Scottish SPCA appeal after snake found in West Pilton Bank

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The Scottish SPCA is appealing for information after a four foot long anaconda was found on an Edinburgh street. Scotland's animal welfare charity was alerted on Saturday (1 August) after street cleaner Gordon Fraser discovered the snake at West Pilton Bank.

The yellow anaconda, nicknamed William, is now in the care of the charity's Edinburgh and Lothians Animal Rescue and Rehoming Centre in Balerno.

Gordon said, "I noticed the snake lying behind some cardboard next to a fence and thought it was a toy at first. Then it moved and I realised it was real.

"The snake looked in really poor condition so I tried to coax him into a cardboard box and we took him back to the depot. I'm pretty shocked to find out the snake is an anaconda.

"My colleagues kept telling me not to touch him but I don't think he would have survived for much longer if I hadn't helped him."

Inspector June Chalcroft said, "Yellow anacondas need experienced owners as they are temperamental and will bite. "However, William was extremely thin and dehydrated when he was found curled up outside and he didn't put up a fight.

"We rescue all types of animals, including snakes, but they tend to be smaller species such as corn snakes. It's extremely rare for a four foot anaconda to be found in public. "After being treated at a vets for three days, William is now being looked after at our rescue centre and is much brighter.

"At this stage we don't know how he came to be found outside. He may have escaped from home but we also have to consider the possibility he has been abandoned.

"We are keen to hear from anyone who recognises this anaconda or has any information on 03000 999 999."

Man arrested following spate of housebreakings in West End

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A 28-year-old man has been arrested following s spate of housebreaking in the west end of Edinburgh.

Between June and August a number of break ins were reported to police and dedicated housebreaking officers have since been investigating each of these incidents.

A search of an address in Morrison Crescent was carried out on 29th July and various items of stolen property were recovered from within.

A 28-year-old man was subsequently detained on Wednesday 6th August and interviewed in connection with seven thefts following break-ins to properties in Gardiners Crescent, Upper Grove Place, Dalry Road and Torphicen Street.

He was charged with each of these crimes as well as two other

housebreaking-related offences in Lothian Road and Morrison Street.

The man is scheduled to appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court today.

Superintendent Alan Porte said: "This is yet another excellent arrest for a spate of offences and once again demonstrates our commitment to tackling housebreaking.

"Every report of acquisitive crime is treated with the utmost seriousness and is investigated thoroughly by our officers to bring those responsible to justice.

"In addition to our continued enforcement activity we remain keen to promote crime prevention and I would urge all home and business owners to visit our website at <u>www.scotland.police.uk</u> for vital information on safeguarding your property."

Police appeal after woman attacked in Craiglockhart

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Police are appealing for witnesses following a sexual assault which happened around 10.30pm yesterday at the junction of Craiglockhart Road and Craiglockhart Quadrant.

A 21-year-old woman was walking home when a male approached her from behind and indecently assaulted her.

A struggled ensued and the victim forced the male off, who then ran off onto Craiglockhart Road.

Detectives are now urging anyone who can assist with their ongoing inquiry to come forward.

The suspect is described as white, 5ft 7ins tall with a slim build. He was wearing a grey hooded top and dark tracksuit bottoms.

Detective Chief Inspector Alwyn Bell said: "This was a terrifying incident for the young woman and thankfully she was able to fend her attacker off before she came to any serious harm.

"I would ask anyone who remembers seeing any suspicious activity within Craiglockhart Road or the wider Craiglockhart area on Wednesday night contacts police immediately.

"Similarly, anyone who recognises the description of the suspect or who has information that can help us locate him is asked to get in touch."

Astroturf stolen from Craigour Park Primary School

During this a 16-metre roll of Astroturf, which had recently been installed on the sports pitch, were stolen from the site.

The cost of the damage is still being estimated and police are now urging anyone who can assist with their inquiry to come forward.

Inspector Graeme Nisbet said: "The theft of this new artificial surface will result in further cost for the school and will mean a delay for the pupils before they can use the pitch again.

"We are keen to trace those responsible for this selfish act and I would ask that anyone, who remembers seeing any suspicious activity around the school between Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, contacts police immediately.

"In addition, anyone with any further information relevant to this investigation should also get in touch."

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Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2015 REVIEW Katie and the Mona Lisa Musical ****

Planet Theatre Productions`charming adaptation of James Mayhew`s award-winning eponymous illustrated younger readers`book is a sixty minute musical menagerie of Renaissance stealth Art appreciation and Panto audience banter. Adapted and directed by Adrian Brown with jingly catchy songs from Robert Hainault, there is an abundance of giggles and charm to satisfy old and young alike.

The neo-classical marbled stage is set. Enter a singing London Routemaster bus – destination? The National Gallery, Trafalgar Square. Katie's first question to her Gran is, `Did Nelson climb to the top of the column because he was afraid of the lions?` A test Katie will face herself on her later Venician adventure. Meanwhile, along in the gallery, the enigmatic Gioconda smiles as Katie trills a ditty unawares that she is being followed with Renaissance retinal rigour!

Now, there's potential for some 'she's behind you!' routines here and maybe that will come as the cast become more confident to wind the kids up. The lonely Mona Lisa steps out of her frame (on loan from The Louvre for articstic licence, thankyou) to take Katie on a tour of classical pictures. Thus begins Katie`s mission – a galloping guide through the galleries. But, can she help Mona recapture her enigmatic smile as well?

On their quest they encounter a smooth-talking charmer in St. George who takes time out from killing a seriously kitsch dragon to woe the, frankly, flattered Mona.

Perhaps the mid-show scene where Mona wants to dance with the Three Graces puppets (cleverly conceived and certainly going for the laughs) needs to engage the kids more whilst the Venetian, San Marco flying lion, *Leo, maybe needs to engage in some extra initial pant scaring? His singing gondolier tableau is a utter delight that shifts scene so quickly the delight is only momentary. A minor grumble – a small thorn in the paw, if you will! Treasure it.

There is a seaside, matinee Panto innocence to this show that climaxes with a slapstick denouement and closes with a let's all make up and be friendly homily with inevitable ensemble harmonies. Thoroughly recommended and a perfect excuse to dip in to the superb Dorling Kindersley Annotated Art where Mona, amongst others, gets the full on beauty treatment.

Holyrood moves closer towards ending of Air Passenger Duty

Scottish Ministers have marked a new milestone towards reform and reduction of Air Passenger Duty (APD) in Scotland.

Deputy First Minister John Swinney and Infrastructure Secretary Keith Brown will this afternoon jointly chair the first meeting of the Scottish APD stakeholder forum – marking the latest stage in fiscal devolution plans – as part of the Scottish Government's commitment to cutting APD by 50 per cent during the lifetime of the next Parliament.

The Smith Commission recommended last year that power to control APD be devolved to Holyrood via the Scotland Bill, which is currently being considered at Westminster.

Speaking during a visit to Edinburgh Airport – Scotland's busiest – the two ministers also announced the launch of a policy consultation on Scottish APD this autumn.

Mr Swinney said:

"Scotland's airports are busier than ever and the Scottish

Government wants to see that success grow further to the benefit of passengers, business, tourism and our wider economy.

"The APD stakeholder forum brings together interested parties – from those in the aviation industry to environmental groups and tax practitioners – to provide expert input into how a replacement tax could work.

"We want to be consultative and collaborative as we have been with the new fiscal levers already devolved to Scotland. The forum and this autumn's policy consultation allow us to take the next step and begin the process of designing and developing a Scottish APD to help deliver our objective of sustainable economic growth.

"They are also further examples of the Scottish Government moving ahead with pace and purpose to ensure we are ready to use Scotland's new additional powers as soon as possible after they have been devolved."

Mr Brown added:

"With the latest Ernst and Young survey showing Scotland remains the most successful part of the UK outside London in attracting foreign direct investment, Scotland is already an attractive destination for business and inbound tourism and we want to open up Scotland to key and emerging markets to capitalise on the opportunities that exist.

"UK APD has been the most expensive tax of its kind in Europe and continues to act as a barrier to Scotland's ability to secure new direct international services and maintain existing ones.

"Devolution of APD to the Scottish Parliament will provide the opportunity to put in place new arrangements which better support the Scottish Government's objective to help generate new direct routes and increase inbound tourism. Our plan to initially cut APD and then abolish it when public finances permit is a fundamental component to improving Scotland's international connectivity"

Sir John Elvidge, Chairman, Edinburgh Airport, said: "Our report earlier in the year showed very clearly that APD is placing a drag on Scotland's economic growth, costing jobs and millions of pounds in lost revenue.

"We've long supported its devolution and are keen to work with the Scottish Government to ensure that the process is as smooth and as quick as possible. Clarity around the timing of any reduction in APD is vital for route development and we hope that this forum will be able to provide that."

Kate Sherry, Ryanair's Deputy Director of Route Development, said: "One need only look to Ireland to see the effect scrapping APD has had, with tourist traffic rising by almost 10 per cent since APD was abolished in April 2014 and the VAT received from the additional tourist spend far exceeding the loss of APD.

"We welcome the opportunity to share our views at the Scottish Air Passenger Duty stakeholder forum and support any initiatives to axe this tax."

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George Street traffic Harmonium Project Tickets at Edinburgh Airport Fringe Tip of the Day Today at the Edinburgh Art Festival <u>In September 2014</u> the Council introduced a dedicated two-way cycle lane, additional pedestrian space and a one-way traffic system for cars as part of a one-year-trial.

This week the cycle lane on the north side of George Street between Castle Street and Frederick Street has been closed to cyclists. Twitter has run amok with comments on the arrangement and the council sent an officer to look into it.

According to the council the changes aimed to make the street more attractive to shoppers, residents and tourists, and were approved as part of a wider city centre vision in $\frac{0 \text{ ctober}}{2013}$.

Upon completion of the trial in September this year, an advisory cycle lane will be introduced on the north side of the street for eastbound cyclists and on the south side of the street for westbound cyclists. The street will also revert to four lanes of traffic while the Council considers the results of the trial and the street's future layout.

An independently-led design process is already underway, and has been specifically set up to involve residents, businesses and all other stakeholders who are interested in the future of George Street.

Open days will be held by independent designers Ironside Farrar during the summer, where anyone will be welcome to drop in and give their views. The purpose of this work is to agree design principles and examine a range of options for George Street's layout.

The first public drop-in will be all day on 13 August in the Roxburghe Hotel.

Sadly it seems that for the moment and without notice cyclists are relegated to using Hill Street instead of George Street. Given that this is a cobbled surface, and one of the bumpiest in town at that, we don't think we'll be using it! ***

Hibernian FC – 140 years old today

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Today marks a significant date in the history of Hibs, and the Edinburgh Reporter looks back at the highs and lows of the club which led the way in providing several innovative changes to 'the beautiful game.'

Hibernian Football Club was launched on Friday, the 6th August 1875 as part of the celebration at the St Mary's Street Halls to mark the centenary of the birth of Daniel O'Connell, the champion of the Catholic Emancipation. Father Edward Hannan was elected as the Club's Manager and Life President and Michael Whelahan appointed Captain (a position to be held many years later by his great great great grand-nephew, Pat Stanton). It was Whelahan who chose the name Hibernian from the Latin word for Ireland.

The team was quickly taken under the wing of the Catholic Young Men's Society, or CYMS, which was based at the local St Patrick's Church in the Cowgate, who offered the Irishmen training and changing facilities. All the players were Catholic Irishmen or the descendants of Irishmen who had come to Edinburgh during the great Irish Potato Famines of the nineteenth century,

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In 1987, 'Hibs' became the first club from the east of Scotland to win the Scottish Cup, beating Dumbarton 2-1 in the final and as holders were invited to play top English side Preston North End in a game described as the 'Association Football Championship of the World.' In a hard-fought game, Hibernian emerged as 2-1 winners in front of a record crowd at the old Easter Road.

After going out of existence for a short period, Hibs returned as a founder member of the Scottish Second Division in 1893 and were promoted to the top flight two years later.

In 1902 Hibs won the Scottish Cup for the second (and last) time, beating Celtic 1-0, then the following year they won the Scottish League title under the leadership of legendry manager Dan McMichael.

Tragedy struck near the end of that decade when right back James Main was injured on Christmas Day 1909 during a match against Partick Thistle and four days later died from his injuries. (A plaque in his memory is located in the Famous Five Stand) Three more Scottish Cup final defeats were followed by relegation in 1930/31 and immediate promotion back to the top flight.

During WWII, Hibs won the 1941 Summer Cup winning 3-2 against Rangers at Hampden Park with a team containing Matt Busby. Three years later Hibs won the Southern League Cup, beating Rangers by 6 corners to 5 after a goalless draw.

After WWII, Hibernian won the League Championship three times in seasons 1947/48 1950/51 and 1951.

During this period also lost another Scottish Cup Final to Aberdeen despite taking an early lead and a Scottish League Cup Final to Motherwell.

In 1951, Hibs played in the first game in Scotland to be staged under floodlights, winning 5-3 against Stenhousemuir in a friendly. They also competed in the first competitive floodlight game when they drew 1-1 with Raith Rovers in a Scottish Cup tie.

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The forward line of that team was known as 'The Famous Five' and included Gordon Smith, Bobby Johnstone, Lawrie Reilly, Eddie Turnbull and Willie Ormond.

In 1955, Hibernian were invited to take part in the inaugural European Champions Cup, the first British club to compete. After beating German champions Rot Weiss Essen 4-0 away from home in the first round, Hibs progressed to the semi final where they were defeated by French side Reims.

In 1958, Hibs again lost in the final of the Scottish Cup, this time to Clyde 1-0 however the emergence of a teenage superstar Joe Baker helped ease the pain. Joe would go on to play 194 times over two spells, scoring an incredible 158 goals including nine in a famous 15-1 victory over Peebles Rovers in the Scottish Cup.

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More European adventures followed, including a famous 7-6 aggregate win over Barcelona then a 5-5 draw after a two legged Inter Cities Fairs Cup semi-final against Roma. Had the away goals rule been applicable, Hibs would have progressed to the final however a play off match was arranged in Italy and the Scots side were defeated.

Another famous name visited Easter Road in 1964 in a friendly match arranged by new manager Jock Stein, and Hibs defeated the great Real Madrid side 2-0 with the first goal being scored by teenager Peter Cormack. That year the team also won the summer Cup, beating Aberdeen over two legs.

In 1967 Hibs beat a Naples side which included Italian keeper Dino Zoff in goal, 5-0 at Easter Road, winning the tie 6-4 on aggregate.

During the 1960s, Hibs played some entertaining football but sold many of their star players for high fees, including Joe Baker, Neil Martin, Dave Gibson, Colin Stein, Peter Marinello and Peter Cormack.

In 1971, Eddie Turnbull returned to Easter Road as manager and created a team which is still revered to this day, known as the Turnbull's Tornadoes.

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The following year, after losing the Scottish Cup Final to Celtic, Hibs returned to Hampden to defeat the Hoops 5-3 in the Drybrough Cup Final, then 2-1 in the Scottish League Cup Final thanks to goals from Pat Stanton and Jimmy O'Rourke. Three weeks later, Hibs travelled across the city for the New Year's derby and won 0-7 in a game known to all fans as 'the Greatest game in History.' The Drybrough Cup was retained the following season but the team was broken up too early when Joe Harper was bought from Everton for a record Scottish transfer fee of £120,000. Harper helped the club to another League Cup Final and actually scored a hat trick but ended up with a runners -up medal.

Once again, many of the star players were transferred for big fees, including Alex Cropley, John Brownlie and John Blackley as Hibs' fortunes deteriorated.

In 1977 Hibs became the first club in Scotland to feature the name of a sponsor (Bukta) on their jerseys and a few years later under the leadership of Chairman Tom Hart, Hibs became the first club in the country to install undersoil heating.

Turnbull lead Hibs to another Scottish Cup Final in 1979 against Rangers however after two goalless draws, the Ibrox men eventually won the trophy 3-2 in the second replay.

The following season saw Hibs relegated despite the signing of former 'European Footballer of the Year' George Best but once again, their stay in the lower division was for one year only and they returned as champions of the First Division.

The 1980s saw another League Cup Final defeat, this time to Aberdeen and Chairman Kenny Waugh installed one of Scotland's first electronic scoreboards.

In 1990, Hearts' Chairman Wallace Mercer launched a takeover bid for the club however the supporters rallied under the banner of 'Hands off Hibs' and with the help of local businessman Sir Tom Farmer Hibernian were saved. Coincidentally relatives of Sir Tom helped save the club 100 years before.

The following year, the 'Team that wouldn't Die' won the Skol Scottish League Cup against all odds, beating Dunfermline 2-0 in the final at Hampden. With Sir Tom's backing, Easter Road was upgraded during the 1990s with the building of new stands at the north and south ends. The decade ended however with another relegation during the 1997/98 season, but new manager Alex McLeish was given funds to spend and amongst the arrivals was French international Franck Sauzee and Trinidad and Tobago star Russell Latapy.

Hibs easily won promotion and McLeish's team reached the 2001 Scottish Cup Final where they were defeated by a strong Celtic side.

After a spell in mid table, Hibs appointed Tony Mowbray as manager and he built a young team which included home grown talent such as Derek Riordan, Scott Brown, Garry O'Conner, Steven Whittaker, Kevin Thompson and Steven Fletcher. Mowbray subsequently moved to West Bromwich Albion but his successor John Collins led the team to a CIS League Cup win, beating Kilmarnock 5-1 in the final.

Since then, the team have been in decline although they did reach and lose two Scottish Cup Finals under Pat Fenlon before suffering relegation under Terry Butcher.

Last season, under new manager Alan Stubbs, the team finished second in the Championship but failed to gain promotion after losing to Rangers in the play offs.

Season 2015/16 starts on Saturday when Hibs take on Dumbarton.

"Brewhive are giving us so much more than just money," says Confessional's director, Jack Silver, "Even just getting rehearsal space in Edinburgh is a huge help, and Kevin, Anna and the team really got what we're trying to do with the play, which was important.

The "phenomenal success" of the crowd funding campaign, which raised over £3,500 in less than three days, helped persuade Brewhive to sponsor the play.

"The phenomenal success of Tramp's Indiegogo campaign proved to us that people really want to see this show, and so do we," says Dorren, "We're happy to support the arts and this show in particular.

"Brewhive and Tramp are both competing in crowded marketplaces," continues Dorren, "The Edinburgh Fringe in their case, the beer market in ours – but what we have in common is excellence and a passion for what we're producing."

The play is, "Like the best episode of Eastenders ever written," according to Silver.

The ambitious project from London-based Tramp has 9 cast members, and sees Tennessee William's play restaged in modern Britain, and made semi-immersive. The audience can sit in the bar during the pre-show, and are invited to, "Share a drink with a group of lowlifes and watch their lives implode."

"Confessional is an earlier draft of Small Craft Warnings,"

explains Silver, "It's set in a bar and follows the fortunes of a group of low-lifes over the course of a single evening. "The play is semi-immersive, so the audience will get to sit and drink with the regulars while the action unfolds around them. It's like getting to sit in an episode of Eastenders, except it's the best episode ever, as it was written by Tennessee Williams. It's fun, fiery, funny, and hauntingly beautiful."

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Lizzie Stanton, who plays beautician Leona Dawson, explains, "When Jack first suggested doing Confessional I wasn't sure that it would work in British accents, but Tennessee has written these amazing characters that transcend their setting and it really, really works. The play deals with love, loss, betrayal, loneliness, hatred — all things that connect with a modern audience just as much as when he wrote it.

"I've fallen in love with Leona. She's such a force of nature and so different to me in so many ways. I wish I could be more like her at times. We've got an amazing cast and we've all fallen in love with our characters and with the play."

"Confessional is a stunning play. It deserves to be much better known. At first reading it seems like a simple bar-room drama," says Jack Silver, "But Williams' masterful use of religious metaphors and his tackling of taboo subjects like homophobia, promiscuity, and medical malpractice make it much, much more than that.

"I've been blessed with a superbly talented and open-minded cast. There are some career-launching performances in Confessional, and Lizzie Stanton, is electric as Leona Dawson, the play's lead.

"When I decided to direct Confessional I always wanted audiences to be unable to take their eyes off the action for the full hour. It's a fun, booze-fuelled hour but with the writing of a genuine literary genius to underpin it all." *Confessional* by Tennessee Williams is on at 7.05pm from 6th August to 31st August at C-Cubed's Main Space (Venue 50) in Celtic Lodge at the end of the Royal Mile (Lawnmarket). "His owner may have moved to Edinburgh without updating the details on the chip. This lovely boy is long-haired and has distinctive black markings on his face.

Teenager arrested following theft of motorcycle

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Edinburgh's Operation RAC officers have arrested and charged a teenage male following the theft of a motorcycle earlier this week.

A Honda PCX moped was reported stolen from the car park at Craigleith Retail Park on Monday 3rd August and was then spotted by police in Marine Drive at around 5.30pm.

After a short search of the Muirhouse area a 17-year-old was detained and the moped was recovered nearby.

The male was subsequently charged and is due to appear in court today for the theft of the vehicle and a number of road traffic offences.

Superintendent Alan Porte said: "Operation RAC actively targets all forms of acquisitive crime, including housebreaking and vehicle theft to bring offenders to justice.

"Everyday we recover more stolen property such as cars, motorcycles and personal possessions and reunite them with their rightful owners.

"Our efforts to tackle acquisitive crime will continue and police will thoroughly investigate any and all reports we receive relating to crimes of this nature."

'Tyson' abandoned outside Sainsbury's in Straiton

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The Scottish SPCA is appealing for information after a dog with a microchip registered to an address in Stoke-on-Trent was abandoned outside a Midlothian supermarket. Scotland's animal welfare charity was alerted on Monday (3 August) by a member of the public who noticed the Staffordshire bull terrier tied up next to Sainsbury's in Straiton.

The white and tan dog, who is microchipped with the name Tyson, is now in the care of the charity's animal rescue and rehoming centre in Balerno.

Senior Inspector John Toule said, "Tyson was found at the side of the store near the loading bay where there is no CCTV.

"The customer service staff at Sainsbury's put out several tannoy announcements but no one came forward. It is thought Tyson was tied up outside the store for most of the day. Unfortunately the contact numbers registered to his chip are unrecognised.

"It is possible that the owners have moved from Stoke-on-Trent to the Midlothian area and the details on the chip have not been updated. We would like to hear from anyone who recognises Tyson or has any information."

Abandoning an animal is an offence under the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006. Anyone found guilty of doing so could be banned from keeping animals for a fixed period or life.

"Her visit, along with the Golden Ticket day and steam excursions, will make it an exciting time for Midlothian and the Scottish Borders – and the country as a whole.

"These events will have an impact on our scheduled services, but we have tried to limit the inconvenience to our passengers, and sincerely thank everyone for their understanding."

He added, "Timetable alterations may not show in online ticket purchasing systems for a few days, so customers should check closer to the time before making any plans to travel on the Borders line in the first few weeks after opening."

Every day at 2pm from 8-30 August, visitors to the Museum will be invited to enjoy a different talent each day, from bold brass and fabulous fiddlers, to soprano soloists and singer-songwriters.

A magnificent display of wildflowers is adding summer colour to Scotland's First World War Centenary Wood in the Pentland Hills.

Millions of seeds from flowers including poppies, cornflower and mayweed were scattered by local cadets and scouts last November to form two large meadows.

Alan Mitchell from the Woodland Trust Scotland said: "The wildflower meadows have exploded into life in the last few weeks. There's a wide range of wildflowers in the mix that flower at different times, so they are changing almost every day at the moment.

"We've included a number of flowers that will take another year or two to flower including foxgloves, vipers bugloss and meadow cranesbill, so the meadows will continue to change over time."

The Woodland Trust Scotland is working in partnership with the Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) to create Scotland's First World War Centenary Wood at Dreghorn and Castlelaw Ranges near Edinburgh.

More than 50,000 native trees will be planted over 100 acres, connecting existing woodland and proving new habitat for wildlife. Members of the public can dedicate a tree within the new woodland at www.woodlandtrust.org.uk/fww

The Trust is planting millions of trees to mark the centenary of the conflict with the support of lead partner Sainsbury's, key individuals, landowners, schools and community groups.

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Andy Black (Billy Elliot the Musical, Young Hearts Run Free) has teamed up with internationally renowned director Molly Molloy and composer Richard Gallagher to create a highoctane interactive theatre piece peppered with fairy tale characters, pseudo-spiritual experiences and the occasional 30-second rave!

Life for man who murdered his landlord in Kirknewton

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James Smith

A man who killed his landlord and concealed his body has been sentenced to life in prison at Edinburgh High Court today.

James Smith was found guilty of murder last month following the death of Alex Cameron at a rural property in Kirknewton earlier this year.

Smith (58) attacked 67-year-old Cameron at the address in West Cairns Farm on 19th January before burying his body on the grounds.

Officers had been conducting a missing person investigation after Alex Cameron failed to show up to a family funeral and inquiries led to the Kirknewton property.

During the police investigation on the site, Smith subsequently confessed to the murder and provided detailed information, which resulted in the recovery of Mr Cameron's body.

Detective Inspector Stuart Wilson from the Major Investigation Team said: "Alex Cameron was subjected to a violent assault on West Cairns Farm and sustained a number of serious injuries, which ultimately resulted in his death. "James Smith then went to extraordinary lengths to conceal his victim's body before eventually confessing to his crime.

"As a result of today's sentencing, Smith will now spend a significant period of time in prison and I hope that the family of Alex Cameron can put their ordeal behind them."

Bathgate woman convicted of dog neglect

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A West Lothian woman whose dog was found to be extremely thin has been convicted following a Scottish SPCA investigation.

Theresa Leggat, 23, of Newlands Court, Bathgate, was sentenced at Livingston Sheriff Court on Monday (3 August).

Leggat pled guilty to causing her husky type dog, named Saska, unnecessary suffering by failing to take her to a vets for a period of three weeks, contrary to the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006.

Leggat was fined ± 270 and banned from owning more than one dog for five years.

Commenting on the investigation and court case, Inspector Jenni Surgeon said, "Saska's ribs, spine and pelvic bones were easily felt through her coat.

"We took her to a vets where she was given a body condition score of two out of nine, with one being emaciated.

"Saska was put on a weight-gain programme in our care and made an excellent recovery. She has since been rehomed to a loving new owner."
