#### Letter from Scotland

We are now into our political conference season which, like the Scottish harvest, comes a few weeks later than the UK conference season. But it's still about gathering in the crops from the last election and planting the seeds for the next.

As I write, the SNP conference is getting under way in Aberdeen. And there is plenty for the party to be pleased about — winning 56 of the 59 Westminster seats in Scotland, quadrupling its membership to over 100,000, scoring over 50 per cent in the opinion polls. In her opening leader's speech Nicola Sturgeon sought to dampen down any excitement over a second referendum on independence. Indeed she appealed to "No" voters to vote the SNP back into power at Holyrood in the Scottish general election in May in the sure knowledge that it won't lead to another referendum. It's simply, she says, a vote in favour of good home-rule government.

Meanwhile, all the other parties are, quite frankly, struggling. They are struggling to find support, to stay in one piece, to produce a leader with any public profile, or to frame a coherent manifesto, let alone an inspiring one.

The Greens met last weekend in Glasgow. Their membership has also quadrupled in the last year to 9,000 but they are still only scoring 6 per cent in the opinion polls. They have not been able to get their economic message across or their decentralisation agenda. They only occasionally surface in the media on recondite issues like fracking and shared parental leave.

The Scottish Labour Party meets in Perth at the end of the month under their new leader Kezia Dugdale. This week she had to remind her comrades in London that Labour is supposed to be an anti-austerity party. And like the leadership of the UK Labour Party it's not clear where she will end up standing on the totemic issue of the renewal of Trident nuclear weapons. This looks like being a lively debate in Perth. The rest of the conference will be about picking up the pieces from the disaster in May when the party lost all but one of its MPs in Scotland. It will also have to find some pretty exciting policies in the next six months if it's going to row its way out of the doldrums of 20 per cent in the opinion polls.

The Conservatives, meanwhile, have also to break through the 20 per cent barrier. Their plucky young leader Ruth Davidson says she's sure they will increase their presence at Holyrood in May (ie more than 15 MSPs). She is trying to portray the Tories as the only centre party in Scotland, now that Labour has apparently turned sharply left. But I think she'll find that being the only "austerity party" is a little uncomfortable.

The Liberal Democrats will have their day out in Dunfermline next weekend. Their man, Willie Rennie, has been bashing away at the SNP over police centralisation and the shortage of GPs. But the party now only has one MP and 5 MSPs and is still sitting at 5 per cent or below in the opinion polls, still unforgiven for siding with the Tories in the last Westminster government.

That only leaves the 3-per-cent-ers...UKIP and the Socialists. UKIP, of course, will be trying to pre-run the referendum on membership of the European Union. And the Socialist parties have formed yet another left-alliance, this time called RISE, which will contest all eight regional-seat elections. So there we have it, the Prologue of Pilgrims on their way to Holyrood. And this is taking place while more powers are being devolved to the Scottish Parliament – income tax rates and bands, some welfare benefits, and this week, we learnt, the delicate issue of abortion. So delicate, in fact, that Ms Sturgeon says she does not intend the change the rules in Scotland, ever.

While the politicians are making their way to jobs at Holyrood, another 18,000 Scots have been making their way to the unemployment office. It's largely the result of the slump in the oil industry but manufacturing has not been doing well either and the service sector has stood still. It means Scotland's unemployment rate has gone up to 6.1 per cent, compared to 5.4 per cent in the UK as a whole.

Late on Thursday, news broke of a surprise move in the Lockerbie investigation. Prosecutors in Scotland and the USA have written to the Libyan authorities asking to speak to two new suspects in the case. They have not been named and we wait to see if they have any connection with the Libyan government agent Abdel Baset Al Megrahi who was convicted of the bombing of Pan Am flight 103 over Lockerbie in 1988. I wonder, after 27 years, whether this mysterious and divisive case is finally beginning to break open.

Poor Pauline Cafferkey, the Scottish nurse who went out to Sierra Leone to help with the Ebola crisis, has been struck down again by the infection. She is critically ill in the isolation unit at the Royal Free Hospital in London. Everyone thought she had recovered completely nine months ago, but apparently the virus can lurk in odd corners of the body and surface again later. Doctors say she's not infectious but they are dealing with an "unprecedented" illness.

The Red Road flats are finally coming down, piece by piece as I write. The six tower blocks in the east end of Glasgow were all supposed to tumble gracefully to the ground last weekend in a public explosion. Alas, things did not go to plan and only four of the 290ft buildings fell instantly, the other two slumped slightly and stood at a precarious angle which earned them the nickname "the leaning towers of Barmulloch." It's just as well these icons of the 1960s were not blown up, as planned, during the opening ceremony of the Commonwealth Games. There would have been many cruel jokes about Scotland not being able to demolish even the ugliest features of its past.

Finally, the Gaelic music festival, the Mod, seems to have enjoyed a vintage year. Thousands of competitors, from all over the Gaelic world — including Germany ! — have been taking part in the nine day event in Oban. Among them were over 800 young competitors, the result of an outreach programme in non-Gaelic medium schools. The honour of best piper went this year to Jonathan Greenlees who's won the title for the third time. How appropriate that he should be an accountant, lending credence to the old Gaelic saying — he who pays the piper calls the tune.

#### Concern for missing West Yorkshire man

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Police in East Lothian are appealing for information in order to trace a 53-year-old man, who is missing from the local area. Mark Wallsworth, who comes from the Ossett area of West Yorkshire, was last seen at 8.30am yesterday morning (Friday, October 16) at an address in Doctor McEwan Lane, Prestonpans.

Mark was visiting family at this address when he left the premises. He has not been seen since and officers are growing increasing concerned for his welfare.

Mark is described as a white man with a slim build. He is around 5ft 9" in height, has thinning dark grey hair and a Yorkshire accent.

At the time Mark went missing he was wearing black tracksuit bottoms, a Celtic FC football top which is all white with a yellow stripe across the chest, a brown leather jacket and dark brogue shoes.

Mark has a variety of medical concerns and is unfamiliar with the local area. Considering these circumstances, officers are keen to trace him as soon as possible.

Inspector Neil Mitchell said: "Mark has been missing now for some time and we are concerned for his welfare.

"We are also aware that Mark is unfamiliar with the East Lothian area. With this in mind we are eager to trace in him as soon as possible.

"Anyone who has seen Mark, or recognises his description, is asked to get in touch with police immediately."

#### Hibernian 4-2 Dumbarton

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Hibs gained revenge for their defeat to Dumbarton in the opening game of the campaign with a comfortable 4-2 victory at Easter Road this afternoon. The score-line actually flattered the 'Sons as Hibs dominated throughout and could have scored several more.

Head Coach Alan Stubbs made three changes to the starting XI that beat Queen of the South 3-0 at Palmerston two weeks ago. Liam Fontaine returned to the centre of defence replacing Paul Hanlon who was rested, whilst Fraser Fyvie and James Keatings took over from Marvin Bartley and Dylan McGeouch who both started on the bench. Also on the bench was Jordon Forster, making his first appearance in the squad since picking up an injury in the first game of the season and on-loan Chelsea midfielder Islam Feruz.

Former Hibs' goalkeeper Mark Brown started for Dumbarton alongside ex Hearts defender Darren Barr.

Before the start, players from both sides held up red cards as part of the national 'Show Racism the Red card' campaign.

Hibs started brightly and had two penalty claims denied in the opening 13 minutes, firstly when Jason Cummings was bundled over inside the box then when a John McGinn volley struck the hand of Frazer Wright, but both appeals were waved away by the referee.

The game then burst into life with three goals in five minutes.

Dominique Malonga opened the scoring in the 20th minute when he fired the ball into the top corner of the net from the edge of the box after playing a one-two with Liam Henderson. As the fans were celebrating, a lapse in concentration in the Hibs' defence allowed Grant Gallagher room inside the area and the striker blasted the ball past Mark Oxley to level the score.

Moments later, Hibs regained the lead when Fontaine headed home from a McGinn free kick.

The hosts then dominated possession and had a third penalty claim denied when Malonga was hauled to the ground but once again the referee waved play on. Both Henderson then Cummings went close before Hibs added a third just before the break.

A long ball from McGinn appeared to strike Barr's hand before falling into the path of Cummings who was immediately brought down by two Dumbarton defenders. Finally the referee pointed to the spot however it was unclear whether the infringement was for the handball or the foul but the fans didn't mind and Cummings dispatched the spot kick into the bottom left hand corner of the net.

Hibs added a fourth in the 59th minute when Lewis Stevenson played a one-two with Cummings before sliding the ball into the path of Keatings who sent a left foot shot past Brown and into the net.

Stubbs made three substitutions in the space of eight minutes with Keatings, Fyvie and Cummings all leaving the field to standing ovations and being replaced by Marvin Bartley, McGeouch and Feruz.

With 17 minutes remaining, Dumbarton pulled a goal back when Steven Craig headed a Mark Docherty free kick into the net but Hibs easily held on for the victory and could have added a fifth near the end but Brown managed to save a goal-bound effort from Malonga.

Elsewhere Rangers came from behind to grab a late winner against Queen of the South at Ibrox.

#### Rugby – Edinburgh v Ulster, Guinness PR012

Four out of Four for Edinburgh in PR012 League

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Edinburgh overcame their fourth opponent in this year's Guinness PR012 competition at BT Murrayfield on Friday night to cement their place at the head of the table with a 100% winning record. Their opponents were Ulster and the Irish side, like their Scottish counterparts, were short of several 'headline' players away on International duty. However, Alan Solomon's young side are making headlines of their own this season.

It took the home side four minutes to open the scoring with a Greg Tonks penalty following a good start which saw the hosts penetrate deep into the opposition 22.

Edinburgh then edged the territorial battle for the next quarter of an hour and another penalty at the breakdown from Tonks saw the score out to 6-0 on the 18 minute mark.

Ulster then put in a period of play more in keeping with their reputation and nearly broke Edinburgh's defensive line on a couple of occasions. Reward came in the  $24^{th}$  minute from the boot of No. 10, Peter Nelson to take the score to 6-3

Edinburgh came closest to scoring before the break, but lost the ball to a turnover when pressing on the Ulster five metre line, but there were no additions to the score which remained 6-3 at half time.

Ulster were first on the score board in the second half with a try from fine forward play down the right. Edinburgh had started well, but lost the ball and the visitors took full advantage. Andrew Trimble collected his own chip over the defence and immediately put the home side on the back foot. A couple of plays later and flanker, Sean Reidy was propelled through try line ruck for the first try of the match. Nelson then slotted home the conversion to put the visiting side in the lead at 10-3 five minutes into the second half.

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Once again, Edinburgh proved their worth and dominated play over the next ten minutes. Attacks down both wings, employing the hyperactive Damien Hoyland and new signing, Will Helu, had the Ulster defence scrambling to cover and, eventually, a break down the left by Helu saw the ball shifted out to No. 8, Nasi Manu, on the wing. He was supported by Hamish Watson, who was then on hand to receive the final pass inside the 22 which put the Edinburgh open side in the clear, with a straight run in for his try. Tonks scored with his kick – interrupted rather unprofessionally by an Ulster medic running on to see to one of his player between Tonks and the posts – and Edinburgh were now back in the lead at 13-10.

Tonks scored another penalty 10 minutes later for 16-10, but the remainder of the match saw Edinburgh mostly defending desperately to keep the Ulster attacking play at bay.

Final relief for the support came in overtime as Ulster ended their five metre line encampment with a turnover to close the match on a winning score for the hosts at 16-10.

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Gordon Strachan will lead Scotland into the FIFA World Cup qualifiers after signing a two-year extension as national coach and agreeing

to remain in charge following the unwavering support demonstrated by the Scotland fans throughout the European Qualifying campaign. He will now lead the country through an exciting FIFA World Cup 2018 qualifying group, that includes the resumption of rivalries with England. Strachan will again be assisted by the newly appointed Motherwell manager, Mark McGhee, and the former Rangers manager, Stuart McCall, both of whom were equally keen to be part of the quest to reach the finals in Russia.

Edinburgh born Strachan said: "It is an honour and a privilege to manage my country and, in a way, that has made the disappointment of not qualifying for Euro 2016 all the more profound. None the less, the reaction from the supporters throughout the campaign, and in particular from those who travelled to Faro in their thousands, is an experience that will live with me for the rest of my life. It was a recognition that the players' efforts had been appreciated.

"That appreciation and goodwill has also been apparent in the messages of support I have received this week, from emails and letters to chats in the street.

"I want the best for our country and for those players and I believe we can make Scotland proud in the upcoming qualifiers. For that reason, I am delighted to have been asked to continue in my role and I look forward to working with my backroom staff and the players to improve on the previous campaign and look forward to the World Cup qualifiers with optimism."

Stewart Regan, Scottish FA Chief Executive: "The Board of the Scottish FA has been consistent in our belief that Gordon should continue the good work that has been apparent in many performances and results throughout the previous campaign. Similarly, the supporters and the players have been overwhelming in their view that Gordon is the national coach to lead us into the World Cup qualifying campaign. The mutual respect and stability that exists is essential to our future success and we all look forward to planning for Russia 2018."

### Man charged with unauthorised use of a drone over the centre of Edinburgh

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A 42-year-old man has been charged in connection with the unauthorised use of a drone over the centre of Edinburgh, prompting Police Scotland to remind the public of their responsibilities when piloting similar devices.

Local officers were alerted at around 10:30am on Wednesday, October 14, after the remote controlled device was seen flying over Edinburgh Castle and Princes Street Gardens.

Officers quickly traced and charged the man under Sections 60 and 61 of The Air Navigation Order (2009) and a report has been sent to the Procurator Fiscal.

There is existing legislation governing the authorised use of unmanned aircraft systems within UK airspace.

Local Officers are now keen to highlight this legislation and the potential risks posed by drones if they are flown in and around crowded or built-up areas

Chief Inspector Bob Paris of Police Scotland said: "Police in Edinburgh were called at around 10.30am on Wednesday following a report of a drone flying over Edinburgh Castle and Princes Street Gardens.

"The operator of the drone has been traced and a report has been submitted to the Procurator Fiscal. "The use of drones in public spaces is becoming more popular for people filming and photographing scenery or places of interest. However, I would advise that operators familiarise themselves with all the appropriate legislation so as to ensure they adhere to existing aviation laws and regulations, and be aware of the areas in our community where drone activity may pose a particular sensitivity."

They started the season well then they had a little bit of a dip in terms of results that they have had a few positive results. Their performance against Rangers is one that they will be happy with although not the result.

"We know they have threats but we have threats as well. If we perform to our capabilities we have a good chance of getting the three points."

Hibs' last game was a 3-0 win away from home against Queen of the South so you would expect that Stubbs would have been disappointed that the international break could upset the players' rhythm however the opposite is true: He continued: "We've had a little bit of a break with the internationals and in terms of bringing bodies back into the fold it's been good.

"It's been a welcomed one because before the break till now, we've welcomed back 'Keats' (James Keating) 'Faz' (Frazer Fyvie) 'Izzy' (Islam Feruz) and Jordan (Forster) and Farid (El Alagui) and Jamie (Insall) have had a game and they have been with the first team also so from that point of view it's been very good for us."

After Dumbarton, Hibs travel to Falkirk in midweek before facing on form Raith Rovers at Starks Park, then Rangers at Easter Road on the first of November. After that Stubbs' men will face Dundee United in the quarter finals of the League Cup and the Hibs' boss is looking forward to the challenge. He continued: "When you are winning games of football you welcome games thick and fast so yes, it's going to be a testing period of games coming up but one that is going to be a good experience for us and one that we are all looking forward to.

"The good this about it is that the squad is in a much healthier position going into these games and it gives us options."

Fans attending the game tomorrow will have the chance to see the new frontage at the West Stand.

### Liam Henderson looks ahead to Dumbarton game

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Hibs' on-loan midfielder Liam Henderson is looking forward to returning to competitive action after an extended training period due to the international break.

The two weeks off has also allowed injured team mates to regain their fitness so the competition for places will be stiff but the teenager is hoping that his performances so far will persuade Alan Stubbs of his worth to the team.

Henderson has quickly become a fans' favourite since his move from Celtic due to his 'eye for a goal,' scoring three times already.

He told Hibernian TV: "It's been good to get the break. we've been training and and looking forward to getting back on the pitch on Saturday.

"I know two of the Dumbarton players who are on loan from Celtic who are very good players although I don't know much about the rest of the team. It will be a tough game but the manager will have a plan and the boys are raring to get back out and play.

"We've been working with the ball and looking to break fast and penetrate and get a lot of goals. First and foremost we need to work hard and put in a shift because that's what they are going to do.

## Woman robbed of laptop and handbag in Richmond Place

Both men left the scene in the direction of Lidl's car park or the Kenneth McKenzie Building.

Officers are now urging anyone who can assist with their inquiries to come forward.

Detective Constable John McShane said: "This was an abhorrent attack on a visitor to Edinburgh.

"Thankfully she was not seriously injured but she was left shaken and shocked.

"We would urge anyone who saw these men or who have information that can assist us with our inquiries to contact us so we can bring them to justice."

### 87-year-old woman fights off armed mugger in Silverknowes

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Police are appealing for witnesses after a man attempted to rob an 87-year-old woman on a footpath in the Silverknowes area between 4:30 – 4:45pm on Wednesday as she made her way home.

As she walked on a public footpath linking Silverknowes Hill with Silverknowes Road an unknown male approached her from behind.

He said something, which the woman could not make out however she turned and noticed he was carrying a knife.

He demanded that she hand over her purse but she refused and then deterred the attacker by waving her mobility stick at him.

The man walked away empty handed heading back towards Silverknowes Hill before being lost from sight.

The woman, thereafter, made her way home and raised the alarm with the police.

An extensive inquiry is now underway in an effort to trace the man and anyone who can help identify him is asked to come forward.

He is described as white, around 6ft tall, has a thin face and

wore a dark hooded top with the hood up.

Detective Inspector John Kavanagh of Police Scotland said: "I am very keen to hear from anyone who has any information which might help with our ongoing investigation.

"Thankfully, the woman was unhurt but it goes without saying that we take a zero tolerance approach towards such despicable crimes.

"The incident was carried out during daylight hours and I would hope that someone may have seen the suspect in the area and can provide us with important information. Likewise, I would ask anyone who was using public transport in Silverknowes around the time of this crime to come forward if they remember seeing the man.

"We are keen to ensure that he is arrested as quickly as possible and those with relevant information can call police on 101 or, alternatively information can be passed anonymously through the registered charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

# Police launch Gaelic language plans consultation period

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Police Scotland and the Scottish Police Authority (SPA) have today launched a joint public consultation seeking views on their respective draft Gaelic Language Plans.

The draft plans were unveiled at the Royal National Mòd in Oban, with the support of Bòrd Na Gàidhlig, alongside officers wearing uniforms bearing English and Gaelic forms of Police Scotland and a vehicle with the Gaelic version of the Police Scotland logo.

Gaelic Language Plans are a statutory requirement for all public bodies in Scotland. The Plans detail how the police service and the police authority will contribute to creating a sustainable future for Gaelic in Scotland. The commitments contained in each plan aim to raise the status and profile of Gaelic, and create practical opportunities for learning and use of the language.

Some of the potential developments contained in both Police Scotland and the SPA plans include:

• Dual branding of the Police Scotland/ Poileas Alba logo to feature on police uniforms, signage and police vehicles on a replacement cost neutral basis,

• Enhanced opportunities for the public to communicate with Police Scotland and the SPA in Gaelic,

• Increased number of corporate publications made available in Gaelic,

• The introduction of training opportunities for police officers and police staff to learn Gaelic

• Dedicated Gaelic pages on Police Scotland and the SPA's website

Police Scotland and the SPA are now inviting members of the public and members of staff to read their draft plans and provide feedback on them. The separate plans are available electronically, from Police Scotland and SPA websites, and upon request, in hard copy.

Chief Superintendent Julian Innes, Local Policing Commander for Highland and Islands Division, and project lead, said: "As a public body Police Scotland has a legal obligation to develop a Gaelic Language Plan and we will do that in consultation with the communities we serve and the organisations who work with us. "The consultation is open and accessible to anyone and I'd encourage those who would like a chance to contribute to do so by making contact with their views.

"Gaelic-speaking communities exist throughout Scotland, although obviously the majority of those who use Gaelic live across the Highlands and Islands region."

Ian Ross, SPA Board Member, added:

"As one of Scotland's national languages, Gaelic has played a central part in Scotland's culture and heritage. Our first Gaelic Language Plan sets out how the SPA will improve understanding and use of Gaelic within our organisation, which in turn will improve how we engage with Scotland's communities."

"I would encourage the public and police officers and police staff to read both the SPA and Police Scotland Gaelic Language Plans and give us their feedback on the commitments we are considering."

Dr Alasdair Allan MSP, Minister for Learning, Science and Scotland's Languages, said: "As Minister with responsibility for Gaelic, I am delighted to support the launch of this consultation. The Scottish Government is firmly committed to supporting all our indigenous languages, including Gaelic. It is welcome to see Police Scotland and the Scottish Police Authority demonstrating such firm commitment to supporting Gaelic and I encourage anyone with an interest to have their say on these important publications."

Bòrd na Gàidhlig Interim CEO, Joe Moore said: "Gaelic Language Plans have proven to be successful in supporting Gaelic by mainstreaming the language in to the everyday operations of Public Bodies while offering those with Gaelic the opportunities to use the language. We are pleased to see Police Scotland and the SPA launch their draft plans for public consultation and look forward to working with them throughout this process."

It is anticipated that following the consultation an assessment will be made of the ways in which Gaelic can be most appropriately brought into use by the organisation and the police authority.

Any re-branding work will be on a rolling replacement and maintenance basis in order to reduce any costs associated with the plan.

## Extensive police operation to trace missing man Duncan 'Andy' Anderson

Police are seeking the assistance of the public in an effort to trace a missing man from Edinburgh.

Duncan Anderson (56), who goes by his middle name of Andy, was last seen at around 6:45am on Wednesday, October 14, leaving an address in Buckstone Loan East.

Since then, he has not been in touch with friends or family and police are growing increasingly concerned for his welfare.

Anyone who has seen Andy or has relevant information on his whereabouts is asked to come forward immediately.

Andy is described as around 5ft 10ins tall, has a large build with short grey hair. He has a mark over his right eye and may be wearing tracksuit bottoms and a long sleeved top.

Police have deployed a number of specialist resources in the south of the city as part of the ongoing search effort including the air support unit and dog handlers.

Inspector David Robertson who is leading the investigation, said: "An extensive operation is now underway in an effort to trace Andy.

"His disappearance is out of character and with temperatures set to drop dramatically this evening, I would urge anyone who has seen him to contact police.

"The information we have at this stage suggests that he may be in the Mortonhall area of the city and anyone with information should contact police on 101 or speak to an officer.

"I also appeal to Andy to please contact police or your family to let us know that you are safe."

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

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Scotland's political parties are today being urged to adopt seven transformative climate policy proposals in their 2016 election manifestos.

The largest civil society coalition in Scotland says the seven ideas outlined today will help politicians set robust, credible plans for a thriving, fairer, low carbon economy.

Stop Climate Chaos Scotland is taking its new climate manifesto round the parties' autumn conferences, calling for the policies to be included in their 2016 manifestos.

The challenging policy asks cover climate justice, energy efficiency, a Warm Homes Act, low carbon infrastructure, an ambitious action plan on Land Use Strategy, a shift from private cars to public transport and active travel, and using new Air Passenger Duty powers to cut emissions.

Gail Wilson, SCCS Campaigns Manager, said: "Securing a low carbon Scotland for 2020 and beyond is essential. There are challenges, but we are hopeful our politicians will rise to them.

Initial contenteasyJet, Europe's leading airline, has launched a new initiative to increase the proportion of new entrant easyJet pilots who are female.

This is part of a new strategy to encourage the development of female pilots at all ranks and positions and will widen the pipeline of women who enter their pilot community.

Just over 5% of easyJet's 2,500 pilots are female — in line with the industry as a whole. Currently women make up 6% of easyJet's new pilot intake. The airline plans to double the proportion of female new entrants to 12% over two years. This is the first phase of its long term strategy to increase the proportion of female pilots at the airline.

As part of the programme easyJet will promote the career of a pilot to young women in a number of ways including:

• Highlight the opportunities of pilot careers to female

audiences such as school groups and other youth organisations — building on the work easyJet already does in mentoring young women.

• Work in partnership with organisations which promote female take-up of STEM (science, engineering, technology and maths) subjects.

• Work with easyJet's pilot training providers to attract more women to apply for the easyJet cadet programme[].

• Offer ten places for women each year on the easyJet pilot training programme with the around £100,000 training loan underwritten by easyJet

easyJet has also committed to provide additional support to develop and retain female pilots, so that more of them can go on to achieve captaincy and pilot management roles.

To achieve this easyJet will run a series of activities including:

• Introduce enhanced mentoring for female pilots (in addition to current mentoring for all pilots).

• Introduce training loan underwriting for A320 type ratings for female pilots entering from other airlines.

• Develop female captains to help them take on leadership roles such as training and base management roles.

Brian Tyrrell, head of flight operations at easyJet commented:

"At easyJet we value diversity and we believe that having a workforce which better reflects our customers will help support our future success.

"We have made sustained progress in our senior management and M&A (management and administration) communities in recent years but we recognise that the proportion of our pilots who

are female is too low, as it is across the industry as a whole.

"A career as a pilot is interesting and rewarding and we want more women to bring their skills to the role.

"Our initial focus will be to increase the pipeline of female pilots, including by talking to young women who may not have considered it as a career.

"This is a long term strategy, which we hope will eventually lead to easyJet recruiting, retaining and developing many more female pilots."

Pauline Vahey, chair of the British Women Pilots Association commented:

"The British Women Pilots' Association (BWPA) is delighted to partner with easyJet in this ground-breaking initiative. It aligns perfectly with the first aim of the BWPA to actively promote and encourage women into flying careers in the aviation industry.

#### At the City Art Centre – Forgotten artist

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The story of a great British painter who slipped into obscurity will be remembered at a major retrospective exhibition arriving at the City Art Centre on 24 October.

Featuring around 120 works spanning his colourful career and coinciding with the centenary of his birth, *William Gear* **1915-1997: The painter that Britain forgot** seeks to reposition William Gear in his rightful place as one of the most advanced British abstract painters of his generation.

Following a successful first run at the Towner Art Gallery this summer, the partnership exhibition between Eastbourne and Edinburgh will run alongside **Jagged Generation: William Gear's Contemporaries and Influences,** an exhibition drawn from the City Art Centre's collection which explores the artist's links to Scotland.

Raised in Methil, a Fife mining community, Gear studied at Edinburgh College of Art during the 1930s where he was taught by influential figures such as S.J. Peploe, John Maxwell and William Gillies. He went on to train in Paris under the Cubist artist Fernand Léger before travelling widely during the Second World War, even becoming one of the 'Monuments Men' whose job it was to help save parts of Europe's culture during and after the conflict.

After returning to Paris in 1947, Gear met the avant-garde artists of the CoBrA group and exhibited with them in Amsterdam and Paris in 1949. In the same year his work was shown in New York alongside paintings by Jackson Pollock. He eventually returned to live in the UK in 1950, and continued to exhibit both at home and internationally until his death in 1997.

Councillor Richard Lewis, Culture Convener for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "How and why William Gear fell into obscurity is quite remarkable. Gear was an artist who was born in Fife 100 years ago, trained in Edinburgh and then went on to create some of the most radical compositions of the 1950s. He was one of the greats of British abstract art and his career and his works tell a fascinating story. These exhibitions cement his place as a pioneer and he is finally getting the recognition he deserves."

William Gear 1915-1997: The painter that Britain forgot has been created in partnership with the Towner Art Gallery where Gear was curator from 1958 – 1964. It traces his prolific career, from his early pen and ink drawings and experiments in colour during the 1930s and 1940s, to his radical monochrome and block paintings of the 1950s and mature works created during the 1960s and beyond.

As one of the first British artists to present screenprints as works of fine art, the exhibition also presents Gear as a printmaker. This exhibition includes loans from The Estate of William Gear, the Royal Academy of Arts, London and The Redfern Gallery amongst many other lenders.

Jagged Generation: William Gear's Contemporaries and Influences presents a selection of artworks from the City Art Centre's own collection. This exhibition focuses on the vibrant circle of Scottish artists associated with Gear – his tutors, friends and contemporaries. It was at Edinburgh College of Art that Gear met like-minded fellow students including Wilhelmina Barns-Graham, Margaret Mellis and Alan Davie, who also made innovative contributions to the post-war art scene.

Gear spent most of his career outside Scotland, yet he retained many Scottish ties and friendships. Jagged Generation showcases Gear's work within this wider Scottish context, shedding light on his personal and professional relationships, as well as his artistic development.

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The hidden dangers of second-hand smoke will be brought to life in a bid to urge parents to take smoking right outside, as a national tour hits Edinburgh on Thursday 15 October 2015.

Visitors to Gambado Edinburgh will be invited into a living room which looks completely smoke-free, but then fills with computer-generated chemicals when viewed through a tablet.

Through the screen, they will also be able to see the harmful effects these chemicals can have on a child's lung health as the second-hand smoke lingers.

The 29-date tour is part of the Take it Right Outside campaign which aims to reduce the number of children who are exposed to second-hand smoke in the home, and drive home that the only way to ensure children are protected is to never smoke in the home or the car.

Advisers will be on hand to speak to parents and grandparents, highlighting that smoking at the back door or an open window isn't enough, as the harmful chemicals drift back into the home and move from room to room for up to five hours after the cigarette has been put out.

Statistics show that 11 per cent of children in Scotland are still being exposed to second-hand smoke in the home<sup>1</sup>. In 2014, the Scottish Government announced a new target of reducing the proportion of children exposed from 12 per cent to six per cent by 2020, which would have the potential to protect up to 50,000 children.

The campaign is targeting those who think they are doing

enough to protect their children by highlighting the steps they can take to make their car and home smoke-free.

Minister for Public Health Maureen Watt said: "We want every child in Scotland to breathe clean air when they're in the home or the car.

"This tour is an innovative way to bring to life the realities of the harm caused by second-hand smoke and the serious consequences it can have on a child's health, particularly as many parents are unaware that it can linger and move around the home for up to five hours.

"We understand everyone's situation is different, but there are small changes people can make to their smoking behaviour which will pay dividends in terms of protecting their children."

It's estimated that second-hand smoke exposure in UK children each year causes over 20,000 cases of lower respiratory tract infection, 120,000 cases of middle ear disease, at least 22,000 new cases of wheeze and asthma, 600 cases of bacterial meningitis, and 40 sudden infant deaths – one in five of all cot deaths<sup>2</sup>.

Irene Johnstone, Head of British Lung Foundation Scotland, said: "Everybody knows that cigarette smoke is harmful. What we don't all know is that more than 85 per cent of smoke is invisible and has no smell. Parents want to do the right thing to protect their children, but not enough people know just how dangerous second-hand smoke is, or that it can hang around a room invisibly for up to five hours.

"We have to change that so we can protect the next generation from the harmful effects."
