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## Police appeal for help in tracing man missing from West Port

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An 18 year-old man was last seen on Lady Lawson Street at around 6 o'clock in the morning and Edinburgh Police are now appealing for help in tracing him.

From there he travelled to Waverley Station where he boarded the 6:55am train bound for King's Cross Station in London. He carried a blue rucksack and holdall however it is not clear at this stage whether Peter went to London or disembarked at an earlier stop.

He has not been in touch with family or friends and police are now seeking the assistance of the public.

Peter is described as white, 6ft tall, slim build, pale complexion, brown hair, which has a slight wave and is normally swept to the side. At the time of his disappearance he wore a dark blue hooded top with white and red writing on the front and a red/burgundy T-shirt underneath.

An extensive investigation is now underway in an effort to trace the teenager as quickly as possible.

Inspector David Cuthbert who is leading the investigation said: "Peter's disappearance is completely out of character and we are concerned for his wellbeing.

"His family are obviously worried and we are doing everything we can to support them at this difficult time and to find Peter as quickly as possible.

"A thorough and robust investigation is underway utilising a number of specialist Police Scotland resources and I am now appealing to the public for their help.

"We are keen to hear from anyone who might have spoken to Peter on the train or who remembers seeing him. Those with relevant information are asked to contact police immediately on 101 or speak to any officer.

"I also appeal to Peter directly to please contact police or a family member to let us know that you are safe."

### New restaurants signed up for South St Andrew Square

There are six restaurants in the development being built on the south side of St Andrew Square, and Standard Life has announced the names of three more coming to Edinburgh just as soon as their spaces are ready.

■ New York contemporary steakhouse and lounge concept **STK Rebel**, plus barbecue lobster shack **Big Easy** and Bombay style café **Dishoom** will all be opening their first restaurants outside of London. The three restaurants will join previously announced names — Drake & Morgan plus Busaba Earthai — to create a new leisure quarter in the city.

STK Rebel has agreed to a 25-year lease on a 7,150 sq ft unit in South St Andrew Square, on two floors. STK is The ONE Group's signature brand, known for its vibe dining, loungelike décor and resident DJ. The company chose Edinburgh for its first European STK Rebel restaurant, to complement recently announced Rebel locations in Denver, Austin, Miami and San Diego.

Barbecue and lobster shack, Big Easy, has signed on a 8,770 sq ft unit fronting on to St Andrew Square. The restaurant first opened on London's Kings Road in 1993, inspired by the 19th century crab shacks and barbecue of the American gulf coast. It offers live music, a friendly atmosphere and hearty portions.

Bombay-style café, Dishoom is taking a 6,800 sq ft unit also facing the square. Dishoom serves Bombay breakfast, lunch, afternoon chai, plus dinner and tipples based on the legendary all day cafés of Bombay which were started in the early 1900s by Zoroastrian immigrants from Iran.

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David Stewart, Fund Manager of the Standard Life Investments Pooled Pension Property Fund said:

"These lettings demonstrate the strong appeal of the South St Andrew Square development and Edinburgh as a destination for international restaurants as they look to expand outside of London. We're confident South St Andrew Square will become the prime destination for top quality dining in Edinburgh."

## Foodies Festival – Edinburgh Christmas

The EICC is a great Edinburgh venue, but in the case of the Foodies Festival which we visited there today we feel that we had a better time at Inverleith Park a couple of years back. In the summer as an outdoors event, it was hit by the vagaries of the Scottish weather, but our last visit was bathed in sunshine and full of good memories.

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I received a couple of complimentary VIP tickets from the organisers and thought this would mean a real VIP experience. I think if I had paid £38 for a VIP ticket rather than just £15 entry I might have felt just a little short-changed, and certainly some murmuring from fellow guests in the VIP lounge indicated that they felt the same way. What the add-on price offers is a glass of champagne and use of a room well away from everything else. It also offers complimentary entry to the drinks demos, but the cakes and chef areas are already free. There is also a goody bag for you to take home.

This is not to say it was all bad, just a bit cramped and too busy in the main areas, so if you are planning a visit on Sunday you might be best to go either early or late! Doors open at 10 with the first chef's demonstration at 10.30 by Fraser Allen from Pompadour by Galvin Brothers.

I very much enjoyed the demonstration by Scott Davies from the Three Chimneys on Skye who cooked duck with Three Chimneys marmalade and Christmas spices. Clearly at home in the kitchen his experience belied his youth at only 29. He has recently taken over at the Three Chimneys on their 30th anniversary, and is only the third Head Chef in three decades.

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Before that we caught the tailend of Tony Rodd's cooking demonstration. He was a Masterchef finalist earlier this year and had set about cooking wood pigeon with winter vegetables (even though he admitted it was actually partridge…!) Entertaining and accomplished he promised to come back to Edinburgh soon with his supper clubs.

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Part of the issue earlier on in the day was the lack of room in the main hall, where many vendors had food on offer but the queues were off-putting.

And had I known that there was another hall with other stalls then I would of course be able to give you a fuller report on the event. There was little signage to suggest more exhibitors, so be aware that you can go left or right at the bottom of the escalator!

In the main hall there was music on the main stage to keep you entertained while browsing the many gins, sausages and kitchen implements on display, and there are cooking classes for children. We came home with a new cast iron pan which promises a lifetime guarantee and that nothing will ever stick to it. Will keep you advised on that one!

It is a pity there is no wifi on offer at the EICC for anyone attending. I know that the wifi there is excellent – so excellent we were able to live broadcast the UK General Election results from the same room earlier this year. Wifi would certainly have made up for lack of phone coverage in the basement of the EICC.

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## Rugby — Edinburgh v Grenoble, European Rugby Challenge Cup

Edinburgh open their European account with a fine win

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Friday night saw Edinburgh play the first match of their 2015-16 European Rugby Challenge Cup campaign. Last season's losing finalists were playing against FC Grenoble Rugby at BT Murrayfield in challenging — to say the least — conditions with an eye on the fact that they had lost their last three games in the PR012 league.

An early indication of how things were stacking up was the virtual destruction of the Grenoble scrum at the first encounter, giving the hosts a platform to build on for the first score. Seven minutes in and a lineout in the opposition 22 gave Edinburgh an early attacking drive, setting up a maul and heaving the Grenoble pack back over their goal line, Cornell du Preez touching down for the try – although confirmation took a good few minutes and, following Sam Hidalgo-Clyne's wayward attempt at goal, a 5-0 lead.

With the weather taking a turn for the worse the next 20, or so, minutes were mostly played in Grenoble's territory, but the wet ball did nothing to enhance the handling experience for either side. However, the almost complete dominance of the home scrum was beginning to make itself felt and, 29 minutes in, Grenoble flanker, Fabien Alexandre was carded for foul play at the breakdown.

This was Edinburgh's chance to increase the score with the pack coming to the fore and winning a penalty on 33 minutes for Hidalgo-Clyne to slot home for 8-0. He then scored his second following another dominant passage of play just on the half time mark to go into the break 11-0 ahead.

Four minutes into the second half and Hidalgo-Clyne added another three points for 14-0. Grenoble came back at the home side, showing a degree of attacking flair missing from the first half and won a penalty in the Edinburgh 22. Choosing to go to the line, the resultant maul won them penalty advantage which was pulled back when Hidalgo-Clyne was forced to touch down over his own try line to give Grenoble a chance to close the gap.

They went for the kick and scrum half, James Hart, knocked the ball over and put their first points on the board for 14-3.

Edinburgh then put in a fine period of play, initiated by a lone break from Dougie Fife deep into the visitors' half. He

was turned over, but Grenoble were now on the defensive and were forced to kick from deep on a number of occasions.

Edinburgh's next score came courtesy of referee, Ben Whitehouse. Winning a scrum five metres from the Grenoble line, Edinburgh's pack set about crushing the opposition and, given little option from the resultant mayhem, Whitehouse marched over the beneath the posts to award the score. Hidalgo-Clyne slotted the conversion home to see the hosts 21-3 ahead with 20 minutes left to play.

Just before the 70 minute mark another Grenoble player, Martino Nemani, was shown yellow for foul play, but his apparent refusal to immediately leave the field saw him 'promoted' to a red – football take note! – and see out the rest of the match from the dugout.

With 70 minutes showing on the four, massive, clocks (I missed seeing them for the first 10 minutes! – JP), Hoyland broke clear and weaved his way upfield. However, his offload from the tackle was fumbled by Fife, giving possession back to the visitors. They cleared, but the ball came straight back via du Preez, but Sean Kennedy's pass from the back of the ruck was juggled and kicked about by his team mates. The ball ended up in the hands of Grenoble's winger, Daniel Kilioni who went the length of the pitch, chased by Hoyland, to score a try for the visitors, converted by Hart, to take them up to 10 points and a 21-10 score line.

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This didn't, fortunately, turn out to be an omen and just before the end of play, Edinburgh were once again on the visitors' try line. A kick through from Tonks was ushered over the sideline by Grenoble, setting up a final minute's attack by Edinburgh. Quick lineout ball, followed by a quick recycle left du Preez with a gap to slot through for his second try of the night — and Man-of-the-Match — to seal the win. HidalgoClyne then took ages over the kick to see the clock over the 80 minutes before kicking the easy conversion and to give Edinburgh a fine campaign- opening 28-10 win.

Oh yes it can — and there you were thinking it was all about books. And you'd be right of course — it is, very much so but this year the **Scottish Book Trust** is looking at writing from all angles, with events for everyone from traditional readers (me..) to those who like their entertainment a little edgier.

Book Week Scotland runs 23-29 November 2015 and here are some local highlights:-

#### Alan Bissett In Conversation

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Ranked as The 46th Hottest Man in Scotland by *The Daily Record* in 2008 (make of that what you will...), Alan Bissett is a male author, who wrote and performed a one woman show. He sprang onto the Scottish literary scene in 2001 with the zeitgeistbusting *Boyracers*, a Scottish novel about being young, naive, and getting taken on a sinister adventure. Later novels include *Death of a Ladies Man*, and *Pack Men* – a novel which, in the words of *The Guardian*, 'casts an unsparing eye over the sectarian pollution of Scottish society.'


Bissett, who is originally from Falkirk, is also a performer and a former teacher of Creative Writing at Leeds and Glasgow Universities; he works extensively with schools, especially senior secondary age pupils. His play **The Pure, The Dead and The Brilliant**, was endorsed by fellow author **Irvine Welsh** – in spite of Alan's assertion in *Death of a Ladies Man* that 'trainspotting was wrong.' Bissett is a contemporary Scottish writer and a chronicler of one of the most exciting times in Scottish History, the 2014 Scottish Referendum. He once tried to read *War and Peace*, but the internet got in the way.

This event forms part of the **Pentlands Book Festival** and will take place at <u>Currie Library</u>, 210 Lanark Road West, at **3.30pm on Thursday 26th November 2015.** It's *free*, but as capacity is limited to 50 people <u>you do need to book</u>, and you can do so via eventbrite <u>here</u>.

#### This is Edinburgh wins big!

Eight men have been jailed for housebreaking offences in Edinburgh after being arrested during the successful initiative, Operation RAC.

Numerous properties throughout the city, particularly in the West, were broken into over the past year and various items of property were taken from within.

Dedicated Operation RAC officers investigated each of these incidents and as a result all of the men were detained and subsequently charged.

Over the past two weeks each of them has since been given prison sentences at court.

Nicholas Briggs (33) was sentenced to 36 months on the 4th November, while Christopher Horne (28) was given 17-months.

Paul Ness (42) appeared in court on Tuesday 10th November and was jailed for six months.

On Thursday 12th November three men — Robbie McLeood, Ryan Duddy and Adam Birrell were all given various sentences in court.

Mcleod (21) and Duddy (26) were both given 10 months in prison, while Birrell (20) was sentenced to 36 months.

Daniel Ross (19) and Daniel Lawrence (20) both appeared yesterday, where Lawrence was sentenced to two years and three months in jail and Ross received a sentence of three years and five months.

Detective Sergeant Bob Campbell from Operation RAC said: "Housebreaking is Edinburgh Division's top priority and through Operation RAC we have regularly targeted acquisitive crime offenders and brought them to justice for their crimes.

"These sentences send a clear message that housebreaking will not be tolerated in the city and we work closely with our partners at the Crown Office to secure significant prison sentences for those found to be involved.

"I would urge anyone who has information relating to those responsible for these sort of offences to contact us on 101 or alternatively make an anonymous report to the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

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The council has a couple of decisions to take about Edinburgh Trams next week.

The first is just a noting exercise in that the <u>council has to</u> <u>respond to the Chairman of the Edinburgh Trams Inquiry</u> following his comments published on the Inquiry website, and his demand that the council revives Edinburgh Trams company **tie**.

The second however is more fundamental. It is the recommendation that the council signs off more spending, inching towards the big decision to spend £144million on the extension of the trams to Newhaven. <u>Read more on this here.</u>

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The Council Leader Andrew Burns has issued his monthly Leader's Report and uses it to remind you to contribute to the Budget Consultation:

"We are now midway through this year's <u>budget</u> <u>consultation</u> and I would like to thank the hundreds of you of who have already taken the time to have your say. If you haven't, there's still plenty of time to do so – the consultation runs until 10 December.

"As part of this, and following the success of last year's event, we are running another <u>Budget Question Time</u> on 23 November in the City Chambers. This is designed to give you the opportunity to quiz our panel of senior councillors on the Council's budget proposals for next year and beyond.

"The proceedings will be chaired by Scotsman and Evening News Managing Editor, Frank O'Donnell, and broadcast live via the Council website.

"If you would like to put a question to the panel, or just come along and be part of the audience, please <u>register</u> <u>online</u> by next Thursday, 19 November. We are allocating places on a first come, first served basis." The Edinburgh Diwali Committee was constituted on behalf of The Lord Provost of the City of Edinburgh to organise Diwali the famous Indian Festival of Lights, and it will take place next weekend.

For first time the public event will be open to everyone at the Ross Band Stand in Princes Street Gardens from 12 noon till 7:00 pm.

The President Mohindra Dhall MBE told The Edinburgh Reporter: "We are organising art workshops where children will be making Diwali Lanterns for first time in Edinburgh. These will be lit up with LED lights in the Marquee which will be built at The Ross Theatre.

There will be Bollywood as well as Indian Classical dances like Bharatnatyam and Kathak.

Students from Mary Erskine and Stewart's Melville College will perform Highland Dances with bagpipe music.

Dancers from Ceilidh Meetup will organise a Ceilidh on the Bella McNab Ceilidh Band.

## John Lewis step aside to allow St James Quarter to

### proceed

The biggest development in the city centre for some time can now make real progress in the spring of next year.

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John Lewis withdrew their objection lodged within the planning process clearing the way for the first demolitions. The £850m St James Quarter development at the top of Leith Walk will include houses and shops.

This was the last objection in the way of the development beginning. It also means that John Lewis will be the only tenant left in any of the buildings there, as the rest will be torn down to make way for the new development.

The project is not without its very vocal critics mainly due to the design for the hotel which many have christened the 'walnut whip', while others have called it something far worse.

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The aim is to complete the shops by 2020 and the remaining leisure and residential elements by the following year. Whether or not the hotel in the development ends up looking like the visual produced for the developers we will have to wait and see, but it cannot look worse than the monolith which is there right now can it?

Councillors are asked at the full council meeting next week to delegate authority to the Chief Executive to progress the paperwork, and sell off an area of land at Picardy Place no longer needed. The Chief Executive will also be given powers to finalise a second compulsory purchase order which may be required in order to sweep up any areas which the developer or the council do not already own. Some 'common good land' is included in the development area following approval by the Court of Session earlier this year.

This means that the council will then be free at the appropriate time to enter into the borrowing procedures as agreed in May 2014. The financing of the infrastructure around the development is to be arranged through an innovative financial model involving the council, The Scottish Government and the developer resulting in the council borrowing £61.4m largely dependent on future council tax revenue.

The mixed use development was given <u>approval in principle</u> in 2009 and all necessary bits of land have now been compulsorily purchased at the developer's expense.

The new development promises 1000 jobs when complete, but also promises other jobs during the construction phase.

John Lewis will be the only store left standing during the development phase and while this paints a lonely picture it is hailed as good news by all concerned. The flagship store is a <u>central pin</u> in the Edinburgh St James development.

Council Leader Andrew Burns said: "It is great news for the city that John Lewis, one of Edinburgh's best-loved retailers, will form part of the fantastic new development and will continue to trade throughout the construction period. The Council has monitored this situation closely.

"The new St James will transform the area at the east end of Princes Street, create thousands of permanent jobs and add £25 million to the Scottish economy each year."

## League Cup semi-final to be held at Tynecastle

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The semi final of the Scottish League Cup presented by Utilita between Hibs and St Johnstone will be played at Tynecastle Stadium on Saturday 30 January (kick-off 3pm).

The match is a repeat of the 2007 League Cup semi final, where Hibs ran out 3-1 winners on the way to winning the trophy.

A poll on Hibs.net indicated that around 60% of fans wanted the game to be played at Tynecastle rather than Hampden Park.

Full ticket information will be announced in due course.

As a result Hibs' Ladbrokes Championship match with Morton, originally scheduled for Saturday 30 January, will be rescheduled.

## Lothian MSP calls on Holyrood to take action on housing shortage

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Lothian MSP Sarah Boyack and Scottish Labour candidate for Edinburgh Central, today called on The Scottish Government to do more to tackle the housing shortage in Edinburgh and the Lothians, as its own figures show that rents in the city are up 6.4% on last year.

The average rental cost for a 2 bedroom property is now £829, compared to just £560 in West Lothian and £669 in Glasgow.

Sarah Boyack said today: "Private rented sector tenants in Edinburgh are being particularly badly hit by the housing shortage. Not only are rents increasing well beyond the means of most families, but any properties which do come on the market are being snapped up in a matter of days. Since 2010 rents have risen by an eye-watering 25% and the first £10,000 you earn each year goes straight to your landlord.

"Young adults starting their careers, families struggling to get affordable accommodation and people without children are the groups most likely to rent from the private sector and are already being hit hard by benefits cuts and slow youth employment. Trapped by high house prices and high rents they spend more and more of their income on expensive, cold homes each year.

"Edinburgh needs more affordable housing supported by the Scottish Government and action in hotspots to tackle rip off rent rises. Scottish Labour's proposals for rent caps were voted down by the SNP and Conservatives, costing tenants hundreds of pounds in rent.

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# Woman robbed of mobile phone in Eyre Crescent

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Police are appealing for witnesses after a woman was robbed around 11:30pm on Tuesday evening.

The 26-year-old was walking alone on Eyre Place, heading in the direction of Broughton Road when she became aware of a man walking closely behind her.

Moments later he pushed the woman and grabbed the phone out of her hand before running off.

Officers are now carrying out various lines of inquiry in an effort to trace the unknown male and are now seeking the assistance of the public.

The male is described as white, between 20-30 years-old, around 5ft 9ins tall and with a medium build.

Detective Constable Alison Wyllie said: "Fortunately the woman did not sustain injury but she has been left shaken by this incident.

"I ask anyone who was in the area around the time of this robbery and who has information that might assist with our ongoing inquiry to contact police immediately on 101 or, alternatively the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

# Police make 100 drug related and anti social behaviour arrests

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Police have made 100 arrests as part of an ongoing initiative to tackle drug related anti-social behaviour.

Operation Austinburg was set up at the end of the summer in

response to complaints from local residents and businesses in the Southside of the City.

Throughout autumn additional officers and Council Environmental Wardens have been on patrol in the area targeting common stairs and other areas where drug use has been occurring.

The activity carried out as part of the operation to date has involved around 2000 disruption visits to stairs and public areas to deter drug use as well as five intelligence-led searches of properties in Potterow, Nicolson Street, Upper Grey Street and Dumbiedykes where information relating to drugs distribution had been received.

Officers also seized £15,000 worth of drugs from the streets during enforcement activity directed at around 80 individuals throughout South Edinburgh.

Chief Inspector Mark Rennie, Area Commander for South Edinburgh said: "Our activity on the ground to tackle drug misuse and street dealing is having a real impact.

"Officers are out on foot patrol targeting the problem on a daily basis and we've received excellent support from the Council's Community Safety team to address security and access issues identified

"The operation also coincides with the strategic level activity carried out by Police Scotland and City of Edinburgh Council to prevent the sale and distribution of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS) across the City

"It's important that our approach considers the significant health issues underlying drug abuse and for that reason we will continue to liaise with health agencies to ensure vulnerable users can be offered help and support."

Councillor Cammy Day, Community Safety Leader for the City of

Edinburgh Council, said: "Anti-social behaviour can have a devastating effect on communities, and it is well known that drugs and alcohol can cause this type of behaviour to worsen.

"We are committed to making communities safer and do so by working closely with Police Scotland on initiatives such as Operation Austinburg to help reduce these incidents.

"Operations like this are made easier by help from residents and as always, local knowledge is extremely valuable.

"I would encourage south-side residents to get in touch if they have any concerns or information that might be helpful."

Nobody denies that Brighton Place carriageway is very much in need of repair. But the vexed question of whether to finish or rebuild Brighton Place with the historic setts or a new tarmac surface rumbles on. A survey carried out door-to-door by Brighton and Rosefield Residents Association concluded that 80% of those living in that part of the Portobello Conservation Area would want the setts replaced and the Council's non-statutory planning policy 'Designing Streets' and the Portobello Conservation Area Character appraisal would support their view. However, a wider community consultation by Portobello Community Council found a small majority in favour of a tarmac surface finish. The whole question is now to be discussed and debated, as part of the overall consideration of priorities in the roads and footways capital investment programme by Councillors on the Transport and Environment Committee in January.

Loneliness is not simply about being alone, it affects our mental and physical wellbeing. Half of older people say the television is their main company. Portobello/Craigmillar, Census 2011 counts 3,359 people over 65 and 486 aged 85 pus. Loneliness is a major challenge, and something we have the power to combat by bringing people together in the community. The relatively new LOOPs (Local Opportunities for Older People) runs a phone line, part of a city-wide initiative to help older people get out and about. If you are aged over 65,

know someone who is, call LOOPs free to speak to one of their friendly volunteers about activities and services in your local area. They provide a professional service, bringing together contacts and information tailored to the person's unique interests and requirements. One example: LOOPs had a call from a 77 year old lady who has a diagnosis of dementia and lives with her son. Although her daughter visits every day, she's alone while everyone is at work and can't go out on her own. LOOPs contacted a number of services who could provide her with care and enjoyable companionship in the safe environment she needed. LOOPs are also involved in hosting events across the city that bring people together, such as the recent Sew & Snack craft afternoon they held at the National Gallery of Scotland. # Council preparing to take the tram to Newhaven

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The trams will in the very near future go all the way to Newhaven, and the council say they have the money to pay for it, without affecting their revenue budgets in the short or long term.

So yesterday we had George Clooney in town, but this is today's big news in the capital.

The beleaguered Edinburgh Tram project which contracted to become one tram *line* from the airport to York Place has a long history, and is now the subject of the <u>Edinburgh Tram Inquiry</u> under the chairmanship of Lord Hardie.

The preparatory works have already been done all the way down Leith Walk, but to stop the line at the Foot of the Walk, on Picardy Place or even at Ocean Terminal would not make financial sense according to council officers. The only option which they recommend is to extend the tram line all the way to Newhaven.

The council agreed in June this year to spend £400,000 on working up the Outline Business Case for the tram extension, and next week councillors will be asked to approve spending of a further £1.6million to take the project to the next stage.

We are not yet at the point of pressing the green for go light on the Tram Extension, but we are getting much closer, as the council approves more investigation.

There are still many hurdles to get over, but the council is adamant that it has learned lessons from the first phase of the tram project and will use this knowledge in taking the next step. They mention traffic management and project governance as two key areas where they will do better next time.

The £1.6million spending to be approved next week will cover what are called Stage 1 activities, which includes procurement for all external processes like hiring lawyers and doing site investigation. This stage is broken down into three parts: Project and Technical Management Resource (£1.3m), Tram Enabling Works (£176K) and Leith Programme Enabling works (£123K).

According to all reports the trams have operated successfully for a year and a bit now, but they are not yet profitable on their own. Nonetheless, during August this year over half a million passengers used the service, and in the latest UK Transport Focus customers said that they are overwhelmingly happy with it. Edinburgh Trams scored a 95% overall satisfaction rating.

So the tram is now reasonably good news for those who use the service, but there is still the matter of how it will be paid for. How will the council be able to pay for the tram extension without affecting any other revenue spending at all?

They say it is very simple: they will use their wholly owned company Lothian Buses to pay for preparatory stages and then provide the 'deposit' for prudent borrowing.

In the first place the council already have £5million in its coffers waiting to be spent on the initial phases. This money has been retained from previous dividends paid by Lothian Buses. Secondly they will ask Lothian Buses for a special one-off dividend of £20million over four years which will then be used to enable council borrowing, and which will cover the initial funding gap.

The council also recognise that the proposed financial

structure could be affected by any change in the numbers of tram passengers or a drop in tram fares, and that any shortfall would have to be met by the council. The next stage of the project is to investigate ways of reducing this risk, and the report suggests that there is much work to be done before firmly deciding to go ahead.

According to Lothian Buses' latest accounts to December 2014 the company made a net profit of over £8million, and is in a position to pay a dividend of around £5m per annum quite easily. The City of Edinburgh Council is the company's biggest shareholder holding over 91% of the shares and so is entitled to demand the dividend needed to make the project a reality.

The capital costs for the extended line have been calculated at £144.7m. The council has investigated borrowing options where the cost would be lower at the beginning, but would increase as the profitability of the project grows, but much depends on The Scottish Government issuing new guidance on council borrowing. The council recognises that there is a risk in any borrowing, particularly in the early years when the line would be under construction with no increase in revenue.

The initial economic research shows that the extended tram line will become profitable almost immediately, and the build cost is the cheapest at £30.9million per kilometre if the line is run to Newhaven.


Leith is the most densely populated area of the city, and the area where only 50% have a car, so it is clear that this area alone adds to the number of potential passengers, but it would not be viable to simply run the line to the foot of Leith Walk.

In addition by 2022 the projections show that there will be another 50,000+ people living in the capital. The bus service in the city may be a very good one but it reaches capacity at 2,400 passengers in one direction each hour, and there will be around 4,000 passengers waiting to get on board from Newhaven, making it necessary to look at other public transport options.

The tram itself will support housing and other economic development across the city and in particular developments at Leith Waterfront which stalled when the decision was taken to stop the tram line in the city.

### Letter from Scotland

Stormy days

We need to talk about Abigail. No, not my four year old granddaughter, but the first "named" storm of the winter. The Met Office has taken to naming our storms as they blow in, to warn us more clearly of their coming. The next one will be Barney…and so on, down the alphabet. Of course, our storms are not as dramatic as the named American hurricanes, with their winds of 150mph, but they are alarming enough for our temperate country.

In fact, we've had a couple of storms already. Last weekend, winds reached 100mph in parts of the Highlands, and Dumfriesshire was drenched in 25mm of rain. On Monday, the winds reached 115mph, western coasts were lashed by 22ft waves and a big dump of snow fell on the Cairngorm Mountains. As I write though we are battening down the hatches for Abigail, with warnings on the radio of heavy rain, high winds and occasional thunder and lightning. Schools are being closed, ferry services suspended.

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I wonder if it's all a warning from the gods that next month's world summit on climate change had better produce results. We had a warning this week from the UK Energy Secretary that the UK is still behind on its target to meet all its electricity needs from renewable sources by 2020, which may have a knock on effect here in Scotland.

It's also been a stormy week for the SNP. The party at Westminster was furious that the Scotland Bill, granting more powers to the Scottish Parliament, was given such short shrift – only one day of debate for over 100 amendments. The SNP were particularly peeved that their amendment giving Holyrood the power to hold another referendum on independence was voted down – despite Labour abstaining.

The Bill has now completed its journey through the House of Commons and now heads for the House of Lords. So new powers over the rates and bands of income tax and new powers to top up welfare benefits are coming Scotland's way. So too is control over abortion, despite a rear-guard action by some Labour MPs worried that Scotland might adopt stricter rules over abortion.

A sign of the increasingly prickly relationship between the SNP's 55 MPs and their Westminster friends is the unlikely issue of Sunday trading. This week the UK Government was forced to abandon its plan to loosen the laws on Sunday trading in England and Wales, because the SNP threatened to vote against. They argued that, although the changes might not have a direct effect on Scotland, they could lead to the big retail chains cutting the wages of shop workers all over the UK.

Back home, the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon faced a storm at Holyrood over a damning report from the Inspector of Constabulary on the police handling of 999 calls. It follows the failure of the police to respond, for three days, to an emergency call about a car which had crashed into a ditch off the M9 near Stirling. The young couple inside both died. The report listed a catalogue of problems — a shortage of call-handling staff, the hasty merger of local call centres, computer and record-keeping failures and a lack of proper oversight.

The opposition parties were not slow in pointing out that the M9 incident was not the only trouble besetting the SNP's project to merge Scotland's eight police forces into one. There were the other matters of armed police, the use of stopand-search powers, an unexplained death of a man in custody, the £25m VAT bill, the early departures of the Chief Constable and the Chairman of the police authority.

Ms Sturgeon said what both Labour and the Conservatives failed to mention was that they were also in favour of merging the eight police forces into one to save money and that crime was now at a 41 year low. "The verdict that really matters," she said, "is the verdict of the Scottish people and the latest opinion poll shows that 58 per cent of them intend to vote for the SNP." She was referring to a TSN poll which found that 58 per cent of respondents said they would vote SNP in the constituency elections next May while only 24 per cent intended to vote Labour.

There was bad news for the SNP, and everyone else, with the latest Scottish unemployment figures out this week. The total over the summer rose by 11,000 to 6 per cent, compared with a fall to 5.3 per cent for the UK as a whole. It's yet another sign that Scotland is suffering most from the downturn in the oil industry. The tax office, HMRC, added to the gloom by announcing it would be shedding around 2,000 jobs in Scotland over the next five years as it merges its 18 local offices into just three.

It's been a bad news week too for the Liberal Democrats ( down to 4 per cent in that poll) as they watched their only MP in Scotland Alistair Carmichael trudge into court each day, accused of misleading his constituents in Orkney and Shetland in the run up to the general election last May. You may remember he at first denied he had authorised the leaking a false report about Nicola Sturgeon's meeting with the French Ambassador, but after the election he admitted it. It's the first time such an election court has sat in 50 years and proceedings were televised — not to the lawyers' advantage, it must be said. Their stumbling speeches looked to me like a lesson in slow dictation to a class of ten year olds. But the two judges, unwigged, took careful notes and will give their verdict at a later date.

Finally some good news, the Ebola nurse Pauline Cafferkey is off the critical list and is recovering, for the second time. She had the misfortune to contract Ebola while volunteering in Sierra Leone last year and she fell ill again a month ago, this time with a little known lingering effect of Ebola, meningitis. On Wednesday she emerged again from her plastic tent in the Royal Free Hospital in London and is back in Glasgow.

It's been a testing time for many people this week. As the old hymn has it, may their anchors hold in the storm of life.

News from the sale room – Lyon & Turnbull sell Mackintosh chair for over

### £20,000

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Lyon & Turnbull sold a ladderback chair designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh for £21,250 at their of Decorative Arts on November the 11th 2015 in Edinburgh. The chair was made for Miss Cranston's Willow Street Tea Rooms, Glasgow, Scotland and comes from a Private Collection in London. It was given to the vendor as a gift

Mackintosh had produced versions of the traditional ladderback chair before, first for David Gauld in 1893 and then as a bedroom chair at Windyhill in 1901. This understated and deceptively simple design of 1903, for Miss Cranston's new Willow Tearooms in Sauchiehall Street, is his most successful treatment of this vernacular form. The dark wood against the pale walls and tablecloths of the tearoom interiors accentuated the striking lines of this, one of Mackintosh's most recognisable chairs.

A piano owned by Barbra Streisand which sold for £4,000, was originally sold in New York at auction in 1994 as part of The Collection of Barbra Streisand.

The Art Deco piano was designed by Krakauer and is made of a polished walnut veneer. Krakauer was an American manufacturer of handmade, high-quality pianos, founded 1869 in New York City by the Jewish immigrant Simon Krakauer, his son David and his brother Julius. Krakauer Brothers was one of the few American piano companies to survive the Great Depression without being absorbed into a larger conglomerate.

Other items in the sale included a Rene Lalique Powder Box which made £3,500, a painted and glazed earthenware dish by Pablo Picasso which made £5,250, a collection of three

paintings and sketches by Simeon Solomon made £5,000, £6,250 and £4,250. A large collection of Archibald Knox silver sold well with individual pieces making good prices including a Liberty & Co pewter and enamel clock making £4,250. A wonderful Fivemiletown arts and crafts fendor made £2,125 and a bronze figure by Bruno Zach circa 1920 made £2,500.

The total for the sale including buyers premium was £389,800 and the number of lots sold was 406 from 519 offered.

#### Edinburgh Restaurant wins third award in two weeks

#### **Concert at Greyfriars**

Police in Edinburgh have arrested 17 youths for a range of fireworks-related offences in the North of the city over the past couple of weeks.

On Sunday 22nd November officers responded to reports of a large group causing a disturbance in Restalrig Road and Restalrig Road South where fireworks were thrown at a Lothian Bus and onto the roadway.

Following an investigation by the local policing team, ten

males aged 13, 15, 14, 12, 14, 14, 13, 13, 13 and 17 were all detained and subsequently charged in connection with this incident.

A similar incident was then reported within Restalrig Road South at the Scotmid premises during Tuesday evening (24th October), where a number of males were seen to aim fireworks at passing traffic as well as pedestrians.

As a result of local inquiries two 13-year-olds and a 15-yearold were arrested and charged. The 15-year-old has also been charged in connection with an incident at the Gulf petrol station in Restalrig on 24th October, where a firework was set off in another youth's face.

Residents in Cables Wynd House then contacted police on the evening of Thursday 26th October after several young people were seen to be throwing fireworks around, creating a risk to the general public.

Those responsible also targeted a police vehicle, which arrived at the scene to investigate the report.

Three 13-year-old boys and a 17-year-old male have since been charged and officers are currently following a positive line of inquiry to trace others believed to be involved.

Inspector Alan Carson from Leith Police Station said: "The vast majority of young people in the North of Edinburgh behaved responsibly during Bonfire Night and the weeks running up to it.

"However, a small group put both their own safety and the safety of others in serious risk during a number of incidents, which took place and local policing teams have been pursuing various lines of inquiry to identify those responsible.

"Reckless conduct such as this will not be tolerated and I would like to remind our communities, particularly the younger

members, that messing around with fireworks may land you in police custody or in hospital."

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There will be an update on the tram extension programme here at 11, but in the meantime you might want to consider the progress of the Edinburgh Tram Inquiry which the Inquiry Chairman is anxious to keep on track.

He is fearful that not having one of the key players in the tram project at the inquiry table will stall progress and make the whole proceedings less meaningful.

Although the tram inquiry is a non-adversarial hearing and is only set up to learn what really happened and report those to the Scottish Ministers, it is keen to get all the facts from the horse's mouth. It will not be possible to quiz any company officers from the tram company **tie** as it now lies dormant. The council refuse to reinstate the company as to do so would cost millions according to the Council Leader.

# 14 men arrested following disturbance before Hearts match in October

Football-related violence has resulted in 14 arrests following a disturbance before the match between Hearts and Kilmarnock last month.

At around 3pm on Saturday 3 October police were called to McLeod Street near Tynecastle Stadium in response to a report of a fight involving more than 20 rival supporters.

Additional officers attended the scene and assisted in breaking up the disturbance resulting in the arrest of a 21-year-old man from Kilmarnock.

A number of other people involved fled the area however following an extensive police investigation conducted by divisional officers and the Football Coordination Unit (FoCUS), which is a specialist police resource designed to tackle violence, disorder and anti-social behaviour associated with football, a further 14 males, aged 28, 24, 23, 19, 18, 17, 17, 16, 16, 16, 15, 15, 14, have now been arrested and charged for various offences.

All are expected to appear before Edinburgh Sheriff Court on February 17, 2016.

Inspector Bob Innes of Police Scotland said: "We treat such incidents extremely seriously.

"The safety of everyone attending football matches is of paramount importance and violence and disorder will not be tolerated.

"Thanks to some excellent police work and with the assistance of our partners at Hearts Football Club, we have successfully traced and charged 14 males in connection with this incident.

"They will appear in court in due course and in the meantime they have been ordered not to attend at any regulated football match in the UK.

"I can reassure the public that anyone involved in this sort of criminal activity will be swiftly dealt with."
