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Transport for Edinburgh is at last going to hold a trial for mobility scooters on trams.

The pilot scheme is a first in Scotland and will run in two parts; firstly inviting potential candidates to sign up to the scheme by applying for a permit, secondly inviting successful applicants to take their mobility vehicles on board.

Anyone who holds a valid Scottish National Entitlement Card (SNEC) or a Disabled Person's Blue Badge parking permit is invited to apply to the scheme by either visiting the dedicated web page edinburghtrams.com/access or in-store at any of Transport for Edinburgh's Travelshops (Waverley Bridge is the most accessible Travelshop).

Applicants will each have their mobility scooters assessed to

make sure it fits the specified criteria and those approved will be issued with a trial permit within 10 working days.

These permits, which will take the form of a pass, can then be used in the second phase of the trial starting on 1 January 2016.

Ian Craig, Chief Executive at Transport for Edinburgh, said: "Transport for Edinburgh has been working hard to make sure this trial is able to support as wide a range of mobility vehicle users as possible and we look forward to welcoming customers on board.

"To make sure passengers in Edinburgh receive the best possible service, we have drawn on the experiences of other UK tram providers who have already trialled this system and feel confident we are offering the best approach.

"I would encourage anyone who wishes to try out this service to get their applications in as soon as possible to ensure they have plenty of time to make use of these special circumstances."

The application phase is now open and will remain so over the course of the trial. Approved passengers will then be able to take their mobility vehicles on board from 1 January 2016 for an initial period of three months concluding on 31 March 2016.

John Ballantine, member at Edinburgh Access Panel, was involved in the consultation process ahead of the trial. He said: "Edinburgh Access Panel is delighted the carriage of mobility scooters on Edinburgh Trams is to be given a trial. We were pleased to be involved in the consultation regarding setting up the trial and are looking forward to mobility scooter users being able to take advantage of the tram to help them get around the city."

The trial is initially being rolled out across the Edinburgh Tram network, meanwhile research and investigations into

whether it may be extended for Lothian Buses are ongoing. Currently the variation in bus vehicle types and sizes means there may be increased limitations in what can be offered to passengers.

Hearts to Remain at Tynecastle — and Redevelop Main Stand



Hearts today delivered the news the majority of their supporters wanted to hear when they announced the club would be remaining at its spiritual home of Tynecastle and work would commence in the next few months on redeveloping the old 'Main Stand'.

At the club's AGM today, owner Ann Budge told shareholders that the club had completely outperformed its financial plan with turnover presently at over £7m.

Mrs Budge said "We are well ahead of our five year plan and our future looks good. We continue doing the right things and doing them well.

"We currently sit in third place in the Ladbrokes Scottish Premiership and as we have said, our target is to be in the top six this season.

"We won the Championship at the first time of asking and by a very handsome margin, the team continues to perform well and we have added some real quality players to our squad.

"Financially, we completely out performed our financial plan and our turnover has risen from £5,098m to £7,077 and a half million pounds improvement on the bottom line and this does not include the donations from the Foundation of Hearts.

"Having lost £994,000 previously our losses are down to £415,000 in the past year and we are well on the way to breaking even or better this season, again, ahead of our schedule."

Hearts have previously considered options regarding where the team should play with the old main stand at Tynecastle a major concern as it has long been considered not fit for purpose.

"In case anyone is still in doubt," Mrs Budge continued, "the Board has decided that Hearts future is here at Tynecastle. I am very confident that by this time next year we will be well down the road in terms of developing our new Main Stand.

"The first step in making this possible is, of course, to enlarge our footprint. We need more space.

"We are well on the way to securing the land that will make that possible — some land has already been purchased — the remainder is in the final stages of discussion.

"We have outline plans/design/building schedules; we have the backing of all of the key players. Our objective is to put the

Tynecastle area well and truly back on the map as an area of which all of Edinburgh can be proud.

"We will not be releasing any details until I am 100% sure all hurdles have been cleared but I expect to be able to unveil our plans within a couple of months.

"We are so proud of our new three year association with Save the Children and our introduction of the Living Wage at Tynecastle.

"Off the field we have very big plans for the coming months with the Main Stand at the forefront of those but next week we will open the stunning new Memorial Garden at Tynecastle and the club Museum is scheduled to open by the end of the season and the 1914 Memorial Trust bronze statue be unveiled in the spring. This season will also see the retail side of the Hearts come back into the club following a number of years as a franchise.

"In short we are very happy where we are and where we are going but we need our wonderful supporters to continue to support us in order to be able to achieve our targets."

During the Vladimir Romanov era at Hearts the club's AGMs and press conferences were sometimes of a pantomime nature. Thankfully, Ann Budge and her ambitious board of directors have restored dignity at Tynecastle. The future looks bright both on and off the field for a great club.

Underage drinking initiative hailed as a success

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An ongoing partnership initiative to tackle underage drinking and associated problems in the East of Edinburgh is being hailed as a success.

In July 2013, the East Edinburgh Community Alchohol Partnership was launched within the Portobello, Piershill and Craigentinny areas to educate the public on the impact of alcohol abuse on communities.

As part of the campaign, local officers have been working closely with partners in education, health, youth groups and

the retail sector to discuss the main factors for underage drinking and the subsequent consequences.

All of the agencies have also been focussing on how to reduce the access young people have to alcohol as well as promoting diversionary activities, which promote positive life choices.

Local licensed premises have played a crucial role by implementing their 'Challenge 25' policy and educating staff on responsible selling practices to deter proxy purchasing.

Police and partner agencies have also targeted schools within these regions to provide inputs to young people on the dangers linked to underage drinking and answering any questions or concerns they may have about this issue.

As a result of this activity, alcohol-related antisocial behaviour in East Edinburgh has fallen from 180 reports in 2013/14 to 148 reports in 2014/15. This is a reduction of almost 18%.

In addition, officers have also seen a significant decrease in the quantity of alcohol being seized from those under the age of 18.

In 2012/13, prior to the launch of the East Edinburgh CAP local policing teams were taking between eight and twelve litres of alcohol off young people each week. Now, only between one and three litres are being seized.

Chief Inspector Jimmy Jones, Local Area Commander for East Edinburgh said: "When we entered into this partnership scheme, our focus was on education. Not only the education of young people but the also the local community, including those responsible for the sale of alcohol.

"We wanted to demonstrate to everyone the real dangers young people can put themselves in if they consume and over-consume alcohol and I think that message has really hit home with many people.

"I am delighted to see that alcohol-related antisocial behaviour has fallen and that our officers are seizing less alcohol from those underage, but we will not become complacent.

"Enforcement activity will continue to identify those who continue to buy or sell alcohol to those under the age of 18 and our ongoing partnership work will look to further address the issue of underage drinking within East Edinburgh."

Derek Lewis, CAP Chairman added: "The rapid growth in the number of local CAPs launched in 2014 and 2015, is a welcome recognition of the need to achieve further reductions in underage drinking, a strong vote of confidence in the CAP model and a powerful demonstration of the effectiveness of local partnerships."

Rugby — Dollar v George Watsons, Brewin-Dolphin U18 Schools Cup Final

Watsons leave it until final minute to retain the title



This match was an entirely different affair — scoring wise — to the U16 match played earlier. In a match played at 100mph, both sides had an took several scoring chances and both had periods of being in the lead, However, it was the Edinburgh side who came out on top with a final seconds' penalty to secure their fourth U18 title in succession.

Right from the start, Watsons pressurised the Dollar defence and quickly gained territory inside the opposition 22. They lost the ball following a close-in ruck, but Harry Warr's clearance found the opposing full back, Callum Martin who ran in from 20 metres out to touch down in the corner. The kick was missed, but, after four minutes, Watsons were 5-0 to the good.

Dollar came straight back from the restart and, in a period of less than five minutes, won a succession of penalties — which might have seen at least one yellow higher up the ranks — finished the play with a 'held up' decision under the posts. However, the referee was playing advantage from the last of the 'penalties' allowing centre, Ben McIlwraith, to get the first points on the board for Dollar for 5-3.

The next 10 minutes of the match were played at tremendous pace with neither side being able to break down the other until the 20 minute mark when Martin finished off a move he had started inside his own half, with his and Watsons' second try. The missed conversion, however, saw the score remain at 10-3.

A minute later, Watsons' scrum half, Fraser Peters, broke a couple of tackles as he launched himself at the Dollar defence and into the 22. He was run down by his opposite number, Warr, but the Watsons' pack were soon in attendance and they mauled their way over the line, Michael Calder emerging with the ball for the try. This time Peters scored the conversion and the Edinburgh side were a healthy 17-3 ahead and looking like remaining Champions.

Dollar had other ideas, however and with less than three minutes played from Watsons' try, they scored their first. Winning ball off the top of a line out the pack repeated Watsons' effort a few minutes earlier and mauled their way to the line. Following a couple of recycles, it was stand-off, Grant Hughes who fired himself over the line to score. McIlwraith then followed up with the conversion to make the score 17-10 with 10 minutes of the half left.

Hughes then scored his second try for Dollar with less than a minute left before the break. Weathering another Watsons' storm, Dollar broke free up the right wing, but full back, Andrew Graham, was tackled into touch a couple of metres out. He'd released the ball before crossing the line, though and Dollar were able to capitalise on their position and, following another lineout, Hughes scored his second try. McIlwraith's second conversion also sailed through and the half time score was 17-17.

After the interval, the game continued where it had left off, with Dollar dominating proceedings. With Watsons on the defensive, Dollar lost the ball following a five metre lineout, but ran the clearance straight back, No. 7, Lachlan Peterson breaking through to score. McIlwraith's metronomic boot then saw the ball over for the extras and Dollar lead for the first time at 24-17.

A penalty exchange, first from Watsons, had the score at 27-20 with 15 minutes left to play, but neither side were looking like falling at the final hurdle.

Unfortunately, the final hurdle loomed for Dollar as Watsons scored a converted try with less than five minutes left. The pack had spent a fair period of time hammering away at — and being repulsed from — Dollar's try line, but something had to give and it was the defence as No. 5, Robbie Begg barrelled over for the score. Peters followed up with the conversion and, with less than three minutes left, it was 27-27 and another shared Cup loomed.

It wasn't to be and, taking advantage of a tiring defence, Watsons fired upfield from the restart in a repeat of the previous play, but this time it ended with that final second's penalty to end a fast and furious encounter 30-27 for Watsons' fourth consecutive title.

The two Brewin-Dolphin matches played on Wednesday night probably matched anything the BT Murrayfield faithful see on a Friday night for sheer thrill and excitement, aided and abetted by a hugely enthusiastic and supportive crowd.

At the National Museum in 2016



Ten new galleries will be unveiled at the National Museum of Scotland next summer and, in spring, two redeveloped aircraft hangars will open at the National Museum of Flight in East Fortune.

Meanwhile, a packed programme of exhibitions explores diverse themes from the secret world of primates in a major new family exhibition, *Monkey Business*, to the complex history of the peoples known as Celts, ground-breaking fossil discoveries and adventures in architecture with LEGO^O bricks.

Dr Gordon Rintoul, Director of National Museums Scotland, said: "2016 is a hugely significant year for us. It is especially fitting that dramatic new displays of our collections of science and technology, decorative art, design and fashion will be unveiled during the Year of Innovation, Architecture, and Design. We are also looking forward to unveiling a transformed visitor experience at the National Museum of Flight — already one of Europe's major aviation

museums — which will showcase our outstanding collections in new and exciting ways."

In summer 2016, ten new galleries will open at the National Museum of Scotland. Following a £14.1 million redevelopment, these will showcase over 3000 objects from National Museums Scotland's internationally important collections of science and technology, decorative art, design and fashion. A large proportion of the objects will not have been seen in public for generations, if at all. The new galleries will open in the 150th anniversary year of the opening of the original Victorian building in 1866. Exhibits will range from Dolly the sheep to a Picasso glass sculpture, a 2.5-tonne copper cavity from CERN to shoes by Alexander McQueen.

Two redeveloped hangars at the National Museum of Flight will be unveiled in spring 2016. The £3.6 million project involves the restoration of two nationally significant Second World War hangars at the Museum. New displays will dramatically present an array of world class military, commercial and leisure aircraft with interactives, film programmes and stories of those who piloted or flew in the aircraft.

Celts will open on 10 March 2016 at the National Museum of Scotland. This dramatic exhibition will tell the story of the different peoples who we call 'Celts' through the stunning objects they made, including intricately decorated jewellery, highly stylised objects of religious devotion. The exhibition also explores the enduring legacy of the 'Celts' in the decorative arts of the late 19th century. Organised with the British Museum and sponsored by Baillie Gifford, this is the first major British exhibition in 40 years to tell the story of the Celts. It will showcase rare objects on loan from 12 international lenders and 14 UK institutions.

Opening on 2 December 2016, *Monkey Business* is a major, family-friendly exhibition which explores the world of

primates, from the tiny mouse lemur to the mighty gorilla. It will feature more than 50 spectacular new taxidermy specimens created by National Museums' specialists, and skeletons of monkeys, apes, lemurs and bushbabies alongside a host of interactives, film, models and photography. Visitors can discover how different primates move and communicate, how they've developed tools to get hold of food and their complex social systems. It will also examine the relationship between humans and primates, including the ways in which many species are threatened with extinction through the impact of habitat loss and hunting.

Fossil Hunters: Unearthing the Mystery of Life on Land, opening on 19 February 2016, will explore the transition of life from water to land 360-340 million years ago, a gigantic evolutionary step without which humans would not exist today. The story of this transition has remained a mystery but can now be told using an internationally important collection of fossils from this period, recently discovered in Scotland. These offer a unique insight into a complete ecosystem which existed millions of years ago. Fossil Hunters will also tell the story of the extensive scientific research and fieldwork behind these remarkable Scottish discoveries.

Opening on 22 April 2016 at the National War Museum, *Life Support: Stories from the Royal Regiment of Scotland* marks the Regiment's first decade of operations. The exhibition will offer a fresh perspective on the combat and peacekeeping work of Scotland's infantry soldiers as well as the people, military and civilian, who make up their vital support network at home and on the frontline.

Build it! Adventures with LEGO^I Bricks is a series of events and activities taking place from 29 January to 17 April. On Wednesday and Fridays in February and March, visitors will have the chance to watch a large scale model of the National Museum of Scotland being built in the Grand Gallery, designed

by the renowned 'artist in LEGO[□] bricks', Warren Elsmore. During February half-term, families can help with an ambitious project to build one of the museum's most iconic objects on a giant scale. The programme of events will be supported by a small display of Warren's creations; model buildings, vehicles and other objects made with LEGO[□] bricks. Build It! Adventures with LEGO[□] Bricks is part of the Festival of Architecture 2016, which will celebrate Scotland's fantastic built environment, as a key part of the 2016 Year of Innovation, Architecture and Design celebrations.

The world famous *Wildlife Photographer of the Year* returns to the National Museum of Scotland on 16 September 2016 following its premiere at the Natural History Museum, London. From intimate portraits to layered motion stills, the award-winners offer startling visuals, compelling narratives, and a passion for the natural world.

A series of free exhibitions in the Grand Gallery will continue throughout the year on topics ranging from prehistoric alpine jade to twentieth century modernist jewellery. Details of these will be published next year.

The college won both the UK and International Student Engagement Awards at the Green Gown Awards in Bristol, beating competition from colleges and universities across the UK and the rest of the world.

And the college's electric vehicle project won a Highly Commended Facilities and Services Award.

The Green Gown awards recognise sustainability initiatives by universities, colleges and the learning and skills sectors

across the UK, and are organised by the Environmental Association for Universities and Colleges (EAUC).

Edinburgh College was the only college up for the UK Student Engagement award, and the community garden project won against schemes from eight UK universities. The community garden team topped the evening with the International Green Gown Student Engagement Award, competing against educational institutes from the UK, Australasia, French speaking Europe and Canada.

The college's Sustainability team has developed the college's two community gardens as a valuable teaching resource since the introduction of the first as a student-led project at its Milton Road Campus in 2012. A second garden was launched at Sighthill Campus in 2014 and they now provide learning and participation opportunities for more than 250 people including students, staff and local community members and groups.

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The gardens have helped students, including those with additional learning needs, develop knowledge and skills in gardening and sustainability, and increased their confidence and employability.

Séverine Monvoisin, community garden coordinator, said: "These awards recognise the hard work done by our volunteer team, who selflessly give their time to keep the garden going. For many of our users the gardens represent much more than a space to grow food. They are a space to learn about healthy living, gain new skills and build self-confidence and self-esteem as well as increasing employability, promoting sustainable behaviours and helping make new friends. We were surprised and delighted to get the international award in recognition of the value of the gardens to sustainability and community."

There are now plans to plant four orchards at the college campuses thanks to a donation from Coffee Conscience and Commonwealth Orchards. The first of these was planted at Midlothian Campus in March.

The college's electric car project was also highly commended in the Facilities and Services category. The college has been operating a fleet of electric cars since its inception in late 2012 to provide staff with a sustainable transport option for travel between its four campuses and other corporate travel.

The cars are integrated with the curriculum, offering students on Engineering, Automotive and Electrical courses experience of working with the technology.

Earlier this year the college's electric vehicle administrator Bob Murphy won the GreenFleet Public Sector Fleet Manager of the Year award.

The college was also shortlisted for the Green Gowns Carbon Reduction Award for the Carbon Management Plan which has at its heart a target of 18% minimum reduction by 2020.

Council declares its buildings and parks smoke free



Smoking will no longer be permitted in play parks, car parks and courtyards, as well as in Council premises, as the new Smoke Free Policy comes into force.

The updated policy, which replaces the Council's Control of Smoking at Work Policy, aims to create a safer, healthier environment.

Under the policy, smoking restrictions have been extended from the workplace and vehicles to surrounding areas for Council properties, including entrances, car parks and playgrounds in addition to other outdoor spaces under the Council's jurisdiction and used by children, such as play parks.

Today, Victoria Primary School pupil Cameron MacPherson, 10, helped launch the new policy with his prize-winning 'No Smoking' sign, which has been attached to the railing at his school.

Cameron's design won a competition run across the city's schools, and will now be displayed in playgrounds and play parks around Edinburgh to deter smoking.

Council Leader, Councillor Andrew Burns, said: "It is well known that smoking is one of the biggest causes of ill health in Scotland. As a local authority, we recognise our role in helping to achieve Scotland's smoke-free ambitions set out by the Scotlish Government.

"The updated policy takes into account the effect passive smoking has on non-smokers, in particular children, who have no choice when it comes to protection from others' tobacco smoke."

As well as extending smoking restrictions to areas surrounding Council premises, under the new policy, smoking restrictions may also be applied at outdoor family events organised by the Council.

Restrictions will apply to the use of e-cigarettes (vapourisers), which will be treated the same in the same way as cigarettes and other tobacco products.

The policy responds to the Scottish Government's document 'Creating a Tobacco-Free Generation — A Tobacco Control

<u>Strategy for Scotland</u>', which calls for Local Authorities to extend smoking restrictions to surrounding grounds and outdoor areas within their jurisdiction, focusing on spaces frequented by children, by 2015.

It is widely recognised that smoking is the largest single cause of serious ill health and premature death in Scotland. Similarly, the effects of people breathing in other people's smoke — passive smoking — have emerged as an important health concern.

Phil Gormley QPM appointed Chief Constable of Police Scotland



Phil Gormley QPM, the Deputy Director General of the UK's National Crime Agency has been appointed by the Scottish Police Authority (SPA) as the next Chief Constable of Police Scotland. He will take up the post on 5 January 2016.

The appointment was made on the recommendation of the SPA and was approved by Scottish Ministers.

Mr Gormley said: "I am delighted to have this opportunity to serve the many communities of Scotland as their Chief Constable. I believe I have the skills, the experience, and the insight required to lead the amazing workforce we have across Police Scotland. I have a 30 year career in policing and law enforcement, the last 13 years as a chief officer leading organisations delivering for the public in a period of profound transformation for policing. Police Scotland is on just such a journey and it will be my job to ensure our service strikes the right balance between local community approaches, and the many challenges we face from organised criminals, cybercrime and extremism. I am very excited and passionate about this unique professional and personal challenge, and I am looking forward to getting to work with my new team."

Announcing the appointment, SPA Chair Andrew Flanagan said: "The SPA has appointed Phil Gormley as the next Chief Constable of Police Scotland, following a rigorous appointment process. From a strong field, I am confident we have found the best candidate to build on the progress that policing in Scotland has made, and to address the issues and challenges that the service faces.

"He has extensive experience in leading law enforcement organisations with diverse workforces, operating across both rural and urban environments, and with local, national and international reach. That mix fits well with the needs of a single service here in Scotland.

"The new Chief Constable has challenges he will want to quickly address: re-engaging our workforce, tackling budget challenges, and bringing stability to the planning and implementation of organisational change.

Exhibition featuring the

Italian community in Scotland opens tomorrow

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National Records of Scotland are to exhibit for the first time a whole archive about the Italians in Scotland never seen before now. The documents include a census of the Italians living in Scotland in the 1930s which may the only set of its kind in existence.

The 'Censimento', ordered by Mussolini's government 1933-1940 details 1,400 households and reveals a picture of specialist shopkeepers and skilled craftspeople living and working across Scotland who maintained strong connections to Italy. The fragile census returns have been painstakingly restored by the conservation department of National Records of Scotland and digitally imaged for future public access.

The free exhibition teams the newly-restored documents with personal keepsakes loaned by Scots Italian families in Scotland, and literally puts the Scots Italians of the 1930s on the map through specially created graphics produced by the National Library of Scotland. Historical photographs from the era are complemented by a documentary project featuring contemporary Scots Italians and the landscape of Scotland by Lorenzo Colantoni and Riccardo Venturi.

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Lorenzo Colantoni commented: "Travelling from the crowd of the Fringe, to the absolute silence of Orkney, and then back through the Highlands and the West Coast, we have found an incredible variety of stories, with such a deep and constant connection with Italy and the Italian culture that most people would not expect. This is one of the reasons why we are extremely happy with our project, and with the chance offered

by the event to present it in Edinburgh for the first time."

The exhibition is the culmination of a collaborative project between the Italian Government and National Records of Scotland to conserve the special registers for public access and was created in partnership with the Consulate General of Italy in Scotland.



Invaluable support from the Italian Cultural Institute in Edinburgh, the Italo-Scottish Research Cluster at Edinburgh University, the National Library of Scotland and the Transnationalizing Modern Languages Project has made this exhibition possible.

The exhibition at General Register House, 2 Princes Street, Edinburgh EH1 3YY, runs from 3 December 2015 until 29 January 2016 (closed 25^{th} & 28^{th} December, 1^{st} & 4^{th} January) August, Monday — Friday, 9.00-4.30.

Cabinet Secretary for Culture and External Affairs, Fiona Hyslop, said:

"This exhibition is a great opportunity for people to learn more about some of the close ties between Scotland and Italy. The story of the Scots Italians is one of amazing continuity and vitality, and their contribution to the life of Scotland is to be celebrated."

Italian Ambassador, H.E. Pasquale Terracciano, said:

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The Old Town's network of closes and wynds are a key element of the city's World Heritage status, and date back to the medieval beginnings of the city. Today there are still 74 closes, forming an integral part of the fabric of the Old Town, and home to residents, businesses and many city institutions. There is to be a new project involving lighting and art to bring the closes back into use. There is a common perception that these are unloved and unsafe places and the Edinburgh World Heritage project aims to change that. The photos here are from the exhibition evening held last week at Bakehouse Close.

Adam Wilkinson, Director of Edinburgh World Heritage said: "Historically the closes were the secondary routes through the medieval city, however they have long been underused and in some cases neglected spaces. We hope that with the help of residents, students, artists, local businesses and the City of Edinburgh's street lighting and neighbourhood teams we will be able to create something of beauty and enchantment in the closes. We hope to encourage people to explore these neglected historical spaces, improving the quality of the spaces for the residents, and supporting businesses by encouraging footfall".

Councillor Ian Perry, Planning Convener for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "The improvements to the closes are a

key part of the Royal Mile Action Plan. However, many visitors may be unaware that these unique aspects of the city's history are there to be explored. This project is a great way to showcase the closes using new lighting techniques. Council planners and lighting staff have been working with Edinburgh World Heritage and we are pleased to continue our support for this impressive project."

Sean Bradley of the Edinburgh Old Town Development Trust said: "It is good news that Edinburgh World Heritage is instigating improvements to selected Old Town closes. Essential to the character of the place, these are also important pedestrian thoroughfares and we look forward to getting residents and others who make daily use of them involved in the project."

The final selection of closes is still under discussion, but the current shortlist includes Riddle's Close, Crichton's Close, Stevenlaw's Close, Fleshmarket Close, Carruber's Close, and Bakehouse Close.

The main funding for the project will come from Edinburgh World Heritage. Grants, sponsorship from local businesses and public donations, as well as contributions from the City of Edinburgh Council and other partners, will match the EWH budget of £190,000 to complete the project. EWH will be working in partnership with Edinburgh Napier University and the Edinburgh Old Town Development Trust in delivering the project.

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'Yogi' extends contract at Inverness until 2018



John 'Yogi' Hughes has signed a new two year contract with Inverness Caledonian Thistle FC, taking him through to the summer of 2018.

Club chairman Kenny Cameron said: "It's extremely pleasing that, having offered John the job two years ago and seen his selection fully vindicated, we've now persuaded him to put pen to paper through to the summer of 2018."

"We're happy to thus ensure that our management team are in place for the longer term. Continuity is vital for a club of our stature and we'll be working closely with John to come to contract agreements with players who are willing to commit to continuing this club's journey."

He continued: "This season has seen the club's worst ever injury crisis but players are now returning to fitness and available for selection so we go into the New Year in a much healthier situation and looking to regain momentum."

Museum Lates: Victorian Sensation

Well, the Museum Lates this time came with a Victorian twist, albeit elements of steampunk and selfies to drag it right up to the present day. With a lecture on tattoos, mindfulness, colouring in of Victorian street-scenes and music from both female-led Glasgow bands, Honeyblood and BDY_PRTS there was a tongue-in-cheek poke at the Victorian era with this event.

Ostentatious attire and grand accessories were worn by most for this frenzied event, leaving those who had made a margin of an effort to queue for three hours to dress up and pose in their own Victorian photograph on site. Otherwise, top-hat making workshops were on hand as was a Victorian sing-a-long to lure the residents of this fine city back into a deceptive age of refined sensibilities.

The exhibition, *Photography: A Victorian Sensation*, was open to certain ticket-buyers so there was enough to keep the audience entertained on top of all of the abnormal activity. Entertainment on offer included Dr Matt Lodder revealing the secret history of tattoos, magician Luke Eaton, and tastings from Edinburgh Gin at a stand, in Hawthornden Court, which of course was much in demand.

The Red Door Gallery provided Victorian-themed crafting opportunities, whilst actors adorned the building, giving the late-night vagabonds of Edinburgh's culture scene the rare opportunity to simply explore the galleries of the National Museum of Scotland by night.

Despite being as far from the Victorian age as the night could be, the most intriguing and entertaining element of the evening came with an introduction from Radio Scotland's Vic Galloway.

BDY_PRTS, comprising of Jill O'Sullivan (of Sparrow and the Workshop), Jenny Reeve (known mostly for her work with Admiral Fallow) and Jonny Scott, is a neon, electro-pop, choreographed affair.

They held the attention of the crowd, if not just primarily for their outrageously shocking pink and yellow skin-tight leotards. Singing tracks such as Cold Shoulder, Warrior and Breathe, incorporating coordinated dance into their routine, a trademark of these Glasgow ladies, we were by then very far removed from any notions of a Victorian sensation, but that

was not to its discredit.

The Victorian theme complemented the <u>Museum's</u> exhibition, Photography: A Victorian Sensation, which closed on 22 November 2015.

Single lane traffic on Forth Bridge on Wednesday



On Wednesday morning the Forth Bridge will be reduced to single lane traffic in each direction to allow for a further detailed inspection to be carried out below the southbound roadway. It appears that a defect has been discovered in the steel structure there.

This is what the Forth Road Bridge say on their website:

Traffic on the Forth Road Bridge is temporarily restricted to a single lane in each direction pending the outcome of a detailed inspection following the discovery of a defect to a steel component beneath the southbound carriageway. This was found during routine planned inspection and a closure is required to ensure a full detailed inspection can be undertaken.

Engineers and specialists will undertake a detailed inspection on Wednesday morning at first daylight, the outcome of which will inform decisions on whether any further restrictions are required. A contraflow will be put in place on the northbound carriageway on Tuesday night on the grounds

of safety and to prevent any risk of damage until the detailed inspection has been undertaken.

Mark Arndt, Operating Company Representative, said: "We've taken the decision to close the southbound carriageway as a safety precaution after one of our engineers spotted a new defect to a piece of steelwork.

"Unfortunately this defect is located in a particularly hard to access area so the full detailed inspection cannot safely be carried out in darkness or during high winds. Our inspectors will however be monitoring the situation overnight and we will be ready to move in as soon as conditions allow.

"We apologise for the short notice to these essential traffic restrictions and are aware that they will result in very long delays, so our advice is to avoid Forth Road Bridge and divert via Kincardine or the A9 and M9, use public transport or travel outwith peak times. We do sympathise with all drivers who face delays, however I'm sure everyone appreciates that safety must come first."

"We'll provide further updates once our investigation is complete and we have information to share."
