracket. The most popular building which people go to visit is Edinburgh Castle.

VisitScotland have been promoting the Year of Innovation, Architecture and Design since January with events at St Peter's Seminary and Ignite Dundee among those in the packed schedule.

Next year from 1 January 2017 the theme will be a Year of History, Heritage and Archaeology.

Malcolm Roughead, Chief Executive of VisitScotland said:

Public urged to be vigilant after thefts in Mayfield and Easthouses

Police are advising Ford van owners to remain vigilant after recent thefts in the areas of Mayfield and Easthouses.

Between 3am and 6am on Thursday, October 6th, a total of three Ford Transit and Ford Connect vans were entered and a number of high value tools stolen.

Enquiries into these incidents are ongoing however there are a number of crime prevention measures motorists can take in order to reduce their chances of falling victim.

Inspector Michelle Ritchie based at Dalkeith said: "In light of the recent thefts, I ask all owners, particularly of Ford vans, to review their security and make sure they have taken adequate steps to protect their vehicles and contents.

"This includes parking your van in a well lit spot preferably overlooked by other houses and, when possible, parking tight against a garage, hedge or wall making it as difficult as possible for any would be thief to access.

"After locking your vehilce, double check all the doors are secure and only keep the tools you actually need in the van. If possible leave the tools you don't regularly use at work or in a locked garage.

"I also recommend that tools are marked so they can be identified should they be stolen.

"These are relatively straight forward steps but can greatly reduce your chances of falling victim to criminals.

"Thieves will always take the easier option and our message is simple, don't give them the opportunity."

Brakes put on Boroughmuir till next summer

The new Boroughmuir High School which we visited recently will not be ready until August 2017 the council have announced today. The Chief Executive Andrew Kerr and senior officials have had discussions with the contractor O'Hare McGovern and have decided on a second delay.

The further delay (the school was expected to be ready after the October half term until recently) is to allow for the exam period to pass without pupils having to move. The school building is due to be ready in April 2017, but pupils and teachers will not move until after the summer.

■ Councillor Paul Godzik, Education Convener, said: "This is understandably disappointing news for the whole school

community and we certainly share their frustration at this fresh delay. We have made clear our displeasure at the way the project has progressed to date and will be seeking compensation in line with the terms of the contract.

"By postponing the opening until the start of the next school year, we can ensure pupils can sit their exams without the upheaval of moving into a new building.

"When staff and pupils return for the new academic year next August, they'll be embarking on an exciting new chapter in Boroughmuir's history, with a fantastic new teaching and learning environment to continue the school's first-class academic track record."

Local Green councillor Melanie Main has said she is astonished at the latest delay. She said: "The first priority for any new school building has to be that it is safe and fit for purpose on day one. And I don't doubt that officers have come to the right conclusion to delay the opening — now for the fourth time.

"However, I am astonished at how this has been handled. The contractor appointed is building a school in Scotland for the first time and, it appears, has really struggled with ground conditions and weather — things that could and should have been anticipated.

"There has been an increasing sense of excitement in the school community about the move so it is really disappointing to see yet more delay.

"After the dust has settled, lessons need to be learned."

The Council say they will be seeking compensation from the contractors in line with the terms of the contract.

A spokesman for O'Hare & McGovern said: "The unfortunate delay was caused by a number of unforeseen circumstances, but we are

confident Edinburgh will take delivery of a magnificent new educational facility in April next year."

Police target anti-social behaviour in East Lothian

Police have been conducting Operation Wolfcastle activity throughout Prestonpans and Musselburgh.

"We are committed to keeping East Lothian a safe place to live, work and visit and will carry out further enforcement activity as part of Operation Wolfcastle wherever and whenever it is required.

Edinburgh Zoo news — rare deer calf born at the weekend

 Edinburgh Zoo has told us today about their newest addition. The Visayan spotted deer calf was born last weekend, the firs time this species has bred at the Zoo.

This breed is also known as the Philippine spotted deer is a rare species and is categorised as Endangered on the Red List published by IUCN. They are usually only found on the Western Visayan Islands of the central Philippines.













Jo Elliott, Animal Collections Manager at RZSS Edinburgh Zoo, said: "The young calf is doing very well and is already able to keep up with its parents. The young female calf has yet to be named by keepers, but she is already stealing visitors' hearts with her large, blue eyes. She has quite a woolly coat and her white spots are already very prominent.

"This is the first Visayan deer calf to be born at the Zoo, so we are extremely happy. The birth of this deer will play an important role in the conservation of this increasingly threatened species, helping to safeguard it from complete extinction."

The deer grow only to 80cm in height and about 80kg in weight.

Church name Edinburgh minister as next Moderator

Moderator Designate of the Church of Scotland (2017) Rev Derek Browning of Morningside Parish Church, Edinburgh.

Edinburgh minister The Rev Dr Derek Browning has been nominated as the next Moderator of the General Assembly. He will be sworn in next May for the following twelve months.

Dr Browning (54), minister at Morningside Parish Church since 2001 was key organiser of the biggest annual open-air festival in Princes Street Gardens attended by 5,000 people.

He said: "Being nominated as Moderator is the greatest honour the Church of Scotland can bestow. It is a huge privilege".

Dr Browning, who graduated with the degree of Doctor of Ministry at Princeton Theological Seminary in the United States in 1997, will succeed the Right Rev. Dr Russell Barr as the Church of Scotland's ambassador at home and abroad.

He read history at Corpus Christi College in Oxford, and opted to train for the ministry ahead of pursuing other graduate career options working for the BBC in London and the oil giant Shell.

Dr Browning, who is also a graduate of St Mary's College in St Andrews, was ordained at Cupar Old Parish Church in Fife in 1987.

He said: "I was in my early 20s when I felt a call not only to be a Christian, but to become a minister.

"For some people this is a gradual realisation, but for me it was a sudden awakening that I couldn't put off until I had

dealt with the questions it posed, and explored the possibility.

"My ministry afterwards has stuck with those two themes: dealing with questions and exploring possibilities."

Dr Browning says the Church is evolving: "Structures and organisations around us continue to change, but the big questions about who we are, why we are here, and what must we do and be are the ones people continue to ask," he added.

"These are challenging times for people of faith and for the Church.

"An American colleague said recently 'The Church isn't dying, it's re-forming.'

"Re-forming is a costly and unsettling process but a fit-forpurpose 21st century Church must have the resilience and the flexibility to be unashamed of its faith in Jesus Christ, and practical in its living out of that faith."

Dr Browning, who enjoys cooking, the performing arts, cinema and theatre in his spare time, has served in the Church in several capacities in St Andrews and Edinburgh Presbyteries and also at a national level.

He is currently the convener of the General Assembly's Business Committee, which also has responsibility for the Heart and Soul event in the gardens.

Dr Browning, who has contributed to BBC Radio Two's 'Pause for Thought' programme, said: "The theme for Heart and Soul 2017 is 'Word of Life' and this rich and layered theme speaks to me about many things but 'inclusion' is one of those words of life.

"The issue of social inclusion is a key one in society and the church".

Dr Browning, a former pupil of North Berwick High School, said he believes social inclusion is clearly a "gospel issue" and hopes to use his time as Moderator to highlight ongoing work carried out by churches that support people on the margins of society.

He added: "People find themselves excluded for all sorts of reasons and the Church must play a role in bridging the gaps between individuals, communities and nations.

"The Church has much to offer, and has much to learn. Jesus was often found not only at the heart and centre of things but also on the fringes and the margins and that is where the Church must be."

Dr Browning said the Church must recognise that society is changing and must respond accordingly: "The challenge facing the Church is bound up to going to where there is vulnerability and need and offering welcome, hope and acceptance.

"I believe in a ministry of presence and chaplaincies in hospitals and the armed forces, universities and schools, work-place chaplaincies and chaplaincies to groups on the fringes of society, take the work of the Church outwards to where people are."

Ian Siegal's '2WENTY5IVE Tour' to visit the capital

next month



Ian Siegal's '2WENTY5IVE Tour' will visit the capital next month.

The British Bluesman will be appearing at La Belle Angele on Friday 18th November.

Twenty-five years. Politically, socially, culturally, it's a lifetime. Ample time for a million bands to ignite and burn out, for a thousand fashions to blossom and wither. There aren't many constants since 1991, but Ian Siegal's mission statement has barely changed in that period. Songs that are real. Shows that resonate. Vocals served raw. Such are the old-fashioned values behind an award-winning career that, even now, feels like it's just getting started.

As an artist in constant motion, Siegal has never been a man for backslaps and laps of honour. But in 2016, the British bluesman will toast that milestone anniversary with a trademark burst of hyperactivity. In Autumn, the *2WENTY5IVE* Tour will take him to 11 venues across the UK and 13 dates in mainland Europe. There'll also be a 38-song retrospective release and a 72-page lyric book curating some of his finest moments to date — before a new studio album in 2017 forges headlong into the future.

There may also be a moment of reflection. If you had told the 20-year-old Siegal, on the night of his first professional band gig in 1991, of the acclaim to come, he'd have dryly laughed it off. Likewise, with the blues genre then in desperate straits, it was unthinkable that he would one day take this music overground in 45 countries, or preside over a trophy haul that includes nine British Blues Awards, three European Blues Awards, two *Mojo* Blues Albums Of The Year (not to mention three US Blues Music Awards nominations — an

unprecedented nod for a non-American).

From roots near Portsmouth, Siegal pinballed through his early life. A child of the '70s and an art-college drop-out in the '80s, he learnt his craft as a busker in Berlin before the motherland lured him back. Even then, as a nascent performer, he already had his calling-cards, shaking up the influences of rock 'n' roll pioneers like Little Richard, blues titans like Muddy Waters and Howlin' Wolf, and leftfield artists like Tom Waits — then adding his inimitable rasped vocal and questing songcraft.

Through the '90s, Siegal — then based in Nottingham — was the best-kept secret on the Midlands circuit. Back-to-back tours in 2003 and 2004 as support to Bill Wyman's Rhythm Kings proved a shop window, and the exposure soon saw him command headline shows in Holland, Belgium, Austria, Hungary (and more), while casting his net beyond the blues genre to draw a pan-generation crowd of both sexes.

In the studio, Siegal opened his account on the Cadiz/Universal distributed Nugene label with 2005's Meat & Potatoes, before 2007's Swagger saw Mojo dub him "one of the most innovative, gifted and engaging blues performers on the planet today". The Dust and Broadside were similarly acclaimed, the UK rock press noting the newcomer's scholarly appreciation for — but irreverent twisting of — the blues template.

But Siegal's quarter-century rise is more than a European success story. He'd made America's acquaintance as early as 2006, visiting major clubs and lighting up the Waterfront Festival. By 2010, this life-long fan of Mississippi hill country blues was drinking deep from the source, striking up a working friendship with Luther and Cody Dickinson of the North Mississippi Allstars, and taking up semi-residence at their Zebra Ranch studio in Coldwater, MS.

The two resulting albums (2011's *The Skinny* and 2012's *Candy Store Kid*), were Siegal's most vital yet, sparking successive BMA nominations for Best Contemporary Blues Album, induction into the British Blues Hall Of Fame, and the memorable Classic Rock soundbite "Mississippi has a new adopted son and Britain a national treasure."

His visits to the US and in particular to the North Mississippi Hill Country Picnic also resulted in 2014's impromptu, campfire-style and critically applauded collaboration *The Picnic Sessions*, teaming Siegal with friends on the local music scene.

Since then, demand has seen Siegal pulled across the planet, with the performer shedding his skin as he plays countless shows in shifting formats — many of them preserved as live albums. In 2014, the BBC-recorded Man & Guitar bottled a solo acoustic performance from the Royal Albert Hall (no doubt a factor in his third BMA nomination for Best Acoustic Artist). The following year's One Night In Amsterdam found him amped and dangerous with a full-throttle electric band; while in 2016, Wayward Sons showcased his fizzing joint tour with Squirrel Nut Zippers man Jimbo Mathus, a partnership so compelling that the pair teamed up again for 37 more shows this Spring.

Twenty-five years. A thousand highlights. And yet, for all the dizzying achievements in the rear-view mirror, the most important part of any Siegal chronology is always the blank canvas that lies ahead. In a music industry built on nostalgia, past glories and diminishing returns, this is one artist with his eye on the future and a hunger for new horizons. A quarter-century later, Ian Siegal is only just getting started.

Autumnal Colours

Although the gardens are lit up in every colour imaginable by the award-winning team at Unique Events, nature still finds a way of outshining. We are well into autumn now which means all the trees, shrubbery and other exotic plant-life are taking on their end of year hues, which is perhaps the only placatory feature of this time of year, as we slide into the darker months.

The golden, purple, reddish and amber coloured leaves which lie under your feet or cling on desperately to the everthinning canopy above, make a dynamic backdrop for the lightshow. It is as though the Botanics have stepped up their game especially for the occasion.

That Hologram

In the first few minutes of the tour, in the Chinese Garden section, you'll be greeted by a thirty-foot tall hologram of George Forrest, the so-called "Indiana Jones of Scotland". Instead of treasured artefacts, Forrest travelled the world,

China and the Himalayas in particular, collecting and cataloguing tens of thousands of plants and sending them back to the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh for safe-keeping.

The display is unlike any other you are likely to see. Using the mist and spray of the pond as a screen, huge and detailed animations play out in the air in front of your eyes, with Chinese warriors and a massive, fire-breathing dragon. It really has to be seen to be believed.

Hearts Stadium Development Gets Go-Ahead



In a somewhat depressing week for Scottish football, there was some good news for Hearts supporters at least today when the City of Edinburgh Council approved plans by the Gorgie club to redevelop the old main stand at Tynecastle.

The ambitious project, two years in the making, will cost £11m and work on turning Tynecastle into a 20,000 capacity stadium fit for the 21^{st} century will begin as early as next month — with completion expected in September 2017.

Hearts owner Ann Budge was delighted that approval had finally been granted. "It's been a long hard road to get here" she told STV News, "so to get unanimous approval this morning was fantastic."

She added "Inevitably there will be a bit of disruption because it is a big building programme but we absolutely keep that to a minimum and the supporters who still want to come and sit in the old stand will do so."

Hearts have come a long way since the dark days of administration three years ago and it wasn't that long ago that former Hearts chief executive Chris Robinson was prepared to sell Tynecastle Stadium for property development and move the club to Murrayfield.

Now, Hearts supporters can look forward to a brand new stand holding 7,000 people — and a bright future for a club that was on its knees not so long ago.

Leith MP dismisses claims for Britannia revival



Deidre Brock MP yesterday dismissed calls by the Conservatives to bring the Royal Yacht Britannia back as a working ship as 'daft'.

Before the parliamentary debate Ms Brock said:-

"The Royal Yacht Britannia is a beautifully kept museum piece. The plan to bring it back as a working ship is just daft.

"The ship is a floating curiosity from a bygone era and it is staying put in Leith — not just because one of the propellers

has been melted down into a statue of a Royal Yachtsman.

"By remaining at the Ocean Terminal, Britannia can actually give something back to society, bringing in money to help regenerate a poorer area, rather than leaching further from the public purse.

"Given the austerity being inflicted upon us, surely even the Tories would flinch at the idea of recommissioning a Royal Yacht.

"As benefit sanctions leave the most disadvantaged people to go hungry, as the working poor join claimants in the foodbank queues, how can anyone justify recommissioning a Royal Yacht? Which budget do they want to cut for that?

"Flashboat democracy has no place in the modern world — which has changed utterly from the day in 1997 that Britannia was decommissioned, never mind the world in which it was commissioned in the first place.

"If Tories want to see economic revival then they must act to ease austerity and properly invest in our people, our infrastructure and our public services, not throw money at baubles from a bygone era."

The campaign to reintroduce the Royal Yacht Britannia to revive international trade was begun by Jake Berry MP for Rossendale and Darwen. He explained that it would be economic, patriotic and crucially would be at a low cost. He said that many members of the public have supported his cause, some event sending him a cheque to help. Mr Berry said during the debate: "There are several proposals for what type of ship we should build, as well as proposals to recommission the existing royal yacht Britannia, which stands proudly in Leith docks. They should all be explored, but I will talk about my personal preference, which is to build a new royal yacht along the lines of the proposals put to the Government in the 1990s.

"The future royal yacht project envisaged a new ship that would be slightly smaller than Britannia but similar in design. Crucially, it would have an increased range and a much-reduced crewing requirement and would be much cheaper to run. It has been estimated that the ship would cost about £100 million to construct and could be funded either through private donations—for example, by giving industry naming rights for certain decks and rooms—through a private finance initiative model or through public fundraising."
