Well, I'm really not quite sure how to describe Lewis Klahr's Sixty Six – it's a stream of art consciousness, over twelve episodes, most of which have Roy Lichtenstein type characters with speech balloons or voiced by actors, interspersed with beautiful colour slides and pieces of photography, some of it out of focus. Much of the accompanying music is really beautiful and very well chosen.

It is compelling in a strange kind of way, except for the second last set, which consists of a whole lot of broken shots of a wedding/celebration table in black and white and out of focus, which does not seem to be cohesive with the rest.

Making a narrative from the images, some of which have buttons traversing them, is a challenging but not unpleasant way to while away 90 minutes and appreciate the life's work of this creative artist. Maybe a double dose of Night Nurse would have helped, though.

Beautiful use is made of the South Shields and Norwegian coastlines as backdrop to Bliss! [tweet_box design="default"]This engaging, coming of age story tells of Tasha Robson (Freya Parks)'s quest to find her real father, known to her mother only as The Viking. [/tweet_box]

Deciding to leave her violent step-father and dysfunctional family, she sets off on the Newcastle to Bergen ferry, finding she has to draw on resources she did not know she had along the way.

Rita Osei's directorial debut is sweet and holds the viewer's attention to its pragmatic end. Parks is excellent, assured yet naive. She sings a pretty little refrain which recurs at various points and is lovely but at times the wider soundtrack is jarring and intrusive.

Tapir calf meets Dad

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Just before Father's Day today the zoo's latest baby, the endangered Malayan tapir calf, met his father for the first time.

The wee chap who is called Baku is growing fast since his birth only a month ago on 19 May. He met Mowgli his father as all the family got together.

Here is the moment they met.

Karen Stiven, Hoofstock Keeper at RZSS Edinburgh Zoo, said: "Baku is growing quickly and is really enjoying exploring his outdoor enclosure. We separated his father Mowgli from him and his mum when he was born to give him time with his mother, Sayang, and to let him do a bit of growing. Now that he is a month old we have introduced him to his father and the trio of tapirs are getting on very well. Mowgli was definitely very interested in meeting his son."

Baby tapirs are born with brown fur and white stripes and dots, which provides camouflage in the forest. Baku still has his spots and stripes, but will start to lose his unique pelage after a few months and, by the time he is six months old, he will look more like his parents, with a stocky black body and white or grey midsections.

Malayan tapirs are listed as Endangered on the IUCN Red List and are increasingly threatened, with population numbers continuing to decline as a result of habitat loss and fragmentation as well as increasing hunting pressure. The population has been estimated to have declined by more than 50% in the last three generations, primarily as a result of tapir habitat being converted into palm oil plantations.

But Jon Cassar's Forsaken is simply magnificent. A classic morality tale of the complexities of good versus evil, John Henry Clayton (Kiefer Sutherland) comes home to to find his mother dead and his pastor father (Donald Sutherland) unforgiving of the long absence which followed his entry into the Civil War and subsequent gun-slinging years. Enter a convincing Demi Moore as his unrequited love now married with a child and the land-grabbing baddies led by our own Brian Cox and the superbly understated Michael Wincott. The story unfolds into a somewhat predictable but wholly gripping tale. A beautiful soundtrack orchestrated by Jonathan Goldsmith complements and enhances the superb cinematography.

Hibs' Hampden hero Anthony Stokes joins Blackburn Rovers

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Hibs' Scottish Cup Final hero Anthony Stokes has signed for Blackburn Rovers on a three-year deal following his release from Celtic.

Stokes was a surprise loan signing from Celtic in the January transfer window and the Republic of Ireland international justified Alan Stubbs' faith when he scored twice and was named man of the match in a dramatic 3-2 Scottish Cup final victory against Rangers in May.

The 27-year-old scored 77 goals in 192 games during a successful six-year spell with Celtic where he won four

Scottish Premiership titles, two Scottish Cups and the Scottish League Cup.

Rovers manager Owen Coyle, a former Republic of Ireland international forward himself, couldn't hide his delight at making the former Hibs' striker his first summer signing.

Coyle told the club website: "I am absolutely delighted to get Anthony Stokes on board

"He had a number of suitors and we had to beat off a lot of competition from some big clubs for his signature. This is a boy who is a proven goalscorer, he's a had a terrific career at a very high level and we've got him at a very good age. At 27, I think he's coming into his prime.

"He's coming here hungry and motivated to do well, to continue to his improvement, to score goals and to help Blackburn Rovers be an exciting team.

"Having played in front of 60,000 fans at Celtic, he's got the mentality to stand up and be counted in big games, as he's shown over the years, and to get a player of that calibre to the club, we're absolutely delighted.

"Hopefully it gives all of the Rovers fans a lift and shows that we're trying to get goalscorers and exciting players to the club that they can enjoy watching."

Niddrie attack being treated as attempted murder

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Police have launched an investigation into an attempted murder that has resulted in a teenager being hospitalised with critical injuries.

Detectives are now appealing for information in relation to the attack, which happened outside an address on Niddrie House Park this morning.

At around 4am, the 18-year-old victim was walking with another man when they were subjected to an unprovoked attack that left the victim with serious injuries to his body.

He is now in the care of medical staff at the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh and remains in a serious condition.

Anyone who has information relevant to this incident is asked to contact police immediately.

Detective Inspector Roddy Hardy of St Leonards police station, said: "There will be a visible police presence over the course of this weekend as we seek information from local residents and to provide a reassuring presence.

"I urge anyone who witnessed suspicious activity in the area of Niddrie House Park in the early hours of Saturday, June 18th, to come forward.

"Similarly those with information that can help with our ongoing investigation are asked to contact police immediately on 101. Alternatively, information can be passed anonymously through the independent charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

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[tweet_box design="default"]Utterly charming and delightful, this documentary is a sweet cornucopia of anecdotes, facts and film clips around the lives of the Michelsons.[/tweet_box] When Harold Michelson returned from his war-time work, forty missions as an aircraft bomb-sighter over Europe during WWII, his commanding officer suggested he try art as a career.

Once home in Florida, he did just that and also fell in love with his kid sister's best friend, eleven years his junior. Lillian was an orphan who used literature to educate herself out of difficult birth circumstances. When their romance became public, in true Austen style she was sent to New York to have his Aunt 'Cile forbid the penniless young woman to marry her nephew. But as soon as Harold established himself in the beginnings of a career in Hollywood, he ignored his family, sent for his sweetheart and their long, fruitful life together began.

So detailed and creative were some of Harold's film storyboards that they were often destroyed after the movie was released. This was so that no-one would ever realise that in fact key visions had been Harold's and not those of whichever director had benefited from them. Spanning sixty years their careers dovetailed and Harold's storyboards relied on Lillian's meticulous film research. Her extensive library and encyclopaedic knowledge was the stuff of legend.

Their family life – they had three sons – was enriched by their generous and loving custom of taking struggling actors and behind-the-scene workers under their wing. Danny DeVito was a prime example of someone who became a surrogate son, to the extent that he was moved to support this loving tribute as Executive Producer. Between them the Michelsons worked on hundreds of iconic films including West Side Story, The Birds, Cleopatra and The Graduate. It is suggested that the figures of the king and queen in Shrek 2 are actually based on Harold and Lillian Michelson in homage to their magnificent and largely unsung contribution to film history.

Imagining History is a programme of day-long workshops taking place across the UK, created specifically to give young people a chance to immerse themselves in historical places from the point of view of a writer. Budding historical fiction writers of the future are invited to attend a day that aims to fire imaginations and inspire young people to explore past times and bring them alive through writing.

The workshops are part of an on-going series of events being set up to support a new writing prize, the Young Walter Scott Prize, which is named in honour of the inventor of the historical fiction genre, Walter Scott.

The workshops, run by professional writers, arts educators and experts in creative exploration, aim to show young writers the inspirational potential of real-life places, land, people and events and therefore take place at sites of historical interest that provide a wealth of inspiration and hidden stories.A combination of games and exercises drawn from arts and somatic education practices, as well as extended personal writing time, invites writers to develop their own research and exploration strategies.

Alan Caig Wilson, director of the Young Walter Scott Prize and workshop-co-ordinator said:

"Following the boyhood example of Sir Walter Scott who was inspired to write by the people, stories and places he encountered during explorations of life in the Scottish Borders that continued through out his writing life, we hope to inspire young writers to get out into the historical world and make their own discoveries."

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The Scottish Government has awarded £450,000 through Transport Scotland to help run Big Bike Revival across the country.

• Fix a cycle so it can start to be used and learn how to maintain it.

• Trade a cycle for one better suited to individual needs and donate surplus cycles.

• Experience cycling in their local area, utilising the National Cycle Network, and discover local cycling networks.

• Take part in a variety of cycle training activities to become confident and competent cycling on the road.

The Big Bike Revival programme has already proved a success in England in 2015. Over 50,000 people benefitted from the project last year, with over 21,000 saying they now cycle more often. Of those who attended, 46% lived in a deprived neighbourhood.

Letter from Scotland

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Common Market Cross

The market cross in Edinburgh has seen a lot of history pass by. It's been there, in one form or another, since 1365, the platform for calling elections and making public announcements. The version we see today was put there in Victorian times by none other than William Gladstone. What would he be thinking this week as we approach another crazy milestone in our history?

I've always been against referendums, especially close ones. They are so divisive and can hinge on the whims of puzzled and undecided voters. I think it's better to wait until there is a "settled will" before going to the people in this way. I don't imagine David Cameron ever thought the vote on EU membership would be so close. With just days to go to Turbulent Thursday, the opinion polls are jittery. Across the UK, the Remain and Leave campaigns are running neck and neck. In Scotland, Remain support has topped at 67 per cent but may be falling, according to the very latest polls. There are still a lot of undecided voters....12 or 13 per cent in most polls.

This week, Nicola Sturgeon decided it was time to get tough. She declared that if Britain votes to leave the EU on 23rd June, Scotland would suffer under "the most right-wing government of modern times." Her bogie men are Boris Johnson, Ian Duncan Smith and Michael Gove, the three Tory Brexiteers who have been leading the Leave campaign. They accused her of mounting a "McFear" offensive. Mr Gove even came north, to his old home in Aberdeen, to hint at more powers for Scotland if we leave the EU.

Meanwhile, Alistair Darling, Labour's former Chancellor of the Exchequer, left his home in Edinburgh to go to London to team up with the current Chancellor George Osborne to warn that the UK's public finances would be plunged into a £30bn deficit if we left the EU. That would mean, they said, a 2p rise in income tax and big budget cuts to education and the NHS. Nigel Farage, steaming up the Thames in flotilla of "Leave" fishing boats, said that was more of Project Fear.

On Thursday afternoon I went to a European Movement meeting just up the Royal Mile from the market cross. The atmosphere was "worried". Leaders from all five main parties in Scotland spoke passionately in favour of remaining in the EU, each from a different perspective. Like the Prime Minister, none of them expected the vote to be this close and all of them recognised that Thursday is a more important day than a general election.

Yet it doesn't seem like that. There's an air of us sleepwalking into this historic decision. Like last week, there's still no outward sign of the referendum in Scotland, no window posters or car stickers, or crowds of leafleteers in the streets, let alone public demonstrations or marches. The campaign is largely being fought on radio and television.

The reason, we are told, is that the main parties in Scotland

are all arguing one way and a Remain vote is a foregone conclusion here. It's also true that immigration is not such a big issue in Scotland as it is in England and somehow, the English have confused the issue of immigration with membership of EU.

Looking at the campaign from north of Hadrian's Wall, I see two Englands fighting it out....the old and the new. The old England is one of the 1950s, the plucky little island who'd defeated Hitler and remembers the Empire. They are the proud old middle class, independent, successful, conservative. Then there is the new England, which has come to terms with the modern world, recognises its complexity, it's global nature, and its acceptance of equality.

Somehow I just can't see the Leave side winning, though the Remain side may have to rely on Scotland for the victory. I think on that fateful Thursday morning, the undecided will choose to remain, persuaded that the economic risk of leaving is too great. They will accept the experts' advice with a shrug of the shoulders.

I predict that in a year's time, we will all wonder what the fuss was about. Britain will be back at the table in Brussels arguing for yet more exemptions but resigned to membership of European Union, till death us do part.

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Eight people arrested for drugs offences in West Lothian

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Eight people have been arrested and charged under the Misuse of Drugs Act following two days of enforcement action in West Lothian.

As part of Operation Borah, an ongoing initiative to tackle drug crime across the Lothians and Scottish Borders, Community Policing Officers and Proactive CID detectives executed search warrants at six homes in Livingston, ArmadalEight people have been arrested and charged under the Misuse of Drugs Act following two days of enforcement action in West Lothian. As part of Operation Borah, an ongoing initiative to tackle drug crime across the Lothians and Scottish Borders, Community Policing Officers and Proactive CID detectives executed search warrants at six homes in Livingston, Armadale, Bathgate, Whitburn and Breich.

During this activity cannabis, heroin and valium worth £10,000 was recovered and two electricity meters were found to have been illegally bypassed.

Seven men aged 43, 47,38,24,47,30 and 40 and a 46-year-old woman will appear at court at a later date.

Inspector Adam Smith from Livingston Police Station said: "Tackling drug crime and the associated harm it caused to our communities is a priority for police in West Lothian and we will continue to act on intelligence from the public to carry out enforcement action such as this.

At the Scottish National Gallery – Rubens and Company

The greatest Flemish artist of the seventeenth century, Sir Peter Paul Rubens (1577-1640), will be at the centre of the exciting new display of master drawings at the Scottish National Gallery this summer. *Rubens and Company* will celebrate the Gallery's outstanding selection of Flemish drawings and prints, with masterpieces by Rubens, Jacob Jordaens (1593-1678) and Sir Anthony van Dyck (1599-1641), shown alongside rarely-seen works by Flemish contemporaries such as Cornelis Schut (1597-1655) and Frans Wouters (1612-1659).

Rubens is considered the towering figure of the Flemish

Baroque - the period between the late sixteenth and early eighteenth centuries – and one of the greatest artists of all time. In the seventeenth century Flanders, together with Brabant, was the most prominent province of the Southern Netherlands, which were then under Spanish control; today it marks the northern, Dutch-speaking part of modern Belgium. The display includes Rubens's beautiful sketch Hero and Leander, c.1600-3, and Eight Women Harvesting, c.1635, which was probably drawn outdoors and from life. Rubens's work shows the strong influence of classical sculpture, and of Italian Renaissance artists such as Raphael and Michelangelo. As a painter of religious pictures, mythological scenes, classical and modern history and portraits, Rubens was a prominent figure on an international stage and had a broad impact on other artists, including Van Dyck and Jordaens. Van Dyck's Study for the Portrait of Nicholas Lanier (1588-1666), a delicate black chalk drawing from 1628, will be displayed in the exhibition, as well as Jordaens's beautiful Female Nude (1641) and The Adoration of the Magi (1644).

Among the highlights of the display will be some new discoveries made during research for the exhibition, including a rare drawing for one of the most important commissions Rubens ever received. Saint Gregory of Nazianzus Subduing Heresy, which dates from 1620, was previously regarded as a copy after a lost painting by Rubens; new research, however, suggests this drawing was made in the artist's studio, under the master's supervision. An oil sketch after Titian's world-famous Diana and Actaeon, which is part of the Scottish National Gallery collection, was previously attributed to David Teniers the Younger and is now considered to be by Frans Wouters, a member of Rubens's extensive studio. This oil sketch was acquired in 2015 through the Art Fund.

Rubens and Company will comprise 28 works in total. Many of these are preparatory drawings or studies which offer a fascinating insight into the function of drawings as well as studio practice; some of them have rarely, in some cases never, been displayed before.

The exhibition will be accompanied by a beautifully illustrated catalogue, which provides a lively panorama of Flemish draughtsmanship in the seventeenth century, its subjects and techniques. The publication has been supported by the General Representation of the Government of Flanders in the UK. This catalogue includes an in-depth discussion of the twenty-eight works in the exhibition as well as an introductory essay highlighting the paintings by Rubens and Van Dyck in the collection of the Scottish National Gallery. £14.95 paperback.

The men were arrested at addresses in Glasgow, Lanarkshire and Edinburgh, over alleged assaults and disorder.

Detective Superintendent Kenny Graham, who is leading the investigation, said: "This investigation is extensive and involves a significant number of people, however, we remain committed to identifying those involved and rest assured we will identify people and they will be arrested. As our investigation progresses, there will be additional arrests and continued police action to track down those responsible.

"I would ask if anyone has any information or knowledge about people involved or for anyone with information, including footage or images, to contact us."

The number of arrests following the game has now reached 32.

70th Edinburgh International Film Festival – Tommy's Honour ***

On Wednesday night a wonderful display of tartan and tweed was to be found at the Festival Theatre, starting the seventieth Edinburgh International Film Festival with the opening night screening of Jason Connery's *Tommy's Honour*.

Directed by Sean Connery's son, starring Peter Mullan, Tommy's

Honour spans the career of golfer Tommy Morris Junior and his devastating departure at a young 24. The stalwarts of Scottish film took to the stage to officially declare the festival open, and introduce the public screening. Joined by actors, Jack Lowden and Peter Ferdinando as well as producer, Bob Last, they warmed up the audience for this captivating drama, set in Fife. Looking at the early beginnings of the game of golf this was a great choice to begin the festival.

Desaturated grade, strong performances by Lowden and Mullan as well as Ophelia Lovibond, who plays Meg, as well as the flashback narrative all made this an interesting period drama.

Too much of it revolves around the golf, which was dull in places though, as the more interesting part of the story lay in Meg's past and the formidable relationship she has with Tom's mother, Nancy, played fantastically by Therese Bradley.

Although interesting and a fabulous choice to begin the film festival, this film would have benefited from another play in the editing suite.

Clearly this film is holding together purely on performance.

Three of Scotland's most renowned wildlife artists are helping

to celebrate a double anniversary with an exhibition inside the Isle of May's iconic Stevenson lighthouse.

Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) is hosting the exhibition in the island's Main Lighthouse as part of a season of events celebrating the Isle of May's 60^{th} anniversary as a National Nature Reserve (NNR). It is also 200 years since the lighthouse started operating in 1816.

The display features artworks depicting scenes of the island and its wildlife by artists Derek Robertson, Keith Brockie and Darren Woodhead. Known locally as 'The May', this small island sits on the edge of the Firth of Forth.

David Steel, SNH's reserve manager on the island, said: "With the two anniversaries there's plenty to celebrate on the Isle of May this year. We're delighted to be able to use the unique venue of the Main Lighthouse, which is owned and operated by the Northern Lighthouse Board, to show work by these talented artists. They each have a strong connection to the island and this exhibition will be a fabulous way of seeing the May through their eyes."

The exhibition will be open each weekend until 01 August, and then it will be open every day. Entry to the exhibition is free and it is free to visit the NNR, but you must take a boat trip to reach the island.

The island's importance for seabirds has drawn scientists to its shores for many years and the May is home to the oldest continuously running bird observatory in the UK, founded in 1934. The May is also a regular haunt for grey seals which are often seen lounging on the shoreline rocks.

Mike Bullock, Chief Executive of the Northern Lighthouse Board, said: "The Isle of May is a very special place and it is significant in our lighthouse heritage as the site of Scotland's first ever lighthouse, dating back to 1636, and the "new" light which is celebrating 200 years of operation for the safety of the mariner.

"Over the last year the NLB has solarised the operation of the light and as part of this reengineering work we have incorporated safety systems and installed information boards to allow the public to access the building and find out more about our history. We are delighted to be working with Scottish Natural Heritage to provide tours of this unique lighthouse building."

This island has been a place of pilgrimage for centuries and features the remains of a 12th Century monastery. Scotland's very first lighthouse, 'The Beacon', remains on the island after it was saved from demolition at the request of Sir Walter Scott. The current, castle-like lighthouse was designed by the engineer Robert Stevenson.
