Equality charity Stonewall Scotland has recognised Police Scotland as one of the country's most friendly employers for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) workers.

The force has been awarded "Most Improved Employer" in recognition of its leap into Stonewall's Top 100 UK Workplace Equality Index, moving to 83rd in the list of UK employers, up from 119th place in 2015 (the first year the force was entered in the list).

Deputy Chief Constable Neil Richardson, Director of People and Development John Gillies, and Chief Inspector Gill Boulton collected the award last night (Thursday 25 February 2016) in Edinburgh.

The 2016 list comprises of more than 400 organisations — the highest in the Index's 12 year history — and Police Scotland's improved ranking highlights its reputation as an employer of choice for the LGBT community.

In 2015, the Force held its first professional development events for LGBTI Allies, and has continued to promote the No Bystanders campaign throughout the Force. A named officer has been appointed to ensure maximum efforts are made to improve workplace equality as Police Scotland continues to work closely with its diversity staff associations, including the Scotlish Police Transgender Network and the Gay Police Scotland Association.

Police Scotland Chief Constable Phil Gormley said: "Police Scotland places a high priority on our ongoing commitment to being a top employer for everyone. I am therefore absolutely delighted with not only our improved rating but also the news that the Force is the most improved employer in Scotland. We value having a diverse workforce to represent the diverse communities we serve.

"Police Scotland first entered the Workplace Equality Index to continue to improve the workplace culture for employees. It is therefore extremely encouraging our efforts have yielded such improvements in just one year. However, we know there is still work to be done and we are committed to driving this agenda forward and making further progress in the wider context of staff wellbeing."

Letter from Scotland

Day of fleeting fortunes

It's unsettling, living in a leap year. And as we approach that extra day, February $29^{\rm th}$, I feel a slight sea-sickness coming on. Is the world really leaping up and down, or is it

just me ? We have elections, referendums, budgets, fiscal frameworks, industries in crisis, parties falling apart, strange characters taking sides, all floating past on a full moon tide.

I've been looking up why we have this extra day. It transpires that the Earth goes round the Sun, not in 365 days, as I'd fondly imagined, but in 365 days and six hours. So every four years we have to add a day so we don't get ahead. But to be even more awkward, the scientists tell us that it's actually 365 days, five hours and 49 minutes and 16 seconds. This unhelpful shortfall adds up to, roughly, three days every 400 years. So every 400 years, the 29th of February has to be removed from our leap years, though that won't bother me since the next time that will happen is 2100.

I don't know anyone who was born on the 29th February but I can imagine it would be awkward. In law, such an unfortunate person has to wait till 1st March to become a year older — unless it's a "normal" leap year — and this could be frustrating if you are waiting to be married, get a driving licence, vote, sign a contract, end an apprenticeship etc. And if you have ever seen a production of "The Pirates of Penzance" you will know how awkward that can be. In New Zealand, they let you jump the gun on the 28th, one of the many advantages of living in a young country.

But back to this old country and our unsettling leap year. After months of haggling, we finally have an agreement between the Westminster government and the Scottish Government on that "fiscal framework", the deal over Scotland's reduced block grant when income tax is devolved later this year. The SNP also got their £30.4bn budget through parliament. So the decks have been cleared for the general election on May 5th.

Or so we thought, till the Conservative Party got us into this

unholy mess over Europe. Now we have a referendum campaign on top of an election campaign. David Cameron must now regret having appeased his euro-sceptics two years ago by promising an "in-or-out" referendum.

He's gone through a gruelling few months "re-negotiating" Britain's membership of the EU, only to find that more than a hundred of his backbenchers and a quarter of his cabinet are still anti-Europe. His party is falling apart before our eyes.

It's perhaps no surprise that the two leading wreckers are journalists. The shambolic wild beast that is Boris Johnson just can't resist a bit of campaigning fun.

And Michael Gove has always been a fish out of water, gasping for air when he was sacked for introducing madcap reforms in English education — despite the fact he's never been a teacher and he's not English but Scottish. Now, as the splendidly robed Attorney General (though he's never been a lawyer), he presumes to tell us that the Prime Minister's agreement with EU leaders is not legally binding. Gilbert and Sullivan would have fun with these two "Pirates of Westminster." Here in Scotland, Margaret Mitchell MSP has become the first Tory to break ranks and join the "Leave" campaign.

Political breakdown

It's unsettling how so much of our political system is breaking down. The Labour Party is not exactly a united red army and the Liberal Democrats and the Greens just can't break through the 10 per cent barrier in the opinion polls. Outsiders and anti-politics campaigners seem to flourish in the winter sun. Different issues overlap and obscure each other, like immigration and the EU, welfare and work, taxation and spending.

Much of what the main parties offer is gesture politics because the real thing is too shocking. The SNP say they are opposing Westminster "austerity" but they won't put up taxes to pay for more public spending. Labour and the Liberal Democrats say they would raise income tax by a penny in Scotland, but that only reduces "austerity" by a third.

Local councils, now setting their budgets, are complaining they have been short-changed by £350m and the result will be cuts to local services and between 8,000 and 15,000 jobs lost.

Oil and Gas

Other things fall apart. We had a report out this week from the leaders of the Scottish oil and gas industry warning that they are standing on the "edge of a chasm" of low investment, hardly any new exploration and further job losses. Already 65,000 jobs have gone as a result of the slump in oil prices from \$110 a barrel to just \$30. It's been caused by a strange combination of a world-wide recession, and the Arabians, Iranians, Russians, Venezuelans and the US frackers are all pumping out oil and gas in a mad poker game for market share.

This week we got another sharp warning about our diet. Members of Obesity Action Scotland, say we've made virtually no progress on the 2010 master plan to improve the nation's health. An embarrassing 65 per cent of us adults are overweight and, even more worrying, so are 30 per cent of children. OAS is calling for a sugar tax, better labelling of food products, and restrictions on marketing and promotions.

Ebola

And finally to a brave lady whose poor health is none of her own doing. Pauline Cafferkey, the nurse from Lanarkshire who went out to Sierra Leone in 2014 to help with the Ebola crisis, has been admitted to a specialist hospital in London for the third time.

At one point, shortly after she came home, she was said to be close to death with the initial infection. She apparently

made a full recovery but then in October last year she went down with meningitis. Now she is ill again with yet another complication. It seems the Ebola virus can linger in remote parts of the body even after patients recover from the main infection. Doctors say it's much more complex virus than at first thought.

What's true of Ebola seems to be true of so much in this awkward leap year. Let's hope that when things fall apart, they re-assemble themselves in a happier form in the future.

Police investigate domestic assault inside car in Uphall

Police are appealing for witnesses following a domestic assault in a car which happened in the area of Stankards Road, Uphall, at the junction with Maclardy Court between 12pm — 12.30pm on Tuesday 23 February.

The male suspect was in the passenger seat of the car and assaulted the female driver.

It's possible that two passers-by may have witnessed the incident, which occurred in a red Ford Ka with black racing stripes around the middle of the vehicle.

The first witness is described as a white woman, in her 50s, around 5ft 7in tall with a medium build and blonde/greyish shoulder length hair.

The second witness is described as a white man, around 15 to 16-years-old, 5ft 7in tall, skinny build with short dark brown

hair.

He was walking a small white dog.

Detective Constable Allan Herbert, of Livingston Police Station, said: "We're appealing for anyone who witnessed this incident to come forward, particularly the two witnesses mentioned above.

"The red Ford Ka with black racing stripes is very distinctive, and it's possible they may have heard a woman screaming from within the car."

Ukulele, guitar and drums make up this twee outfit, which hit the stage with hoodies and leggings, no disguise from their lounging attire. Setting the style, it did not take long to discover that these two are quite happy to expose themselves, singing personal songs about ex-boyfriends, and their coming of age, which at times took me back to reading Sylvia Plath and Jeffery Euginides.

Lost Map Records' Tuff Love, beginning with tracks *Poncho* and *Sweet Discontent*, were an organic succession from The Prettiots as they equally carried an air of appealing to the generation of Junos and Scott Pilgrims.

Consisting of two guitars and drums, as well as ruffled haircuts, striped t-shirts, baseball caps and socially awkward rapport, Julie and Suse could also be mistaken for East Coast Americans. (Until you hear them speak of course).

Despite the crown only being about a hundred strong, the vibe and appreciation were there, head bopping coming from most and schizophrenic lighting hitting them from the venue.

If they want to begin my week again, they are more than welcome with this coming of age tone. The rest of you should make a point of starting your week with a bit of Tuff Love.

#safepassage - Edinburgh protest joins 40 cities and

12 countries

Edinburgh joins more than 40 cities in 12 countries to demand safe passage for refugees into Europe.

At 12 noon tomorrow Saturday 27 February, Newkirkgate in Leith will be the venue for a 'speak out' against racist immigration laws, calling for safe passage to Europe for all migrants.

Over 3,700 people died attempting to cross the Mediterranean in 2015, already over 410 have died in 2016. January 2016 was by far the deadliest month on record as at least 244 deaths were recorded.

A spokesperson for the event said: 'These deaths are directly due to the lack of legal safe migration routes into Europe. Immigration controls and Fortress Europe's militarised borders kill! We are calling out for all anti-racist groups and individuals to contact us and participate in this event. Join us on the streets, speak on our open mic, bring placards, banners, drums, ideas!'

Similar events will be taking place in Glasgow, Newcastle, London, Brighton, Bristol and Oxford. Photos will be available on the day on Facebook and Twitter pages 'Migrants' Solidarity Network'

The Migrants' Solidarity Network is a network of different groups and individuals in Edinburgh, working together to challenge racist immigration laws and discrimination.

A spokesperson for the network explained 'We are holding this event in Leith as we are trying to build links with existing communities and organisations in local areas. Racist immigration laws are attacking migrants' rights, restricting access to healthcare, housing, benefits and legal work. Many people live in fear of discrimination, detention and deportation, threatened by immigration raids and checks at

every bank, GP and jobcentre. Meanwhile international companies are profiting from the exploitation of migrant workers, who face precarious conditions, zero hours contracts, repressive agency practices. Whilst the media blames migrants, single mothers and unemployed people for this crisis- we refuse to accept this racism! We are inviting people to a local community meeting in Leith the next day, aiming to bring people together and discuss what issues are impacting on communities the most'

The meeting the following day will take place from 4pm-6pm at the Leith Community Education Centre, Newkirkgate, Leith EH6 6AD

Then on Tuesday 1 March the group will be taking part in a carnival of resistance protest on Princes Street at 6pm. The event links up with a European transnational social strike day of action. Entitled '24 hours without us' the initiative calls for a day of migrants' strikes and solidarity actions across the continent, highlighting the exploitation and precaritisation of migrant workers and repression of refugees.

From 10-5 there will be a team of Jobcentre Plus volunteers requesting that you sign up for free Child Rescue Alerts which is a partnership of the National Crime Agency, the charity Missing People and education technology company, Groupcall. These alerts activate when a child goes missing locally and when police believe their life may be in danger.

This is all part of a two week long national campaign which has the backing of Missing People charity patron, Stephen Fry.

Stephen Fry said: "I believe that Child Rescue Alert should be a national institution. It reminds me of a fire extinguisher — everyone should have one ready to use at a moment's notice but we all hope that we will never need it."

Josie Allan, Regional Manager at Missing People, said: "It's amazing to have the support of volunteers within their own community to raise awareness of this vital service. By signing up, anyone could save a child's life so we want to get the message out to as many people as possible across Edinburgh."

Denise Horsfall, Jobcentre Plus Work Services Director for Scotland, said "Working with Missing People to make the public aware of the Child Rescue Alert scheme has been a hugely fulfilling experience for our staff in Scotland, and is a valuable part of the work that the charity does. Feedback from those taking part has been very positive, and we plan to take ongoing advantage of opportunities with Missing People through our Community 10,000 volunteer programme in 2016."

Finally The Scottish Government has given mothers an early present. It has promised to take action to ensure fairer workplaces for women and to tackle discrimination against new and expectant mothers, just ahead of a report from the Equality and Human Rights Commission expected later in the spring.

Cabinet Secretary for Fair Work, Skills and Training Roseanna Cunningham presented the plan at a breakfast session this morning on the issue organised by the EHRC and Working Families and Family Friendly Working Scotland, hosted by Maclay, Murray and Spens LLP in Edinburgh. The meeting was also attended by Barclays Bank and the Scottish Parliament. She said:

"Sadly in 2016, negative consequences of being pregnant or a new mother while working remain frustratingly common. This is unacceptable in a modern Scotland and does not sit well in a fair and equitable society.

"A report from the EHRC on these issues will be published in the coming weeks and as part of the Scottish Government's commitment to fairer workplaces, we want to tackle these issues head on. Discrimination during pregnancy or following birth has the potential to set patterns that persist for the rest of a woman's working life and we need to ensure it is stopped.

"Recent female employment figures have been strong, particularly when compared to the rest of Europe, and we are making progress on the 5050 by 2020 pledge, with a number of organisations signing up. The latest figures also show a drop of 1.8 percentage points in the gender pay gap over the year, so progress is being made. However we must keep highlighting that motherhood does not detract from a worker's productivity or value.

"We have set up the Fair Work Convention which will publish its framework for fairer workplaces in the coming weeks. In the meantime, however, if there are opportunities to improve the rights of employees we will take them."

Hibs announce new shares innovation

Hibs today announced a new innovation for Scottish football that will allow supporters the hassle-free opportunity to buy shares in their Club online.

The Board is committed to offering fans the opportunity to own up to 51% of the shares in the Club — a controlling interest. An original share issue which ended in August last year — allied with the ongoing activity of the collective ownership vehicle Hibernian Supporters Limited — has already seen supporter ownership leap from around 2% to more than 20%.

And in another unique feature of Hibernian's widening of ownership all of the funds raised go directly to the Club to fund sporting ambition. The purchase of new shares has seen additional investment in football of more than £0.5 million over the past year.

The closure of the previous share issue allowed the Board to consult again with supporters. While fans gave overwhelming backing to the concept, the biggest message was that a simpler mechanism should be found to sell shares while still meeting the burden of regulation.

Thanks to the technology offered by local financial technology business ShareIn, the Club can now meet those demands. Through a newly available platform, The Club has enabled fans to apply for shares directly on the Club's own website at — www.hibernianfc.co.uk/shares

Chairman Rod Petrie said: "The Board has taken its time to learn from the share issue. There has been significant consultation, and the solution that we can now put forward is innovative, as supporters expect from Hibernian.

"We've listened, and we have tried to make the process of buying shares as straightforward as possible but still within the regulatory framework which is designed to protect investors. Barriers have been removed, and supporters can now have a real say in the future of their Club."

Chief Executive Leeann Dempster said: "There is no doubt that there is a huge well of goodwill and desire out there from supporters to get more involved with their Club, to enjoy greater ownership, and to buy shares safe in the knowledge that the money they spend will be used to strengthen the Club they will own.

"Our original share issue meant supporters on our database had to go through a fairly complex process, including consulting an appropriately qualified Independent Financial Adviser, to get shares. That was to ensure we complied with the legislation and regulation and was the right thing to do.

"We now have the situation where a financial technology company has come up with a way that still meets all of the regulatory requirements, but allows supporters a very easy process to buy shares with a few clicks of a button. I expect this to be very popular."

That said, it remains important that supporters fully understand all of the normal risks involved in the purchase of shares, and that the purchase of shares in the Club will not

be something that will pay dividends and is more of an emotional investment."

The Board's plan sees Easter Road Stadium and Hibernian Training Centre secure within the Club's ownership. It's a win-win situation that has won the overwhelming backing of the Hibernian support, demonstrated by several official and supporter led surveys.

Leeann added: "Supporters know that ownership of the Club brings a number of opportunities. They have told us clearly they want to feel they belong, they want to help protect their Club, they want a voice in big decisions, and they want the Club to win things.

"That is why our campaign will have those key strands — Belong; Protect; Guide; Succeed."

Five teenagers arrested following housebreaking spree

Five teenagers have been arrested and charged following a spree of housebreakings and car thefts at three business premises in East Lothian and the Borders which took place between 1.50am and 2.20am on Wednesday morning.

The suspects used stolen cars to get to each area, which were later traced in Edinburgh.

Four boys, aged 16, 16, 17 and 18, will appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court today and a 15-year-old boy has been reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

The arrests were part of a combined resources effort from uniformed and plain clothed officers in the Lothians and Borders and Edinburgh divisions.

The first incident happened on Wednesday around 1.50am when entry was forced to a post office in Stow.

A number of cigarettes were stolen and three previously stolen cars - a VW Golf, Fiat 500 and BMW X5 - were spotted outside the store at the time.

The second incident happened around 2.10am when thieves managed to gain entry to a sandwich store in Longniddry, but nothing was stolen.

The third incident happened around 2.20am at a petrol station in Tranent.

A two-figure sum of cash was stolen along with a quantity of alcohol.

Officers in Dalkeith later recovered the stolen Fiat 500, BMW X5, Vauxhall Astra and an Audi Q7.

Detective Inspector Steven Bertram, of Dalkeith Police Station, said: "Vehicle crime and housebreakings have a huge effect on victims and businesses, and this result shows our desire to tackle these crimes.

"We know this is important to our communities and we'll continue to work together to track those responsible.

"This is a good result for our officers across the three divisions."

Police identify body found in Gogar as Saima Ahmed from London.

Police have confirmed that the body found in the Gogar area of Edinburgh last month is that of Saima Ahmed from London.

The 36-year-old was discovered on the afternoon of Saturday 9^{th} January 2016 off Gogarstone Road prompting a major investigation involving a detailed forensic examination of the area.

After carrying out specialist forensic techniques, including DNA analysis, investigating officers have now ascertained that the remains are those of Saima who had been reported missing by her family to the Metropolitan Police Service on the $31^{\rm st}$ August 2015.

Her death is currently being treated as unexplained and specially trained officers are providing support to the Ahmed family as inquiries progress.

As part of the ongoing investigation, Police Scotland is today launching a UK-wide appeal for information as officers endeavour to establish the exact journey Saima took from London to Edinburgh, what took her to the Gogarstone area and the events leading to her death.

The investigation thus far has led detectives to believe she most likely travelled by rail on Sunday the 30^{th} of August last

year.

Saima's movements on that day are as follows:

8:30am — Oakington Manor Drive, Wembley — Saima leaves home

9:57am — captured on CCTV alone in High Road, Wembley

10:00am — High Road, Wembley — ATM outside Natwest Bank — Saima is believed to have withdrawn money from her account.

10:08am — captured on CCTV alone entering Wembley Central Railway Station

10:18am — Wembley Central Railway Station — boards a London Overground service bound for Watford Junction. She appears to have been alone.

Saima thereafter is believed to have alighted at Watford Junction and at...

11:06am — believed, but not confirmed, to have boarded a train bound for Northampton.

Her exact route after this time is unknown however police believe she may have travelled to Hemel Hempstead, Birmingham and then onto Edinburgh.

Officers are keen to speak to anyone who remembers Saima or who may have spoken to her to come forward.

Saima is described as an Asian female, around 5ft 5ins tall, medium build, with shoulder length straight dark hair. She was last seen wearing a dark long v-neck top, black trousers, black shoes and a black jacket.

Detective Chief Inspector Martin MacLean, Head of Crime Operations for Edinburgh CID, said:

"I have met personally with Saima Ahmed's family and have passed my condolences to them at this tragic and extremely difficult time. "I have given them a commitment that we are doing everything we can to establish why Saima travelled to Edinburgh and the exact circumstances that led to her death.

"At this stage of our inquiry we continue to treat Saima's death as unexplained however there is no evidence of criminality as matters currently stand. Clearly there are a number of matters and facts we have yet to establish and it remains a mystery to Saima's family why she travelled to Edinburgh.

"Today I am appealing to anyone who saw Saima on, or around, the 30^{th} of August 2015 to please contact police immediately.

"As part of our ongoing investigation we continue to work closely with our colleagues in the various police forces across the UK where we believe Saima had travelled en route to Scotland and Edinburgh, including the Metropolitan Police Service and the British Transport Police.

"I urge any regular rail users who may have been on these services to please think carefully and to get in touch with Police Scotland on 101 if you remember or spoke with Saima.

"I also want to hear from anyone who saw her in Edinburgh, or who can help explain how she made her way to the Gogarstone Road area, whether by tram, train, taxi, private hire car or any other means."

In a statement issued through Police Scotland Saima's family said: "We, Saima's family are extremely saddened and shocked by the death of Saima.

"She was a very loving and caring person who was part of a very close family.

"We are hoping someone can provide some information as to Saima's journey on the 30th of August 2015 and help us to understand what happened to her.

"We would appreciate it if we are left alone at what is still a very difficult time for us. Thank you."

To help jog memories, Sunday, August 30th, 2015, was the penultimate day of the Edinburgh Festival Fringe and "Fight Song" by Rachel Platten was at the top of the charts. It was also around this time that "We Are Your Friends" opened in UK cinemas and X Factor had returned to our screens the day before.

Man jailed for embezzling £55k from his employers



Scott Rennie was today sentenced to two-years in prison — reduced to 16-months — at Edinburgh Sheriff Court after pleading guilty to embezzling almost £55,000 from his employers.

In his position as Complaints Handler with Aegon UK, the 29 year-old embezzled £54,933.33 between December 2014 and April 2015.

Suspicions at the company were raised and an investigation by Police Scotland's Economic Crime Unit was carried out.

Rennie was subsequently detained and then charged before pleading guilty to embezzlement and money laundering on 11th February.

Detective Inspector Arron Clinkscales from the Economic Crime Unit said, "Rennie had betrayed the trust and confidence of his employers and their clients to secure funds for his own means.

"His sentence should serve as a warning to others that Police Scotland has specialist resources in place to investigate financial crime and will continue to work with our partners in the Financial Services to identify corrupt employees who prove a threat to their businesses.

Police want to trace dog walker following indecent act in Musselburgh

Police in East Lothian are appealing for witnesses following an indecent incident in Musselburgh which took place around 10.15 a.m. this morning within the Lagoons area of the town.

A man walking a golden Labrador was seen with no clothing on the lower half of his body before performing an indecent act.

The male then headed towards the Goose Green area, at which time it is believed he was fully clothed again.

Local officers are now conducting inquiries within Musselburgh to trace this individual and anyone who can assist with this investigation is asked to come forward.

The suspect is described as white, in his twenties or early thirties, around 5ft 10ins tall with a slim build. He was wearing a dark grey hooded top with the hood up and when fully clothed was also wearing light grey shorts.

Sergeant Laura White from Tranent Police Station said: "Various members of the public witnessed this indecency, which was unpleasant and unsettling for them.

"While we have spoken to several witnesses we are keen to hear from anyone else who was in the Lagoons or Goose Green area on Thursday morning and saw anything suspicious.

"Similarly, anyone who recognises the description of the suspect or who has any other information relevant to this investigation should also contact police immediately."

Hibs hopes of overtaking Rangers to gain automatic promotion are hanging by a thread tonight after crashing to a 3-0 home defeat to Morton.

The game marked Lewis Stevenson's 300th game for the club joining such legends as Gordon Smith, Lawrie Reilly and Pat Stanton, and although he was made captain for the night, it's a game that he won't want to remember.

Head Coach Alan Stubbs made seven changes to the starting XI that beat Alloa Athletic on Sunday. David Gray, Stevenson, John McGinn, Darren McGregor, Anthony Stokes, Kevin Thomson and Jason Cummings all returned to team but surprisingly there was no place on the bench for either of the goal-scorers, Martin Boyle or Dan Carmichael.

Long term injury victim Farid El Alagui was listed amongst the substitutes.

Two familiar faces were in the away dug out, former manager Jim Duffy and substitute goalkeeper Andy McNeil who was a team mate of Stevenson when Hibs won the CIS League Cup in 2007.

Hibs started brightly and Stokes went close with a long range

effort and a header which flew into the side netting.

Striking partner Cummings almost gave Hibs the lead in the 9th minute but his first time effort from a Liam Henderson corner took a deflection off a defender and ended up in the keeper's arms.

Derek Gaston then did well to save another Cummings header then Hibs' fans thought they had taken the lead in the 14th minute when McGinn fired home from close range but the linesman's flag was raised against Cummings in the build up.

It seemed only a matter of time before Hibs scored then in the 26th minute Henderson slotted a thrugh ball into the path of Gray. the full back calmly chipped the ball to Cummings but somehow his header flew wide with the goal gaping.

A goal did arrive a few minutes later but it was for Morton against the run of play. Ross Forbes sent in a dangerous corner and Thomas O'Ware headed the ball into the net from close range.

Just after the break, Cummings struck the crossbar and the ball rebounded into the path of Stokes who was clearly bundled to the ground by Lee Kilday in a challenge that would be more appropriate in the six nations. Incredibly referee Greg Aitken ignored the appeal then infuriated the supporters even more when Morton scored a second.

Both Stevenson and McGeough were fouled during the build up but the referee waved play on both times. Declan McManus then sent in a cross from the right which Oxley spilled into the path of Denny Johnstone who tapped the ball into the net from three vards.

Hibs continued to attack but Morton defended well and hit on the break and a third goal ended the game as a contest. With Hibs attacking, the ball was cleared to Bobby Barr who ran 50 yards into the penalty area before cutting the ball back to Ross Forbes who slotted the ball into the corner of the net leaving Oxley helpless.

Hibs had another penalty appeal ignored when substitute James Keatings was brought down by O'Ware although by that time the game was lost.

Morton almost added a fourth but McManus fired over from eight yards.

In the last few minutes Marvin Bartley forced a fine save from Gaston and Morton held on to secure the points.

The defeat is Hibs' first loss at home since last April and leaves them eight points behind Rangers in the race for the Championship.

After the game a disappointed Alan Stubbs said: "When you are on top you have to take your chances. We've given away two poor goals but all credit to Morton. When they had chances they took them and I've no complaints."

"Like many surfaces across Scotland, Hampden Park has suffered due to prolonged inclement weather and, in particular, heavy rainfall since the turn of the year. This has been exacerbated by the programme of fixtures for Queen's Park FC, who play their home matches at Hampden Park.

"While the best efforts of the ground staff have ensured Hampden's playability, nonetheless, with a series of showpiece matches due to take place this spring — the League Cup Final and Scotland Vauxhall International Challenge Match against Denmark next month, the Petrofac Training Cup and the William Hill Scottish Cup semi-finals in April and the Scottish Cup Final in May — the Board of HPL Ltd has taken the proactive decision to provide the best possible conditions for these matches.

"Work on relaying the pitch will commence immediately after the Queen's Park match against Berwick Rangers on 5th March.

"The National Stadium also has a busy summer ahead with four spectacular concerts announced. The appearance of four globally renowned acts — Coldplay, Rihanna, Beyoncé and Bruce Springsteen and the E-Street Band — reaffirm Hampden Park as a world-class sports and entertainment venue."

The transfer of Sow, whose contract with Hearts was due to end this summer, is believed to have netted Hearts a fee in excess of £1m, a remarkable piece of business given the Gorgie club would have received nothing if he had left in the summer.

23 goals in 52 appearances marked Sow as a prolific goalscorer and the Swedish star was keen to thank Hearts for resurrecting his career.

He told the official Hearts website: "I really enjoyed my time at Hearts and I'm proud that I was able to help the club back up to the top of Scottish football.

"I'd like to thank Robbie, Craig and all the coaching staff for giving me the chance to come over and play regular football, and the boys for being great teammates. "I'd also like to thank the fans who were tremendous with me and never stopped supporting us. I wish Hearts all the best and hope the club continues its rise to the top."

Meanwhile, Hearts have announced re-arranged dates for their Ladbrokes Premiership fixtures against Partick Thistle and Inverness Caledonian Thistle — both of which were recently postponed because of waterlogged pitches.

Firefighters battling to save properties in Bathgate

Firefighters are battling to save properties after a burst water main caused severe flooding Bathgate.

They were alerted at 8.23am this morning to reports of flooding at a large number of properties at the town's Meikle Inch Lane.

Crews from Bathgate and Livingston fire stations rushed to the scene at 8.29am and quickly ensured residents were safe before dealing directly with the water.

Firefighters began diverting the flood water into a nearby river.

Specialist trained water rescue crews are involved and are using sand bags to protect the properties as well as using a high volume pump to help bring water levels down.

Seventeen properties have been affected and the incident is ongoing.

Group Manager Alan Horberry said: "We are working closely with Scottish Water, West Lothian Council and Police Scotland to ensure public safety throughout this incident."

A Police Scotland spokesman said: "Police in West Lothian

responded to Mosside Terrace in Bathgate at around 8.20 a.m. on Wednesday 24th February after a ruptured water main resulted in extensive flooding within the street.

"Several households have been affected and local officers continue to work alongside colleagues from West Lothian Council, The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and Scottish Water to evacuate residents and stop the flooding.

"Members of the public are advised to avoid the area during this multi-agency operation."

Police have closed both Leyland Road and Meikle Inch Lane.








Police are appealing for information following an assault and robbery in a common stair in Edinburgh which took place around 1.25am on Monday morning.

The handbag contained items including a laptop and a rare coin. DC McShane continued: "We have since recovered the coin and a 44 year old woman has been arrested and charged for reset and will be appearing at Edinburgh Sheriff Court on 20 April. The laptop is still missing and so I want to hear from anyone who may be offered such an item in suspicious circumstances."
