Council seeking accreditation from Living Wage Foundation

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The City of Edinburgh Council introduced the Living Wage for its employees in 2013 and is now looking for accreditation through the Living Wage Foundation.

The recommendation is one of a number of updates relating to the Living Wage detailed in a <u>new report</u> being considered by the Finance and Resources Committee tomorrow.

It also proposes the Council adopts the Scottish Government's guidance on fair work practices relating to procurement, which means the Council can take into account the way in which prospective suppliers treat their employees when it comes to awarding contracts.

Councillor Alasdair Rankin, Convener of the Finance and Resources Committee, said: "Applying for accreditation by the Living Wage Foundation is another positive sign that we value both our employees and those who provide services through contracts and grant funding. It also supports the Capital Coalition's pledge to promote Edinburgh's economic growth and prosperity.

"Research has indicated that the living wage leads to improved staff attendance, greater efficiency from workers, better staff loyalty and increased retention rates. I, for one am delighted that thousands of Council staff have been benefitting for the past three years since we introduced it.

"By also adopting the Scottish Government's guidelines on the Living Wage and procurement we are encouraging other organisations to show a positive approach to their workforce and demonstrate their commitment to fair work practices." The City of Edinburgh Council introduced a Living Wage for all employees on 1 January 2013 and continues to pay a Living Wage to all relevant staff as part of the agreed overall pay settlement for Local Government employees. The current rate of £8.25 an hour will be introduced by April 2016.

Saxophonist will celebrate the jazz pioneers

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Saxophonist John Burgess is launching a series of monthly concerts in the Outhouse Bar in Broughton Street Lane to celebrate the great jazz pioneers.

Beginning on Thursday, February 4, the first three concerts will focus on Louis Armstrong, Bix Beiderbecke (March 3) and Jelly Roll Morton (April 14).

Haddington-based Burgess is one of Scotland's most versatile musicians, having worked in music across the board and played every form of jazz from early New Orleans and Chicago styles with the Nova Scotia Jazz Band through ballads and swing with his So in Love quartet and on to free improvisation with the Glasgow Improvisers Orchestra.

A professional since 1987, he has shared bandstands with Roy Williams, Warren Vache, Digby Fairweather, Harry Beckett, Alan Skidmore, Jim Mullen, Zoe Rahman, and Stan Sulzmann among many others and studied with George Garzone, Jerry Bergonzi and Don Lanphere.

The new series will feature the recently formed John Burgess

Classic Jazz Quintet, with Burgess on clarinet as well as saxophones, Ross Milligan on banjo and guitar, Campbell Normand on piano, Bill Brydon on string bass, and Tom Bancroft on drums.

"We want to avoid idle, slavish recreations of past gems and modern reworkings of the greats," says Burgess, whose Edinburgh Jazz Festival 2015 was one of the event's most popular attractions. "Instead, we're playing the music of these early jazz greats in their own way, which is something of which we think Louis Armstrong in particular would have very much approved."

Witness appeal after two women targeted by thieves



Police are appealing for witnesses after thieves targeted two women during separate incidents in the north of the city last night

The first of these happened at around 6:50pm on Pilrig Street as the 30-year-old was making her way home heading in the direction of Broughton Road.

Two males walked past her before turning and attempting to

snatch her handbag. However, the woman resisted prompting the suspects to run off empty handed across Pilrig Park.

One of the men is described as white, aged between 20 and 29 years old, slim/medium build, around 5ft 8ins tall with a full facial beard. He was wearing dark or navy coloured 'Parka' style jacket with a hood and dark trousers.

No description of the second man is available at this time.

Meanwhile, a short time later, at around 7:15pm, a 31-year-old female was walking home along Dalmeny Street heading towards St Clair Street when two unknown males approached her opposite the junction with Buchanan Street.

One of the men grabbed her handbag before pushing her to the ground resulting in the woman sustaining cuts and swelling to her hand.

The suspects were then seen running southwards along Buchanan Street towards Sloan Street with the handbag before being lost from sight.

The woman was taken to the Western General Hospital to have her injuries assessed and has since been discharged.

Both suspects are described as white, around 5ft 6ins tall and wearing dark coloured hooded tops. One of the men wore a lighter coloured top underneath the hooded top while the other had a scarf partially covering his face.

Police are carrying out various lines of inquiry in an effort to trace those responsible and are now seeking the assistance of the public.

Detective Sergeant Lynsey Thomson of Edinburgh CID said: "Given the similarities of these crimes and their proximity, we are keeping an open mind to the possibility that both incidents are linked.

"There will be an increase in police patrols in the community to provide a reassuring presence however I urge anyone who recognises the description or who has any information relevant to our ongoing inquiries to come forward."

Evil child killer Robert Black has died in prison

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Evil child killer Robert Black has died of natural causes in Maghaberry prison, Northern Ireland.

In a statement, the Northern Ireland Prison Service confirmed that a "68-year-old prisoner" had died at the high-security jail in County Antrim.

"While this is not being treated as suspicious, the Prison Service has informed the Police Service of Northern Ireland (PSNI) Coroner, and Prisoner Ombudsman

"It would not be appropriate to comment further at this time."

On 30th July 1982 Black abducted and murdered 11-year-old Susan Maxwell from Cornhill-on-Tweed. Her body was later found near Twycross in Staffordshire.

On 8th July 1983 he abducted five-year-old Caroline Hogg from outside her home in Portobello. Her body was later found in a ditch in Leicestershire.

In 1986 Black abducted 10-year-old Sarah Harper as she walked from a corner shop near her home in Morley, Leeds. Her body was later discovered in the River Trent in Nottingham.

A massive police enquiry involving six forces failed to identify the culprit then in 1990 Black was arrested following another abduction of a young girl in the Borders.

He plead guilty to that offence and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

In 1994 Black was convicted for the murders of Susan, Caroline and Sarah and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Subsequent investigations by the Police Service of Northern Ireland linked him to the murder of nine-year-old Jennifer Cardy near her home in Ballinderry, County Antrim, on 12 August 1981. At the time, he was in Northern Ireland working as a delivery driver for a London-based poster company.

He was later convicted of Jennifer's murder and since then he has been serving his sentence in Northern Ireland.

20mph to be rolled out in Edinburgh from this summer

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Edinburgh is close to becoming Scotland's first 20mph city after Councillors approved plans to begin rolling out the speed limit.

Members of the Transport and Environment Committee today agreed a Traffic Regulation Order enabling the implementation of changes.

It is now planned to introduce the 20mph network over six phases, beginning with the city centre and rural west in July.

The move follows a formal consultation across the city as part

of the statutory process to apply the speed limit.

Transport Convener, Councillor Lesley Hinds, said: "I am pleased that we are now able to move forward to the final stages of preparation before introducing a network of 20mph routes to the city, which will deliver a range of benefits to both residents and visitors.

"These proposals, aiming to create safer, more attractive streets for all road users, follow a great deal of consultation with the public, which found that the majority of citizens were in support.

"These moves will no doubt involve a culture change for all those who live in and travel through the city, but what we want to do now is work to raise awareness and share information amongst drivers, cyclists and pedestrians to ensure a smooth transition."

Responses to the consultation process for the Local Transport Strategy 2014-19, approved in January 2014, helped to shape the Council's approach to setting speed limits in the urban area.

Reducing traffic speeds has been proven to lower the risk and severity of accidents, which in turn it is hoped would encourage more walking and cycling, reducing congestion and pollution and improving the local environment.

A map of 20mph, 30mph and 40mph limits for the city was passed by Transport and Environment Committee in January 2015, following extensive public consultation with local communities, businesses and other stakeholders.

Elected members also agreed a detailed implementation plan for the phased roll-out of 20mph limits in March 2015, which addresses project delivery, awareness-raising, enforcement and monitoring of the proposed changes. Find out more about plans for 20mph limits on the Council website.

Dylan McGeouch looking forward to Scottish cup derby

McGeouch has quickly become a fans' favourite since his move from Celtic in the summer due to his adventurous style of play and he relishes the prospect of an Edinburgh derby before a packed Tynecastle. Last season he featured in a draw in Gorgie and also a 2-0 win at Easter Road so he knows what to expect.

Speaking to Hibs TV he said: "It will be great for everyone involved at the club and the players as well.

"There are a few new players but there are plenty in the squad who have been involved in derbies before. Obviously the hype before the game will get us going but we will be looking to go there and get a good result.

"I've played in a few. the 2-0 game at Easter Road last year was great to be involved in and for the fans there was a great

atmosphere.

"Hearts are a good side, we found that out last year. The games we played against each other were good and for the people watching the games there was a great atmosphere.

The fans love it and turn up and at derby games they are very vocal.

"The Semi Final game against St Johnstone is massive for us, it's a chance to get to Hampden in the Final — so we'll be looking to get a good result there.

"A week later we are back and involved in the Derby and I think there will be a lot of hype around the game. We just need to keep our heads focussed and hopefully go there and get a good result.

"It will be massive for us. we went there and got a draw last year so hopefully we will go one step ahead and get a positive result."

Elderly woman struck by car in Corstorphine Road



An investigation is underway after an elderly woman was struck by a car in Corstorphine Road around 8.20am this morning.

The collision resulted in Corstorphine Road being closed for just over an hour between Balgreen Road and Western Corner.

Edinburgh Airport reports growth in passenger numbers



Edinburgh Airport announced December's passenger numbers showing that a grand total of 11,130,584 passengers passed through the airport in 2015 making it the busiest ever year at a Scottish Airport.

The annual total represents an increase of over 950,000 passengers from the 2014 total which the airport owners say cements Edinburgh Airport's reputation as the place where Scotland meets the World.

The success was bolstered by particularly strong international passenger figures — which in December peaked with a 19 per cent year-on-year growth.

Although its overall traffic numbers are smaller, in the west of the country Glasgow Airport has issued the highest growth in its passenger numbers in the last year.

Glasgow Airport reported that more than 8.7 million passengers travelled through its doors in 2015, representing an annual increase of 13% — over one million additional

passengers.

The airport, which celebrates its fiftieth anniversary year in 2016, experienced unprecedented growth during each month of 2015, ensuring it was able to record its fifth consecutive year of growth and return its passenger numbers to pre-recession levels.

Over the past 12 months the airport announced 30 new routes and services, significantly strengthened its connections to major European cities and cemented its position as Scotland's principal long haul airport. The new services led to uplifts in both international and domestic traffic over the year — up by 16.8% and 9% respectively. The airport was also classified as one of the fastest growing airports in Europe by airport trade body ACI Europe.

More than 569,000 people travelled through the airport in December 2015 — an increase of 10.1% on 2014 figures — seeing the airport report its busiest December on record. International traffic grew by 16.4% while domestic was up by 5.3%.

Welcoming the annual passenger figures in the capital, Gordon Dewar, Edinburgh Airport's Chief Executive, said: "Last year we enhanced passenger choice by offering more routes and more destinations— and passengers responded by choosing to fly in and out of Edinburgh Airport in greater numbers than ever before.

"This unprecedented success of 11.13 million passengers through our doors highlights the draw of Edinburgh as a destination and the growing appeal that Scotland holds across the globe.

"The 2015 annual total also represents an increase of over 950,000 passengers from the previous year.

"We remain focused on delivering more success in the year

ahead. In 2016 we will continue to improve the passenger experience at Edinburgh Airport with a multi-million pound investment in our check-in and baggage systems, an improved retail offering with greater choice products and we aim to expand our range of new routes and destinations in the year ahead.

"I was asked late last year how much more Edinburgh Airport can grow in a country with little over five million people; I explained that it was not the 5 million I was worried about but how the other seven billion across the globe get to visit us.

"Our international passenger figures for December show a 19 per cent year-on-year growth; this is a strong indicator of our global ambitions and gives reason to be optimistic about further growth in the year ahead."

Scottish Government Minister for Transport and Islands Derek Mackay said: "Reaching this milestone is a fantastic achievement and I congratulate the entire team at Edinburgh Airport for their record breaking efforts in 2015.

"The airport's success brings benefits to both the local and national economies. By improving our international connectivity, we give Scottish businesses improved access to global markets and make the country even more attractive as a destination for tourists

"Edinburgh Airport already offers a wide range of destinations, but the Scottish Government's plan to cut Air Passenger Duty will help encourage airlines to develop new routes as well as help sustain existing ones.

"I wish Edinburgh Airport continued success and look forward to working with them once again in 2016."

More have their say on council's budget proposals



The City of Edinburgh Council have told us that a record number of people have given feedback on the services that matter to them as part of the council's 2016/17 budget engagement.

There were a total of 4183 responses, up 31% on last year, relating to a variety of topics such as parking charges, school music tuition, allotments, library services, waste collections and council tax.

This year, the public have been able to have their say through a variety of methods, including an online planner and the online <u>'Your City, Your Say' dialogue page</u>, which let people submit suggestions and rate others' views.

Results of the engagement will be detailed in a report to be considered by the <u>Finance and Resources Committee</u> on Thursday, 14 January.

These include:

- 1,086 people using the online budget planner, which this year focused on some of the key transformational topics
- 1,067 responses via email, telephone call, letter or participation in an online survey
- 153 ideas discussed on the dedicated dialogue page
- Social media: 376 comments made about budget proposals on Facebook and Twitter
- A budget question time event attended by over 50 people, viewed by more than 200 people on the live webcast and watched

another 360 times using the archive.

Finance and Resources Convener, Councillor Alasdair Rankin, said: "It has been an important element of the Capital Coalition's contract with the city that we would seek your views on the decisions we make which affect you. With this in mind we have once again put our budget proposals out to consultation to ask what services are important to you in your daily lives.

"It is encouraging that a record number of responses have been received as part of the City of Edinburgh Council's 2016/17 budget engagement and that so many of you want to work with us on what are the most important decisions that this Council will make.

"It is vital that we make it as easy as possible for you to have your say on how we spend and save money. We are already carefully considering the range of feedback we've received, which will enable us to make informed decisions when setting our budget. In previous years we have amended aspects of the budget to reflect what we have heard and I'm sure we will do so this time as well."

The strength of public opinion was also demonstrated by three petitions submitted, two on proposals to introduce charges for music tuition and one on proposals to reduce hours for school crossing guides at lunch time.

This year, the range of online budget feedback tools has built on the success of an online budget planner launched in 2014. The new dialogue tool encourages people to discuss and rate their own ideas.

Online engagement was supplemented by more traditional means of communication, including face-to-face meetings, leaflets with forms, and media.

The report will be considered at <u>Finance and Resources</u>

<u>Committee</u>, which will take place on Thursday, 14 January and can be watched <u>on webcast</u>. The Edinburgh Reporter will be at the meeting tweeting and reporting live on the discussions.

Recorded Police Warning Scheme introduced



A new system of recorded warnings that will speed up justice outcomes was introduced yesterday.

The Recorded Police Warning Scheme will allow police officers to make greater use of their discretion when dealing with minor crimes. It replaces the Formal Adult Warning system and has been extended to include 16 and 17 year olds.

Developed following revised Lord Advocate's Guidelines, the scheme will address minor offending behaviour which is currently reported to the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS) and results in either a non-court disposal or no action being taken due to the minor nature of the offence and circumstances.

In 2014/15, thousands of cases reported to COPFS resulted in no proceedings being taken or the Procurator Fiscal issuing a direct fine or other similar disposal.

The Recorded Police Warning Scheme is the first step in a three-tiered disposal process — Recorded Police Warning; Fixed Penalty Notice; Standard Prosecution Report — and it is hoped that the introduction of the scheme will substantially reduce the number of reports being sent to COPFS. The Recorded Police

Warning Scheme does not replace the opportunity for officers, in appropriate circumstances, to issue a verbal warning.

The Recorded Police Warning Scheme provides a proportionate response to minor offending whilst significantly reducing the volume of reports being compiled and submitted through the justice system

Operational briefings have been carried out across Police Scotland with a focus on operational officers, service centre and control room staff and custody officers. As with any new approach, full implementation will take some time to achieve, but the scheme provides a method to deliver an effective, proportionate and outcome focused way to address minor offending.

Alan Stubbs hails derby as "undoubtedly the tie of the round"



Excitement is building already amongst both sets of supporters after Hibs were drawn to play city rivals Hearts in the Fifth Round of the William Hill Scottish Cup and Head Coach Alan Stubbs has hailed the Edinburgh Derby as "undoubtedly the tie of the round"

The draw was made at Hampden Park last night by former Rangers star Brian Laudrup and World Darts Champion Gary Anderson and for the second time in succession, Hibs were the last ball drawn.

The ties are due to be played on the weekend of February 6th however with Scotland playing England in the Calcutta Cup at Murrayfield and the fact that the game will almost certainly be live on TV, it is likely that it will be played on Sunday 7th February.

Coincidentally Hibs play St Johnstone at Tynecastle the week before in the semi-final of the Scottish League Cup.

Although excited about the return of the Capital derby, Stubbs insists his focus will be on the upcoming league fixtures rather than the Scottish Cup clash.

Speaking to the official Hibernian website, Stubbs said: "It's a fantastic tie for both teams.

"With no derby this season it's even more special — it's undoubtedly the tie of the round. We'll be hoping to go there and get a result — it's two good teams in good form.

"I'm sure the excitement has started already for both sets of supporters, but we have four big games to think about before focusing on Hearts."

Ticket information will follow in due course.

Witnesses sought following attempted robbery in Wardieburn



Police are appealing for witnesses following an attempted robbery in Wardieburn which took place at around 12.30am on Saturday 9 January.

Gareth Hoskins OBE 1967-2016



Prominent Edinburgh architect Gareth Hoskins died at the weekend following a heart attack.

Gareth Hoskins body of work in Edinburgh was huge, with designs for the new galleries at the National Museum of Scotland and redevelopment of the building at Colinton Road which houses George Watson's School among them.

Recently involved in the design for the former Royal High School, Mr Hoskins gave evidence at the planning hearing just last month in the City Chambers.

His proposals for the new hotel development were bold, and not

without controversy, but his vision was clear: "The proposals will not only restore and sustain the category A listed Hamilton building but, along with other initiatives such as Collective Gallery within the Observatory, should also be a catalyst for change that allows Calton Hill to once again become an active and vibrant destination within Scotland's capital city."

His company website carries the following notice:

It is with great sadness that we confirm that Gareth Hoskins OBE, the founder and Managing Director of Hoskins Architects, has died.

Gareth, who was 48, took ill at an event in Edinburgh on Sunday 3rd January and, despite receiving the best care possible in Edinburgh Royal Infirmary, he passed away on Saturday 9th January.

Everyone at Hoskins Architects is deeply shocked and saddened by this untimely loss. Our thoughts are with Gareth's family. Chris Coleman-Smith, a co-director of Hoskins Architects, said:

"Everyone at Hoskins Architects has lost an exceptional architect, a visionary and a gifted leader, but above all a very good friend. Gareth leaves a huge gap, he was such a special person. We appreciate the very many messages of condolence that have already been received."

There will be a private family funeral and a memorial service for Gareth is planned to be held at a later date.

Anthony Stokes linked with Hibs' return

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Anthony Stokes is in informal talks with Hibs about the possibility of signing a loan deal until the end of the season according to media reports over the weekend.

Hibs' Head Coach refused to confirm or deny the reports when questioned about the move.

The 27-year-old Republic of Ireland striker spent just over a year With Hibs during the 2009/10 season and scored an impressive 24 goals in 48 games before moving to Celtic.

He started his career with Arsenal but made his mark in Scottish football during a loan spell with Falkirk before joining fellow Irishman Roy Keane at Sunderland.

His signing was a major coup for Hibs where he formed a dangerous partnership with Derek Riordan.

Former Hibs' manager John Collins who is currently number 2 at Celtic Park confirmed that the striker is likely to go out on loan during the January transfer window and both Inverness Caledonian Thistle and Dundee United have been linked.

Despite his links to Inverness boss John Hughes who took him to Falkirk and Hibs, it is understood that Stokes would prefer a move back to Easter Road where former team-mates Dylan McGeouch and Liam Henderson are regulars in the first team.

The move has been the subject of much debate on social media and whilst the majority of Hibs' fans would welcome him back, a proportion are concerned about his off field reputation. Earlier this season he tweeted his unhappiness about being taken to Inverness for a league game then not being included in the squad.

Air pollution requires bold action says Lothians MSP

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Alison Johnstone, Health and Wellbeing spokesperson for the Scottish Greens and MSP for Lothian, today challenged the Scottish Government and local authorities over their inaction on air pollution highlighted by TV documentary "Car Sick".

The investigation, due to air on BBC1 at 7.30 tonight, reveals that only 13 of the country's 32 local authorities carry out roadside emissions testing, more than a decade after the powers were introduced.

In the programme, Transport Minister Derek Mackay claims spending on walking and cycling is "at a record level", yet analysis published by the Scottish Greens has shown it remains less than 2 per cent of the total transport budget, with funding for safe routes to schools due to be cut by £2.1million while spending on motorways is to rise by £125.5million.

Alison Johnstone, Health and Wellbeing spokesperson for the Scottish Greens and MSP for Lothian, said: "This investigation shows yet again that public health is being paid lip service by both national and local government who remain unwilling to use their powers and budgets to make our streets safe and healthy. Successive Labour, Lib Dem and SNP Governments have failed to take this issue seriously despite the clear evidence

that investing in walking and cycling infrastructure and efficient, affordable public transport delivers much greater public benefit than building new roads.

"In parliament I highlighted comments by Professor David Newby of the British Heart Foundation centre of research excellence in Edinburgh who says there is a clear link between air pollution levels and heart attacks. I will continue to challenge ministers and local authorities so we see bold action to save lives."

Sarah Boyack Lothians MSP introduced the motion about air pollution in the Scottish Parliament on 18 November 2015. Beginning the short parliamentary debate Ms Boyack said: "More than 2,000 people die early deaths every year in Scotland as a result of traffic-related air pollution. There is also an impact on people's health, on children, on older people and on those who have chronic conditions. The cocktail of emissions can lead to cancer, increased risk of heart attacks, angina and impacts on respiratory health. We lose days at work and we cost our national health service more than £1 billion every year."

Gordon MacDonald MSP for Edinburgh Pentlands also spoke during the debate, saying: "I thank Sarah Boyack for securing the debate. The west of Edinburgh has four main commuter routes into the city: Queensferry Road, St John's Road, Calder Road and Lanark Road. Two of those arterial routes—the A70 and the A71—are in my constituency.

"At the evening peak, between 4.30 and 6.30, Calder Road is the biggest car park in the west of the city. Communities along that route—from Stenhouse, past Saughton Mains, Parkhead, Broomhouse, Sighthill and the Calders—have mile after mile of traffic crawling along in second gear as commuters try to leave the city. The residents have to put up with the road noise and the difficulty of travelling the Calder Road to get to their homes. Furthermore, anyone who

lives along that route has to contend with the exhaust fumes that are pumped out by thousands of cars over a relatively short period.

"The situation will only get worse as more than 6,000 homes are to be built in the east of the West Lothian Council area at Calderwood, Broxburn and Winchburgh. Those areas are all easily commutable into Edinburgh by car along roads that are heavily congested."

Malcolm Chisholm MSP for Edinburgh Northern and Leith said: "If we want to find out what is happening in my city, we can turn to a report to City of Edinburgh Council's transport and environment committee, dated 25 August 2015. Such reviews of air quality are required under the Environment Act 1995—I remember participating in the process for what is a good piece of legislation from a previous Conservative Government; I do not often say that, but there, I have just said it.

"There are five air quality management areas in this city—by "this city", I mean Edinburgh and Leith. It is important to include Leith, because, unfortunately, one of the zones is in Leith; it is centred on Great Junction Street but extends to Commercial Street and Bernard Street. There is nitrogen dioxide monitoring in Duke Street, almost as if the problem is expected to increase because of changes to traffic arrangements in Leith Walk. There is also an air quality management area covering Inverleith, which is not so well known."

The motion read as follows:

"That the Parliament notes with concern statistics published by Friends of the Earth Scotland that suggest that more than 3,500 people in Scotland die early because of exposure to toxic emissions and that highlight the cost of these emissions, their environmental justice impact and the fact that they are believed to cost up to £2 billion to Scotland's

economy; is further concerned at the admission by Volkswagen Automobile Group that its diesel vehicles were fitted with "defeat devices" to produce favourable emission test results; notes the view that the results of other manufacturers' models might require investigation; understands that European air quality legal limits continue to be breached in Scotland and that 32 air-quality management areas declared by local authorities, including sites in Edinburgh, are in breach of regulatory standards; believes that the Supreme Court's determination that new air-quality plans should be devised before the end of 2015 to ensure that Scotland can comply with EU law is significant; welcomes the Scottish Government's commitment to achieving binding European airquality legal limits by 2020 through the delivery of its low emission strategy, and notes the view that a new policy focus and funding will be required for the Scottish Government to achieve its stated ambition for the strategy and to deliver low emission zones where air-quality management areas are currently in place."

Emilia Hanna, air pollution campaigner for Friends of the Earth Scotland said today:

"Traffic related air pollution continues to be a public health crisis in Scotland, increasing the risk of asthma attacks, strokes, heart attacks, and cancers. Tonight's BBC documentary shows just how damaging cars are to our health and confirm air pollution as one of the biggest silent killers in Scotland.

"Last year the Scottish Government was ordered by the UK Supreme Court to increase its efforts to tackle air pollution but instead we see even more money poured into building motorways and trunk roads. The draft budget includes a massive £820 million for road building with only £40m left for walking and cycling paths. The current budget allocations are irresponsible and reckless if this Government wants to address traffic, the root cause of our air pollution problem.

"The Scottish Government says that it wants more people to walk and cycle, but if it is serious about this then it has to put its money where its mouth is. It cannot simply expect more people to walk and cycle when our pavements are broken and cycle paths still non-existent in many areas.

"The Netherlands and Denmark provide clear proof that investing in active travel reaps huge health, social and economic benefits. In the long term the Government must spend 10% of its transport budget on walking and cycling. This year, we are calling for it to reallocate a further 1% of the roads and motorway budget to active transport in addition to its existing commitments.

The BBC's investigation also found that Aberdeen, Dundee and Edinburgh where not using powers to stop and fine polluting vehicles. Hanna commented:

"Getting the most polluting vehicles off the road can make a big difference, so it is disappointing that large councils are not using these powers. The Government should work with councils to make sure the skills and resources are available to allow these powers to be used effectively."

Dons Left Dignity Behind For Tynecastle Trip

Four weeks ago Hearts lost a Ladbrokes SPFL Premiership game at Aberdeen. While it was a poor performance from the Gorgie players it took an inexplicable hand ball from Hearts defender Jordan McGhee towards the end of the game to give the home side a penalty, which they subsequently converted for the only goal of a scrappy game. It was, though, a win the Dons deserved, for they were the better team, something Hearts Head Coach Robbie Neilson alluded to after the game while expressing disappointment in his own side's performance.

This didn't prevent some Aberdeen players commenting that Hearts were a long-ball team with a brutal approach to the game. Yes, there were some robust challenges that afternoon but this could be said of both sides — some of the Dons players weren't averse to 'mixing things up', to use a well-worn cliché, during the game.

Fast forward a month and to the William Hill Scottish Cup Fourth Round tie between the sides at Tynecastle, in front of the BBC cameras for live television broadcast. Aberdeen brought around 3,500 fans and they contributed to a cracking atmosphere as they always do. Perhaps the Aberdeen players were pumped up by this; it might explain their aggressive stance to the game right from kick-off — or it could be they felt the need to show Hearts they had a brutal side to their game.

In the first half Hearts played more of a passing game than has been evident in recent weeks. The visitors seemed to resort to long-ball tactics even though they had in their ranks, Johnny Hayes, who has the trickery of wing players of yesteryear who would bring fans to the edge of their seats. Moreover, Aberdeen were making some physical challenges of the sort they had condemned Hearts for last month. One incident involving Adam Rooney should have been punished by referee John Beaton but wasn't — giving the impression the referee was not entirely in control of what was going on.

Hearts scored in the second minute through the impressive Callum Paterson who, as well as his fine goal, was clearly not allowing himself to be intimidated by Aberdeen's tactics. The home side dominated the first half and the only note of concern for the Maroon Army at half-time was that their favourites only had one goal to show for their superiority. Robbie Neilson acknowledged after the game that his team need to learn how to kill teams off.

Although Aberdeen came more into the game in the second half, it was Hearts who still managed to create the better chances and who deservedly won the tie. Perhaps it was this that so annoyed Aberdeen manager Derek McInnes who vented his anger on some of the Hearts players at the final whistle — and also on Neilson who he accused of trying to get Dons player Graeme Shinnie yellow-carded. Conveniently, McInnes chose to overlook Shinnie's late lunge which incurred the wrath of the Hearts

bench as the Dons became ever more desperate.

The visitors dispensed with sporting integrity — what they had of it — in the final minutes when Hearts captain Alim Ozturk went down with cramp. The defender has only recently returned to the first team following a few weeks out through injury and, given the bruising nature of Saturday's game, it was understandable he was feeling its effects. Hearts keeper Neil Alexander booted the ball out of play to enable Ozturk to receive treatment. To his credit, the aforementioned Hayes was about to give the ball back to Hearts from the resultant throw-in — only for his manager to instruct him to ignore the accepted practice of immediately giving the ball back, much to the disgust of the home fans.

McInnes could not contain his anger after the game and criticised Hearts Spanish striker Juanma, Neilson and, yet again, Hearts approach to the game. Now, in the immediate aftermath of a game your side has just lost, emotions can run high. Aberdeen's exit from this season's Scottish Cup at the first time of asking — at the same stage they took their exit from the competition last season when McInnes said his team was by far the better team despite a 2-1 loss to Dundee — has seen their only realistic chance of silverware this campaign disappear. The loss of revenue from a cup run and the likelihood that attendances at Pittodrie will suffer until the end of the season will be all too apparent to the Aberdeen board of directors — and, unquestionably, to McInnes himself who may feel his job is less secure following his side's disappointing cup defeat.

However, the former Rangers player really should consider his words more carefully. His post-match comments at Tynecastle intimated Hearts had cheated to victory and had a reputation for it. This from a man whose team includes Peter Pawlett who has a reputation of his own for 'simulation' (diving to you and me) and was given a two game suspension from the SFA in 2011 for obtaining a penalty by unfair means against

Hibernian. It seemed to me on Saturday evening his behaviour hasn't changed much.

Three decades ago, during the Alex Ferguson era, Aberdeen were one of the best teams in Europe. They won every trophy going in Scotland as well as the (now defunct) European Cup Winners Cup in 1983.

My ten-year-old grandson Jack asked me why the Aberdeen fans threw toilet rolls on to the Tynecastle pitch on Saturday evening. I gave an admittedly sarcastic reply that this was something fans did generations ago and that Aberdeen fans were stuck in the past. That Aberdeen team of the 1980s didn't lose often but, if memory serves me well, when they did dignity was quite often posted missing.

Derek McInnes has shown he is now deep in the ethos of Aberdeen FC. Losing graciously is something that doesn't seem to happen in the Granite City.

Darren McGregor's delight at scoring Hibs' 1000th Scottish Cup goal

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Darren McGregor scored his first goal for Hibs during yesterday's 2-0 victory over Raith Rovers in the William Hill Scottish Cup Fourth Round and unbeknown to him, the strike entered the record books.

McGregor, who grew up in Leith as a Hibs' supporter made an immediate impact as a second half substitute but to him, the

most important aspect was ensuring that Hibs' name is in the hat for Monday's Scottish Cup draw.

Speaking after the game to Cliff Pike of Hibs TV he said: "When you come to places like this (Starks Park) it's difficult. They got men behind the ball and the surface wasn't great due to the rain, but we worked ourselves into the game pretty well and when I came on I got the goal which I was delighted with.

"Lewis (Stevenson) crossed it and I hit it first time and I am delighted to get the win and the gaffer said before the game the important thing us to be in the next round of the cup regardless of performance and obviously we have done that and we are looking forward to the next round.

The goal enters the record books as being the 1,000th goal for the Club in the competition and McGregor thinks this adds to the significance. He continued: "When I was told about it I was absolutely delighted about that. One of the guys just mentioned it so that obviously just adds icing to the cake to be honest.

"I said to the boys that hopefully it is one of more. I'd like to score more goals, whether it is a header or a right-footed volley it'll do. I timed my run pretty well, it was one of the ones where if I took a touch I'd have given it away. I hit it first time and it went in.

"I scored a couple last season. It's either hitting the target or someone in the crowd so I'm glad I hit the target. keeper may be a bit disappointed that the ball went under him but I think the pace maybe caught him off guard by me hitting it first time. As soon as I saw the defender missing the ball I thought 'Right this is getting hit."

Two police officers and teenager injured during incident in Morningside

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Two police officers and a teenager required hospital treatment following an incident in Morningside last night.

Police were called to the area after a report about a group of youths having set a fire in the area. The youths dispersed but one was apprehended and during a struggle it is understood that the officers and the youth fell through a shop window.

Morningside Road was closed for a period but has since reopened and enquires are ongoing into the circumstances.

A spokesman for Police Scotland said: "Police in Edinburgh responded to Morningside Road at around 8:40pm on Saturday, January 9, following a report of a group of youths having set a fire in the area.

"Upon police arrival, a group of youths ran off however officers apprehended a male in connection with their inquiries.

"The teenager struggled with the officers resulting in him sustaining an injury to his neck and he was taken by ambulance to the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh for treatment.

"Both officers were also taken to hospital for treatment after one sustained an injury to his leg and the other injured his arm. During the incident, the window of a local shop was smashed. "The road was closed while inquiries were carried out at the scene but reopened shortly after 10:15pm.

"An investigation into this matter is ongoing as police work to establish the full set of circumstances and anyone with relevant information is asked to contact 101."
