Cabinet Secretary for Education and Lifelong Learning Angela Constance said:

That's why we are expanding early learning and childcare, funding a range of local family support projects and delivering the PlayTalkRead campaign to help new parents and carers during their child's early years.

"Read, Write, Count aims to support families at the next stage, as their children start primary school, because we know that learning doesn't stop at the school gates. I want to make it easier for parents to be involved in their child's learning - not only in their school education but through a range of

### experiences.

"The new TV adverts offer tips and advice about fun and interesting ways to boost counting and reading skills in a variety of every-day scenarios. By doing so, we can help our children to be happy, more confident and to get every chance to achieve their own ambitions for life and learning."

# Planning permission granted for new gym at Fountainbridge

Global gym operator Anytime Fitness has obtained planning permission to operate a 24 hour gym at Edinburgh Quay in Fountainbridge.

It is proposed that the 4,500 square foot site overlooking the canal will have premium equipment by Life Fitness and a dedicated weight training studio. It will offer free fitness classes and convenient private changing rooms.

Subject to city council licencing the gym hopes to open its doors by summer, the Fountainbridge site would be the operator's second gym in the city, complementing their Edinburgh Canonmills site that opened in early 2015.

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## EU to debate the Rule of Law in Poland

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SNP MEP Alyn Smith has alerted us to a debate which takes place in the European Parliament in Strasbourg tomorrow. The debate will centre on the state of the rule of law and restrictions to press freedom in Poland.

The MEP explains that we have not to rush to conclusions about such a debate; it is simply that the European Parliament has the right to monitor laws and democracy in member states, but there is a complaint on the table about contentious new Polish laws which are claimed to threaten media independence.

The Polish Prime Minister Beata Szydio will attend the session.

Ahead of the debate Alyn said:

"It's an established fact that the new Warsaw government has rushed through controversial legal and constitutional changes which undermine the independence of the judiciary and the media. The legislation gives Poland's conservative government the power to directly appoint the heads of public broadcasters, despite EU concern and condemnation from rights watchdogs.The process is well underway and many respected journalists have been dismissed with an immediate effect.

"There is absolutely no doubt that the current Polish Government was democratically elected and has a mandate to introduce its programme. However, democracy is not only about elections but also about checks and balances through independent institutions such as the judiciary and the media, whose independence from the government must be protected as part of a healthy democracy. In this context, every state can benefit from a degree of external scrutiny.

"It's also not a coincidence that tens of thousands of people took to the streets in cities across the country to protest against the new laws. Many Poles in Scotland also fear Poland's isolation in the EU, following the Commission's decision to monitor Poland to determine whether or not the new government may constitute a systematic threat to the Rule of Law.

"I rarely comment on the internal affairs of another member state, however, in this instance, as members of the same Union, sharing the same values we should be asking Polish Government questions to ensure their reforms do not violate the Union's democratic principles."

### Edinburgh Trams to the rescue

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If you are a ScotRail passenger and your journey is disrupted then you can complete your journey by tram for no extra cost.

The idea is that if your rail journey is affected by severe weather disruption, emergency repairs or signalling then you can transfer to a tram and still use your rail ticket.

When the ticket acceptance is implemented, passengers will be advised by ScotRail staff and via social media.

Ian Craig, Chief Executive of Transport for Edinburgh,

**said:** "We are pleased to announce this new partnership with ScotRail as we believe it will be a helpful support to affected passengers.

"Ours and ScotRail's commitment is to ensure customers receive the best possible service at all times but on occasion there are external influences that can cause disruption. It's our hope that by enabling passengers to use their tickets on the trams as well as trains, we will be able to somewhat ease the level of inconvenience caused when trains can't run as planned."

Rural Affairs Secretary, Richard Lochhead again urges the UK Government to devolve the management and revenue of all Crown Estate assets in Scotland, ahead of the House of Lords Committee stage this week.

The UK Government's current plans propose treating the Crown Estate's valuable shareholding in Fort Kinnaird, as a non-Scottish asset, so that it is not devolved.

The capital value of the Crown Estate's interest in Fort

Kinnaird outside Edinburgh is £103 million. If included in the transfer, this financial asset could be used to help local communities in Scotland.

Mr Lochhead said:

"From managing rural estates and tenant farms to leasing and co-ordinating investment in renewable energy or leasing aquaculture sites — the management of assets affects communities the length and breadth of Scotland, particularly rural, coastal, island communities and tenant farmers. The Crown Estate Commissioners have raised gross revenue in Scotland of around £110 million between 2007 and 2015. The surplus income has been paid to the UK Treasury and we need to retain future income in Scotland, make the most of our natural assets and increase transparency.

"Current plans for devolution of the management of Crown Estate assets in Scotland are far too complicated, include reservations that allow UK Ministers to limit devolution and exclude significant economic assets in Scotland that are not wholly owned by the Crown Estate. The Crown Estate's interest in the shopping centre at Fort Kinnaird is valued at £103 million – it is totally unacceptable for the UK Government to refuse to devolve this asset.

"I again urge the UK Government to rethink their plans as the devolution of the management and income of the Crown Estate in Scotland provides a real opportunity to deliver benefits to communities across Scotland.

"In the meantime we will continue to work with our stakeholder advisory group to develop future options for the management and revenues of Crown Estate assets in Scotland to implement the Smith Commission's recommendations."

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Friends of the Earth have confirmed that yet again St John's Road features high on the list of polluted streets in Scotland. In addition Salamander Street in Leith is also included. The list is made up of streets which do not meet Scottish safety standards.

Air Pollution campaigner Emilia Hanna stated:

"Streets are breaking legal limits in each major city in Scotland, demonstrating just how serious and widespread Scotland's air pollution health crisis is. Air pollution causes over 2,000 early deaths in Scotland each year at a cost of over £1.1 billion to the economy. Air pollution increases the risk of heart attacks, strokes and asthma attacks and the main culprit is traffic.

"The Scottish Government's Clean Air Strategy has good aspirations but needs resources and energy behind it to tackle the scourge of dirty air in our towns and cities. The government must support local authorities with funding to implement low emission zones in all major cities. It must also increase its investment in walking and cycling paths so that it becomes safer and more convenient for people to leave their cars at home. It is unacceptable that is is throwing f3bn at dualling the A9 while funding for walking, cycling and public transport, and measures to improve air quality remains very low. That is why we are calling on the Scottish Government to reallocate a portion of its motorways budget to active travel in the next budget. Top 8 most polluted streets for nitrogen dioxide in 2015. Following a legal action, the Scottish Government has been forced to come up with fresh plans to show how it will achieve compliance with European law in as short a time as possible. [6]

## Green councillors say 'increase council tax to invest in services'

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Green councillors in Edinburgh propose £10m investment through council tax rise of 97 pence

f10 million to invest in services and to combat cuts in schools, social care and vulnerable children should be the capital's priority.

That is the message from Green councillors in Edinburgh as they propose a 4.3% council tax rise for next year: equivalent to an extra 97p a week for the average Band D property.

The council tax rise, which is backed by 63% of respondents to the council's budget consultation, would still leave the council having to make significant efficiencies and savings, but, according to the Greens, it would head off the worst cuts.

The flom package includes

Retaining a properly-funded school music service
 Blocking cuts to special schools and disadvantaged children

Keeping budgets for social care for frail older

#### people

Supporting community centres, libraries and leisure centres.

On top of that, the additional money also allows the Council to recruit and keep more care workers to bridge a gap of 5,000 unmet care hours a week. And it sees a substantial investment in long term repair and maintenance of schools.

The proposals are outlined in a **blog** published today (Monday 18 January) by Green Finance spokesperson Cllr Gavin Corbett, ahead of the council budget meeting this Thursday (21 January).

Cllr Corbett said:

"This year's budget round is by far the toughest since devolution in 1999, with the city council looking down the barrel of £85m worth of cuts. That includes cuts to schools, libraries, swimming pools, social care and community centres.

"That is why almost two-thirds of people responding to the council's budget consultation backed a council tax rise. I agree with them and I am proposing 97p extra a week to reverse all of the worst cuts and also help tackle to mounting crisis in social care.

"So I believe the city council owes to it to the people of Edinburgh to have a proper grown-up debate about the right balance between new income and spending. To shrink away from that debate, to meekly accept whatever cuts central governments dole out is to infantilise the capital city, to impoverish vital services and to simply store up yet greater problems for the future.

"Let's have that grown-up debate."

## Voujon Bengali and Indian Cuisine

All this cold wet weather requires a little something to warm the cockles — and on a particularly dreich evening that little something came in the form of a very welcome meal from Voujon. Located in Newington, the restaurant is well within reach from any point in the city, offering up flavours from Bangladesh and Northern India.

We received a warm welcome and there was no loitering as we were whisked off to our table. It's a small place – the interior is very modern, with white linen table cloths and elegant orchids adding a sophisticated edge – but this is curiously incongruent with the restaurant's exterior. It is really hard to see in from outside!





The wine menu has a tasty selection however those looking to go by the glass will be disappointed as only the house wines (Chardonnay and Merlot) are offered along with one each from the white and red list – I opted for the Sauvignon Blanc, sticking to my comfort zone on this occasion. It was a clean and easy wine which went down well enough with the meal but it lacked the zesty punch I was looking for. My dining partner went for the Cobra – a winner as always.

► For starters I had the assorted kebabs which included nice whole chunks of tandoori lamb, chicken and white fish in a delicate, crispy batter — not a drop of excess oil anywhere. A 'special sauce' accompanied the dish which was light and refreshing, complimenting three very different meats excellently. The meat itself was incredibly tasty and fresh clearly it had been marinated for a good while before cooking. The lamb was particularly good — not at all fatty but clean and tender. Fresh lettuce and a squeeze of lemon helped a treat too. The other half of our duo ordered the chicken pakora and was thoroughly pleased.

For the main event I went for the Lamb Karachi which came in a stylish white bowl topped with a dried chilli and fresh coriander. It was a bit too hot for my taste (normally a bhuna or korma is enough for me) but the flavour was good and it would satisfy fans of tomato-based curries with a kick. The lamb was a tad on the salty side, but it did not spoil the dish. My partner went for the jaipuri chicken and it was the winner of the night, hands down. Tangy and sweet whilst savoury, it was very moreish right down the delicious mushrooms. It was a very well balanced dish, and both our mains were supported by a gorgeous peshwari naan bread and pilau rice. The nan was perfection — elastic and light whilst crispy round the edges and (thank goodness) not stuffed full of gooey jam but real shredded coconut — just enough to taste.

Dessert unfortunately let us down on what would have otherwise been a home-run for Voujon. We shared a coconut supreme; coconut ice-cream in a half shell which we selected from a generic menu which was not created by the kitchen but instead featured the usual bought-in sweets. The first bite was akin to tucking in to a tub of coconut body butter — the texture and perfume overwhelmingly synthetic.

Whilst it would be nice to see the chefs take over the dessert menu with the same flair as the main menu, the meal was thoroughly enjoyable and we would go back. Average prices: starter £5, main £10.

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Police are appealing for witnesses following a robbery at a business premises which took place on Saturday afternoon in Sciennes Road.

### shared at Falkirk Stadium

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Hibs came from behind to grab a share of the points in a hard fought encounter against Falkirk at the Falkirk Stadium this afternoon however they could easily have won the game but for a poor refereeing decision and a world class save from the Falkirk keeper.

The game went ahead thanks to around 50 volunteers who turned up at the stadium last night to clear the snow off the pitch and the surrounding areas.

Hibs' fans hoping to see Anthony Stokes in action were disappointed although it is understood that the striker is about to sign a loan deal from Celtic.

Former skipper Kevin Thomson was present however and he is expected to sign for the club within the next few days.

Head Coach Alan Stubbs made three changes to the starting Xi that beat Raith Rovers last Saturday with goal-scorer Darren McGregor replacing Niklas Gunnarsson, Fraser Fyvie returning from suspension to take over from Marvin Bartley and top scorer Jason Cummings (pictured) taking the place of Chris Dagnall.

Hibs started on the front foot and Cummings had a chance within the opening minute however his effort was high and wide.

The Hibs players then struggled to come to terms with the artificial surface and for the remainder of the first half both teams cancelled each other out with neither creating any clear cut chances. Cummings looked lively whilst Malonga had two long range efforts which went well wide and a fierce drive from Will Valuks had Mark Oxley scrambling across his goal before flying inches past the post.

The first shot on target actually came in the 44th minute when John Baird set up Luke Leahy 12 yards from goal but the youngster's effort was tipped over the bar by Oxley.

Falkirk started the second half brightly and Lee Miller forced a good save from Oxley before the Bairns took the lead in the 49th minute. Good work from Baird set up Blair Aston and the youngster slotted the ball past Oxley into the corner of the net.

Liam Henderson replaced Keating then Hibs were denied a clear cut penalty when McGinn was brought down by Leahy inside the penalty area as he was about to shoot however unbelievably referee John Beaton waved away the appeals.

Henderson then set up Cummings but his effort was well saved by Danny Rogers. The keeper was soon in action again to hold a dangerous cross from Fyvie as Hibs pressed forward in search of an equaliser.

Henderson did well to create an opening down the left but his cross was too long, the on-loan midfielder then set up Cummings but his cross was cleared for a corner with Malonga waiting.

Hibs eventually grabbed the equaliser their play deserved in the 73rd minute. McGeouch set up Darren McGregor and the defender's powerful strike was parried by Rogers leaving cummings with a tap in.

A minute later Malonga mistimed a free header from a corner and was replaced by Dagnall.

Alston was booked for a bad challenge on Henderson and Cummings went close with a header from the resultant free kick.

McGregor had a header saved on the line then Cummings missed a

glorious chance to secure the victory. Henderson lobbed the Falkirk defender into Cummings' path but Rogers produced a superb save from his powerful volley.

With time running out Henderson sent a low cross into the six yard box which Cummings just missed.

Hibs had three corners in time added on and another penalty appeal denied when the ball struck Peter Grant's arm from a Cummings shot but Falkirk managed to hold on for a share of the points.

The result leaves Hibs five points behind Rangers in the title race.

After the game Stubbs told BT Sport: "We look at it as two points dropped really. We felt that we did a lot in the game. I thought hat for large parts of it we controlled it. First half I thought we were OK but we didn't creat a lot considering the amount of ball that we had.

"Second half we've conceded and I thought our response was very good. I thought we should have had a penalty. I don't know why it hasn't been given.

"I'm disappointed that we've dropped two points today and the standards that we are setting ourselves right now we are right to be disappointed., but as I have said all along there are plenty of twists and turns along the way."

# Hibs launch new Public Social Partnership with NHS Lothian

While there are three founding partners, almost 100 private, public and third sector organisations and individuals have signed up as interested parties.

Included amongst these are local authorities, MSPs, universities, colleges, and some of the region's major charities and social enterprises.

The scope and scale of the projects being planned to deliver community benefits is very significant, with medium-to-longterm projects including a health village, a learning and innovation zone, a family centre, and a healthy growing zone. A huge range of other ambitious projects and programmes are also being developed.

Leeann Dempster said: "GameChanger is attracting a lot of interest because it sees football take a very different approach to how it works to benefit its community. It is the first time a Scottish Club has been involved in a Public Social Partnership, and on such a very significant scale.

"We came from the perspective that the Club has very large physical assets. ### Rugby – Edinburgh v Agen, European Rugby Challenge Cup

Bonus point win keeps European hopes alive

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Edinburgh finally woke up and scored four tries in their latest European Challenge Cup match at BT Murrayfield on Friday night. The match also marked the occasion of Alex and Ben Toolis lining up in the second row – the first time twins had done so in, at least, this country.

The French visitors, SU Agen, were never really at the races and, although they pressed on a couple of occasions, never looked like taking the match. Edinburgh, for their part, had 'rested' a few of their International players, causing a few mutters from the pretty sparse – but typical numbered – crowd.

The first 20 minutes, or so, of the match were a bit flat with neither side looking like scoring — a 'high' point being the hosts getting within a few metres of the line at one point via a kick through from Chris Dean — until the 18<sup>th</sup> minute when Greg Tonks opened the scoring by sinking a penalty for an offside inside the five metre zone. 3-0 to Edinburgh, but Tonks boot was to fail him for the rest of the match.

From the restart, the match went back into the fairly dreary contest that had preceded the score until, with 25 minutes gone, the referee – who was to have issues with the scrum all match – awarded Agen a scrum penalty 20 metres out which their

No. 10, Francois Bouvier somehow missed. Or as Agen reported it "25′ mêlée Agenaise dominante et récompensée d'une pénalité. Mais Bouvier manque son coup de pied. 3-0 !!

The home side now seemed to decide that enough was enough and began to turn up the heat. A close-in maul on 30 minutes saw Nicolas Chocou carded, setting up Edinburgh for a period of dominance.

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Despite having the man advantage, it took the home side eight minutes to get across the line. A series of ruck and offside penalties went to the sidelines for lineouts, until Tonks took charge of another two minutes from the break, and taking a quick tap, he caught the defence napping, handing the ball to hooker, Stuart McInally who swung a long pass out to No. 8, Magnus Bradbury. He then had the relatively easy job of taking two defenders to five metres to the touch line for a try. Tonks missed the kick, but the score was 8-0 as the teams went into the break.

The first 20 minutes of the second half were very much like the first, and although Edinburgh enjoyed the lions' share of the ball and territory, there was always a handling error at the end of the move to cause concern for the home support.

With the scrum woes continuing — Edinburgh's pack being under real pressure for one of the few times this season — it was No. 20, Mike Coman, who ended the stalemate with a second Edinburgh try.

A break up the left wing from Will Helu drove the match into the Agen 22 and a quick recycle soon had the ball on the opposite wing. Damien Hoyland did his bit in attack, then a couple of phases saw Coman crash over the line for the  $60^{th}$ minute try. Tonks, once again failed to convert, but the 13-0 score line put a bit of daylight between the teams. With Agen beginning to look a bit jaded, Edinburgh's backs were hammering at them from all angles and puting a great deal of pressure on the opposition's tiring defence. Tonks then partially redeemed himself with the third try, selling a great dummy before diving over, but then blotted his copy book by missing the kick. Still, 18-0 with 10 minutes to go was looking good, but could the bonus point be at hand?

Yes they could! Another, 'kickable', penalty was won, but Tonks had seen the light and went for the corner, a decision which proved fruitful. Off the lineout, Hamish Watson came round the side of the resultant maul and went over for the bonus point try. Tonks etc, etc....... but 23-0 was to be the winning score.

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Hoyland crossed the whitewash a couple of minutes later, but had his 'try' chalked off for a forward pass and, just as the clock ticked over the 80 minutes, an interception from Agen saw the visitors attack the length of the pitch in a last-gasp attempt at a score. That was foiled by Dougie Fife at fullback and. Following his turn over, Edinburgh launched an attack of their own..!! Why?! With the crowd urging them to kick the ball dead, they charged upfield on the offensive. A fifth try? No, as they, in turn were turned over and Agen were once again on the attack. However, thankfully, that came to naught and the match fizzled to a close with a knock on about four minutes after 'full time'.

A fine win for Edinburgh – weathering a late yellow for a scrum infringement only bad enough for a free kick(!) – giving them a chance, if the beat Grenoble next week, to advance to the knock-out rounds. But the scrum will need to get back to form if they are to overcome another French side in their quest.

### Kevin Thomson leaves Dundee by mutual consent

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Dundee have confirmed that Kevin Thomson has left the Club by mutual consent sparking speculation that he may be returning to Hibs as a player coach.

The 31-year-old midfielder was one of the 'golden generation' of youngsters who came through the ranks at Easter Road before leaving on big money transfers and gaining international honours which included Scott Brown, Steven Whittaker, Steven Fletcher, Derek Riordan, Garry O'Connor and Ian Murray.

Thomson left for Rangers in 2007 shortly before Hibs won the CIS League Cup. At Ibrox he won five major trophies and played in the UEFA Cup Final, before moving south to Middlesbrough. Injuries hampered his career in England and he returned to Easter Road under Pat Fenlon in March 2013 after agreeing to play for no wages.

The following season he was part of the squad that were relegated under Terry Butcher and was released in the summer before signing for Dundee where he was made captain.

Thomson made 38 appearances over the past 18 months for The Dee and his final match came against Dundee United on January 2nd as a second half substitute in the 2-1 victory.

A spokesman for the club said: We would like to thank Kevin for his contribution during his time at Dens and wish him all the best with the next stage of his career."

#### Keith Wright nominated for Dundee FC's Hall of Fame.

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Former Hibs' star Keith Wright has been nominated for the Legends award at this year's Dundee Fc's Hall of Fame.

Wright, who is a member of the Hibernian FC Hall of Fame is also considered to be a bone fide Dundee legend having scored 75 goals in 197 appearances as part of two successful striking partnerships in his time at Dens.

His most renowned was with Tommy Coyne as one half of 'The Cobra and The Mongoose" who punished Premier Division defences in the later half of the 1980s.

Wright finished as Dundee's top goalscorer on two occasions, scored the two goals that got Dundee to the Centenary Cup Final in 1990 and was the last Dundee player to be capped by the Scottish League.

He was also a thorn in Dundee United's defence with four wins and seven goals against The Arabs and is perhaps most fondly remembered for his hat-trick against United in a famous 4-3 derby win in August 1989.

Wright joined his boyhood heroes Hibs in 1991 and helped the club with the Skol League Cup, scoring in every round including the second goal in the final against Dunfermline.

As a Hibs' player he was capped by Scotland against Northern Ireland in 1992.

Wright is joined on the shortlist by another former Hibs'

player, goalkeeper Thomson Allan who was part of the Dark Blue side which won the League Cup at Hampden with a 1-0 win over Celtic and in the twelve match League Cup run, Allan kept a clean sheet in seven of them including in the quarters, semi and final.

In 1974 he was part of the Scotland Squad who went to the World Cup in Munich.

The Hall of Fame event will take place this year on Friday 4th March. 2016 at the Invercarse Hotel.

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While there are a dozen councils in Scotland where household recycling has exceeded the EU target of recycling at least 50% of household waste by 2020, Edinburgh is said to be falling behind with a recycling figure of around 37% according to research by the GMB union.

In the 32 councils in Scotland, out of the total household waste of 2,459,559 tonnes some 1,053,249 tonnes were sent for recycling, composting or reuse. That is 42.8%.

Gary Smith, Acting GMB Scotland Secretary, said: "It is a great credit to all those working in waste collection and recycling that such great strides have been made over the last decade to recycle more at the same time as increasing efficiency.

We are well on the way for many councils to meet the EU target for the UK to recycle at least 50% of waste generated by households.

Increased recycling has come at a cost. The waste sector is the most dangerous in the country to work in.

GMB's research tells us two things. First, we need a sharing of expertise and knowledge which is vital to bring the recycling underachievers up to the levels of their peers. Second, to raise recycling levels even further, and make this sector safer, requires more staff to be employed, more investment in vehicles and equipment and safer methods of working to keep those providing these vital service safe." The table produced by the GMB union shows that Edinburgh only recycles around 37% of waste. Do you recycle? Do you find it easy to do?

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#### The Joy of Six For Rampant Hearts

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Heart of Midlothian 6 Motherwell 0

Ladbrokes SPFL Premiership, Saturday 16 January 2016 – Ice Station Zebra (Tynecastle) Hearts produced their best performance of the season — and one of the best in this reporter's memory — when they demolished Motherwell 6-0 at a freezing and snowy Tynecastle on Saturday afternoon.

Following on from last Saturday's impressive victory over Aberdeen in the William Hill Scottish Cup, Hearts produced an awesome first half performance against the Steelmen which saw the Gorgie Boys three goals up within 22 minutes. Understandably, the second half performance was never going to match the first but the Maroons managed to add a further three goals. Six goals in total and six different goalscorers – no wonder the Maroon Army gave their team a standing ovation at the end of the game despite the snow becoming heavier as the afternoon went on.

Hearts Head Coach Robbie Neilson was forced to make one change to the team which defeated Aberdeen — Sam Nicholson, who picked up a leg knock following some tough treatment from the Dons overly-physical defenders, was unable play, his place being taken by Billy King.

As is so often the case at Tynecastle – close to yet another full-house despite it being a day when you wouldn't put the dog out – Hearts pressurised the opposition from the start. Callum Paterson, the goal hero from seven days ago, was the first to try his luck on goal with rasping effort from 20 yards which just went wide.

In the 11<sup>th</sup> minute Hearts made their early pressure count. Billy King's corner from the left was met by the head of Igor Rossi and his goal bound effort was cleared by a 'Well defender — but the assistant referee signalled the ball had crossed the line and Hearts were ahead.

Motherwell looked dangerous when they broke forward and McDonald tested home keeper Neil Alexander who saved the Australian's effort without too much difficulty. In the 16<sup>th</sup> minute Hearts were two goals ahead. Fine play from Arnaud Djoum set up Osman Sow and the Swede showed fine control before firing past keeper Ripley from 20 yards and into the corner of the net.

Buoyed by these early goals, Hearts swarmed forward at will and Paterson drilled in a tempting cross which just eluded maroon shirts. If the vociferous Motherwell fans thought it was going to be a long afternoon, their fears were confirmed in the 22<sup>nd</sup> minute when the hard-working Gavin Reilly attempted to take ball past keeper Ripley who brought him down. Penalty kick said referee Kevin Clancy (although only a yellow card for the keeper which surprised many) and Reilly duly despatched the penalty kick to put the Maroons 3-0 ahead.

There was a rare opportunity for the visitors when Johnson – who made some ill-judged comments during the week about Tynecastle being a 'horrible place' – had a chance from 20 yards out but he appeared to slip as he shot for goal and ball sailed over the bar, much to the delight of the baying home support.

In the 31<sup>st</sup> minute Hearts thought they had added a fourth goal when a pass from Reilly found Sow who poked the ball home but the former Crystal Palace striker was adjudged to be offside. Then Prince Buaben, who looks revitalised, tried his luck from 30 yards which brought out a fine save from Ripley.

#### Half-time Hearts 3 Motherwell 0

After such an engrossing first half, there was a bit of a lull to proceedings at the beginning of the second period. Motherwell tried hard to grab the goal which would bring them back into the game but, as they had done last week, Hearts defended resolutely.

The visitors should have scored with 20 minutes left. Johnson's cross fell to the unmarked McDonald but the

Australian contrived to head wide with the goal gaping. It was a miss on a par with Aberdeen's Considine at Tynecastle last week but the home support weren't complaining.

Osman Sow was replaced by Juanma and the Swede's generous applause to the home support seemed to signal this may have been his last game at Tynecastle. If it is, he will be a huge miss.

Juanma showed his strength by racing past the visiting defence before passing to Callum Paterson. The defender's cross into the box was almost met by Billy King but, again, Ripley came to the rescue.

Despite their fine showing, casualness crept into Hearts play when Blazej Augustyn dithered on the edge of his own penalty box and gave the ball away to Fletcher. Thankfully, Hearts keeper Neil Alexander saved and the danger was averted but the Hearts number one wasn't slow in making his feelings known to the unfortunate Augustyn.

All was forgiven in the 77<sup>th</sup> minute. Fine play from captain Alim Ozturk set up substitute Dario Zanatta and the young Canadian fed Callum Paterson who fired home Hearts fourth goal.

Three minutes from the end Hearts went nap. The impressive Arnaud Djoum found Juanma who fired home inside the penalty box to put Hearts five goals ahead.

In stoppage time, Djoum danced his way into the Motherwell penalty box before being brought down. The Belgian blasted home the resultant penalty to end the scoring at 6-0 to Hearts.

The final whistle sounded moments later as the snow fell ever more heavily but the Maroon Army went home happy after a thoroughly impressive display. There was pace, skill, movement and deadly finishing from Hearts who will fancy their chances against anyone at Tynecastle on this kind of form.

Robbie Neilson, though, was not getting carried away following what has been a fine week for Hearts.

"Last week was the benchmark and we've carried it on into this week," he said. "We're not going to get carried away. We had a good result last week, we've had a fantastic result this week, but we've still got a long way to go.

"The players have still got to improve vastly if they want to get to where we want to be, which is challenging Celtic, and we've still got Aberdeen in our sights."
