Scotland is expected to receive around one third of the total number of Syrian refugees due to arrive in the UK before Christmas, Minister for Europe and International Development, Humza Yousaf, has announced.

The refugee taskforce set up to co-ordinate Scotland's practical response to the humanitarian crisis met this week ahead of the first arrivals.

Mr Yousaf, who chairs the meeting, has offered to visit local authorities expected to receive refugees to discuss their arrangements and preparations, and engage with local communities on the importance of their role in the integration process.

The Minister said: "Scotland's response to the humanitarian crisis has been phenomenal and we have been working to ensure we provide a very warm welcome to those who come to Scotland seeking protection, safety and security.

"Of the refugees expected to arrive in the UK before Christmas, Scotland is expected to take around one third, and this is testament to the work of the taskforce, local authorities and many other partner organisations to ensure we are ready — and we are ready. It is a great symbol of our compassion that Scotland is expected to take a third of refugees arriving before Christmas, while making up only 10 per cent of the UK population.

"I realise that local authorities have already gone to great lengths to prepare themselves but I will be looking to visit them to discuss their arrangements and offer them support and advice if they feel it beneficial.

"It has been heart-warming and inspiring to see the positive reaction from people all over Scotland and local communities will play a crucial role in the integration of these refugees. We cannot underestimate the importance of local engagement in response to what is an international crisis.

"Scotland is a caring and compassionate country and we have worked with our partners to provide a welcoming environment for those refugees.

"Areas such as local government, housing, health services, language support, transport and social services are crucial to this, and the taskforce has worked to ensure these services are ready."

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One of Edinburgh's own diving stars is to help inspire children with Additional Support Needs (ASN) at a dedicated new class.

European Games Gold winner James Heatly will visit the new class at the Royal Commonwealth Pool, where he has been coached by Edinburgh Leisure since he was a young child.

It is hoped the new diving classes will provide children with a range of ages and abilities the opportunity to discover the joys of diving and its many fitness benefits. The addition of a 1m platform to the world class diving facilities has made it possible to specifically launch coaching for children with a wider range of needs.

Part-funded by Sport Scotland, the new 1m platform joins Olympic Standard facilities including 5m and 10m platform, and three 1m springboards.

The venue in the heart of Edinburgh played host to the commonwealth games diving event in 2014, where James — the grandson of the late diving champion Sir Peter Heatly — competed before the eyes of the world.

Vicki Tomlinson, Diving Coach for Edinburgh Leisure, said: "We are delighted that the arrival of the brand new 1m diving platform has allowed us to launch diving coaching for children with additional support needs.

"Diving is just such an amazing sport which allows children to build strength and agility, as well as grow in confidence.

"That's why it's great to be able to see children of all ages and different abilities and needs get a chance to enjoy diving.

"The children will also have the opportunity to work towards certificates and, although it's early days, we hope to connect with clubs across the UK and eventually participate in tournaments.

"We're really pleased that James has kindly offered to share his expertise and passion for diving with the class. It will be really inspiring for the children to meet a diving star who has been coached here in our own Royal Commonwealth Pool."

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Impressive Hearts Win Again

Ladbrokes SPFL Premiership, Saturday 7 November 2015 – Tynecastle

Hearts recorded their fourth league victory in a row with a hard-fought win over Hamilton Academical at Tynecastle on Saturday. Prince Buaben and Arnaud Djoum scored in the first half and this was enough to ensure Robbie Neilson's side remained in second place in the Ladbrokes SPFL Premiership and close the gap on leaders Celtic to three points – at least until Sunday when the champions visit Ross County.

Neilson made a couple of changes to the team which romped to victory at Partick Thistle last week — Blazej Augustyn returned from suspension at the expense of Juwon Oshaniwa while Morgaro Gomis replaced Danny Swanson and wore the captain's armband.

It was an unusually quiet start to a game at Tynecastle but Hearts finally burst into action in the seventh minute when Callum Paterson crossed for Arnaud Djoum who headed wide.

The last time these two sides met it was a somewhat controversial affair with the aforementioned Paterson sent off (wrongly as it transpired) and the Accies ending Hearts unbeaten run. There seemed to be some unfinished business from that game with tousy challenges and bookings for the visitors. Tagliapietra came close to scoring for the Accies when he was left unmarked at a corner but, thankfully for the home support, his header went wide.

After 26 minutes Hearts went ahead. There seemed minimal danger when Prince Buaben collected the ball thirty yards from

goal but the midfielder fired in a low effort which visiting keeper McGovern appeared slow to react to and another packed house at Tynecastle celebrated.

The dangerous Tagliapietra nearly drew parity when he connected with a free-kick inside the Hearts penalty box but home keeper Neil Alexander saved splendidly.

Accies were to rue that chance as Hearts doubled their lead seven minutes before half-time. The pacey Sam Nicholson broke forward and crossed towards Osman Sow. The Swedish striker was given time to chest the ball down before taking it round keeper McGovern before unselfishly passing for the impressive Arnaud Djoum to poke home.

Djoum almost made it 3-0 early in the second half when he just missed getting on the end of a brilliant cross from Nicholson before Callum Paterson forced a fine save from McGovern with a free-kick.

Djoum limped off with a hamstring injury to be replaced by Miguel Pallardo. The substitute broke free to set up Osman Sow whose effort on goal produced another fine save from McGovern.

With 15 minutes left, it looked again like goal number three when Buaben and Sow linked well in the Accies penalty box before the Swede pushed the ball goalwards only to see it go wide.

Gavin Reilly then had a chance for the home side in injury time but his shot on goal up was pushed over the bar by McGovern.

Robbie Neilson was a satisfied man after the game

"I thought we played really well in the first half and obviously we got a couple of goals on the back of that. "The second half was a bit scrappy but overall we competed well and played some good football at times.

We'd like to try to sustain it for as long as possible but there's going to come a dip. We're not going to go through the season winning every game. To be where we are is fantastic, but we have to continue to work hard and try to stay as high up the league as we can," the Head Coach told BBC Scotland.

"The players are confident that every game they go in to they can win, but we have to prove it and at the moment we're doing it. I've got a good squad. The aim is to get top six. If we get that it's another progression from getting promoted, being stable in the top flight, and if we get higher than that it'll be a fantastic season.

"We're ahead of where we want to be as a club. The plans were to get out the Championship at the second time of asking. To get out at the first time of asking was great. To be where we are just now is great."

Although the impressive Arnaud Djoum limped off injured he is expected to be fit for Hearts next game against Dundee in a fortnight.

"Arnaud is fine, it's just a tight hamstring" said Neilson. "He's played a fair bit recently so he'll get a break now and he'll be fine once we return to league action."

Another impressive win for Hearts and another clean sheet. This was Robbie Neilson's 50^{th} league game in charge with a remarkable record of 38 wins, 6 draws and 6 defeats. That's a mighty fine record.

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Letter from Scotland

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Remembrance Sunday always stops me in my tracks. I see the names on the war memorials, I see yellow leaves on the green grass, I see the familiar ceremonies on television and I wonder at man's stupidity. Why are we unable to see the madness of war coming before we are drawn into it ?

The First World War is the most haunting for me, because of its mystery and for its huge impact on every town and village in Scotland to this day. My grandfather served in the Royal Army Medical Corps, my great uncle was killed at the second battle of the Somme. We are still connected to this most awful of wars. It was only six years ago that the last British soldier to serve in the trenches Harry Patch died, just short of his 100th birthday.

The Second World War is easier to understand, with its clearcut conflict between good and evil. My grandfather and my uncle both served in this war and survived. But the losses were six times those of the First War and most of the casualties were not soldiers at all but innocent bystanders.

Despite these two catastrophic conflicts, we have not been able to shake off the contagion of war, a disease peculiar to our species. Since the First World War, Britain has been involved in 30 major wars. And throughout the world, as I write, there are 35 wars going on, four of them major wars, in Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan, and the Boko Haram war in West Africa, each of which resulted in more than 10,000 people killed last year. And still we sell arms to the evil tyrants causing these wars and we mock the efforts of the UN and the EU to bring them to an end.

This week, The Scottish Parliament debated the renewal of Trident nuclear weapons, which can either be seen as a costly example of this war madness, or as the ultimate guarantee of peace between the major powers. Scottish Labour, newly converted to the anti-Trident cause, voted with the SNP, against any renewal of Trident. This week we learnt that the cost had gone up yet again, to £25billion plus 6 per cent of the annual defence budget for maintenance, which would put the final bill at £167billion.

Another of the Scottish Labour Party's innovations this week was to come out strongly against the Chancellor's cuts to tax credits, which they said would leave a quarter of a million low-earning households a thousand pounds worse off each year. The party leader Kezia Dugdale said Labour in Scotland would reverse these cuts by not cutting Air Passenger Duty and not raising the threshold for the upper rate of income tax.

Until Wednesday, the SNP maintained that the Scottish Parliament did not have the power to make these changes but then Alex Neil, the social justice secretary, admitted he'd been reading the new devolution bill again and, lo and behold, he'd found that Holyrood will indeed have such powers from next year. This left the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon simply promising MSPs, at question time, that the Scottish government would come up with a "realistic and affordable" scheme to compensate those affected by the tax credit changes – if the Chancellor can't be persuaded out of them.

Oh dear, the Scottish economy is not doing as well as expected. The number crunchers at the Fraser of Allander Institute now say our annual growth rate for 2015 is likely to be 1.9 per cent, not the 2.5 per cent they had confidently predicted in the summer. This comes on top of last month's bad news from the oil and steel industries and the rise in unemployment to 6.1 per cent. We are now relying on the building trade to drive growth in the economy. And, of course, there will very soon be the Christmas stampede by the ever brave Scottish shoppers who have kept our heads above water throughout the recession.

The off-shore wind industry is also doing its bit to keep the economy afloat. This week the world's largest floating wind farm was given permission to launch 25 miles off the coast of Peterhead. There will be five floating turbines, anchored to the seabed, capable of powering 20,000 homes. It's a pioneering project for deep sea energy production. It's just a pity it's being done by enterprising Norwegians from Statoil, rather than a Scottish energy company.

I end with a Boy's Own tale. Poor Susie Wolff, the Scottish racing driver, is a girl. This means she is not welcome in the boy's world of Formula One racing. She announced this week that she is retiring from the sport after 20 years of trying to break through the glass ceiling. She wrote revealingly: "I fought very hard to make it onto that starting grid (for the Williams Team) but events at the start of this year and the current environment in F1 the way it is, it isn't going to happen."

Perhaps she is just too sensible for the mad world of motor racing. To me it's a crazy mixture of micro-engineering, dubious big money, kamikaze drivers, ghoulish blood sport, celebrity, television and childish fantasy. You may have gathered that I don't like it.

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

Business — The Peacock Inn changes hands

▶ Property advisors Christie + Co have told The Edinburgh Reporter that they have sold The Peacock Inn, one of Edinburgh's best-known pubs, to one of Edinburgh's best-known businessmen.

Rich in history, the pub's legacy can be traced back to 1767 and since the nineteenth century, the popular Newhaven haunt has been famed for its traditional fish and chips. It occupies a prominent trading position on Lindsay Road in the heart of the Newhaven Harbour area which has undergone substantial redevelopment over the last 20 years. In 2011 the Peacock Inn underwent substantial refurbishment but failed to rekindle its glory days and was subsequently closed at the end of 2014. The property has been purchased by the well-known independent Edinburgh retailer and restaurateur Remo Margiotta. Remo plans to extensively upgrade the property opening in mid January 2016 as a gastro pub called The Mucky Fox.

Scottish Women's Cup Final — Hibs v Glasgow City

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This Sunday the third act of the domestic battle between Glasgow City and Hibernian will be played at Spartans' ground Ainslie Park.

So far, the two sides have battled out for the SWPL title and the SWP League Cup and whilst City came out on top on both occasions, these have been closely fought affairs.

In the league, the two sides moved toe-to-toe, with neither side giving an inch until September when Hibernian lost to Aberdeen. The first two league games between them were pulsating 3-3 draws before in October, City beat them 2-0 to effectively wrap up the title. In the end, City finished six points ahead of Hibernian in the final league table, as both sides secured a place in the 2016-17 UEFA Women's Champions League.

In the SWP League Cup Final, it looked like Hibernian were going to win the trophy until when Kerry Montgomery equalised in the 77th minute. Early in extra-time, Susan Fairlie scored the winner to see City win their fourth SWP League Cup in a row.

To get to the Scottish Women's Cup Final, City had to beat Spartans, Aberdeen, FC Kilmarnock Ladies and Rangers. Hibernian had to beat Glasgow City's Development side, Forfar Farmington, Cumbernauld Colts and Celtic.

Since 2003, the Scottish Women's Cup has been a competition that has been dominated by the two finalists with Hibernian winning it five times and City winning it seven times – including the last four. This means, that if City win, it will be their fourth domestic treble in a row.

This is the fourth time these two sides have met in the final. Hibernian triumphed in the 2007 final when the Edinburgh side won 5-1. However, it has been City who have been victorious in the previous two: winning 3-0 in the 2011 final and 1-0 in 2013.

Glasgow City may have dominated the domestic scene in recent seasons, however, this season has shown that Hibernian are more than capable in winning the tournament – this will be the battle between the two best sides in Scotland.

The Final kicks-off at 2pm and tickets are only £5 for adults and £2 for concessions. Fans turning up will have the chance to meet the members of Scotland's Women's National Team. If you are unable to make it, it will be broadcast live on BBC Alba & BBC Radio Scotland.

The City of Edinburgh Council has set out plans to build 8,000 homes in an attempt to address the shortage of affordable housing and tackle the impact of soaring housing costs in the private sector.

A <u>report</u> to the Council's Health, Social Care and Housing Committee, on November 10th, will outline proposals to increase the Council's house-building programme from 3,000 to 8,000 over the next decade.

The report represents a major change in the Council's bid to meet growing demand for new affordable homes. Almost 150 households bid for every Council and housing association home available to let in Edinburgh, and the city's population is set to grow by up to 30% over the next 20 years.

The Council has already committed to funding the construction of almost 3,000 new homes through the award-winning 21st Century Homes and working in partnership with the National Housing Trust.

The proposals are part of the Council's ongoing budget consultation details, of which can be accessed <u>here</u>.

Councillor Cammy Day, Housing Leader for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "Expanding the Council's award-winning housebuilding programme would be a bold and strategic response to the acute shortage of homes in Edinburgh. High quality, low cost, energy efficient housing is simply out of reach for far too many people in the city. We are determined to address that."

Reported crime in North Edinburgh on the decrease

Police Scotland have said that reported crime in the north of the capital has come down by just over 23% compared to the same period last year.

Reports of violent crime across Leith, Leith Walk, Inverleith and Forth wards have reduced by 20% and robberies have fallen by 27%.

Police are also pleased to say that for this type of crime almost 3 out of every 4 has been solved.

Chief Inspector Richard Horan, Local Area Commander for North Edinburgh, said: "I am fortunate to work with a very talented and enthusiastic team of officers who are determined to make sure that the area in which they live and work is kept safe.

"Our anti-violence initiative in Leith, Operation Elbrus, has been utilising high visibility targeted patrols at key times and locations. The ongoing work of the Violent Offender Watch in Edinburgh and the investigations of our dedicated Violent Crime Unit have been invaluable in achieving this reduction, as have the funded officers within the Divisional Violence Reduction Unit."

Reports of anti-social behaviour are down by approximately 10%, and calls surrounding similar types of disorder are down the same. The City of Edinburgh Council has obtained a number of ASBOs for high-level repeat offenders, and the number of joint interventions using funded officers continues to rise.

Councillor Cammy Day, Community Safety Leader for the City

of Edinburgh Council, said: "I am delighted that there has been such a significant drop in crime in the north of the capital. A huge amount of work has been put into tackling criminal activity in this part of Edinburgh, and the figures reflect that this effort has been well worth it.

"Partnership working between the Council, Police Scotland and the wider community on initiatives such as Stronger North has played a vital part in dealing with issues of concern, as has an increase in patrols by community police and community safety officers. Residents can be assured that efforts to keep them safe will continue."

Domestic housebreaking is down by almost 12% and business housebreaking down by 50% thanks to the hard work of local officers and the Community Investigation Unit. The Vehicle Crime Team, assisted by local officers, has helped reduce vehicle crime by 30% while detection rates for this have doubled.

CI Horan continued: "Housebreaking remains Edinburgh's number one priority, and I'm grateful for all the hard work our officers and partners have been doing to prevent this deeply personal crime. We've improved our ability to identify trends which have provided real benefits in quickly responding to emerging issues, and we have been assisted by a number of national units such as road policing and air support."

Officers have just completed a 6-month refresh of the Multi-Member Ward Plans for the North of the city, which are the policing priorities that the local community have identified for action. Further opportunity for members of the local community to influence future priorities will commence early next year.

Each of the four local ward plans include reducing violent crime, tackling anti-social behaviour, and reducing housebreaking as three of the key priorities told to officers by the public.

Leith and Leith Walk also have tackling drug and alcohol abuse as a priority, and there is significant work ongoing throughout Edinburgh in relation to this. This includes the recent NPS Forfeiture Order, which is the first granted to a local authority area in Scotland, and 21 people were on Friday (30 October) charged with various drugs offences following a series of raids across the Capital involving over 170 officers.

Forth and Inverleith also have road safety as a priority, and local officers will continue to work alongside the Road Policing Unit and the City of Edinburgh Council to prevent unsafe driving behaviour and detect offenders.

Council reject Allan Park planning application

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The council's Development Management Committee unanimously decided to reject the application by Allan Park Ltd to demolish a house to form a roadway to the brownfield site behind.

The Edinburgh Reporter spoke to campaigners and their supporters after the meeting. The developer opted to give us a comment off camera which you can read below:

The objectors filled the public gallery in the Dean of Guild Court Room at the City Chambers, almost leaving no room for their own supporters or the small group of representatives from the site owners, Allan Park Ltd. Such was the strength of opinion some stood throughout the meeting which lasted more than two hours.

The objectors were delighted with their win today but recognise that this was just another hurdle in a fight which has already lasted for six years. The Managing Director of Allan Park Ltd said during the meeting that they would appeal any decision today if it was not favourable to their plans.

The committee based their decision on planning policies

relating to housing, open space and transport contained in the existing and emerging Local Development Plans.

The Managing Director Sean Black told The Edinburgh Reporter after the meeting: "As you can imagine I am extremely disappointed in the planning committee's verdict today. The director of planning has recommended approval of the application for good planning reasons, which is supported by a number of third party reports, including transport, environmental as well as the City's Local Plan, the secondary plan and Scottish Planning policy.

"Furthermore, the city Health and Social Care department have identified this development would fulfil a gap in the local community as well as provide much needed family accommodation.

"The development would benefit from the creation of 50 local jobs, supply local businesses and cater for many vulnerable people in need of care. However it has been argued today by committee and the residents' association these issues do not hold weight over the opinion of few in context to the the city of Edinburgh and Scotland as a whole.

"On top of this it is a brownfield site within the urban area and is supported by fundamental Scottish planning policy and local plan objectives. It will deal with a site that has lain vacant for years and improve residential amenity and appearance.

"This is further supported in the SESplan of July 2015. I refer to two of the key visions of success:

"new development is intergrated with existing communities and in accessible locations on transport corridors"

" walking, cycling and public transport account for an increasing proportion of all journeys"

"I am passionate that our development will benefit the city.

"By Allan Park's own admittance over 38000 people viewed their social media campaign in which only 4% (c.1650 people) of those chose to object to the proposals, this represents less than 1% of Edinburgh population however, sadly the weight of these numbers has prevailed over the city of Edinburgh's own planning policy.

"These people were misled by false information provided throughout the objection campaign. It is important to consider whilst public objection is an important consideration it needs to be based on legitimate policy and material matters rather than weight of numbers. Many locally will support and benefit here.

"I refer to the Facebook statement from Allan Park in the aftermath of today's hearing which is a prime example of the disingenuous and misleading information the Save Allan Park campaign has provided throughout.

We are delighted that common sense has prevailed and our planning committee have unanimously refused this application. A...

"Sadly whilst I conducted myself professionally throughout and presented on facts today, Save Allan Park continue to resort to personal slurs and misleading information which contradicts Scottish planning policy.

"I will now consult with our property and legal professionals and intend to take the application to the inspectorate of planning and environmental appeals."

There is already a planning permission in place for a 60+ bed care home, but the new application included a downsized care home with 14 townhouses.

The supporters were many and all were heard except for Joanna Cherry QC MP and Jim Eadie MSP who had both sent their assistants to deliver their statements verbally. The committee would not hear the representatives sticking to a decision made a while back. They did however take a short break to read the statements provided.

Hockey – Scotland Women v Ireland Women, November Test Series – 3 of 3

Ireland square the series in Glasgow

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Ireland's women took a well deserved win in the third and final match of the November Test Series at the National Hockey Centre in Glasgow. 1-0 up at the break, another goal in the second half sealed the victory for the visitors.

The opening exchanges were fairly evenly matched, but Ireland had the first opportunity for a score with a penalty corner seven minutes in, but Shirley McCay's low shot was deflected around the post off the stick of a diving Nicola Cochrane. This save was to prove to be the first in a string of fine stops by the Scottish keeper as Ireland rained in shots on the home side goal.

The visitors then opened their account with 15 minutes on the

clock when a reverse stick strike from the sliding Nicola Evans at the top of the 'D' cut back across the goal to leave Cochrane wrong footed.

She redeemed herself 10 minutes later when she saved a close in strike, but the writing was on the wall and Scotland's few trips upfield were easily dealt with by the Irish defence. However, their attack, despite the best efforts of Chloe Brown, Cliodhna Sargent and Megan Frazer, couldn't add to their tally before the break.

Once again, Scotland came out all guns blazing in the second half, but Ireland were soon back in command of the ball and a 'goal' 10 minutes in was disallowed by Scotland's Olympicsbound Sarah Wilson for a high ball in the area.

The next 15 minutes of the match could so easily have been spent picking the ball out of the Scottish net, but a combination of Cochrane saves, a goal line clearance from Emily Newlands – also the only carded (green) player – and poor finishing from Ireland kept the score at 1-0.

It couldn't last, however and in the 60^{th} minute Ireland netted their second when Emily Beattie ended a long run into the 'D' with a fierce strike that gave Cochrane no chance.

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The Scots' keeper earned her corn in the final 10 minutes with another string of saves — aided by Newlands — meant that the visitors had to be content with a 2-0 victory backed up by a fine performance from the squad in general.

"Here at ESPC we have a fantastic working relationship with Royal Blind and are committed to supporting the charity throughout the year. "Royal Blind provides education, care and employment for blind and partially sighted people throughout Scotland helping to raise the awareness of a disability that many of us take for granted, something we are extremely proud to support.

The money raised by ESPC will go towards the purchase of a SMART Platform. Designed to encourage self-development and to help pupils actively participate in their own mobility, the mobility aids allow for an individual's bespoke wheelchair to be easily loaded via integral ramps onto various levels normally inaccessible by wheelchair users.

The mobility devices are also ideal for shared use as they let each user remain in their own wheelchair with their own unique seating and controls, allowing staff to assess an individuals' capability and needs. Each device also includes anti-collision sensors, carer control, voice confirmations, speed and motion control.

Kerrigan Bell, Senior Fundraiser at Royal Blind, said:

"Sight loss affects around 1 in 30 people and can have a profound impact on a person's life.

"Royal Blind exists to improve the quality of life for people with blindness and visual impairments through care, education and employment.

"We're delighted with how the event went – everyone had a great evening and helped raise lots of money for a great cause."

The ESPC team also sponsor the Royal Blind Ambassador, Paralympian and Commonwealth medal winner, Libby Clegg. Libby suffers from a deteriorating eye condition known as Stargardt's Macular Dystrophy disease, which means she only has slight peripheral vision in her left eye, and is registered as blind.

The charity quiz was held on 26th October at Edinburgh's 'Ghillie Dhu' and welcomed 120 guests comprising ESPC members, suppliers and charity representatives.

Hockey – Scotland Women v Ireland Women, November Test Series

Scots come from behind for the win

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Scotland made life hard for themselves in the first half of the second match in the Novembers Test Series against Ireland, but came through for the win with a much improved performance in the second.

The first half of the match was, as in Match 1, largely dominated by the visitors. Scotland broke through a few times but didn't really pressurise the Irish goal. Players were continually beaten to the ball and Ireland's reward came in the twelfth minute of play with a fine reverse stick strike into the top of the Scottish net from Megan Frazer.

Scotland were saved on more than a couple of occasions by their goalie, Nicola Cochrane and endured a goal mouth scramble with the ball being cleared off the line by a sprawling Susan McGilveray.

The second half saw a different Scotland team take to the field and Ireland, despite Cochrane having to make a couple of early saves, were seemingly unable to exert the same dominance in play.

The first of Scotland's two goals came just over 10 minutes into the second half. Scotland's Captain, Nikki Kidd charged into the 'D' with the ball and, evading a diving lunge from Ireland's new cap, Elena Tice (right) – who nevertheless acquitted herself pretty well in the match in general – took the ball wide and reversed the ball into the centre to where Fiona Bruce was on hand to deflect the ball into the net past the keeper.

A few minutes later she just missed adding the scoreboard when she failed to connect with a cross goal strike from Emma McGregor.

The second goal for Scotland came from a failed attempt by Ireland to clear fully from a penalty corner. The initial shot on goal came in from Kidd, but was stopped. However, the loose ball was picked up by Katie Robertson (top) who went over the Irish keeper and found the back of the net for the second.

Ireland had had a few incursions into the Scots' 'D' but had been fairly easily stopped in their tracks by the defence, saving a penalty corner on the way.

Late on in the match Scotland were awarded a string of four penalty corners and, although the set-up and execution of each one was unique, they couldn't find the back of the net for a third goal and the match finished 2-1 to Scotland.

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After the match a brief word with Scotland coach, Gordon Shepherd, elicited his opinion that while they'll take it, given the first half performance, Ireland deserved the win and things would need to improve for the third and final match.
