Rugby — Stewarts-Melville v Edinburgh Accies, BT National League, Div. 1

Accies get their season off the ground at Inverleith



Playing all of 0.9 miles away from home, Edinburgh Accies 'travelled' to Stewart-Melville's home ground at Inverleith for their third round match in the BT National League's Division 1. Stew-Mel came into the match with two wins from two matches while Accies had suffered two losses. According to various sources, however, neither team had played particularly well in the run up to the match, so it was all eyes to the pitch as the referee blew to start the match.

Initially, it looked like a poor start for the visitors as the wind took the kick off beyond Stew-Mel's dead ball line, forcing a scrum restart from the centre. It was immediately apparent that the home side scrum was in for a long afternoon as they just managed to retain the ball. However, less than two minutes in, the Accies pack turned over the ball from a ruck and, exploiting a gap up the left, wing Neil Armstrong galloped in from 30+ metres for the try. Facundo Beltrami, then stepped up to score with the conversion and Accies were 7-0 ahead.

For the next 20 minutes of the first half, play was fairly evenly distributed between the teams, with Stew-Mel possibly having the territorial advantage, but suffering a couple of turnovers in the process as the bigger Accies pack exerted a bit of dominance. But, 'evenly distributed' possession counted for little as Beltramino knocked over two penalties in the period of the match to stretch the visitors lead to 13-0.

Despite the penalty count against Stew-Mel climbing, they did have their own chance at points with just about 10 minutes to play, but, the, usually reliable, boot of Nick McCashin failed, and his attempt just made

it across the goal line. From the 22 restart the home side pressed for the next score, but had to settle for a, this time, successful penalty goal from McCashin with about five minutes of the half left. Accies then regained the restart ball and pushed the home side deep, pressure which was rewarded with a successful Beltramino penalty on 40 minutes, so the sides went in 16-3 at the break.

Five minutes into the second half and McCashin pulled back three points for Stew-Mel with a finely struck penalty from distance to close the score up a touch to 16-6.

By this time, the referee was losing patience with Stew-Mel's penalty count and, with another ruck infringement in the home 22, sub, Neil Bowie, saw yellow and was off for 10 minutes. Accies saw their chance, but their own penalty count was increased by two as they were penalised in a ruck and then again following the penalty lineout. This put Stew-Mel deep in the visiting half, but a dropped ball handed possession back to Accies.

They then used their extra man to great effect and, despite desperate defence from Stew-Mel, they scored their second try from a rolling maul off the top of a five metre lineout, Jamie Sole coming up with the ball. With another successful Beltramino kick, the score had now opened up to 23-6 with just over 20 minutes left to play.

Just as in the first half, the home side found their feet and were easily the better side for the next 10 minutes or so. They came near to scoring down the right, but eventually crossed the line with a fine passing move which saw No. 14, Ross McCann forcing himself over near the left corner. With McCashin's conversion just shaving the front of the posts, the score remained at 23-11.

Almost chasing down a clearance from the restart saw Stew-Mel inside Accies 22 again, but some fine play had the visitors clear after a few neat moves and deep in the home half. A ruck on the right was badly dealt with by the Stew-Mel defence and Accies no. 6, Jamie Winks, had a virtually clear run in to the line — almost losing his shorts, but displaying a fine line in Edinburgh Accies branded underwear in the

process! Once again, Beltramino was on song with his kicking and, with just enough time for the restart, the score was 30-11.

And it was a restart that one Stew-Mel player soon wished had never happened.

with Stew-Mel on the attack, the ball was lost forward and Accies set up to clear. With frustration mounting, one of the Stew-Mel players 'got in the way'. He was then 'moved on' by Accies Swanepoel, but Matt Stevens from the home side saw red, picked up the Accies player and dumped him on his head. Needless to say, this initiated a, thankfully, brief mêlée and the whole thing 'kicked off' with players flying in from all angles. When the dust had settled, the referee had no option but to have Stevens literally see red as he carded him following a short conference with his assistant on the touch line.

Accies then cleared the ball to touch to bring, what had been a fairly scrappy match, to a disappointing — for Stew-Mel — conclusion.

Images from the match will appear <u>here</u> over the next few days. As Matt Stevens will, in all likelihood, be facing an SRU disciplinary hearing, images of the incident will be withheld.

Alan Stubbs' verdict on Alloa victory



Hibs' Head Coach was happy with the performance of his defence, midfield and strikers during yesterdays comfortable win over Alloa Athletic at Easter Road. Apart from the first minute when the Wasps had two good chances, Hibs dominated

throughout creating attack after attack and scoring three times.

In addition to the squad, Stubbs also had a number of first team members sitting in the stand, including Fraser Fyvie, Jordon Forster, Sam Stanton, Farid El Alagui, Henri Anier, Adam Eckersley and Danny Handling, but it was the players on the park that he wanted to discuss.

Speaking immediately after the game Stubbs said: "It's important that we keep a clean sheet because of the attacking quality that we have in the team. We've got goals in us.

"It's important that the boys at the back do their job because it gives those front of them a licence to go and create opportunities. You have to give Alloa a bit credit because they got behind the ball early on and they obviously frustrated us and they worked really hard, but one lapse in concentration and we managed to get the goal then in the end we could have scored one or two more, but 3-0 at home is a good days work.

"When I first came Easter Road was talked about as not being a fortress and how vulnerable the players were playing at home but that is one thing we have addressed since we've came. Our home form is very good. I think we only had a couple of defeats in the whole of the season but we drew too many and we are hoping to try and improve on that.

"The midfield are a very talented bunch. Dylan (McGeouch) has come and he has really lifted everybody. John McGinn will just get better and better, Marvin Bartley does the unnoticed jobs and gives them the licence to get forward and obviously we've got Fraser (Fyvie) and Liam (Henderson so we do have a riches of talent there.

"The strikers in the squad can't all play but when they are in there as long as we are creating chances, the ones that are picked will get opportunities. it;'s the one position that every manager wants to see competition in numbers is the strikers. We've got for the first time now a real healthiness about the striking options and it's great but obviously I can't keep everybody happy but as long as long as the team that goes on the pitch keeps the fans and me and the board happy that's the most important thing.

Edinburgh International Book Festival — Tom McCarthy

The Secret Logic of Oil Slicks and Traffic Jams



Chaired by Stuart Kelly, Tom McCarthy's event laid it on thick and heavy for a Saturday evening in Charlotte Square, referencing authors such as Chesterton, Kafka and James Joyce, and theorists, Adorno and Deleuze.

Satin Island is set around U, a corporate anthropologist, Man Booker long-listed, and obviously embodied with theory and meaning, as this book seems to speak about our digital culture and more specifically, buffering. The crowd just has to glance at the book jacket to gauge that it's a novel set significantly in a technologically post-modern age.

The hour with Kelly and McCarthy fundamentally revolved around themes of connection, disconnection, technological age,

profound meaning, Edward Snowden and theology. As aforementioned, no light material for a weekend evening at the book festival. "The art of literature is about the production of meaning," exclaimed McCarthy himself, as Kelly probed him on his novels resonating with that idea.

Tom McCarthy, writer and artist, was born in London in 1969. He grew up in Greenwich, south London and was educated at Dulwich College (1978 to 1986) and later New College, Oxford, where he studied English literature. Well-travelled, with a profound interest in duplication and repetition, it would be interesting to gauge whether McCarthy is familiar with William Gibson and other dystopian sci-fi authors, which the event served to rekindle my own interest in.

McCarthy highlighted that within *Satin Island*, "matter is irredeemably subversive." Satin obviously holds connotations of Staten Island in New York but if we look at variations of the title it only enhances its interest and meaning.

A stain is corrosive and thus the title of the island, and therefore the novel, carries subtexts of hidden meaning. The internet in this world is the salon. Adorno, Deleuze and Barthes are all incorporated into this book structure and Snowdon's revelations came out around about the time that Tom McCarthy was writing this work, influencing the content and structure. Fascinated with these ideas of repetition and reenactment, it would appear that *Satin Island* should be predictable, yet nothing short of rapturous for the likes of this well-read artist. It's safe to say I headed directly to buy a copy of this Booker long-list nominee.



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

Jeremy Corbyn who went from being a reluctant candidate to the favourite was elected as the new Labour Party leader yesterday.

Commenting on the result of the Labour Party leadership contest, SNP leader and First Minister Nicola Sturgeon said:

"We congratulate Jeremy Corbyn on his victory and hope that we can work constructively with him in a progressive alliance against Tory austerity. We also call on him to give an early commitment that Labour MPs will join the SNP in voting against the £100 billion renewal of Trident.

"However, the reality today is that at a time when the country needs strong opposition to the Tories, Jeremy Corbyn leads a deeply, and very bitterly, divided party. Indeed, if Labour cannot quickly demonstrate that they have a credible chance of winning the next UK general election, many more people in Scotland are likely to conclude that independence is the only alternative to continued Tory government.

"In the meantime, it is clearer than ever that the only credible and united opposition to the Tories, north and south

of the border, is the SNP."

Patrick Harvie has today congratulated Jeremy Corbyn on his victory in the Labour leadership contest in the face of attacks from the party's right wing. However, Harvie remains doubtful of Labour's ability to win back votes in Scotland, as the Scottish Greens prepare for a campaign to represent the left voice in the Holyrood election in 2016.

Patrick Harvie, MSP for Glasgow and Co-convenor of the Scottish Green said:

"Jeremy Corbyn is due huge congratulations for winning this election in the face of relentless attacks from Labour's right wing. The debate, enthusiasm and ideas his campaign has invigorated have been missing from the Labour Party for far too long. Many of those ideas have long been held by the Greens, from sharing society's wealth more fairly and ending vicious austerity, to more investment in sustainable jobs and the return of public services to public hands.

"However, all the signs suggest that those who hold power behind the scenes within Labour will do anything to stop the party from from returning to its roots, even with a capable, principled leader in place. It remains to be seen weather Corbyn can revive his party's democracy before his position is undermined by those who have lost the democratic debate.

"For all his merits, Jeremy Corbyn has had little to say about how he would support a stronger voice for Scotland, and Labour north of the border is struggling to reconnect with the voters it lost during its cynical campaign against independece. That seems unlikely to change in eight months before the Holyrood election, and the Scottish Greens will be campaigning with our new membership to build a strong left opposition in the next Scottish Parliament."

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

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Serious sexual assault in Princes Street



Police are appealing for witnesses following a serious sexual assault in the city-centre which happened around 4am today on Princes Street, outside the Primark store.

An 18-year-old woman was approached and attacked by a male who thereafter made off on foot westbound along Princes Street.

It is believed the suspect then entered a taxi before being dropped off in the Oxgangs Road North area around 5am.

Anyone who can help officers trace this male is asked to come forward.

He is described as white, 18-25 years-old with a slim build and strawberry blond/ginger hair that was short at the sides and longer on top.

He was wearing a white short-sleved polo top with three buttons, a dark logo on the left breast and a dark stain around the stomach; blue skinny jeans and trainers.

This male spoke with a local accent.

Police also think he may have been in the company of a group of other males and one female prior to this incident.

Detective Chief Inspector Alwyn Bell said: "This was a horrendous sexual assault, which has left the young victim traumatised and we are currently providing her with all the necessary support she requires.

"We have been conducting extensive CCTV inquiries as well as forensic investigation at the scene but I would ask anyone who can help us trace the suspect contacts police immediately.

"In addition, anyone who remembers seeing anything suspicious in or around Princes Street around 4am on Saturday morning should also get in touch."

Hearts Must Learn to Walk Before They Can Run



Hearts Head Coach Robbie Neilson was ruefully reflecting on his side's second league defeat of the season following the 2-0 reversal in Inverness on Friday evening.

After a blistering start to their Ladbrokes Premiership campaign, Hearts tonight sit third in the league, three points behind leaders Aberdeen — who visit Gorgie next Sunday.

However, Neilson believes the Maroon Army — some of whom were quick to criticise their team's performance in the Highlands — should perhaps reflect on where the club were just a few months ago.

"We're a Championship team who were promoted in the summer," Neilson told the official Hearts website. "Yes, we've had a great start to the season but our priority is to get in the top six. That's what we want.

"We were playing on Friday night against a team that finished third in the league and won the Scottish Cup, at home, and they're a decent team. We can't expect just to turn up here and pick up three points. We have to come up here and compete and work really hard.

"Sometimes you need the rub of the green to get a victory up here. It's been a long time since a Hearts team has won here. We have to be realistic about where we are and we don't get carried away."

"In the top league you have to compete in every game," Neilson went on. "You have to compete and earn the right to win the game, and I just didn't think we did that. We didn't pass it as well as we can but that came from not thinking enough to try and get into good areas.

"It's such a hard league, especially when you get promoted and bring in a lot of new guys and a lot of young guys."

Hearts are, perhaps, victims of their own success following their room to the Championship last season. If, at the start of the season, someone had suggested Hearts would be third in the league after seven games, it's fair to say the majority of Hearts supporters would have accepted it. The defeats from Hamilton Academical and Inverness Caledonian Thistle will have brought unrealistic expectations down a peg or two and that's no bad thing. Perhaps people who should really know better — step forward former Hearts captain Steven Pressley and current

full back Juwon Oshaniwa — will give serious thought before expressing views that Hearts can win the league. The team must first learn to walk before it can run.

Neilson is certain to make changes for the visit of the Dons next weekend and the Maroons will hope to preserve their 100% home record in what promises to be the game of the weekend in Scotland.

Police appeal to identify woman who fell from bridge in Slateford

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Police are appealing for assistance from the public to help identify a woman who died in the west of the city today.

Officers responded to Slateford Road at its junction with Craiglockhart Avenue at around 2.50pm following reports of a female having fallen from the footbridge.

Alloa started brightly and created two good chances within the first minute however from then on it was one way traffic as Hibs dominated possession. For the umpteenth time this season, Hibs were denied a clear cut penalty when Keatings was bundled over in the box but the referee infuriated the fans by waving play on then lecturing Stubbs for protesting.

In the 39th minute David Gray and Chopra were booked after an altercation following a challenge then Hibs took a deserved lead a few minutes later. McGinn sent an inch perfect through ball into the path of Cummings. He was fouled after the ball left his feet, but the referee played advantage and Cummings fired a low shot toward the bottom left hand corner of the net. David Crawford did well to save the strike but he could only parry the ball into the path of Henderson who slotted the ball home from six yards.

Hibs added a second just after the restart. A Keatings free kick rebounded to him off the wall and he set up Gray who dummied a shot before sliding the ball to Cummings. The striker showed good composure before side footing the ball into the net from a tight angle.

Hibs wrapped things up in the 64th minute with a well worked goal. Henderson rolled a corner into the path of McGinn who side footed the ball into the net to make it 3-0.

Keatings sustained a knock and had to leave the field being replaced by Martin Boyle as Hibs continued to attack. Feruz then replaced Henderson who left the field to a standing ovation, as did Cummings who was later replaced by Dominique Malonga.

Malonga almost added a fourth from a McGinn corner but his close range shot was tipped over the bar as Hibs held on to

claim the three points.

Letter from Scotland



On Wednesday I found myself curiously drawn to an obscure railway halt on the outskirts of Edinburgh to witness two historic events — the re-opening of the Borders rail line and the Queen's "Victoria Day," the day she overtook Queen Victoria as Britain's longest reigning monarch. A small crowd had gathered at Newcraighall to watch proceedings but, because of confusion over the timing, most of us were away having coffee when the Queen's steam train went puffing by. We'd missed our moment in history. But in our virtual age, when so little is "live", we were able to catch up on events later on television.

The day left many of us reflecting on how things change. The Queen herself noted how many milestones she'd passed in her 63 years on the throne. She herself has changed from being an institution to being a celebrity. We celebrate her personal qualities rather than her office, personal qualities of loyalty, commitment to duty, her steady and sympathetic eye on all that is happening. And we, (some of us at least), take with a happy shrug of the shoulders the fact that the institution of monarchy is a contradiction of our modern belief in democracy.

As in Victoria's time, much has happened in Elizabeth's reign but it would be fascinating to see how it is all summed up in, say, a hundred years' time. Will "Elizabethan" be as pejorative a word as "Victorian" is to us today?

Take the railways as an example. First we axed them, now we are re-opening them. Then we nationalised them, then we denationalised them, and now we've half nationalised them again. But however it's come back to life, the new Waverley line from Edinburgh to Tweedbank is a great thing. It will open up the Borders and ease the housing pressure on Edinburgh. The 30 miles of track have cost £294m and taken three years to build.

Of course, with our usual short-termism, the line is only single-track, is not electrified and leaves you in the middle of nowhere, a twenty minute walk from Melrose. But it's a start and, if other rail re-openings are anything to go by, it will soon be carrying far more than its target of 650,000 passengers a year.

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I wonder how many bicycles it will take ? Not that the hundred or so participants in the Tour of Britain were interested in the train on Wednesday. I watched them speed past me near Arthur's Seat as they set out on the fourth stage of the race, from Edinburgh to Blyth in Northumberland, a mere 136 miles

away. The lycra stars were hunched over their handlebars — Sir Bradley Wiggins, Mark Cavendish, Dylan van Baarle and Colombian Fernado Gaviria who eventually won that day's stage. I didn't expect such an entourage — police outriders, race officials, media cameras, team cars with spare bikes on the roof-racks, and, ominously, an ambulance. It was quite a cavalcade.

As I write, we are expecting the result of another race, the UK Labour leadership. If as expected, Jeremy Corbyn, crosses the line first, either hands in the air or hunched over his handlebars, Labour in Scotland will have a little adjusting to do.

Already, the new leader here Kezia Dugale has had to row back from her view that a Corbyn victory would lead to Labour carping from the sidelines of British politics. And this morning I heard Labour's only MP in Scotland, Ian Murray, hint that he would, after all, join Corbyn's front bench team if asked. The problem for Labour in Scotland is that many of its Corbynesque members have already deserted the party for the SNP.

One Labour man we will have to watch out for in future is Frank McAveety. He's just been re-elected leader of the city council in Glasgow. This cheerful bouncing ball is back after a spell as leader in the 1990s and then a period as a Minister in the Labour-led Scottish governments of the early 2000s. All that seems such a long time ago, another example of Elizabethan times a-changing.

Times are changing too down at St Abbs. I've spent many a pleasant afternoon walking round this old fishing village on the Berwickshire coast, watching the sea birds wheeling round the cliffs, the creel fishermen offshore and the diving boats going to and fro. The village has been in the news this week because it's losing its 104-year-old lifeboat station.

The RNLI say the St Abbs lifeboat has only been launched an average of nine times a year in recent decades and even then, it's worked in conjunction with the Eyemouth lifeboat which is only a few miles away. But the folk in St Abbs are not going down without a fight, there's a campaign under way to start a private lifeboat station, which they say will be worth it even if it only saves one life. That's easy to say, harder to do. I'm afraid they are swimming against the tide of time.

But time itself will tell.

Gannet chick rescued at Bass Rock



The Scottish SPCA is caring for a two week old gannet chick that was stranded on rocks at the Bass Rock near North Berwick.

Scotland's animal welfare charity was alerted on Sunday (30 August) after the bird was found by staff at the Scottish Seabird Centre.

The young gannet is now being reared at the charity's National Wildlife Rescue Centre in Fishcross, until he is ready to be released.



Centre manager Colin Seddon said, "The chick was stranded on the rocks as it is very young and cannot fly. It is likely that it was knocked out of its nest on the Bass Rock which is home to over 150,000 gannets. It is now being hand fed and we will care for it for four to six weeks until it is able to fly and then we'll take it back to North Berwick to be released."

Sorley Maclean and the Edinburgh Seven to be honoured with plaques



Some of the most important historic figures to Edinburgh will be recognised by three new plaques to be installed across the capital.

Historic Scotland's Commemorative Plaque Scheme will

honour the contributions to Scottish society of Sorley Maclean, Baroness Florence Horsburgh, and a group known as the Edinburgh Seven, who were the first women to be admitted on a degree programme at any university in Britain. They are three of eight historical groups or figures to be recognised by the scheme, now in its fourth year. The intention is to celebrate the life and achievements of significant historic figures, through the erection of a plague on the home where they lived, or a building synonymous with their achievements. Nominations for the scheme are submitted by the public before an independent panel of experts review and select the final recipients. Sorley Maclean was one of the most significant Scottish poets of the 20th Century and once taught English at Edinburgh's Boroughmuir High School. Recognised all over the world for his contribution to Scottish culture, his Gaelic language poetry explores the beauty and passion of love, as well as the horrors of war, which he experienced first-hand in the western desert in World War Two. He died in 1996 at the age of 85. His plague is set to be installed in Viewforth, Bruntsfield.

Baroness Florence Horsburgh was a Scottish Unionist Party politician and champion of social welfare issues, born in 1889. She introduced a private members bill in Parliament which eventually led to the Adoption of Children Act (1939), and was promoted to a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) for her services. She also played a prominent role in the preparation and development of a scheme which eventually led to the formation of the National Health Service. She died in 1969 and her plaque is set to be installed in East Camus Place, Edinburgh.

The Edinburgh Seven were the first group of matriculated undergraduate female students at any British university. They began studying medicine at the University of Edinburgh in 1869 amidst a storm of public criticism. Although ultimately thwarted in their attempts to graduate as doctors, the campaign they fought won them many supporters and gained national attention. It put the right of women to a university education on the political agenda, and in 1877 legislation was

passed to ensure women were no longer denied the chance to study at universities.

The latest round of plaque recipients were announced by Cabinet Secretary for Culture, Europe and External Affairs, Fiona Hyslop at a ceremony in the University of Edinburgh Anatomical Museum this morning. Speaking at the ceremony she said: "This latest round of plaque recipients celebrates a range people from different walks of life and various periods of Scottish history. It's especially encouraging to see a greater representation this year for women, including Florence Horsburgh, who championed social welfare in the 20th century; Christian Missionary Jane Haining, who sadly lost her life in Auschwitz concentration camp; and of course The Edinburgh Seven, who in 1869 blazed a trail which eventually led to legislation allowing women to finally be admitted to universities in this country.

"Other recipients of the plaque include Henry Bell, the Scottish engineer who introduced the first successful passenger steamboat service in all of Europe; Aviation pioneer Andrew Blain Baird; the founder of the Boys Brigade, Sir William Alexander Smith; Gaelic poet Sorley Maclean — arguably one of the most influential Scottish poets of the 20th century; and the shipbuilder (amongst other things) best known for designing the Cutty Sark, Hercules Linton.

"I hope that today's announcement will lead to a far greater recognition of the contribution each of these remarkable people have made to Scottish society and, in many cases, to the wider world."

Martin Ross, Policy and Projects Manager at Historic Scotland said: "In the last four years the number of nominations to the scheme has grown rapidly, and this latest round produced a wide range of potential recipients, from a broad spectrum of society. The end result is eight recipients who have undoubtedly contributed significantly to the advancement of

their particular field, both in Scotland and further afield. In many cases their legacies continue to make a difference, many years later.

"I would like to thank all those who submitted applications, and remind them that nominations for the next round of plaques are being accepted from the end of this month."

New approaches to tackling fuel poverty in Scotland

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"Everyone involved in tackling fuel poverty needs to dig even deeper to wipe out this unnecessary hardship," says a spokesman for Changeworks, the environmental charity which is organising this month's Fuel Poverty Conference in Edinburgh.

The event on 23 September 2015 is designed to bring together policy makers, service managers and frontline practitioners to share best practice, rethink current approaches to fuel poverty and identify opportunities and improvements for the future.

Speakers include Margaret Burgess MSP, Minister for Housing and Welfare, David Sigsworth, Chair of Scottish Fuel Poverty Forum, Di Alexander, Chair of the new Scottish Rural Fuel Poverty Task Force, Ross Armstrong, Transition Manager for Warmworks Scotland and Amanda Britain, Lead for Housing, Joint Improvement Team.

A person is deemed to be living in fuel poverty if they need to spend more than 10 per cent of their household income on fuel, to heat their home to a satisfactory standard.

Teresa Bray, Changeworks Chief Executive, said: "With 39% of

Scottish households living in fuel poverty it is clear that the statutory target to eradicate fuel poverty by November 2016 will not be achieved. Too many people are still living in fuel poverty in Scotland. A new action plan is required.

"Changeworks has spent over 20 years working with the Scottish Government, local authorities and other partners to address fuel poverty. While many of these initiatives are helping to improve people's lives, save money and reduce energy use — more needs to be done.

"Bringing together policy makers and practitioners is the only way to ensure any new action plan is built on the latest ideas and experience proven to make the most difference."

Remade in Edinburgh expanding beyond the capital



Remade in Edinburgh is rolling out its innovative reuse and repair centre — the Edinburgh Remakery — to other cities in

the UK.

Since 2012 Remade in Edinburgh has offered a place where anyone can learn to fix everyday items such as clothing, computers and furniture, offering repair workshops, selling refurbished computers and campaigning for goods to be designed to last. It has won three awards and now diverts 70 tonnes of waste a year and employs a team of five, with an additional 20 volunteers and freelance tutors, and 2,000 supporters.

Competitive 'Scale up' funding and business support from Lloyds Bank, School for Social Entrepreneurs and The Big Lottery will allow Remade to pilot a social franchise programme which will offer training and support to other community groups and organisations.

Remade's Founder and Director Sophie Unwin said: "The ultimate vision is to see a Remakery in every city across the UK — starting with two pilot projects. We want to help repair come back into fashion and make it mainstream. Our innovative business model has grown each year — we think it's an idea whose time has come. Repair education creates many more skilled jobs than recycling, builds relationships in the community and is good for the planet. "

Remade's computer expert Sotiris Katsimpas says "Too often people throw their technology away when, with a bit of knowledge, their existing kit can be fixed. At Remade we show people how to extend the life of their machines, saving them money and teaching them new skills in the process."

Edinburgh Councillor Alex Lunn has supported the project from its early days when it started with £60 and a group of volunteers. He said: "If the economic malaise of the last few years has shown us anything it's that we need to change. The Remakery is a practical step towards economic and environmental sustainability. It's also a huge opportunity for teaching and employability opportunities."

New pilot opportunities are currently being identified, with possibilities emerging in Glasgow, Manchester, Dumfries and Devon.

Three men arrested in connection with housebreakings in Edinburgh



Three men have been arrested and charged with a number of housebreaking offences in the Edinburgh area.

Two men, aged 20 and 21, have been arrested in connection with five domestic housebreakings across the city. They were arrested yesterday (Wednesday, September 9) and will appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court today (Thursday, September 10).

Superintendent Alan Porte said: "Tackling both domestic and commercial housebreaking remains a top priority for police in Edinburgh Division. It is unacceptable that some people in our community commit these offences, clearly showing no respect for the property of others.
