Advice for Edinburgh students – Feeling like a #fresheroutofwater?

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Help is at hand for you if you are finding Freshers' Week and the first few weeks of university life just too much to handle.

It is a big leap from school to university life no matter whether you are still living at home or have moved into your sparkly new student accommodation.

As new students from all over the UK start university for the first time, Samaritans is reminding those who feel like a 'Fresher out of water' that its volunteers are available any time of day or night to listen if they are struggling to cope.

You can speak, in confidence, to a listening volunteer by telephone, text or email, or by visiting a local branch. Above all, [tweet_box design="default"]Samaritans wants all Freshers to know that if they are struggling, for whatever reason, they do not have to face their problems alone.[/tweet_box]

Nicola Gee, ex-student and now Samaritans volunteer, struggled with the way that she felt while at university and said: "I remember asking myself why I was so down at university and then punishing myself for the way I felt. I loved my course but I had withdrawn totally and compared myself negatively to my peers who seemed to be having the time of their lives.

"It was Samaritans who helped me put together a support plan which has been essential to me managing episodes of depression ever since. I wish I had called them sooner, when you are confused by the way you feel having someone to listen to you and work through your problems has a hugely positive effect."

A survey released by Samaritans in July 2015 revealed that the majority of young people feared admitting that they were struggling with life. More than half (52.3%) of 16-24 yearolds in the UK felt there was a a stigma around admitting that you're struggling to cope with something. Yet, two-fifths (40.9%) say they sometimes felt overwhelmed by their problems.* Young adults are the least likely to want to burden others with their problems and the most likely to feel 'embarrassed' or 'weak' if they do, the survey found. A fifth (20.5%) feared they'll be seen as 'weird'.

Elsewhere, the survey also revealed that many young people had strong listening skills, with 45.5% saying that people went to them with their problems. Samaritans are calling on Freshers to utilise these listening skills and watch out for friends who may be struggling with the way that they are feeling.

James Jopling, Executive Director for Scotland, said: "University life is often portrayed as a wild, fun journey of self-discovery. Whilst that can be the case for some, the reality is that moving away from home, making new friends, managing a new workload and financial pressures can be a struggle for many young people.

"25 years ago I moved 450 miles from South London to the University of Stirling and can remember only too well the initial isolation and worry this caused me. I've made Scotland my home now but knowing Samaritans are always there might help others who are now making this huge life change.

"That's why Samaritans are making an urgent plea to new students to remember that help is always at hand. We know that having a listening ear when times get tough helps people work through their problems. If you, or anybody you know, is struggling to cope, for whatever reason, please don't hesitate to get in touch. You can tell us anything, it stays between us."



New term at Edinburgh Drawing School

One of the world's leading wave energy firms has teamed up with a top Irish university to accelerate the development of a commercial wave energy technology.

Edinburgh-based Aquamarine Power and the National University of Ireland, Maynooth (NUIM) have together secured an €800,000 (£580,000) EU Horizon 2020 grant to improve the performance of Aquamarine Power's Oyster wave energy converter. The company has already built and operated two full-scale Oyster machines at the European Marine Energy Centre in Orkney.

The new Brussels-backed programme – called INNOWAVE – will enable three PhD researchers to explore ways to optimise the

energy capture and economic performance of Oyster. As part of the three-year programme, each researcher will split their time between Aquamarine Power and NUIM's Centre for Ocean Energy Research in County Kildare, west of Dublin.

Midlothian Council unanimously approved planning permission to FCC Environment (UK) Ltd for the construction of a waste recycling and combined heat and power plant on former railway marshalling yards at Millerhill in Midlothian.

FCC Medio Ambiente SA was appointed preferred bidder in December 2014 for the contract to design, build, finance and operate facilities to treat and recover value from all the waste collected by both The City of Edinburgh and Midlothian Councils that currently goes directly to landfill.

This 25-year contract will involve the thermal treatment of up to 135,000 tonnes of mixed waste annually to produce electricity for the National Grid and heat suitable for a district heating scheme, with less than 5% of all waste going to landfill in line with Scottish Government targets.

Councillor Lesley Hinds, Environment Convener for City of

Edinburgh Council, said: "This decision takes us a step closer to our goal of achieving the highest possible public participation in recycling while having dedicated, competitively priced facilities that will use all the remaining waste that cannot be readily recovered as a valuable resource."

"In combination with the food waste treatment plant which is nearing completion, these facilities will boost our recycling rate, guarantee we would meet our landfill diversion targets and make a significant contribution towards Scotland's renewable energy targets."

Good causes across Scotland are set to "bag" a funding boost of more than £750,000 as The Co-operative today launches its Local Fund to share the money raised through carrier bag charges and sales in its food stores.

The community retailer is calling on local causes or community groups in Scotland interested in "carrying" away a share of the Co-op Local Fund to apply online by Wednesday, 7 October.

It is envisaged that approaching 1,000 organisations and groups across Scotland will receive grants of between £200 and £2,500 from The Co-op Local Fund to make a difference in their community.

In addition to the 5p minimum charge on single-use bags, The Co-op has also pledged to go further and top-up the fund with proceeds from its entire range of carriers, including sales of its bags-for-life and its new woven reusable shopping bags.

Applications can be made until midnight on Wednesday, 7 October. Then, between 16 November and 11 December, the community retailer will give its one million members in Scotland a chance to vote and have a say, from a shortlist of organisations, on how the fund will benefit local communities. John McNeill, Divisional Managing Director for The Cooperative Food in Scotland, said:

"The Co-operative is a community retailer with a strong heritage and commitment to the environment and to supporting its local communities.

"We are asking the Scottish public to nominate those causes that they care about and would like to see supported through The Co-op Local Fund. The Co-operative's one million members in Scotland will then have a unique opportunity to vote and say how the money should be shared.

"The Co-op shares the aspiration of reducing the number of single-use carrier bags in use. It is also encouraging shoppers to further reduce their reliance on single-use carriers by donating proceeds from its reusable bags to good causes too. The money raised will enable organisations across Scotland to make a difference in their community – together, we will reduce, reuse, recycle, and reinvest in our communities."

Scottish National Gallery acquires new French painting

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A rare painting by one of the leading French artists of the 17th century, which has recently been acquired by the Scottish National Gallery, is to be unveiled this week. Although *A Classical Landscape with Judah and Tamar* by Pierre Patel (1605-76) has been in a Scottish private collection since the mid-nineteenth century it has been shown in public on only one previous occasion. This outstanding landscape has now been allocated to the Gallery through the Government's Acceptance in Lieu (AIL) scheme, and is on display at the Gallery from today.

Like his close contemporary Claude Lorrain (1604/5?-82), Pierre Patel is celebrated for his majestic landscapes, which often feature the picturesque ruins of classical architecture and are populated by figures drawn from biblical and mythological narratives. A Classical Landscape with Judah and Tamar, which was painted in the early 1650s, is highly representative of Patel's work; on the left is a ruined, overgrown temple, its fine columns and entablature painted with a precision and sharpness that is a particular mark of the artist's style.

The two figures that meet in the middle foreground have been identified as Judah and Tamar, whose story is told in the Book of Genesis and who are recorded in St Matthew's Gospel as among the ancestors of Christ.

The scene is infused with a soft, Italianate light, despite

the fact that Patel never followed Claude in travelling to Italy, and spent his artistic career in Paris, where he was the leading landscape painter at work in the city. Little is known of the artist's life and *A Classical Landscape with Judah and Tamar* is one of only around 120 works that can be attributed to him.

Patel, like Claude, was much admired in Britain in the 18th and early 19th centuries, and there are examples of his work by him in the collections of the National Gallery in London, the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge, and the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford.

Speaking of the acquisition, Michael Clarke, Director of the Scottish National Gallery, said, "French seventeenth-century art is still under-represented in the national collection, so this allocation through the AIL scheme of a rare and beautiful classical landscape by Patel is most welcome. It joins our major paintings by Claude Lorrain, Nicolas Poussin and Gaspard Dughet from this period and we hope to add many more such masterpieces in the future."

Cabinet Secretary for Culture, Europe and External Affairs, Fiona Hyslop added, "The Acceptance in Lieu scheme allows the Scottish Government to accept important works of art into public ownership on behalf of Scotland's museum, gallery and archive collections. With up to 10 items allocated to Scotland each year, it is an excellent way to enrich the range of internationally renowned paintings and artefacts that are available for everyone in Scotland to enjoy. I was very pleased to be given the opportunity to allocate the Pierre Patel painting to the National Galleries of Scotland. It's an important and valuable acquisition and one which I hope gives great joy to the Galleries' many thousands of visitors."

The three PhD researchers will focus on two areas. One project will look at all aspects of Oyster design from an economic perspective – measured over the lifetime of a wave energy project. The other two will look at the development and implementation of control systems applicable to shore-based and offshore power take off systems.

Commenting on the award, Aquamarine Power Chief Executive Officer Paddy O'Kane said: "Aquamarine Power's aim is to become the world's leading supplier of utility-scale wave farm power stations. With the survivability and performance potential of our Oyster wave technology now largely proven following four years of continuous deployment at the European Marine Energy Centre in Orkney we are significantly advanced towards that goal. This collaboration with NUIM will now help us focus on driving down costs and further improving performance.

"We have been working informally and sharing our experience with NUIM for a number of years. We believe their research centre and team are at the very forefront of innovation in wave energy device optimisation and control. We very much look forward to working with them on this exciting new research programme with very clear academic and commercial goals – to significantly advance the efficiency and economic performance of future Oyster wave farm power stations," O'Kane concludes.

Commenting on the project, **Professor John Ringwood, Maynooth University said**:

"This is a very exciting project which has the potential to greatly advance the field of wave energy and progress its development as a commercially viable energy source. It's a great example of academia and industry collaborating to progress research which can have a monumental impact energy provision for future generations. Marine energy has enormous potential as an environmentally friendly and cost effective source of power. We look forward to working with our partners in Scotland in making a significant contribution to the evolution of wave energy research."

Lindsay Roberts, Senior Policy Manager for industry body Scottish Renewables said:

"Scotland leads the world in the development of wave energy devices, and it's fantastic to see that the European Union's commitment to the technology remains strong. Aquamarine Power's Oyster has generated some great results from its testing to date, and further work on power take-off will help ensure that it remains on course for commercialisation."

Today's award follows the recent announcement of £2million funding from Wave Energy Scotland to Aquamarine Power, Bosch Rexroth and Carnegie Wave Energy to complete testing of their scale prototype and deliver the design and specification for a full-scale prototype WavePOD offshore power take off system.

The funding for INNOWAVE was awarded as part of the EU's Horizon 2020 fund, the largest EU Research and Innovation programme with nearly €80 billion of funding, under the Marie Skłodowska-Curie grant agreement No 676061.

Edinburgh Marriott Hotel

Blending an American citrus hop with the tropical taste of New Zealand, the beer unusually uses Champagne yeast, which gives it a sparkling texture without being carbonated. The yeast also leaves a dry taste on the palate, offering drinkers a wine-like finish.

Taking more influence from the world of wine, the beer is uniquely served in a Vichy bottle; both look and feel makes it suitable for male and female drinkers.

The locally crafted brew has been a huge hit, with six cases selling out in less than two weeks. The hotel is currently working on its second brew as demand is so high.

Former Edinburgh stockbroker bidding for Crossfit Queen title

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A former stockbroker who switched careers to launch her dream of launching a fitness label is helping put one of the world's toughest fitness trends on the map in Scotland.

Lauren Moss's team vivimoss — named after her sportswear brand — is taking part in Beyond the Wall, a competition to find the best competitive CrossFit athletes in the country.

The 33-year-old left her job in the city's financial services sector to set up her new company featuring an eco-friendly sportswear range for men and women, inspired by her passion for the high-intensity fitness programme which combines aerobics, gymnastics and Olympic weightlifting.

Lauren, from Stockbridge, and her team vivimoss partner Amy Norton — who compete in distinctive hot pink and purple kit from Lauren's own range — qualified in third place for the Beyond The Wall final after submitting three workout videos for the online stages.

Now they are bidding to be named Queens of the North at the Beyond The Wall finals, which take place in front of a sellout audience this weekend.

Lauren took up CrossFit when she was working as a stockbroker in Edinburgh. Competitors in the fast-growing sport are considered among the world's fittest athletes and the recent CrossFit Games in California saw 250,000 people enter the online qualifiers.

She said: "For me, CrossFit is about a healthy lifestyle rather than just exercise – it encompasses healthy eating as well as fitness. I'm much more conscious of what I eat and drink and I'm now a lot leaner, healthier and physically stronger than before."

Last November, she took part in her first weightlifting competition, coming second in her class at the Weightlifting Scotland championships, an achievement she couldn't have imagined when she first took up CrossFit – or while working in the financial markets.

Lauren, who is also one of the competition sponsors, said: "There's a real community behind CrossFit — it's a big group of like-minded people who are supporting one another. That's why I'm delighted to support Beyond the Wall's bid to find the best athletes in Scotland and give them a platform to show their talents. Hopefully we can help to put competitive CrossFit on the map here."

Lauren's passion for fitness drew her to follow her dream and ambition of having her own fitness label and she founded vivimoss last summer. Her designs, for both men and women, are now stocked in a number of independent outlets in addition to the vivimoss online store.

She said: "After ten years in a job that was not fulfilling my hopes and dreams, I decided that I needed to make the leap. I felt that I couldn't find the kind of fitness clothing that I wanted to wear — simple and functional, yet comfortable and stylish, and that could take me from the gym to dog walking, to popping to the shops, or out for coffee.

Photography Exhibition 'If walls could talk' at Ocean Terminal from Friday

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A unique photographic exhibition charting the proud decline of an historic Fife factory is being held at The Design Exchange on the top floor of Ocean Terminal from 18th September to the 18th October.

Edinburgh photographer Jim Mackintosh recorded the final days of the Well Brae factory in Falkland, capturing not just the industrial heritage of the building and the equipment, but the spirit of the men and women who work there.

The relocation of paper bag making operations by Smith Anderson from Falkland to Kirkcaldy brought manufacturing to an end on a site that had seen continuous production since the 1890s. The transfer of work to a more modern and efficient site means that the workforce will continue to be employed, but the building and its contents, for long a Falkland landmark will be gone forever.

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Jim Mackintosh said: 'I had access to the site in its final months and tried to capture not just the drama and richness of the buildings and the machinery, but something of the spirit of the place. And the people too, for this is a site that has been the workplace for generations of skilled men and women who lived out much of their lives within these walls.

'Within the current workforce there are people with decades of service. A building with such a rich architectural heritage deserves to be recorded before the bulldozers arrive. But the people are what made the building come alive and they are just as important a part of the exhibition.

'Scotland's economy is always developing as manufacturing becomes increasingly sophisticated, and factories like Well Brae are slipping into the past. But these are the factories where millions of people lived their lives, provided for their families, met their life's love, laughed and cried. They are places which echo with stories.'

Cruel theft from 90-year-old man in Stenhouse

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Police are investigating following the theft of a sum of cash from a 90-year-old man which happened on Sunday at around 1.45pm when victim was using the ATM at Tesco Express in Stenhouse Place East.

When the cash dispensed from the ATM, the man waiting behind him grabbed the money and made off. He was last seen running towards the Saughton area, along Stevenson Drive.

The victim was not harmed as a result of the incident and

The suspect is described as a white man with a slim build. He is in his early thirties, has fair short hair and is around 5ft 6/7inches in height. It appears his nose has been broken several times. He was wearing a blue padded light jacket with a cord collar and blue jeans.

Inspector Bob Innes said: "This was a frightening attack on an elderly man, which has left him badly shaken.

"We are eager to trace the man responsible as soon as possible. Anyone who was in the area at the time, and saw anything suspicious, is asked to contact us immediately."

Spotlight to fall on Canongate during New Waverley development

The council has just announced funding for community groups working to improve the look of the New Waverley development in the Old Town during the time of its construction. The projects to be funded will include ideas like art installations and festival lighting.

The New Waverley Community Fund (NWCF) is a joint project between the City of Edinburgh Council and Artisan Real Estate Investors, the developers of New Waverley, which is one of the Edinburgh 12 sites. The total fund available is £200,000 including £100,000 being held by the Council from a previous developer.

Community groups were asked to make bids for not-for-profit organisations for up to £25,000. The City Centre Neighbourhood Partnership then recommended six projects from the 20 bids submitted. Over half of the funds are being allocated at the moment and in early 2016 there will be another opportunity to make a bid for funding up to £25,000.

Edinburgh World Heritage (EWH) will lead on two projects, to improve the New Calton Burial Ground and to bring festive lighting to the Canongate.

EWH announced: "The project at New Calton Burial Ground looks to increase awareness and engagement with one of the city's forgotten treasures, and also improve an important pedestrian route linking Calton Hill directly with the Canongate. Following on from the successes in other locations as part of the Edinburgh Graveyard Project, a volunteers group will be established to help promote and look after the burial ground, as well as adding new planting, interpretation and public events.

"We will also be working the council and the Canongate community to bring festive lighting to the area, creating a more appealing environment on dark winter evenings and increasing footfall to help support local businesses. A series of options will be considered, including using existing flag sockets to fix 3D white balls and providing a ceiling a white light stretching over the street at key points."

Clive Wilding, New Waverley's project director said: "These exciting projects show exactly why New Waverley is, and will become, such a special city centre destination. They all celebrate the unique attributes that the area has — both in its physical heritage and the wonderful nooks and crannies that you can find there. The projects include innovative art installations, the opening up of secret green spaces and the excitement of festive lighting — all becoming a brilliant and vibrant showcase highlighting what our development can bring to the city."

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Cllr Frank Ross, Convener of the Economy Committee, said "Work at the New Waverley site is now very visible and gathering pace. The development will create thousands of new jobs including apprenticeships, as well as boosting the local economy. Some really interesting projects have been successful and will help to create a real buzz in the area ahead of the development being completed."

The projects include:

Stars in New Waverley by Edinburgh UNESCO City of Literature Trust

To celebrate Edinburgh's UNESCO literature and heritage status, stunning light installations will showcase the area's literary heritage supported by a trail in the windows of businesses along the Royal Mile. Well known writers will be commissioned to provide words inspired by the city. These will then combine with the area's heritage to create large-scale light installations/interpretation through partnership with Edinburgh World Heritage's *Twelve Closes* project.

Edinburgh Art Festival New Waverley Commission by Edinburgh Art Festival

Commissioning of an artist to develop a significant new artwork for the railway bridge situated at the meeting point between New Street and Calton Road. The installation will provide a prominent arrival point to the New Waverley development, reinvigorating a space that needs to be brightened up.

Jacobs Ladder Community Garden by Old Town Development Trust

Develop the derelict land on the north side of Calton Road (around Jacobs Ladder and Railway Bridge). Residents in Calton Road and Tolbooth Wynd a would help to design a community garden which could be a wild flower garden, a forest garden, a vegetable site and/or an orchard.

Canongate Festive Lighting by Edinburgh World Heritage on behalf of several community partners

Installation of Christmas lighting in the Canongate (for an initial period of three to four festive seasons) to fulfil a long term aspiration of the Canongate community. It will help create a more visually appealing and welcoming night time environment for the Canongate, helping to encourage greater footfall and ensuring that the Canongate is included as part of the wider city centre festive celebrations.

Unlocking the secret of the New Calton Burial Ground by Edinburgh World Heritage

Stimulate better public access and use of the burial ground, enhance its appearance and encourage volunteers to join a "friends of" group. Increasing local community awareness and engagement with New Calton Burial Ground will significantly improve local amenity and the quality of life for residents, businesses and visitors in the New Waverley neighbourhood.

New Waverley – Community Art by Spectrum Arts

Organising community art projects, installations, murals and workshops around the site, primarily on hoardings. This is made up of four activities: a large scale mural where the local community would be consulted on proposals, hoarding "toppers" to soften the impact of the hoardings, artwork, workshops where the local community can participate in the learning and creation process, and street art events known as "jams".

Adam Wilkinson, Director of Edinburgh World Heritage said: "The Canongate is an important but overlooked part of the World Heritage Site. We are thrilled for all the successful applicants on their worthwhile projects, particularly because these are ideas generated by the local community, with the backing of local groups such as the Canongate and Holyrood Initiative, the Old Town Development Trust and the Royal Mile Business Association."

Top scorer Jason Cummings taking nothing for granted

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Being last season's top scorer in the Championship with 22 goals then starting this season in style with a further five should mean that Jason Cummings' name would be first on Alan Stubbs' team-sheets however the youngster is taking nothing for granted, particularly with the number and quality of strikers at the club following the transfer window.

Speaking immediately after Saturday's 3-0 victory over Alloa Athletic during which he scored the second goal, Cummings said: "There's plenty of competition for places and I'm looking over my shoulder. There are six or seven strikers who want to play so I need to keep working hard and scoring.

"I've got five goals already but I don't feel added pressure from being the top scorer in the Championship last season. I always want to improve my scoring record.

"You are kept on your toes and we have a good standard of strikers who want to play. But I've got a jersey at the moment."

There is more to Cummings' game than scoring however and Head Coach Alan Stubbs has drummed it into him that helping the team win is more important than notching up the goals.

He added "The gaffer said to me it's not necessarily about scoring — as long as I play well and do my best for the team I'll keep my place. But I do like scoring every week.

"In the past if I played rubbish but scored I'd be happy instead of playing well for the team and scoring. But he's happy if my all-round game is good and I link it up. "The gaffer only brings in quality players. Izzy looks really fast and sharp. I need to slot in at left-back in training games so some of them can get a shot up front. But competition is good."

Cummings has started the last two games alongside James Keatings and the pair have developed a strong partnership but there may have to be an enforced change for next week's game at Livingston as the former Hearts' striker had to leave the field with a hamstring injury.

Cummings continued: "I love playing with [Keatings. He does most of my runs and I just need to tap it in. I was gutted when he pulled up in the game. I hope it's not too bad.

"It was good to give the fans something to cheer about and top it off with a goal."

Dog found in water near Cockenzie believed to have been deliberately drowned

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The Scottish SPCA is appealing for information after the body of a dog was found next to water near Cockenzie Power Station in Prestonpans.

Scotland's animal welfare charity was alerted on Sunday (13 September) and believes the dog may have been intentionally drowned.

Inspector Emma Phillips said, "A member of the public came across the dog's body by the Firth of Forth next to Cockenzie Power Station.

"The dog had string tied around its neck which was attached to a rock. The person responsible would only have been able to tie the dog up at low tide which leads us to believe they may have intended to drown the dog. Where the dog was found is also relatively remote.

"Due to exposure to the water, the body was so badly decomposed we cannot identify the breed or age of the dog. We also cannot be sure how long the dog was tied up or the exact cause of death, though it is likely to have drowned.

"This is a particularly disturbing case and it seems this poor

dog was subjected to a horrific death which would have caused immense distress.

"We are urging anyone with any information to contact our animal helpline on 03000 999 999."

A pioneering veterinary scientist – described as being a hundred years ahead of his time – is to have a blue plaque unveiled in his honour later this morning.

Professor John Barlow (1815-1856) was an eminent scientist at the Edinburgh Veterinary College and a leading figure in the city's scientific community.

John Barlow was Professor of Anatomy and Physiology at the Edinburgh Veterinary College – now the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies at the University of Edinburgh – where he was the first to introduce the microscope into veterinary studies.

An event to commemorate Professor Barlow's life and work takes place on Monday (14 September) at his former home in Edinburgh. A blue plaque will be unveiled at 1 Pilrig Street, where Professor Barlow lived with his wife and three children.

The Lord Provost of Edinburgh, The Rt. Hon. Donald Wilson, and

Professor Brendan Corcoran, Deputy Head of School at the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies, will be in attendance. They will be joined by Professor Barlow's great grandson, Antony Barlow, and other members of the University of Edinburgh.

Professor William Williams, founder and Principal of the New Veterinary College in Edinburgh, said in 1893: "Professor Barlow was a pioneer of veterinary science, a man living one hundred years before his time. The others were rule of thumb practitioners, while he brought the light of science to bear upon the profession."

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REVIEW: Andrew Combs and Barna Howard at Voodoo Rooms

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Below the Voodoo Rooms restaurant is a tiny, intimate bar which is home to live music, easily compared to a small American bar in the middle of nowhere. But tonight the Americans are bringing that over to Edinburgh for a night of alternative country-folk. The soothing voice of Barna Howard, with songs ranging from romance to maturity, is impressive. Howard does not put a foot wrong in his half-hour show, but has a slightly awkward stage presence. It is clear that Howard's songs are delicately told stories but they do not hold too much attention for too long.

More excitement was bound to be had during Andrew Combs' set. He has a backing band to accompany his solo work, but it seems that the backing band are enjoying being there more than Combs is — by showing a lot more emotion and elation.

Yet his songs have a real meaning, and delve into real-life matters like not getting anything from his girl to fishing with random people.

Combs, and even Barna Howard for that matter, manage to successively flesh out simple, little anecdotes into full songs. The former introduces every song with a short explanation laced with traditional American country wit.

These two quite similar artists may offer something different for a Scottish audience, who are more acquainted to popular music that sits within the lines of rock and pop, but the predominantly older adult audience is always going to enjoy music along genres of folk and even country more easily than a younger one.

At best, however, it's a bracket of music that struggles to gain momentum in an indie-pop-loving-era. The tiny Voodoo Rooms audience of roughly 25 people was certainly intrigued.

Historic Environment Scotland granted charitable status

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Historic Scotland and The Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland (RCAHMS) announced they were to merge some time ago, but now they are to be combined into one body called Historic Environment Scotland (HES) and it has received charitable status from the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

The move marks another important milestone in the establishment of the new organisation, which takes up full operational powers on October 1st, following the merging of the two organisations into a new public body.

As a new Non Departmental Public Body (NDPB) with charitable status, HES will operate with a degree of independence while still being accountable to Scottish Ministers and Parliament when it officially starts work from the 1st of October. The move brings the new body closer in line with other national cultural bodies including the National Library of Scotland, the National Galleries of Scotland, The National Museum of Scotland and the Royal Botanic Gardens of Edinburgh. HES Chair, Jane Ryder has now written to the Convenor of the Scottish Parliament's Education and Culture Committee, MSP Stewart Maxwell, informing him of the new body's successful application to become a charity.

The functions of HES, as set out in the 2014 Historic Environment Scotland Act, support the advancement of education and the arts, heritage and culture and environmental protection or improvement, and were accepted by OSCR as the charitable purposes of the new body. The existing Historic Scotland Foundation (HSF) – set up in 2001 to accept donations, gifts and legacies for the work of Historic Scotland or any successor body – will remain a separate charity.

As the new body moves towards starting work in October, it has also recently appointed its first Chief Executive, David Middleton, who will take up his post in November, while work continues to develop the new organisation's first Corporate Plan.

Commenting on the granting of charitable status, Jane Ryder, OBE, Chair of HES, said: "Becoming a charity affirms our core purpose and is a status that carries great responsibility. The Board is delighted our application to OSCR has been successful and that we now have charitable status. This is another key milestone as we approach 1st October when we take on our full statutory responsibilities.

"While becoming a charity enables us to contribute to the wider good of Scotland more strategically, it also provides greater opportunities to develop our new organisation overall and its varied operations in future. Such status will also hopefully provide greater opportunities for the sector and assist us in performing our role as a key player in helping to deliver Scotland's first strategy for the Historic Environment, "Our Place in Time."

David Middleton (CBE) was announced last month as first Chief Executive of the new body.

David joins HES from Transport Scotland, where he has served as Chief Executive since February 2009, and will take up the post from mid-November.

David has a long and established career within the public sector having joined the Scottish Office in 1978 with his senior civil service appointments including key posts in Housing Policy and Finance. He was also Head of Personnel in the Scottish Office in the lead up to Devolution in 1999.

Since 1999, his posts have covered Local Government, Europe and Agriculture, a secondment to the University of Highlands and Islands (Millennium Institute) before becoming the Director of the Scotland Office and most recently Chief Executive of Transport Scotland.
